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C.I.F. PROTECTION FUND INFORMATION

Mr. Dana Winters, chairman of the committee appointed by the C.I.F. Southern Section Council to look into the problems of school insurance, made his report at the meeting February 5, 1955. The questions raised by this committee are listed below, and the answers given by A. B. Ingham, Executive Secretary of the C.I.F.P.F. are briefly stated:

Q. May the maximum of protection be increased?

A. The CIF Protection Fund is a non-profit benefit and relief association and it can make payments on account of injuries on the basis of the monies collected. The maximum of \$500 for an injury is, in general, adequate for 99% of the injuries which occur. However, if the schools desire a higher maximum, such can be arranged.

Q. Is hospitalization provided by the CIFPF?

A. Yes, hospitalization is provided.

Q. Cannot ambulance service be provided?

A. Yes, it is possible that ambulance service can be provided under the present schedule of dues if ambulance is used only for fractured legs, back, concussion, etc.

Q. Can the Protection Fund follow more closely the Industrial Accident Commission's fee schedule?

A. Yes, it is anticipated that the 1954 Industrial Accident Commission's fee schedule will be the basis of payment of claims for the school year of 1955-56.

Q. Should not the CIF provide a branch office in Southern California?

A. This would add to the cost of doing business and would result in confusion inasmuch as decisions would be given from two offices and they would not always be in agreement. With the addition of an Assistant Executive Secretary it will be possible to make more frequent personal contacts with the schools.

Q. Could not some of the follow-through responsibilities on the part of the school principals be eliminated?

A. Yes, we are working on plans to reduce the follow-through work on the part of the principals. In those schools that desire, we anticipate

that a large part of the responsibility will be placed on the student and his parent to see that bills are sent to the State CIFPF office. It is also possible to make checks payable directly to the doctor and/or hospital concerned.

Q. May not the CIF eliminate the time limit for coverage?

A. The time limit for coverage may be extended if the injury is a serious one and requires lengthy care.

Q. Is it necessary to make the statement in the Fund's bulletin that claims will be paid if funds are available?

A. No, this is no longer necessary, for the Fund now has sufficient surplus to guarantee payments.

Q. Should the CIF negotiate with a private company to underwrite a statewide insurance program?

A. This does not seem advisable, for the private company must have profits of from 25% to 50% while the CIFPF can operate on a 10% margin for its overhead.

Q. Can the CIF Protection Fund compete with private companies which are profit-making concerns?

A. There is no question but that the CIF can compete favorably with private companies. One of the best coverages offered by a private company in California for high school football requires a premium of \$10 from the boy, while the CIFPF requires \$8.90 per boy. For example, this private company provides a maximum payment of only \$72 for the surgeon for a compound fracture of the clavicle requiring OPEN reduction while the CIFPF provides up to \$250. An almost unlimited list of other examples showing the great difference between the two plans can be given.

Bill Russell, assistant executive secretary of the State CIF, stated that the policy of the Federated Council is to find out what the school men of California wish to have to fill their insurance needs, to inform the administrators what the costs would be, to ask if the costs could be met, and to provide the insurance protection desired. The CIFPF will continue to offer maximum coverage to athletes and pupils on a minimum non-profit cost basis.

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RUSSELL NAMED ADVISOR TO BASKETBALL TRAINING FILM

Bill Russell, former Commissioner of the Southern Section and now Assistant Executive Secretary of the State C.I.F., has been named as a technical advisor to the new basketball training film to be made in Kansas City, Missouri, under the sanction of the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations.

Russell will suggest basketball play situations and rule interpretations which might be incorporated into the film to improve the conduct of the game. In addition to experience as a high school, college, and AAU basketball competitor, Russell has served as an official for the three groups over a period of 15 years. In 1953 and 1954 he served as Instructional Committee Chairman for the Southern California Basketball Officials Association.

The film, "Better Basketball," is sponsored by the Official Sports Film Service, and is sanctioned by H. V. Porter and Oswald Tower, editor and interpreter respectively of the National Basketball Rules Committee of the United States and Canada. The movie will include any changes which the basketball rules committee may make for the 1955-56 season. Russell will attend the NCAA basketball and semi-finals and finals at Kansas City, and observe the work of the national basketball rules committee which meets during the week of March 20. Filming of the scenes will take place March 21 to 26. The previous editions of the film have been shown nationwide to coaches, players, officials, student body groups, and others interested in learning more about the game.

TRADITIONAL WHITTIER SWIM RELAYS HUGE SUCCESS

The 1955 Whittier High School Swimming Relays, now a traditional event in C.I.F. swim circles, will go down in record as one of the best events ever held. Under the direction of meet manager Frank Poucher, and with the weather man cooperating by providing ideal temperatures for the outdoor pool, the competitors and a capacity crowd of rooters, enjoyed themselves thoroughly.

A total of 215 teams, representing 22 schools, competed in the preliminaries in this year's event. In the finals, team titles were won by Long Beach Wilson in Class A, by Long Beach Jordan in Class B, and by host Whittier High School in Class C.

New meet records were set in four events. L. B. Wilson smashed El Segundo's old mark

of 2:21.3 in the four-man 200 ft. Free Style Relay, with a brilliant time of 2:19.7. The El Segundo record was set in 1950, and the fact that it had stood for four years indicates further the outstanding performance by the Wilson team. One "B" record was broken by the four-man 200 ft. Breast Stroke Relay team from Long Beach Jordan, when they negotiated the distance in 3:05.7, clipping two tenths of a second off the old record formerly held by L. B. Wilson. In the Class C division, two new marks went into the record book. Fullerton's six-man 100 ft. Free Style Relay team lowered Whittier High School's old mark to 1:43.6. Bill Denny, Jim Hamilton, J. Miller, and K. Miller of El Segundo High School, set a new mark of 1:24.5, in the four-man 100 ft. Back Stroke.

WHITTIER HS CAPTURES WRESTLING CHAMPIONSHIP

After winning five straight C.I.F., Southern Section Wrestling Championships, San Diego HS was finally dethroned by an outstanding team from Whittier HS, at the championship finals which were held at La Jolla HS, Friday, March 4, 1955. Coach Joe Incorvia's Whittier team amassed 47 points through the individual efforts of six boys who picked up three first place medals, two second place awards, and one third place medal. Kearny HS of San Diego, with 35 points took second place honors, followed closely by Mira Costa and San Diego High Schools, with 34 and 30 points respectively.

The championship meet was conducted under ideal conditions by Mr. Bill Bailey of the San Diego City Schools, Physical Education Department. An enthusiastic crowd was in attendance for the matches, which featured lots of action.

The week previous to the championship meet, two divisional meets were held to qualify boys for the finals. The northern schools went to Whittier HS, where under the direction of Coach Joe Incorvia, five boys were qualified in each weight classification. In the south, Mr. Bill Bailey conducted the divisional tournament at La Jolla HS, on Saturday, February 26.
