## Fullerton, Corona del Mar and Chaffey Capture CIF Swim Relay Championships; 14 Records Set

Fourteen CIF Swim Relay records were broken in the 21 event program to highlight the 20th annual Swim Relays held on Friday, Feb. 19, at Long Beach Poly. Fullerton, Corona del Mar and Chaffey captured team championships in the A, B, and C classifications, respectively.

Every record on the book in Class B and six of seven records in Class A competition were shattered, as a total of 27 relay teams bettered listed record times. One mark fell in Class C events.

Fullerton, winning four events in Class A and all in record time, was a

one-sided winner in that division with a total of 76 points. Chadwick, which managed a record time win in the 100-yard individual medley, was second with 42 points while Glendora and Downey tied for third.

Fullerton's records came in the 4x50 breaststroke, 4x50 butterfly, 4x50 backstroke and 4x100 freestyle. Other winners in Class A were Downey in the 6x50 freestyle and Long Beach Wilson in the 4x50 medley relay. Downey's win was also a meet record.

Class B competition was dominated by Corona del Mar (appropriately nicknamed the Sea Kings) where records were set in all seven events. Corona del Mar accounted for three marks: 4x50 backstroke, 4x100 freestyle, and 4x50 medley relay.

## WHAT ABOUT THE FIVE-FOUL RULE?

(Editor's Note: The following does not reflect any official or unofficial sentiment of the CIF, SS. Nor does it reflect any feeling on the part of the National Basketball Committee which writes the high school rules. John Nucatola is supervisor of basketball officials for the Eastern College Athletic Conference. His viewpoints are presented here for informational reasons only.)

Basketball is the only sport in which a player is disqualified for the remainder of the game for committing five errors. I firmly believe that it should be the responsibility of the coach, as in any other sport, as to whether or not a player remains in the game. We have, in basketball, as well in all other sports, the provision for handling removal of a player for unsportsmanlike behavior. However, it should be the coach who decides whether or not the errors committed by one of his players is detrimental to the play of his team and whether this player should be removed from the game and for whatever length of time and in the interest of his team's play.

Some may say that this will lead to rough play. I believe quite the contrary. I believe that it may well reduce the overall number of fouls in a given game. We must remember that we will have the flagrant and unsportsman-

like fouls for which a player may be disqualified. This is consistent with other sports.

I firmly believe that the elimination of the fifth foul as a disqualifying foul will not only reduce fouling but more important will remove the game's greatest irritant, loss of key players. The loss or placing of a key player in jeopardy because of possible elimination by fouls not only injures team play but also reduces game enjoyment by the fans and tends to bring wrath upon the game officials with the result that official effectiveness is impaired.

Now as to the "modus operandi" . . . I recommend the following procedure.

If a player commits his fifth and any subsequent foul he will receive the penalty which the foul entails. For example, his opponent would receive, if fouled in the act of shooting and the basket is unsuccessful, two shots; if the basket is successful one shot, etc.

In addition, upon execution of the penalty the ball will be awarded to his opponent at mid-court. In other words, the fifth and any other additional fouls, by this player, will, in addition to the foul penalty, result in the loss of the ball to the opponents at mid-court. Quite a deterrent to excessive "fouling".

It will become the coach's responsibility to apprise his players of the seriousness of the penalty for fouling and particularly after the fourth foul. It will also become the coach's responsibility to decide if he can afford the "luxury" of keeping a player in the game at so serious a penalty. If the player, in foul difficulty, is a key player and if the team is seriously be-

Fred Wilding, captain of Alta Loma's quintet must have set some sort of record when he tallied 10 points in 16 seconds during the Braves' 81-41 win over South Hills. There were just 16 seconds remaining when Wilding went on his torrid spree on January 29.

First, Wilding tipped in a missed shot. He was pushed after the shot and made both on the one-and-one situation . . . The ensuing inbound pass was picked off and passed to Wilding who scored.

With three seconds left, Wilding stole the ball and was fouled, converting both free throws. Then, in the final seconds he swiped another pass and dunked it as the buzzer sounded.

For those curious enough to wonder how many he would have scored in the entire game by scoring at the rate of 10 points in 16 seconds . . . we've saved you from having to do the algebra. He would have scored 1200.

## MINUTES OF CIF, SOUTHERN SECTION, EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING—FEBRUARY 9, 1965

The meeting of the CIF, Southern Section, Executive Committee was called to order by Chairman Robert D. Ashton at 1:45 p.m. on February 9, 1965 in the CIF office.

The following members were in attendance: Chairman Ashton, assistant superintendent, Excelsior School District; Keith Gunn, principal, Victor Valley High School; Harry L. Bigger, principal, Fillmore High School; Clair Franklin, principal, Trona High School; Arthur H. North, assistant superintendent, Azusa Unified School District; Marion C. Hays, vice principal, Harvard School; Harold Wetzler, principal, Hawthorne High School; Charles M. Ronin, vice principal, Redlands High School; Steve Miletich, vice principal, Beverly Hills High School; Winston Nelson, superintendent, Pomona Unified School District; and Commissioner of Athletics J. Kenneth Fagans.

1. APPROVE MINUTES—It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of December 18, 1964 as published in the January Monthly Bulletin.

2. CONSIDER APPLICATIONS FOR MEMBERSHIP—It was moved, seconded and carried to recommend to the Council that St. Bonaventure High School of Ventura be admitted to regular membership in the CIF, SS.

It was moved, seconded and carried to recommend to the Council that Sandburg Junior High School of the Glendora District be admitted to associate membership in the CIF, SS.

3. EVALUATE BASEBALL SCHEDULES OF NEEDLES AND BOSCO TECH—After a review of the baseball schedule of Needles High School, it was moved, seconded and carried that in order to qualify for the 1965 CIF, SS, baseball play-offs, Needles High must win eight of the following ten games: March 19, Eagle Mountain; March 23, Kingman; March 27, Parker; April 3, Twenty-nine Palms; April 10, Blythe; April 20, Parker; April 24, Blythe; April 30, Kingman; May 1, Parker; May 4, Barstow.

After a review of the baseball schedule of Bosco Tech HS, it was moved, seconded and carried that in order to qualify for the 1965 CIF, SS, "AA" baseball play-offs, Bosco Tech must win eight of the following ten games: March 26, Brea HS; March 27, St. Paul HS; April 2, Mater Dei; April

3, Lasuen HS; April 10, Palm Springs HS; April 14, St. Francis; April 24, Cantwell HS; April 30, St. John Vianney; May 1, LA Baptist HS; May 7, Salesian.

4. APPROVE HIGH SCHOOL SECTION OF TIMES INDOOR MEET—It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the CIF, SS, high school section of the Los Angeles Times Indoor Track and Field meet to be held on Saturday, February 13, 1965. Southern Section schools will have entries in the relay, pole vault and mile run. Because this is an indoor meet, participation will not count as one of the four permitted invitationals to which boys are limited in the outdoor season.

5. REQUEST FOR RESTORATION OF AMATEUR STANDING—It was moved, seconded and carried to restore the amateur standing of Larry Shewfelt of Harvard School. Last year Larry participated in a bowling league where prizes in violation of our awards rule were given.

6. PLANS FOR MAY COUNCIL MEETING—Plans were discussed for the next CIF, SS, Council meeting which will be held at 9:30 a.m. on Saturday, May 1, 1965, at Excelsior HS. It was decided to conduct the regular Council meeting during the morning hours and then after lunch adjourn to the auditorium for a special meeting to be held to discuss the problems connected with the districting of private schools for athletic purposes.

Reverend Donald Montrose, superintendent of Catholic High Schools in the Southland, will be in charge of the afternoon's program. He has invited any person interested in preparing questions to be discussed by the panel to submit the questions to the SS office so they may be screened and organized for presentation. All school administrators and coaches will be issued special invitations at a later date to attend the session.

Following the meeting, interested parties will be invited to visit the campus of the new Gahr HS in Norwalk, where it is expected construction will be under way on the new CIF, SS, office headquarters.

7. SPRING BASKETBALL LEAGUES—The Council at its January meeting instructed the Commissioner to reword a proposed regulation pertaining to the participation in spring leagues by high school teams and players. It was moved, seconded

and carried that the following regulation be added to Article XXI of the By-Laws:

No representative of a member high school shall organize, sponsor, or coach a team in a spring basketball league in which boys with remaining basketball eligibility at his school are participating. (A boy with remaining eligibility may participate as an individual on a church-sponsored or recreation-sponsored team in a spring league as long as that team does not have on its roster more than two potential members of his high school team.)

8. REPORT OF BUILDING COMMITTEE—Chairman Ashton reported that the bid submitted by the Southern Section to lease a small parcel of land on the campus of the new Gahr HS in Norwalk was the lowest presented to the School Board and was immediately accepted. Preliminary plans for the new office building were submitted to the Executive Committee by architect Al Duhaime, who represented the firm of Kistner, Wright and Wright. After considerable study it was moved, seconded and carried to approve the preliminary plans as submitted.

An agreement to employ Kistner, Wright and Wright as the architectural firm to design plans and supervise construction of the new building at a fee of 8% of the total cost of the building, was then presented for study. It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the agreement with Kistner, Wright and Wright and to authorize them to begin work immediately in the hopes that the building could be ready for occupancy prior to the opening of school in September, 1965.

9. COMMISSIONER OF OFFICIALS FOR THE SAN GABRIEL VALLEY AREA—Commissioner Fagans reported that he had met with representatives of the five leagues in the San Gabriel Valley area, for the purpose of determining whether or not those leagues would be interested in employing a commissioner whose responsibility it would be to assign game officials for all schools in the area. At the present time this job is done by the SS office. Communications from the leagues involved were read which indicated that they desired the SS office to continue the present policy of assigning game officials.

10. ELIGIBILITY CASES—  
a. Mr. Robert L. Webb of Chino appeared before the committee relative to the eligibility of his son. A review



of the case showed that the boy had transferred from Chino to Pomona Catholic HS because of harassment he had been receiving at the former school. It was the ruling of the Executive Committee that the boy would be ineligible at Pomona Catholic HS because there had been no change of address on the part of his parents which necessitated a change of schools.

b. It was moved, seconded and carried to declare Delvin Luge immediately eligible for interscholastic athletics at Pacific HS of San Bernardino as a result of a court order which placed the boy in a home in the Pacific HS attendance district.

**11. ANNUAL MEETING**—Further discussion was held as to the feasibility of holding an annual meeting in September, to which at least one representative of each member school would attend. The matter was deferred to the next meeting, with the Commissioner instructed to investigate the possibility of holding a series of area-wide meetings as an alternate plan to the annual meeting.

**12. RECRUITMENT OF OFFICIALS COMMITTEE**—Steve Miletich, a member of the committee appointed to study the problems pertaining to the training and recruitment of new officials, reported that the committee had met and started work on this serious problem. A survey is now under way to determine the number of officials available, the schools supplying such officials, the type of employment engaged in by officials, and the number that will be necessary next year in order to properly conduct our interscholastic athletic program. The results of this survey and an explanatory bulletin explaining the problem will be sent to all administrators in the near future.

**13. RADIO BROADCASTING FEES FOR PLAY-OFF CONTESTS**—Discussion was held on the present policy of the CIF, SS, which provides that a fee must be paid in order for any radio station to broadcast a play-off game in football or basketball. It was the opinion of the committee that a fee should be charged but the amount of the fee to be charged for the right to broadcast play-off games during the 1965-66 school year should be given careful study.

**14. APPROVE BASEBALL PLAY-OFF AND FINANCIAL REGULATIONS**—The committee reviewed the baseball play-off and financial regulations which were in effect for the 1964 baseball play-offs. It was then

moved, seconded and carried to continue these regulations with the following exceptions.

a. Increase dinner allowance where approved from \$2.00 to \$3.00 per person.

b. Increase the lodging allowance where approved from \$2.50 to \$3.00 per person.

c. Increase the fee for the championship game umpires to \$18.00 for the plate and \$16.00 for the bases.

There being no further business to come before the Committee, the meeting was adjourned at 5:30 p.m.

Whittier managed two Class B records (6x50 freestyle and 4x50 breaststroke) while Fullerton did likewise (4x100 individual medley and 4x50 butterfly).

Whittier (40) finished second to Corona del Mar (66) in team scoring while Fullerton (34) was third and Pacific and Downey tied for fourth (24 each).

Lasuen High of San Pedro and Burbank each won two races in Class C but had to settle for second and sixth, respectively, in the division while Chaffey High had no firsts but two seconds, two thirds and a fourth place finish for a 42 point total and the team title. Lasuen was second with 40 while Newport had 36 and Servite 32.

Lasuen set the only C record, in the 4x100 freestyle.

The only record left standing in the Class A division was in the 4x50 medley relay, a mark established in 1962 by Glendale Hoover.

## 220 To Be Run In CIF Meets on Straightaway

CIF State Executive Secretary Bill Russell has announced that the 220-yard dash in the State Track and Field Meet at Bakersfield in June will be run on a straightaway. Therefore, Southern Section competition in the prelims, semis and sectional finals will also be conducted on the straightaway.

It is recommended that if facilities permit, league and dual meets should also be conducted in this manner.

## SPORT SHORTS

### BASEBALL PLAY-OFF DATES

CIF baseball play-offs in the "AA" and "A" divisions will begin on May 18 and continue on May 21, 25, and 28.

In the "AAA" division the first round is set for May 21 with subsequent rounds slated for May 25, 28, June 1 and 4.

### GYMNASTICS SITES SET

Four locations have been confirmed for the 1965 CIF gymnastics prelims which will be held on May 7. The four prelims will be held at Anaheim, Montebello, Arroyo, and Lakewood.

The finals will be held at Pasadena High on May 14.

Baldwin Park is the defending CIF champion.

## Riviera Tennis Club to Host CIF Individual Tournament

A "new look" will highlight the 1965 CIF Individual Tennis Tournament with the announcement that the finals on Saturday, June 5, will be held at the Riviera Tennis Club.

Formerly known as the "A" Tennis Tournament, the event will now be known as the CIF, SS, Individual Championships, inasmuch as all boys are eligible to enter regardless of weight classification.

Four sectional tournaments will be held on Thursday, June 3, for the purpose of qualifying boys for the finals. Sectionals are scheduled for Morning side, Santa Ana, Redlands, and Pasadena.

From each sectional the four top singles players and the four top doubles teams will advance to the competition at Riviera.

hind in the score, the coach in all likelihood will keep him in the game, for without him the team would have little chance, however, I am sure that he will once again warn this player of the seriousness of the penalty should he commit additional fouls.

If the team is ahead in the score, the coach may decide to keep the player on the bench. The coach in this instance may not feel that he can afford the "luxury" of keeping this player in the game.

Also, if a second-line player commits his fourth foul a coach may decide to remove him from the game. In this instance the coach may again feel that it would be too "expensive" should this player commit a fifth additional fouls.

## Mira Costa High Repeats as CIF Wrestling Champions; Buehler Wins Heavyweight Title

For the third time in the last seven years and for the second straight year Mira Costa High School captured the team title in the CIF, SS, Wrestling Championships. The finals were held at Mira Costa on Saturday, Feb. 27 and managed by Don Cogswell.

Coach Jack Fernandez's MiCoHi team won the title in 1964 and in 1959 and finished in the runner up spot in 1963.

Fifty-four schools qualified boys for the finals in the two sectional meets held on Feb. 20 at Huntington Beach Marina and Simi Valley High and of the 54 all but 18 scored points in the championship meet which was conducted before a capacity crowd at the Mira Costa gymnasium.

Following the host school in team scoring was Aviation with 29 points (Mira Costa had 46), Westminster with 25, Whittier 22 and Redondo 21.

Whittier's CIF football Player-of-the-Year, George Buehler, successfully defended his heavyweight championship and Bert Ambler of Lowell High in La Habra was the only other repeat winner. Ambler won the 157-lb title last year and captured the 168-lb. crown this time around.

Winning individual titles for Mira Costa were Ed Acosta in the 115-lb. division and Ralph Gambin in the 157-lb. class. No other school won more than a single individual crown.

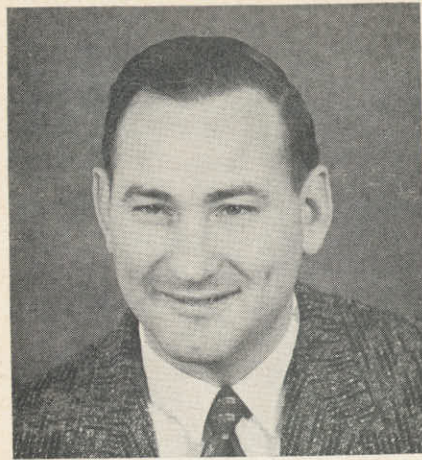

### Three Retired Coaches To Be Honored By So. Cal. Basketball Coaches Assn.

Three former Southland high school basketball coaches, who between them totaled more than 90 years in the coaching profession, will be honored with Merit Awards by the Southern California Interscholastic Basketball Coaches Assn. at the group's annual play-off meeting in Long Beach and at the CIF finals on March 13.

The three are: Charlie Church, former coach at Long Beach Wilson (three years), Long Beach Poly (12 years) and Long Beach City College (11 years); Hobart C. Uhls, 23 years at Redondo High; and T. M. "Hank" Gerhart, 36 years at Inglewood High.

Presentation of medallions and certificates will be made at halftime of the "AA" championship play-off game at the Long Beach Sports Arena on Saturday, March 13, according to Chuck Clustka of Harvard School, chairman of the Merit Awards Committee of the coaches association.

Church has a lifetime coaching record of 597 wins against 215 losses over 26 seasons of coaching. His teams at Poly High won three CIF major championships—1939, 1940 and 1942—and appeared in the finals five times. After leaving Poly in 1949 Church spent 11 seasons as head coach at Long Beach City College where his teams won two State Junior College titles. He is still on the staff at LBCC.

Uhls, currently principal at Aviation High School in Redondo Beach, spent his first years of basketball under the guidance of Phog Allen at Kansas University. After three seasons of coaching in Kansas High Schools Uhls spent two seasons at Grand Island (Nebraska) College before moving west. His next 23 years were spent as head coach at Redondo High. While he coached numerous championship teams, Uhls says one of his real "kicks" in coaching came during his last three seasons when he had three successive undefeated Cee teams.

Gerhart spent his entire 36 years of coaching at Inglewood High where he was instrumental in the development of many of the youth leagues which are still popular in the Bay Area.

He is now retired and living in Green Valley in northern California.
