Ohio, Texas Prep Grid Coaches to Speak at So. Cal. Clinic

Prep football coaching greats from Ohio and Texas will highlight the 8th annual Southern California Interscholastic Football Coaches Assn. clinic at Cerritos College and Saturday and Sunday, March 12 and 13.

L. Marvin Moorehead from Upper Arlington High in Columbus, Ohio and Gordon L. Wood from Brownwood (Texas) High will be the featured speakers during the two-day meeting.

Both Moorehead and Wood coached undefeated teams last season, Wood's being the only undefeated team in Texas and scored nine shutouts in 14 games. Moorehead's Golden Bear team won the Central Buckeye League title for the fourth time in five years.

Wood's record at Brownwood is 197-34-7 in 20 years while Moorehead's teams are 76-22-3 in 11 seasons. According to Clinic Director Clare VanHoorebeke of Anaheim, Moorehead will speak during the clinic sessions on the following topics:

Attacking with the Flexible 4-5 Delense" — Development of Arlington's approach to defense with particular emphasis on adjustments and reactions to various offensive maneuvers.

Put the QB at the Throttle"—
Moorehead's program of training the
QB to be the field general. Description

of pre-season meetings, weekly plans, game plays, QB booklets, built-in practice situations, two minute drills, etc.

"Psychology of Football Success"— Discussion of the spirit and attitudes that are incorporated into the Arlington system.

"Defensive Preparation for the Coming Opponent"—Step by step approach to Friday night's defensive effort — staff meeting and planning, squad meetings, practice organization and drills.

Both Wood and Moorehead are noted clinic speakers.

Wood's most recent appearances include the Texas State High School Clinic in Houston, Howard Payne College Clinic in Brownwood, Sul Ross State College Clinic in Alpine, Texas Tech College Clinic in Abilene and Ohio High School Coaching Clinic in Canton.

Moorehead's recent clinic presentations have been at Ohio Wesleyan University Clinic; Louisville (Ky.) Clinic; Princeton Clinic; Richmond (Ind.) Clinic; Wooster College (Ohio) Clinic; Capital University Clinic; Lima (Ohio) Coaches Clinic and guest speaker to the Ohio Association of Health, Physical Education and Athletic Convention.

Tickets for CIF Cage Finals on Sale at Two Locations

Reserved seat tickets for the CIF basketball finals at the Long Beach Arena on March 11 and 12 are currently on sale at two locations, according to CIF Commissioner of Athletics Ken Fagans.

Priced at \$2.50 and \$2.00, approximately 4500 seats for each of the two nights are on sale at Kenny's Sporting Goods, 635 Pine, Long Beach and at the CIF office, 11011 Artesia Blvd., Artesia.

Mail orders will be accepted at the CIF Office, Post Office Box 488, Artesia.

More than 4000 general admission tickets (priced at \$1.50) will be sold at the Arena on game nights.

"We experimented with reserved seats for the first time last season," said the Commissioner, "and found that the fans of Southern California appreciated having the tickets available early. We have increased the number of reserved seats available by 2500 and already have had many inquiries at the office from persons wondering when tickets will be made available."

Last year a record crowd of 12,532 watched the CIF finals in the arena. It was the largest crowd ever to see prep basketball in California and the largest crowd ever to see a basketball contest in Long Beach.

"We feel that interest in our program is building," commented Commissioner Fagans, "to where someday we may sell the arena out in advance of the games as they do in many midwestern states."

The state of Minnesota has an eightyear waiting list for tickets for its State Finals which are played at the University Field House and attracts an annual crowd of 18,000. Indiana's finals annually fill the Butler Field House in Indianapolis while Illinois and Wisconsin sell out at Champaign and Madison, respectively.

CIF play-off attendance has increased in recent years to the point that the play-offs have been moved from Long Beach City College (capacity 3000) to Cal-State — Los Angeles (capacity 5300) and now to the

Long Beach Arena (capacity 12,631).

Semi-finals in the "AAA" division will open the schedule of games in the Arena on Friday (March 11) with games slated for 7:30 and 9 p.m.

Saturday afternoon the "AAA" third place game will open the program at 1 p.m., followed by the "A" division championship game at 2:30. The "AA" and "AAA" championship games will form the evening's doubleheader beginning at 7:30 p.m.

Long Beach Poly is the two-time defending "AAA" champion.

CIF NOTES-W. H. Hunt of San Francisco is a prep sports buff of the truest sense. Hunt, who says he gets the prep sports "Itch" in October and it lasts until the State Track Meet in June, will "commute" to Long Beach for the CIF finals on March 12. Writes Hunt: "I've already seen some of the rated CIF teams . . . what a night March 12 should be."

. . . During the week of the tournament finals, schools competing in Long Beach will also have an allottment of reserved seat tickets at both the \$2.00 and \$2.50 level. Tickets will also be on sale during the day at the Long Beach Arena on Friday and Saturday, March 11 and 12.

Three Retired Cage Coaches to Receive Merit Awards

Three retired basketball coaches whose cumulative years of service total 80 will be honored with Merit Awards by the Southern California Interscholastic Basketball Coaches Assn., at the CIF basketball play-offs in the Long Beach Arena on March 12.

Due to receive the awards at the third annual presentation by the coaches association are Roy E. "Pop" Squire of Huntington Park, Lee Mossteller of Hunting Beach, and Roy Lockwood of Burbank. The announcement of the awards was made by Shirley Moore, basketball coach at South Hills High and chairman of the coaches Merit Awards Committee.

Presentation of medallions and certifications will be made to the three coaches at halftime of the "AA" championship play-off game at the Long Beach Arena on March 12.

"Pop" Squire, now 81 years old, retired in 1950 after a coaching career which spanned 34 years at Huntington Park and included CIF championships in 1923 and 1927, B titles in 1920 and 1922 and nine Bay League titles in 17 seasons. His varsity teams won L.A. City League titles 10 times between 1934 and 1950.

In addition to his outstanding coaching record, Squire also served as manager of CIF basketball play-offs from 1920 to 1932.

Mossteller's coaching career, encompassing 24 years and 334 wins against 19 losses, was spent at McKinley Junior High in Middleton, Ohio (1934-41) and at Huntington Beach High (1942-58). He won six Sunset League championships and eight titles in the Huntington Beach Invitational Tournament. The Oilers advanced to the CIF semifinals under Mossteller in 1945.

He is now vice-principal at Huntington Beach High.

Roy Lockwood's 14 years in prep basketball were all spent at Burbank High. He won 212 and lost 123 while winning three league titles and tying for a fourth. Lockwood was one of the first high school coaches to install the zone-press in his system.

Prior to his stint at Burbank, Roy handled the Redlands University Frosh (1937) and was at Muir Junior High between '38 and '43. He is currently head swimming and water polo coach at Burbank.

Fullerton, Arcadia, Estancia Foothill Nab Swim Relays Honors

Fullerton High's powerful swimming team began the 1966 season where it ended the '65 campaign-win-

ning CIF championships.
The Indians, three-time defending swim champs, recorded their second straight Varsity Invitational Swim Relay title on Friday, February 18, when they overwhelmingly captured the team championship with 72 points, 36 more than a trio of teams tied for second place. The threesome included Corona del Mar, Glendora and Red-

In the Class B division, Arcadia High led the assault on the record books (four were set in the sevenevent card) with two marks en route to the team championship.

Arcadia teams established new records in the 100 Individual Medley (4:05.4) and in the 50 yard backstroke (1:52.0). Other records in Class B went to Servite in the 50 yard breaststroke (2:05.3) and to Palos Verdes in the 50 yard medley relay (1:48.6).

Fullerton tied the 100 yard individual medley record time of 3:57.0 and Burbank and Redlands swam the 50 medley relay in 1:44.1 for the only record performances in Varsity com-

Palos Verdes was runner up to Arcadia, trailing the Apaches by a mere four, 50-46. Newport 44 was third and Lasuen (30) fourth.

In Class C competition, the new Estancia High of Costa Mesa tied for team honors with Foothill High of Tustin. Each team had 38 points. Anaheim and Mira Costa tied for third with 34 each.

No records were established in the Class C division.

Cage Finalists of 39 Years Ago to Be Honored at CIF Play-Offs

Newspaper accounts described the 1927 CIF basketball finals between Huntington Park and Long Beach Poly as a "pulse-quickening game that had the rooters on pins and needles throughout" and when it was over, said the report, "it was Huntington Park Union that clutched firmly the basketball championship of Southern California. The scoreboard emblazoned 18 to 14 as the timekeeper's pistol released a pandemonium of cheering. . .

Hard as it may seem that a basketball game could finish 18-14 that's how it was on March 12, 1927 at the old U.S.C. Pavillion when Huntington Park captured the CIF crown from Long Beach Poly in a game highlighted by 1) a power failure that delayed the game for 15 minutes with just 58 seconds to play; 2) a HP defense that held Poly to one point in each of the third and fourth periods; and 3) a basketball which "slipped easily through the ring" from past midcourt.

On Saturday night, March 12, exactly 39 years to the night, the CIF, Southern Section, will pay tribute to the Huntington Park and Long Beach Poly teams of 1927 during halftime of the CIF "AAA" championship finals in Long Beach.

Players from both teams, along with the two coaches, Huntington Park's Roy "Pop" Squire, now 81 years old, and Orian Landreth of Long Beach, will be presented plaques by the CIF, SS, in honor of their achievements 39 years ago.

The 1966 halftime presentations will mark the third successive year that the CIF, SS, has paid tribute to some of its past champions during the basketball finals.

It will also be the first "team reunion" for the Huntington Park championship team of 39 years ago.

Back to the championship game of '27. After a first period deadlock at 3-all, Long Beach outscored the Huntington Park five by a 9-8 count in the second stanza sending the clubs into the locker room with the Jackrabbits on top, 12-11, at halftime.

One of the second period Huntington Park baskets, according to newspaper reports, was a shot "from beyond the midcourt line by Kenny Fagans." Fagans, today's CIF Commissioner of Athletics, along the Huntington Park's Bill Keighley, now a retired Navy officer, shared high point honors in the championship game with

Poly's Jackrabbits, heavy favorites in the finals, were paced by captain Dick Coleman and Paul Bixby, each scoring five points.

Free throws by Keighley and Fagans in the third period put the Spartans ahead to stay. Jim Shrader scored from under the bucket for Huntington Park later in the third period while all Long Beach could garner was a single free throw from Bixby.

The fourth period was more of the same as Huntington Park's defense held Poly to a single free throw-by Peter Osborne-while Shrader scored another bucket and Keighley another free throw to round out the scoring.

"As the precious time ticked away," according to the Huntington Park Daily Signal, "both teams made hurried efforts without success. The timekeeper looked at his watch . . . 58 seconds to play. Suddenly, the lights went out . . . for nearly 15 minutes caretakers fumbled with switches . . ." in an effort to restore power. Although not mentioned in the news report. there was some speculation that Poly fans had doused the lights hoping to have the game delayed long enough for the Rabbits to regain their composure and make a comeback.

Those being honored at the CIF finals from Huntington Park in addition to Coach Squire, Fagans, Keighley and Shrader include: Gene McKee, Clary Steinen, Murle Mashburn, Garrett Arbelbide, John Renner and Clinton Hubbard.

From Poly returning for the reunion will be Coach Landreth, Bixby, Coleman, Osborne, Marcel McClure, John Reynolds, Ralph Callahan, Cliff Shaw, Hugh Linnell, Jerry Easterbrook.
