

MINUTES OF SOUTHERN SECTION

CALIFORNIA INTERSCHOLASTIC FEDERATION

MARCH 16, 1921

The Council of the Southern Section of the C. I. F. met in called meeting at the Y. M. C. A. Building at three-thirty P. M. March 16, 1921.

The minutes of February 15, 1921 were read and approved as corrected.

Southern California Track Meet

It was moved, seconded and carried to pay 5¢ per mile one way for all athletes who competed in the Southern California track meet April 16, who have to come a distance greater than 25 miles.

It was agreed to authorize Mr. Van Patton to hold preliminary heats in the 880 yd. and 440 yd. races of Thursday afternoon, April 16, if in his judgement this were necessary and that the above mileage be allowed all who competed.

Weight Teams

It was moved, seconded and carried that in weight teams no school should be allowed to use a man on more than one team during same week.

Special Case of Ray Wilhite

Mr. F. S. Hayden, Principal of Citrus Union High School, was present and requested that the case of Ray Wilhite be re-considered.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the case be re-considered.

The President of the Council then read a statement from the boy, one from Mr. Hayden. and one from Mr. Rannister of Orange

Addressed the Council either pro or contra in reference to this case.

Statement of Fact

Ray Wilhite entered Oxnard High School without a change of residence and with no attempt to conceal the fact. He played with the Oxnard High Baseball team for three games which they won. Oxnard won the League Schedule.

In about eight weeks he returned to Citrus Union High School and was played by that school during the rest of the semester as soon as he was passing in his studies.

Motion that was Reconsidered

That Ray Wilhite be suspended for one year from date - February 20, 1921.

It was moved, seconded and carried to amend the motion by suspending for one semester from date, instead of one year from date.

Central League-Excused from voting.

Chair then declared the motion passed yes-7; No-3; No vote-1

It was moved, seconded and carried that that part of the minutes of February 25, which reads, "He further boasted that he knew that he was breaking a rule of the C. I. F. and was putting it over on the schools" had not been substantiated and therefore should be stricken out.

The Chair ruled that an ineligible boy may play with a junior college team or with a town team during his time of ineligibility without jeopardizing his next semester's standing.

Case of Oxnard

The Secretary reported that Ventura had telephoned protesting Oxnard because of Wilhite.

The Chair ruled that the Wilhite and Redondo cases had been irregularly considered by the Council and that hereafter the League must settle such cases and be brought before the Council only on appeal. The Oxnard case was therefore referred to the Northern League for investigation and action, and to come before the Council only on appeal.

Case of La Verne College

A representative from the La Verne College stated that they had been playing "an institutional team" (college and high school combined) and they did not wish to break the C. I. F. rules. This team did not play during the League season.

The Chair ruled that any school could play an institutional team provided this team did not play during the League season for the sport.

Case of Redondo

Mr. Langworthy came before the Council and asked that the Redondo case be reconsidered. It was moved by Mr. Fisher and seconded by Mr. Malcolm that we reconsider. Carried.

The Chair raised the point that this case should have been settled by the Bay League. Mr. Green stated that to refer to the Bay League would be a loss of time for the case would come up on appeal.

Mr. Langworthy stated that he wished the Council to give final judgement now.

The Chair agreed to the consideration of the question.

Statement of Fact

Mr. Langworthy stated that he was greatly surprised to find the boy had played for Redondo during his 9th and 10th semesters.

The boy was under-sized as a freshman and had not played that year and that the boy had forgotten that he had been in school over

After a general discussion a vote was called on the motion to suspend Redondo for the rest of the school year of 1920-21.

Case of Gardena and Redondo

Last year Gardena and Redondo had been suspended from baseball for the year 1920-21 because men had played Sunday Baseball during the League Season.

The Chair ruled that unless there was a motion to reconsider the action of last year, the suspension would stand.

It was moved by Mr. Fisher and seconded by Mr. H. J. Moore that the decision of the Chair be sustained; carried without dissenting vote.

The Chair then ruled that hereafter all cases of protest must be settled by the League and come up to us in the form of an appeal from the decision of the League.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the Chair and Mr. H. J. Moore be a committee to prepare a blank form to be used in cases of protest.

It was agreed to instruct managers to inform teams in the semi-final schedules that unless the winner at once inform the manager of the place of play, the names of officials, and the score, the winner would not be allowed to enter the next round of the semi-finals.

There being no further business, the Council adjourned at 7:30 P. M.

A. Transferred Pupils from other schools.

A. Transferred Pupil.

1. Is he under twenty-one?
2. Is he a graduate of High School?
3. Is he an amateur?
4. How many semesters has he been in other High Schools?
5. Was he in school the semester just before transfer?
6. Did he pass in three units of work the semester just before transfer?
7. Is he passing in the work of the current semester in three units of work?
(When we transfer a pupil to another school, we ought to send the above information to the new Principal)
8. Did he change schools with or without a change of residence of his parents?

B. Pupil who has been in no other school.

1. Is he under twenty-one?
2. Is he an amateur?
3. Was he in school the semester immediately preceding the semester of the game?
4. Did he pass in three units of work the semester immediately preceding the semester of the game?
5. Is he passing for the current semester?
6. How many semesters has he been in school?
7. Is he an undergraduate?

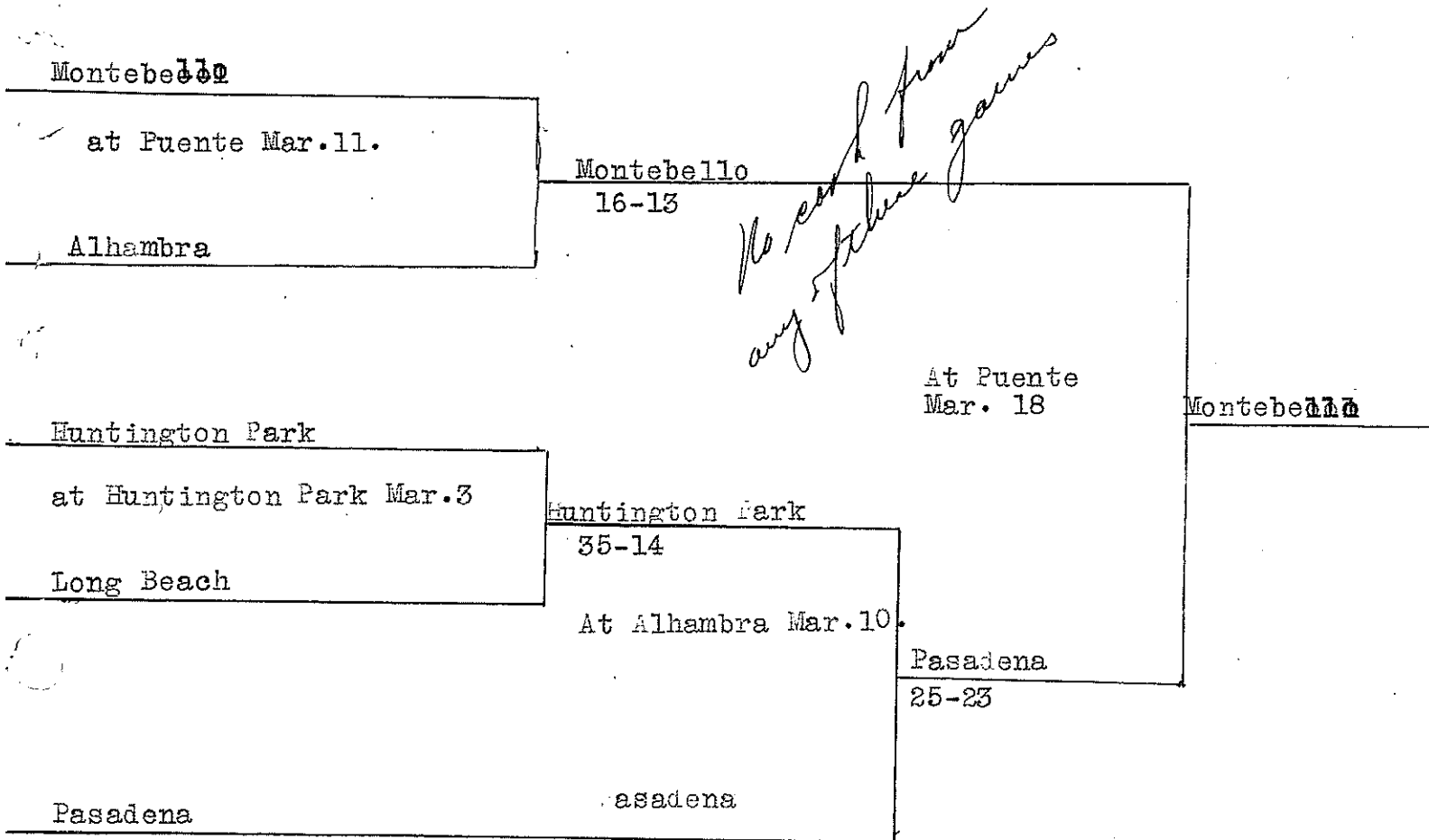
