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BEVERLY HILLS COASTS TO "AAA" CHAMPIONSHIP WIN OVER SANTA MARIA

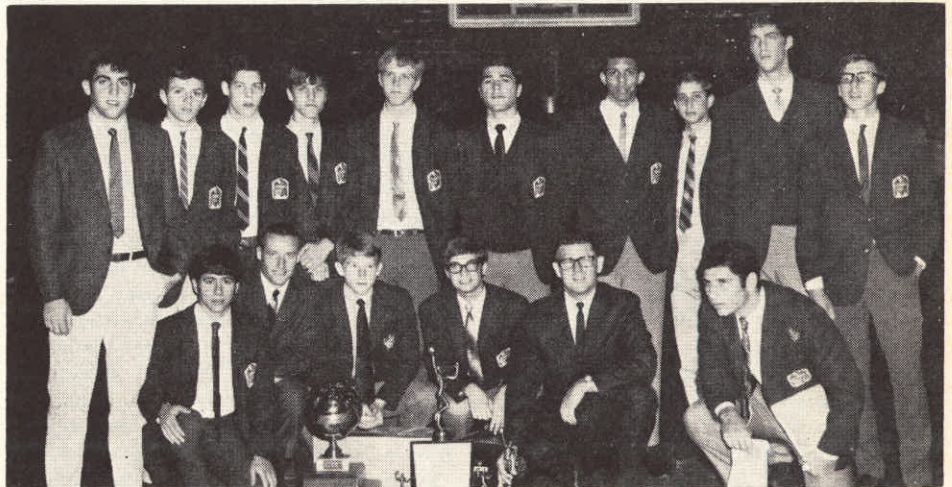
Parlaying outside shooting with stingy defense, the Beverly Hills Normans took command early in the game and then coasted to a 74-62 win over Santa Maria for the 1969 CIF, SS, "AAA" division championship before 7,150 fans at the Los Angeles Sports Arena.

The Normans, relying on the outside shooting of guards Jim Tough and Jason Newman, jumped out to a 21-15 first-quarter lead and were never headed in the contest, which matched the third- and fourth-ranked teams in the CIF, SS.

Newman and Tough both finished the match with 19 points while Santa Maria ace John Roth led the Saints with 18.

It was a 28-point second-quarter outburst by the Normans which put the game out of reach of the Saints, who went into the game slightly favored because of a 26-1 season record. Beverly Hills' harassing defense kept the Saints off balance all evening and resulted in 17 turnovers to 10 for the Normans.

SIEXAS, KENNEDY, ADAIR SALUTED BY COACHES AT CIF, SS, CAGE FINALS

Three coaches who, between them, have devoted more than 66 years to serving high school athletics, were honored by their fellow coaches at the 1969 CIF, SS, Basketball Championships on Saturday, March 15, at the Los Angeles Sports Arena.

The trio — John Siexas of San Gabriel, Eugene "Red" Kennedy of Fillmore and Richard Adair of San Bernardino — were presented medals and certificates of merit by the Southern California Interscholastic Basketball Coaches Association at half-time of the "AAAA" championship game.

Ed Wiesehan, chairman of the SCIBCA Merit Awards Committee, made the presentations, citing the three for their contributions to coaching and athletics.

Siexas, currently athletic director at San Gabriel, was saluted as "a leader of young people and trainer of young teachers and coaches. His ideals are the highest and he has never seen fit to compromise them."

Kennedy, one of the first coaches to experiment with the one-hand shot, was one of the top high school mentors in the Ventura-Santa Barbara area during the late 1920's and 30's.

Adair developed a well-organized and well-disciplined program in his coaching. Many outstanding players advanced from under Adair's tutelage to gain fame in college ranks, among them Ernie Powell of USC and Mike Michael of Stanford.

The three coaches joined 18 other men who have been honored by the SCIBA in past years.

VERBUM DEI HOLDS OFF STRONG KATELLA SURGE TO GAIN "AA" CROWN

Highly-rated Verbum Dei had to hold off a determined Katella bid in the waning seconds of play to emerge victorious, 90-87, and gain the 1969 CIF, SS, "AA" division basketball championship before 3,665 fans at the Los Angeles Sports Arena.

The Eagles, top-seeded in the "AA" division, jumped out to a 13-point first-quarter lead, but watched it go up in smoke as the smaller but very-determined Katella five came back to close the gap to five points at halftime.

Behind the outside shooting of guards Bob Sherwin and Rick Aber-egg, the Katella crew continued its charge in the third period, but the Eagles, led by senior center Keith Batiste, stretched the lead to eight points at the three-quarters mark.

Verbum Dei got a nine-point burst midway through the final period to take a 97-69 lead and, while many fans felt the game was over, Katella went into a full-court zone press which harassed the Eagles and gave the Knights a 10-2 scoring edge to close the gap to 81-77 with little more than three minutes remaining.

Behind Sherwin's deadly outside shooting, the Knights continued to hold the upper hand and with forward Jim Laube and Brent Giroux contributing points, closed to within one point with over a minute left to play.

But the Eagles went into a ball control offense which ate up the clock, and, with 59 seconds left, Ray Lewis was fouled and hit both free throws to put the game on ice.

The Eagles, 28-1 for the season, eliminated Saddleback, San Luis Obis-

po and Bell Gardens to gain the finals while Katella (24-4) defeated Bosco Tech, Hemet and Hart enroute to the finals.

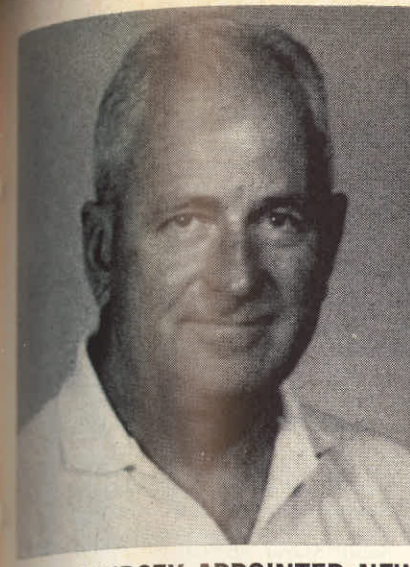

TRUCK LINDSEY APPOINTED NEW FOOTHILL AREA COMMISSIONER

Truscott "Truck" Lindsey, Chaffey High athletic director and a longtime official, has been selected as the new Area Commissioner of Officials for the Foothill-Citrus Area, effective immediately.

Lindsey's primary responsibilities will be to assign officials for the 50-plus schools in the Foothill-Citrus Area, as well as recruiting new men as officials.

The rapid growth of the Foothill-Citrus Area, coupled with its somewhat-detached geographical location in relation with the CIF, SS, office, brought about the employment of Lindsey, the sixth Area Commissioner of Officials employed by the CIF, SS.

Lindsey began his Southland coaching career at Orange High, his alma mater, in the late 1930's, following his graduation from South Dakota State College.

He moved to Leuzinger, where he was head football coach for two years, then on to El Monte, where he served as head football coach for four years.

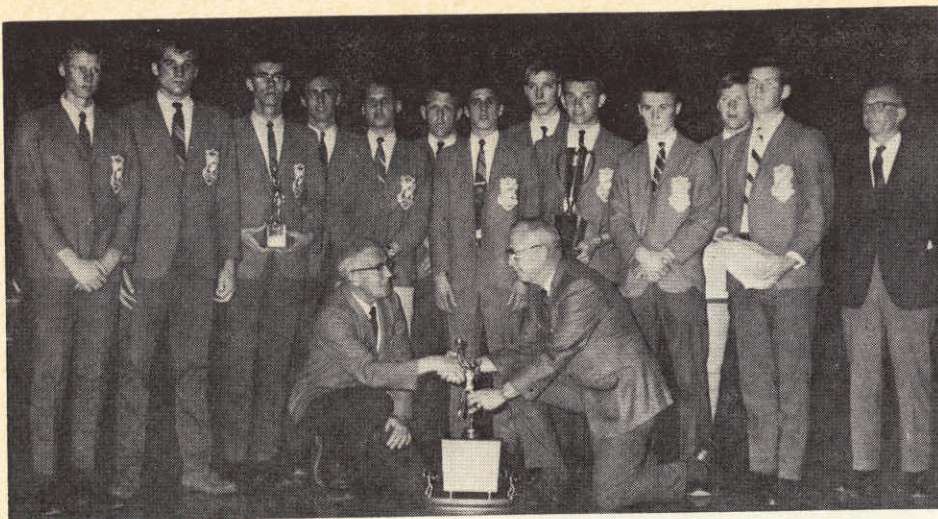

Eleven New Records Set in 1969 Swim Relays; L. B. Wilson Wins Title

In a hotly-contested battle for the varsity team championship, Long Beach Wilson walked off with top honors in the 1969 CIF, SS, Swim Relays, held at the Belmont Plaza Olympic Pool.

Palos Verdes and Rancho Alamitos tied for second on the varsity level, while La Serna captured the Bee title and Palos Verdes won the Cee championship.

Eleven new meet records were established as more than 2,000 swimmers from throughout the CIF, SS, competed in two-day qualifying at the Belmont Plaza pool prior to the February 21 championship meet.

Perry T. Jones Honored at Basketball Finals

In recognition for more than 50 years of service to amateur tennis and youth in Southern California, Perry T. Jones was presented a gold CIF Life Pass and special proclamation at the 1969 CIF, SS, Basketball Championships on March 15 at the Los Angeles Sports Arena.

The presentation, made by CIF, SS, Commissioner of Athletics Ken Fagans, cited Mr. Jones' contribution to the CIF, SS, program and his service to amateur tennis in the Southland during the past half a century.

Jones, known as "Mr. Tennis" in the area, was given a special resolution, adopted by the CIF, SS, Council at its January 25 meeting, which catalogued many of his achievements in the field of amateur tennis.

In part, the resolution read:

"WHEREAS, Perry T. Jones has distinguished himself as one of the outstanding amateur tennis players in Southern California history, and . . .

"WHEREAS, in 1955, he helped organize the Youth Tennis Foundation of Southern California, and still serves as its Secretary and Managing Director, and;

"WHEREAS, he has worked closely with CIF, Southern Section, officials to promote the sport of tennis among high schools throughout Southern California, and annually conducts clinics for CIF, SS, member high schools, soliciting the aid of outstanding world-ranked amateur and professional tennis players;

"NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Council of the CIF, Southern Section, expresses its gratitude and sincere best wishes to Perry T. Jones for his efforts to promote amateur tennis in Southern California, and wishes him every continued success in his endeavors."

Brawley Dethrones Pacific for CIF Wrestling Title

Brawley captured its first CIF, SS wrestling title by upsetting two-time defending champion Pacific of San Bernardino, 40-34, in the 1969 CIF, SS, Wrestling Championships at Cal State-Fullerton.

Coach Jack Gifford's Wildcats were led by Gilbert Mendez, who snared the 98-pound division first place medal.

Brawley placed wrestlers among the top four finishers in four of the 13 weight divisions.

Taking second place for the Wildcats were 98-pound Fidel Torrez and 178-pound Keith Smith. Xavier Ruiz rounded out Brawley's scoring with a fourth-place showing in the 123-pound class.

CIF, SS kingpin for the past two years, Pacific had to settle for the second spot this year. Pacific's lone individual champ was 98-pound Bobby Vargas.

The only school with two individual champions, Fountain Valley took third place with 29 points. Winning for the Barons were 106-pound Chris Sones and 123-pound Glenn Anderson.

Morro Bay and Norwalk deadlocked for fourth place with 27 points each.

Champion of the 168-pound category, Mike Hartman of Morro Bay was selected the tournament's most outstanding wrestler.

Mr. Ted Otto, parent of Corona del Mar swimmers; Roy Wilks, swimming coach, La Puente HS; and Glenn White, sports editor, Orange Coast Daily Pilot.

1. APPROVE MINUTES—It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of January 24, 1969, as published in the February Monthly Bulletin.

2. BASEBALL SCHEDULE EVALUATED—The baseball schedule of Canyon HS was evaluated for possible entry into the 1969 CIF, SS, "A" division baseball playoffs. It was moved, seconded and carried that, for Canyon HS to qualify for entry into the "A" division baseball play-offs, it must win eight of a designated 10 games on its schedule.

3. ELIGIBILITY CASES—In accordance with Article XI, Section 14, of the current Blue Book, the residence rule was waived to grant immediate eligibility to Don Williams at Upland HS; David McNatt at Workman HS; Mark Carpenter at Norco HS and Jack Strosnider at Morningside HS.

After reviewing the facts in the case, it was moved, seconded and carried to deny a request for a waiver of the eight-semester rule in the case of Neil Oldenburg at Bosco Tech HS.

After some discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to table the request of Dos Pueblos HS in the case of Steven Blois pending further investigation by Claud Hardesty.

4. REVIEW CORONA DEL MAR VIOLATION — Mr. Leon Meeks, principal, Corona del Mar HS; Mr. Cliff Hooper, water polo coach; Mr. Dave Millovich, swimming coach; Mr. Ron Davis, athletic director, and Mr. John Anderson, representing the Orange County Counsel's office appeared before the committee to appeal its decision regarding swimming violations at Corona del Mar HS at its January 24 meeting.

Mr. Meeks indicated to the committee that he felt the ruling was made without sufficient evidence and without a representative of the school in attendance at the meeting.

Chairman Miletich reviewed the facts in the case for those present, and Mr. Meeks presented Corona del Mar's position with regard to the AAU program which was the center of the controversy.

Coaches Millovich and Hooper outlined the program, indicating that it was a loosely organized program, with workouts broken down according to a swimmer's ability and that, while no

under-age swimmers or girls were at Corona del Mar HS when the Commissioner investigated reports of illegal activity, there were pre-high school age swimmers and girls among the membership of the group.

Much of the discussion centered around the involvement of the AAU in out-of-season swimming and water polo practice, and both coaches agreed that they were not clear on the position of the CIF in regard to AAU programs.

Both coaches were then asked whether or not the practice being conducted on the morning of the Commissioner's visit was swimming or water polo, and both stated that it was, indeed, swimming practice.

After further discussion of the case, Corona del Mar representatives were told that the committee would review the case, in light of the additional evidence, and arrive at a decision on the appeal in executive session.

In executive session, it was moved, seconded and carried that the committee reaffirm its decision in the case of Corona del Mar HS, based on the fact that no new evidence was presented to alter the original decision.

5. REVIEW NEWPORT HARBOR VIOLATION—Mr. Chuck Godshall, principal, Newport Harbor HS, and Mr. Jules Gage, Newport Harbor athletic director, appeared before the committee to appeal its decision regarding violations in connection with an invitational basketball tournament at Newport Harbor HS during the Christmas recess.

Mr. Godshall reviewed the facts in the case for the committee, and submitted letters stating the positions of those persons involved. He stated that the school was in violation and he was appealing the severity of the penalty assessed, not the decision itself.

Discussion centered around the seriousness of the violations, and it was felt that they were intentional, since those persons involved in the case were informed that the entry of an illegal alumni team would be in violation of CIF, SS, rules.

In executive session, it was moved, seconded and carried to reaffirm the committee's decision in the case of Newport Harbor HS, in light of the seriousness of the violations and the involvement of teams from the San Diego Section of the CIF and from Arizona in the tournament.

6. DISCUSS COSTA MESA VIOLATION—Mr. Frank Lopes, principal, Costa Mesa HS, and Mr. Bob Hunter, Costa Mesa athletic director, appeared before the committee to discuss a possible violation of CIF, SS, out-of-season swimming rules at Costa Mesa HS.

Mr. Lopes stated that, as a result of a meeting with Commissioner Fagans, it was discovered that Costa Mesa HS was in technical violation of the CIF, SS, rule covering out-of-season swimming practice.

He stated, however, that the Coast Clippers, the group in question, was comprised of boys from many high schools in the Newport-Costa Mesa area, and has been sanctioned by the AAU since 1965. He continued to say that workouts were conducted at Costa Mesa High School, under the direction of the Costa Mesa swimming coach.

Mr. Lopes was informed by the committee that it was legal, under present rules, for boys from other high schools to work out at Costa Mesa HS under the direction of the Costa Mesa coach, but swimmers from Costa Mesa could not legally be involved in such a program.

In executive session, it was moved, seconded and carried that those boys involved in the Coast Clippers AAU program from other schools were not in violation of CIF, SS, rules and that only those boys from Costa Mesa HS who were in regular attendance at the Coast Clippers' program would be barred from invitational and CIF, SS, competition during the 1969 swimming season.

7. ATHLETIC CONTEST ADMINISTRATION WORKSHOP — Dr. Richard Perry of the University of Southern California appeared before the committee representing a group of persons who are attempting to arrive at definite guidelines which might be used in administering athletic contests on the high school level.

Dr. Perry explained to the committee that his group was concerned about several problems which had arisen throughout the state of California, and other states in the nation, with regard to vandalism and rowdiness at night athletic contests. He said that his group, comprised of people on all levels of education, was working on solutions to problems of crowd control and game management at these contests, in an effort to prevent much of the vandalism and violence which has prevailed.

Dr. Perry proposed to the committee that, with the cooperation of the CIF, SS, an extensive two-day workshop dealing with specific problems involved in administration of these contests, should be held in Southern California. He explained that the facilities at the University of Southern California would be available for such a workshop, and that the expense to the CIF, SS, would approximate \$2,000.00.
