COMPTON HS WINS ITS FIFTH CIF, SS "AAA" BASKETBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

Although finishing second to Dominguez HS in the torrid Coast League race, the Compton Tarbabes came on strong in the play-offs to overwhelm Ramona HS of Riverside 52-38 and capture their fifth CIF, SS crown in a game played on March 9, in the beautiful Long Beach Arena before 8,051 screaming fans.

Compton, playing superb defense and shooting well, took a 12 to 9 lead at the end of the first quarter and were never headed. "Jumpin" Joe Davis, versatile 6-5, 175-pound center was the key figure in Compton's smashing triumph as he took high-point honors with 24 points and completely subdued Larry Bunce, Ramona's 6-11 center. Harvey Dillon and Mike Jacobs were also outstanding for the Tarbabes.

Steve Barber, dynamic 6-0 junior guard, scored

more than half of Ramona's points in a losing cause. With Bunce having a cold night, it was evident to all in attendance that the Rams, champions of the strong Citrus Belt League, were destined to go down in defeat. They battled all the way, however, but it just wasn't their night as the poised Tarbabes dominated play throughout the evening.

The victory for Coach Bill Armstrong and his Compton cagers marked the fifth time in the past 13 years that the CIF, SS basketball championship has gone to Compton HS. No other school can even approach that record and it places them third in the total number of championships won. Long Beach Poly leads the pack with 7 titles, closely followed by Whittier with 6 and Compton with five.

CALIFORNIA INTERSCHOLASTIC FEDERATION, SOUTHERN SECTION

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In the battle for third place, Pius X scored a convincing victory over a fighting West Covina team, 69-52. The Warriors, champions of the strong Catholic League, will be a definite factor in the 1964 play-offs, as Coach Jim O'Connor loses only one boy out of the 14 that constituted his 1963 squad. All starters return except forward Errol Mathieu. With the experience gained in this year's postseason competition, the Warriors will be plenty tough next year and will definitely be the team to beat.

With all three championship games played in the Arena on the same night, it was possible for the first time to select an all-tournament ten and an outstanding player. The selections were made by the prep sport writers and it was a near unanimous choice of Joe Davis of Compton as the outstanding performer of the 1963 tournament. The balance of the all-tournament team included the following: Steve Barber, Ramona HS; Andy Herrera, Santa Clara HS; Larry Bunce, Ramona HS; Dean Donnellon, Pius X HS; Harvey Dillon, Compton HS; Dan Deurwaarder, El Segundo HS; Gary Horkey, Chadwick School; Joe Davis, Compton HS; Ron Lutz, Laguna Beach HS; and Mike Jacobs, Compton HS.

The facilities at the Long Beach Arena were outstanding and for the first time in the history of the CIF, SS basketball play-offs, all of the fans who wanted to see the championship games were able to secure admittance and find a seat. We are looking forward to returning to Long Beach next year and anticipate an even bigger and better tournament. Appreciation is extended to the personnel at all of the participating schools who cooperated so well to assure the success of this activity.

SANTA CLARA CONTINUES DOMINATION IN "A" BASKETBALL PLAY-OFFS

After a lapse of one year, when they finished in the runner-up spot, the Santa Clara Saints came back strong to recapture the CIF, SS "A" basketball championship by downing Chadwick School, 70-60, in a hard-fought battle before 8,000 fans in the beautiful new Sports Arena in Long Beach on Saturday night, March 9, 1963. Champions in 1959, 1960 and 1961, the Saints were edged out of the title last year by a strong Laguna Beach HS five, 58-54. Lou Cvijanovich's charges were not to be denied this year, however, as Mike O'Brien and Andy Herrera each scored 26 points to give Santa Clara the CIF, SS championship in four out of the last five years. This is truly a remarkable achievement for this small school from Oxnard where basketball players seem to develop overnight under the tutelage of their outstanding mentor, Coach Lou Cvijanovich. Early in the season the Saints dropped a number of games but when the chips are down, they seem to rise to the occasion and are tough to beat.

Chadwick School led at the end of the first quarter, 15-11, and at the half, 28-25. Santa Clara spurted in the third quarter to take a narrow 42-41 lead as play began in the final period. From this point on, the superior experience and stronger bench of the Saints began to tell and they pulled away to record their great victory.

In looking over each team's roster it appears that both of these fine teams may be back to meet again in the finals of the 1964 play-offs. Chadwick's starting five is composed of four juniors and a senior and they only lost three of their reserves. Santa Clara is also a young club, having only one senior on the first team and their stars, Herrera and O'Brien, are both returning. Nothing is certain in basketball, however, and both of these quintets still have many a battle on their hands if they are to reach the championship game.

Champions of the Prep League, Chadwick won a first round game from Avalon, 79-63, and then eked out a victory over Valley Christian, 51-49, in a second round encounter. Their next opponent was Calipatria whom they defeated 65-56. In the semi-finals they met a tough Garey team and again prevailed by the narrow margin of one point, 40-39.

Santa Clara drew a first round bye and then defeated Bell-Jeff, 57-30, Flintridge Academy, 58-48, and Bishop HS, 55-48, to earn the right to compete in the championship contest at Long Beach. Both Chadwick and Santa Clara scored victories over teams from higher classifications during the season and were outstanding small school representatives.

DAN DEURWAARDER LEADS EL SEGUNDO TO "AA" CHAMPIONSHIP

Led by their great forward, Dan Deurwaarder, who scored 21 points, the El Segundo Eagles captured the CIF, SS "AA" basketball championship by nipping a great Laguna Beach five, 63-61, in a real thriller at the Long Beach Arena on Saturday, March 9, 1963.

Midway in the third period, the Artists from Laguna Beach held a commanding 37-23 lead and it appeared that they were well on their way to their second straight CIF, SS basketball championship. Such was not the case, however, as the Eagles went into a full court press and slowly but surely reduced the Artists' lead until, with only a few seconds remaining on the clock, they took the lead 62-61, for the first time in the game.

With three seconds remaining, Bill Wardrop drove in for what looked like the clinching basket, and then the gun sounded and it looked like El Segundo had won the championship. The game was not over, however, because due to the noise of the crowd no one had heard the referee's whistle blow to signal a foul on a Laguna Beach player just before Wardrop scored the final basket. The officials, scorer and timer then conferred and it was agreed that the foul nullified the basket and Wardrop should have two free throws and 3 seconds should be put back on the clock.

With a one point lead and only three seconds to go, young Wardrop had an opportunity to sink two free throws and cinch the victory for his team. He calmly stepped to the free throw line and missed the first one but made the second shot to put the Eagles two points ahead. Laguna took the ball out of bounds, passed to a man in mid-court who took two dribbles and let loose with a long arching shot which struck

the rim but did not go through the basket. At this point the gun sounded and one of the wild-est games in the long history of the CIF, SS play-offs came to an end with El Segundo the victors after a tough uphill battle that had the crowd cheering their every effort.

Both of these fine teams had to overcome considerable opposition to reach the finals and they are both to be congratulated on a most successful season. Laguna, champions of the Orange League, drew a bye in the first round and then defeated San Marino 58-47, Chino 67-58, and Palmdale 48-44, to earn the right to play in the championship contest.

El Segundo, second place finisher in the strong Pioneer League, journeyed to Alemany for their first round game and had to battle to eke out a 77-74 victory in a double overtime against the strong Indians, champions of the Camino Real League. Their next game resulted in a victory over Buena HS, 72-47, followed by a 73-62 win over La Salle, champions of the Santa Fe League. The semi-finals found El Segundo making the long trip to Calexico to engage the Bulldogs on their home court. This contest resulted in an El Segundo victory, 53-44, and sent the Eagles into the finals at Long Beach.

Twenty-five schools were represented in the "AA" basketball play-offs this year and the level of competition was better than in any previous season. All of the play-off games were conducted in an atmosphere of good sportsmanship and friendly rivalry, and a word of appreciation and thanks is in order for the administrators and coaches of all of the participating teams who cooperated so magnificently with the Commissioner in arranging all of the myriad of details that go into the staging of these play-offs. Plans are now underway to study the play-off picture in the "AA" division in an effort to eliminate the problems connected with playing semi-final contests on Friday and then having to travel to Long Beach for the finals on the next night.

MINUTES OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING — MARCH 9, 1963

The meeting of the CIF, SS Executive Committee was called to order by Chairman Keith Gunn at 10:30 AM on Saturday, March 9, 1963, at the Pacific Coast Club in Long Beach. Those in attendance included Messrs. Winston Nelson, Asst. Supt. of Pomona School District; Frank O. Hopkins, Supt. of Schools at Brea; John Taylor, Principal of Nordhoff HS; Marion C. Hays, Vice Principal of Harvard School; Harold Wetzler, Principal of Hawthorne HS; Charles Ronin, Vice Principal of Redlands HS; Roland Ewing, Vice Principal of Atascadero HS; Robert D. Ashton, Asst. Supt. of Excelsior Union High School District; and J. Kenneth Fagans, Commissioner of Athletics.

1. MINUTES APROVED. — It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of January 25, 1963, as published in the February, 1963, Monthly Bulletin.

2. NEW SCHOOLS ADMITTED TO MEMBERSHIP — It was moved, seconded and carried to recommend to the Council that the Buckley School of Sherman Oaks and the Moreno Valley High School of Sunnymead be admitted to regular membership in the CIF, SS.

It was moved, seconded and carried to recommend to the Council that Emerson, Fremont, Marshall and Palomares Junior High Schools of Pomona be admitted to Associate membership in the CIF, SS, as of September, 1963, and that these four schools organize and be known as the Pomona Jr. High League.

3. FOOTBALL PLAY-OFF REQUIREMENT — After a review of the 1963 football schedule of Needles HS, it was moved, seconded and carried that in order to qualify for the 1963 CIF, SS Small Schools football play-offs, Needles HS may not lose more than two of the following seven games on its schedule: Kingman HS, Sept. 13; Holtville HS, Sept. 20; Calipatria HS, Sept. 27; Blythe, Oct. 4; Barstow, Oct. 11; Boulder City, Oct. 18; and Santa Clara, Nov. 8, 1963.

4. BASEBALL PLAY-OFF REGULATIONS — The 1963 CIF SS baseball play-off and financial regulations were discussed by the committee. It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the same regulations as were in effect during the 1962 baseball play-offs.

5. SWIM INVITATIONAL MEET APPROVED — Santa Monica HS requested approval to conduct a Swim Pentathlon on April 11, 1963, during the Easter vacation. In this pentath-

lon each boy would be required to swim five events but each event would be limited to 50 yds. except for the Individual Medley, which would be 100 yards. After some discussion it was moved, seconded and carried to grant permission to Santa Monica HS to conduct a swimming pentathlon on April 11 as an experimental activity. At the conclusion of the meet the director is expected to submit a report evaluating the activity.

6. GYMNASTICS COACHES MEETING — It was moved, seconded, and carried to approve the minutes of the gymnastics coaches meeting of February 20, 1963, as submitted by the Commissioner.

7. TELEVISE CHAMPIONSHIP SWIM MEET — The Commissioner reported that KHJ-TV Channel 9 was interested in televising our Championship Swim Meet, scheduled for May 4 at Cerritos College. Although the CIF, SS would not be reimbursed financially for the televising of this activity, it was the opinion of all concerned that it would greatly benefit our swim program and publicize this fine meet. It was moved, seconded and carried to grant permission to KHJ-TV to televise our Championship Swim Meet on May 4, 1963.

8. RELEAGUING COMMITTEE APPOINTED — The Executive Committee appointed Mr. Robert D. Ashton to again serve as chairman of the Releaguings Committee for the coming school year. They then conferred with Mr. Ashton relative to the area chairmen to serve on this committee. The Releaguings Committee members and their areas of responsibility are published on another page of this bulletin.

9. RECOMMENDED CONSTITUTIONAL CHANGE — At the Council meeting held on February 2, action was taken to establish qualifications for nominees to run for the office of Southern Section Representative to the State Federated Council. Article V, Section 2, of the Constitution now reads as follows: State Representatives shall be nominated from any member of the Southern Section Council who are or have been members of the Executive Committee. It was pointed out that this provision limited the number of qualified persons who would be eligible to be placed in nomination for this important office. After considerable discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to recommend to the Council that Article V, Section 2, be amended to read as follows: State Representatives shall be persons who are or have been members of the Southern Section Council and the Executive Committee.

10. CONSTITUTIONAL INTERPRETATION — A clarification was requested as to when the newly elected Representative to the State Federated Council would take office. It was agreed that all officers elected at the Spring Council meeting would take office at the beginning of the following school year.

11. JAPANESE SWIMMERS IN SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA — A group of high school swimmers from Japan will be in Southern Cali-

fornia for the purpose of participating in AAU swim meets scheduled in Anaheim and the San Fernando Valley on March 23 and 24, 1963. Many high school principals have written in requesting permission for certain of their outstanding swimmers to compete against the Japanese high school boys in these meets. Because international competition is such a rare privilege for our high school boys, it was moved, seconded and carried to approve the participation of any high school swimmer in good standing in one of our member schools in either of the two scheduled swim meets, provided they observe the following conditions:

- Compete as unattached athletes.
- Pay their own entry fee, if one is required.
- Do not wear the school uniform.

12. VIOLATION OF BASEBALL SCRIMMAGE RULE — The Commissioner reported that the San Marino HS baseball team violated Article XXIX, Section 7, of the By-laws by engaging in a baseball scrimmage with Palm Springs HS on Saturday, March 2, after they had already participated in two baseball scrimmages with other schools. Although the coach was aware of our rule, he knowingly scheduled this unauthorized scrimmage. It was moved, seconded and carried to direct the Commissioner to write a letter to the Superintendent of the San Marino School District severely censuring the coach for his violation of this CIF, SS regulation and to inform the principal of San Marino HS that because of this violation they must cancel one of their scheduled practice baseball games.

13. ELIGIBILITY CASES—

a. Ruled John Clifton eligible at California HS pending receipt of a court order confirming Ralph Clifton as the boy's legal guardian. Should this order not be forthcoming prior to the close of the Spring athletic program, all athletic contests in which this boy participated must be forfeited.

b. Ruled Pat Stranahan ineligible for interscholastic athletics at San Pasqual HS because of a violation of the transfer rule.

c. At the request of the administration at San Marcos and Buena HS, a review was made of the eligibility case involving Robert Smith, a student at San Marcos HS. Although the committee was sympathetic to the problem, there was no new evidence presented which would enable them to reverse their original decision declaring this boy ineligible for interscholastic athletics for a period of one year because of a violation of the transfer rule.

d. Mr. Garland Lewis, athletic director at San Marino HS, appeared before the committee to request a review of the eligibility case involving Steve Roulac. The case was reviewed and it was confirmed that the boy had violated our transfer rule, which caused him to be ineligible at San Marino HS for the current school year. The committee informed Mr. Lewis that they did not have the power to make an exception in this case, although they were sympathetic to the problem.

14. COMMITTEE TO STUDY TRANSFER RULE — As a result of our recent court action involving the eligibility of a boy at San Marcos HS, our attorney, Mr. Zetterberg, wrote a letter to the Commissioner in which he supplied us with legal information to assist in the wording of our transfer rule.

To study and prepare possible changes in the wording of our transfer rule, Chairman Gunn appointed the following committee: Harold Wetzler, Marion Hays and Charles Ronin. This committee will meet and report back at the next meeting of the Executive Committee.

15. NEXT MEETING — The date of Saturday, April 20, was set for the next meeting of the Executive Committee. The Commissioner was directed to secure a meeting place and notify all members of the committee.

There being no further business to come before the committee, the meeting was adjourned at 3:00 PM.

CHANGES IN CIF, SS TRACK REGULATIONS

Last spring the Council of the CIF, Southern Section took official action to make a number of changes in the track and field regulations governing our high school track program. From the number of inquiries reaching this office, it appears that many of the coaches in our member schools are not acquainted with these very important changes. So that all personnel connected with track and field understand the latest changes in our By-laws, we are reproducing them at this time.

COMPETING IN MORE THAN ONE CLASSIFICATION DURING A CALENDAR WEEK—Last year Article XXVII, Section 7, read as follows: "For those sports in which there is class competition, no athlete shall be allowed to compete on two class teams in the same sport in the same calendar week." This section was then amended to permit boys in swimming and track to compete in more than one classification in the same calendar week, but boys on basketball, football and water polo teams were still restricted to one classification per week. Article XXVII, Section 7, now reads as follows: "In the team sports of football, water polo and basketball, no athlete shall be allowed to compete on two class teams in the same sport in the same calendar week."

CLASS C ENTRIES — Last year Article XXXVII, Section 42, stated that in a Class C track meet, a boy could compete in only two events, plus the relay. This section which is now Section 44 Article XXXVII of the new Blue Book reads as follows: In a Class C track meet a boy may be allowed to enter only three events, plus the relay, two track and one field, or one track and two field. He may compete in only one of the 180, 660 and 1320 yard events.

NUMBER OF EVENTS A BOY MAY ENTER IN RELAY MEETS — The CIF, SS sanc-

tions many different kinds of invitational track meets, relay meets and track carnivals. They vary greatly as to the type and number of events included in the program. Some are limited to relay races only, with no individual races or field events. Others have a full slate of field events and relays, while others have field events, relay races and special individual track events, such as a special mile or 100 yard dash. Because of this it is difficult to establish firm regulations governing the number of events a boy may enter in each individual meet.

In general the same basic rule governing entry into a regular track and field meet would prevail. A boy should not be entered in more than 3 running events and 1 field, or 2 running and 2 field events. A varsity performer should not enter more than one running event of 440 yards or over, a Class B boy should not enter more than one event where he would run 220 yards or over, and a Class C boy can only compete in one event of 180 yards or over.

Should there be any questions regarding any of the above interpretations or regulations, our coaches are urged to call the SS office for clarification. Track coaches are also requested to study the Blue Book, particularly Article XXVII, so they may become familiar with all CIF, SS track and field regulations.

CIF, SS WRESTLING CHAMPIONSHIP HELD AT LONG BEACH STATE COLLEGE

A great high school wrestling program was brought to a most successful conclusion when Upland HS captured the CIF, Southern Section team championship by scoring 39 points to runner-up Mira Costa's 33, in the final tournament held at Long Beach State College on Friday, March 8, 1963.

A near-capacity crowd was in attendance as Coach Pat Bandy's well balanced aggregation, led by Joey Caldera and Loren Miller, champions in the 115 and 148 lb. divisions, respectively, returned the title to the Citrus Belt area. Also scoring points for the Tri-County League champs were Dave Gonzales and Charles Presby, who finished third in the 106 and 141 lb. classes, respectively.

This marked the first CIF, SS wrestling championship for this comparatively new school and it appears that they will be hard to beat in future years. Last season they scored 29 points to tie with Simi HS for runner-up honors, but this year they were not to be denied as all members of their team came through with superlative performances.

Out of the 134 schools fielding wrestling teams in the Southern Section, 52 of them qualified competitors for the final tournament through league and sectional eliminations. Of these 52 schools, 32 of them had boys earn points in the championship meet.

The facilities at Long Beach were excellent and Dr. Barney Boring, wrestling coach at Long

Beach State, served as tournament director and did an outstanding job. Things were well organized and the tournament ran off promptly with a minimum of problems.

The northern area semi-final was held at Mira Costa HS on Saturday, March 2, with Don Cogswell serving as meet manager. The other semi-final was held on the same day under the

Downey took runner-up honors with 44 points and were followed by Fullerton HS with 34.
