Saturday, March 23—The Twenty-Fifth Annual Huntington Beach Invitational Meet will be held. Forty schools have signified their intention of taking part. A special program is being planned by Huntington Beach in celebration of a quarter of a century of great annual track and field meets.

Saturday, April 13—The Class B and Class C Tennis Tournaments will be held at the Mark Keppel High School. Entry blanks will be sent out with the April Bulletin.

Wednesday, April 24—The C. I. F., Southern Section Gymnastics Championship will be held at the Mark Keppel High School. Entry blanks for this event will be sent out early in April.

BASEBALL AGREEMENT

Below is the text of an agreement which has been entered into between the major and minor professional baseball clubs and the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations.

This agreement was ratified by the State Coun-

cil of the C. I. F. at its meeting in Salinas in December, 1945.

"Agreement Between Professional Baseball and the National High School Federation

A SOLICITATION AND CONTRACT AGREEMENT was drawn up by the Joint Baseball Committee to protect the eligibility of students attending any high school which is a member of the National Federation and of any student who has been eligible in such high school and whose class has not yet graduated. That agreement has now been adopted by the Major and Minor Baseball Leagues and by the National Federation. The agreement follows.

"No student of a high school which is a member of the National Federation of High School Associations shall be signed to a professional baseball contract until the day following his graduation, or, if he has left school, until the day following graduation of his class; nor shall any representative of Professional Baseball initiate or participate in any negotiations which would violate such a boy's high school athletic eligibility; except that a boy out of school one year or longer may, with the consent of his parents, apply to the Commissioner for permission to sign a contract and if, in the judgment of the Commissioner, the circumstances justify it, he shall approve the application and so notify all clubs. Such a player may be signed to a professional contract fifteen (15) days subsequent to the date of the Commissioner's notice.

Penalties for Violation

A. For Professional Baseball Official: Any contract made in violation of above agreement shall be declared null and void, and the offending club shall be permanently prohibited from using such player. Also, any club which fails to establish that it did not know and by exercising reasonable care and diligence, could not have known, that the player was connected with high school baseball and was still eligible therefore, shall be fined \$500.00. Any club official or employee conducting any such negotiations and who does not establish that he did not know, and by exercising reasonable care and diligence could not have known of such interference with player eligibility, shall be declared ineligible for one year.

B. For High School Officials: Any school whose employee or official encourages or collaborates in such negotiations will be suspended from its state high school association and made ineligible to compete with other high schools or will be penalized in a similar manner in ac-

cordance with the state association policy relative
to penalties.

Additional High School Federation Responsibility

The High Schools, through their National

Federation of State High School Athletic Asso-
ciations, shall use their best efforts to promote
a uniform set of eligibility rules as such rules
are related to professional baseball activity. The
National Federation will further assist through
providing a summary of those parts of the state
high school eligibility rules which apply to base-
ball activities, and will make these summaries
available for distribution to all Professional Base-
ball Clubs so that representatives of such clubs
will be familiar with the limits under which nego-
tiations may be made in any given state.

Agreement Period and Parties to the Agreement

This agreement is in effect for the two years
of 1946 and 1947, and applies to those member
and affiliated state high school associations of
the National Federation, whose athletic officers
become parties to the terms of the agreement.
Interpretations of this agreement will be made
jointly by the Commissioner of Baseball and the
Executive Secretary of the High School Federa-
tion, acting in conjunction with the Joint Base-
ball Committee."

STATE TRACK MEET

The State Council at its meeting on December
1, 1945, voted to revive the State Track Meet
and to hold it in Southern California.

The following letter is self explanatory.

Dear Mr. Ingham:

As time goes on, there seems to be some ques-
tion as to the number of sections that will take
part in the State Track Meet. According to your
letter, it seems likely that Oakland, San Francisco,
and the two other northern sections will not send
contestants to the State Meet. At a meeting of
the City of Los Angeles principals yesterday, they
decided to take part in a meet under the juris-
diction of the A. A. U. which is to be held in
the Coliseum on the day of the State Track
Meet.

All this brings up the question of whether or
not there is sufficient interest to justify holding
the Meet. The Southern Section has decided to
hold the Meet at Compton, but some of us are
wondering if it will be merely a duplication of

the Southern California Meet due to lack of
interest in the other sections of the state.

Since the Principals' Convention is to be held
more than a month before the date set for the
Track Meet, I believe that notice should be
sent out to all members of the State Council ask-
ing them to come prepared to state definitely
regarding entries from their sections and if a
poll of the members indicates a general lack of
interest, that we give up the idea of holding the
Meet this year.

I believe that your suggestion of Tuesday
evening, April 16, as the time for the State Coun-
cil meeting to be held at the place of the Prin-
cipals' Convention, is a good one and the Coun-
cil members should be notified to that effect.

method be followed in all C. I. F., Southern Section swimming meets:

Change the wording of Rule VII Official Start N. C. A. A. Swimming Rules to read,

Section 1. In all swimming races except the back stroke the contestants shall be on their starting stations and upon the signal, "Take your marks" shall assume any starting position, provided they hold a steady balance for an appreciable length of time. When the starter is assured that swimmers are steady, he starts the race.

(Explanation: This will prevent the swimmers from taking a step forward, trying to get their feet placed, and assuming a crouching position all in one command.)

SWIMMING COACHES MEET

Mr. Van Patten presided over the meeting and the following plans for the year were agreed upon:

(a) To have a swimming relay at Whittier High School pool on Thursday afternoon, February 21.

(b) The following events will be staged in the order given:

- (1) Class C 6 x 100 feet Free style
- (2) Class B 6 x 100 feet Free style
- (3) Class A 6 x 100 feet Free style
- (4) Class C 4 x 100 feet Breast stroke
- (5) Class B 4 x 200 feet Breast stroke
- (6) Class A 4 x 200 feet Breast stroke
- (7) Class C 4 x 100 feet Back stroke
- (8) Class B 4 x 200 feet Back stroke
- (9) Class A 4 x 200 feet Back stroke
- (10) Class C 4 x 100 feet Free style
- (11) Class B 4 x 200 feet Free style
- (12) Class A 4 x 200 feet Free style
- (13) Class C 3 x 100 feet Medley
- (14) Class B 3 x 200 feet Medley
- (15) Class A 3 x 200 feet Medley

(c) It was agreed that no boy could enter more than four events.

(d) The entry fee was set at \$1.00 per team, per event.

(e) It was decided to give the winning team medals and the 2nd, 3rd, 4th, and 5th place winners ribbons.

Open Meet

(f) It was decided to have an open meet on Saturday, March 16 at the Compton College, morning and afternoon.

(g) The events in the meet to be the regular C. I. F., Southern Section events.

(h) No school to enter more than three boys in any event.

(i) The entry fee to be 25c per boy, per event.

j) Give medals to the first five boys in each event.

Championship Meet

(k) It was agreed to recommend to the Council that the Championship Meet be sponsored by the Flintridge School for boys and held in the Occidental College pool.

(l) The preliminaries on Wednesday, May 8, and the finals on Friday, May 10.

(m) Leagues having a regular swimming meet to be entitled to send three boys per event to the preliminaries. The Commissioner of Athletics to arrange a free lance swimming meet at Whittier for others to try to qualify.

(n) Voted to keep diving in the program as in the 1945 Blue Book.

These plans of the coaches were approved by the Executive Committee.

SWIMMING RELAYS

The swimming relays held at the Whittier High School pool on Thursday, February 21, were a great success so far as number of schools in the competition was concerned. There were thirteen schools and well over three hundred boys who took part.

Fifteen events were scheduled and in all but two, preliminary heats had to be swum. That made a total of forty-three races for the afternoon which took nearly four hours to finish. A summary of the times showed that the boys were actually in the pool swimming over an hour and a half.

The response to the invitation to participate in these relays indicates a very marked increase in interest in swimming.

A summary of the score is given below.
