THIRD MEETING—MARCH 5, 1927—CALLED MEETING

The Council of the California Interscholastic Federation Southern Section, met in called meeting at the Y. M. C. A., in Los Angeles, California, at 9:30 A. M., March 5, 1927.

President Aldrich called the meeting to order and asked for a Roll Call.

The minutes of December 18, 1926, were approved as printed.

1. The Secretary reported that there was some misunderstanding in the San Gabriel League with reference to some of the boys in Covina High School, and that Covina should be requested to furnish information as to the Grammar School attendance of several players. The Vice-Principal, Mr. Ross, of Covina, agreed to investigate and submit to the proper authorities the information desired.

The Secretary reported that it had been found that William Arenas was born June 2, 1906, and Jerry Cole was born March 27, 1906.

2—PROTESTS

The Southern Section through the Secretary protested the following teams:

There was a very general discussion by members, Secretary, and Manager Squire.

The Secretary based his protests on the following rules:

The Chair ruled several motions out of order stating that the rules were well known and made to be obeyed.

The Protests of the Secretary were sustained if facts were as stated above.

It was moved, seconded, and carried, that in as much as Hemet, Lancaster, and Ventura Class C teams had been declared ineligible San Bernardino should not be required to play any other school coming up through that leg of the playoff.

3. It was agreed to have the Managers and Secretary meet

and send out a letter before next Fall calling the attention of new Coaches and Principals to rules governing contests.

4. It was moved, seconded, and carried, that all Four Point Records must be mailed hereafter to the Secretary on or before Friday of the fourth week of each semester, which date must not be later than October 15th for the first semester and March 15th for the second semester

5. FRATERNITIES. The details of the Long Beach suit and the "Little" Bill which is before the State Legislature were explained by Mr. Oliver.

A. It was moved, seconded, and carried, that a warrant be drawn on the Treasury for \$150.00 Attorney's Fees for services in the recent court proceedings at Long Beach.

B. It was moved, seconded, and carried, that the following resolution of the Tri-County League be written into the minutes:

RESOLUTION

It was moved, seconded, and carried that each representative at the meeting secure the hearty support of his League, both financially and morally, in securing the enforcement of the Anti-Fraternity Rule; and that the representative recommend to his League that it pass a resolution to that effect, such as the resolution passed by the Tri-County League.

C. It was moved, seconded, and carried "That the C. I. F., S. S., feels that if any modification of the present Anti-Fraternity Law is made, it should be in the direction of strengthening rather than weakening the present Law. It is felt that the Little Bill tends to weaken the law by restricting the powers of School Trustees."

6—COLLEGE CODE OF ETHICS.

Mr. Johns reported that the Bay League had taken action on the movement started by the Secretary, urging the Colleges to adopt a Code of Ethics to be applied to the elimination of scouting for athletes, and that the Bay League had unanimously sanctioned the movement and had appointed him to request the C. I. F., S. S., to take action.

A—THE BIG TEN CODE OF ETHICS.

- Scholarships shall not be awarded on a basis of Athletic skill.
- Athletic directors and coaches shall not recruit prospective candidates in any manner.
- General or field alumni secretaries, similar officers, and alumni shall be particularly careful to refrain from recruiting activities.
- Prospective athletes shall not be promised employment.

B. It was moved, seconded, and carried, that the C. I. F., express its approval of the movement started by Mr. Green, Secretary of the C. I. F., S. S., to eliminate scouting by colleges for athletes.

C. It was moved, seconded, and carried, that a list of the Colleges that favor the movement be furnished the High School Principals.

7—RE-LEAGUING—

The President requests that all suggestions for re-leaguings be filed with Mr. Green, Secretary, on or before April 3rd, and the Secretary to issue a copy of all recommendations and suggestions received to each Principal on or before April 18th. Final action will take place May 7th, at the Annual Meeting.

8—TRAVELING EXPENSES—

It was moved, seconded, and carried, that traveling expenses of two cents per mile per man each way be allowed for teams in all inter-league and semi-final games in football, baseball, and basketball.

9—TRACK—

A. It was moved, seconded, and carried, that the Javelin be continued as an exhibition event.

B. Hereafter no school is to receive money for the first twenty-five miles or less traveled; five cents per mile per man, for each mile over twenty-five and up to 100 miles; and six cents per mile for each mile over 100 miles. Reimbursement to be for distances traveled one way.

EXAMPLE—Town X is 145 miles from Los Angeles. The rate would be 5 cents per mile for 75 miles and 6 cents per mile for 45 miles.

The Secretary wishes to call the attention of Principals to the following:

- A. Track season starts first day of February and Four Point Record Sheets should be in for Class "C."
- B. Swimming season starts first day of April and Four Point Record sheets should be in for Class "C" before that date.
- C. The Four Point Record Sheet is YOUR Official Record. Give exact birth, Oct. 12, 1492; give exact weight; give exact height; give exact semesters.

NOT THIS WAY—Age—16 year, 3 months.

Weight—Less than 140 pounds.

Height—Less than 68 inches.

Semesters—10th Grade.

Check and recheck the Four Point list. See that there are no mistakes. This is the official list and MUST stand. If you have a boy on this list 6 years old, he must stay six for all time. If he is 9 feet high, he must stay 9 feet. If he is 200 pounds, he must stay 200 pounds.

Boys who enter school after list has been sent in should be sent in on extra sheet if they enter from school outside of the Southern Section.

Boys who enter from schools in this Section should be listed on extra sheet giving name of school from which they transfer.

D. School entering semi-finals must send to the Secretary "pink" sheet three days before the game. "Pink" sheet MUST agree with Four Point Record—if it does not, the Four Point Record stands. Boys on "pink" sheet and not on "Four Point" Record are ineligible.

"Pinks" are to be sent in for Class A games also.

E. The Secretary believes that any one has a right to question the eligibility of any player on any team for any school.

It is the duty of any Principal to re-check players in doubt. It is not a question of the honesty or integrity of the Principal, but a question of facts, which might not have been given to the Principal.

If man in question is found ineligible, all games in which the man played are forfeited without disgrace to the Principal.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.
