FOOTHILL COPS 'MOST SUCCESSFUL' SWIM RELAYS

Foothill High of Santa Ana, despite record-breaking performance being adlified by a disqualification, outplashed Redlands High at Belmont real Pool in Long Beach to capture annual CIF, SS Swim Relays arrity championship Feb. 11.

It was the first Relays title for Footlill High. Coach Tom DeLong's mights won two events (one in record and placed second and fourth

In all, 10 records fell in the 21-event making it probably the most accessful event in the history of the clays, at least performance-wise.

Sunny Hills won two events and sheed second in three others (all to exord breaking efforts by the winners) asily annex the B Class title; and tarina, which didn't win an event outest, but placed in six of the seven, as the C Class champion.

FOUR-SECTION GOLF TOURNEY PLANNED FOR JUNE 7

State CIF sanction has been given for a first-of-its-kind golf tournament to be held June 7 of this year at the Virginia Country Club in Long Beach.

CHAMPIONS TO SOON BE CROWNED IN THREE SPORTS

Playoffs conducted by the CIF, SS, are under way in three "winter season" sports.

Eight of the finest basketball teams in the Southland will be competing for championships in four divisions March 13 at the Los Angeles Sports Arena. The basketball playoffs, largest among the Southern Section from a school team participation standpoint, began with 112 schools.

Quarterfinals in the AAAA division were slated March 5 and 6 at the Long Beach Arena, with semifinals in that division to be played at the L.A. Sports Arena Friday evening, March 12.

The A championship game will tip off at 1:30 p.m., the AA at 3 p.m., the AAA at 7:30 and the AAAA at 9.

The wrestling season climaxes March 6 at Redondo High School where the Southern Section finals are scheduled.

In soccer, the eight-team playoff bracket teams opened play March 3, the with CIF championship game set for Friday evening March 12 at South Torrance High School, a site selected at a recent meeting of the CIF Soccer Association council meeting. Roger Bryant, of South Torrance High School is association president.

The tournament would involve high school golfers from four of the CIF's 10 sections, the first time an intersectional golf event would be conducted.

The tournament, to be sponsored by the CIF, SS, with the assistance of the Southern California Golf Association, would have 100 entries. Officials of the San Diego, Los Angeles City and Southern Sections have given their approval to participation, and although the Central Section has not yet met to give its OK, it is hoped that it will.

The team and individual events would run concurrently, with one fiveman team, presumably the section champion, competing from each section.

The setup as outlined by the CIF, SS, for SCGA Executive Director Newell O. Pinch, would allot 40 individual entries for the Southern Section, 15 each for L.A. and San Diego and 10 for the Central. Plans are for the tourney site to be rotated each year.

All individual entries would play 18 holes of stroke play in the morning, with the field cut to 25 (plus ties) for a second 18 in the afternoon. A low gross champion over 36 holes would then be determined. Team winner, determined by the best four scores from each team, would be decided at the end of the first 18 holes.

The SCGA, in its commendable gesture to promote high school golf, will sponsor awards and handle operating details at the course.

Administrators in the Sunset League have directed the removal of a coach from athletic responsibility at one school and censured another school as the result of charges in an unusual "undue influence" case.

The school censured is Santa Ana High School, where Neil Reed, the basketball coach in question, was employed during the 1969-70 school year. Reed was subsequently hired to coach at Anaheim High School and has been relieved of all athletic responsibility there until the end of the current school year.

The complexity of the case involved Reed's change of employment. Santa Ana was censured "for practices and conduct on the part of one of their coaches, Coach Neil Reed, while in their employ, that are inimical to the welfare of atheltics."

As regards the censure of Santa Ana

High School, it comes as a result of the undue influence by Reed while he was still employed at Santa Ana, The council of the Sunset League, after considerable testimony and discussion found no proof that Reed had been guilty of any undue influence while in the employ of Anaheim High School Originally, Santa Ana High had charged that this was the case.

The student in question, Howard Carson, now attends Anaheim High School. He had attended Lathron Junior High in Santa Ana before move ing, and it was during this time that Reed came in contact with Carson and his mother, Mrs. Mary Carson.

The Carsons were living in the Saddleback High School attendance area and Howard was attending Lathrop (from which all students matriculate to Santa Ana High) on an intradia trict permit.

Reed, during testimony, admitted he had advised Mrs. Carson to remain in Santa Ana and suggested she talk with the football coach at Saddleback High School before making a decision to move from Santa Ana. Mrs. Carson had indicated on several occasions, according to testimony, that she planned to leave Santa Ana.

In the Sunset League's original meeting involving the case, the following two motions were passed, according to league president Charles Godshall of Newport Harbor High School, in a communication to the CIF office:

"That Anaheim coach Neil Reed. formerly a coach at Santa Ana High School, did effect undue influence on an athlete under Section XVII of the CIF Constitution. Due to the complexity of his employment location ... the sanctions described under this see tion not automatically be invoked at this time and that the final disposition concerning any penalty be placed on the agenda for the regular meeting of the Sunset League."

"That the student in question, How ard Carson, be relieved of any jeo pardy as ascribed in Section XVII of the Sunset League constitution, as charged by the Santa Ana principal Fred Pasquale."

Section XVII of the CIF by-laws states "There shall be no recruiting of athletes for high school competition The use of undue influence by any per son or persons to secure or retain a boy or to secure or retain one or both par ents or guardians of a boy as residents

WHAT INFLATION?

In these days of rising costs - for all types of services and commoditiesit's interesting to note the history of the CIF. Southern Section's dues assessment for its member schools.

The current annual dues are based on four cents per pupil enrolled with a minimum of \$25. For example, a school with 2,000 students would be assessed an annual dues payment of \$80; a school with 200 students would pay the minimum \$25.

The dues back in 1914, when the California Interscholastic Federation was formed? You guessed it - four cents per pupil enrolled. The minimum has been raised a few times since then, but the four cents has remained for more than a half-century. Not many commodities or services could boast such a non-inflationary measure.

But the dues situation is about all that has remained static. Over the years, the Southern Section has in-

In assigning officials for athletic contests alone, the CIF, SS spends \$40,000 per year to alleviate the tremendous confusion which would be present without a "central clearing house" type operation, and area commissioners in outlying areas.

The CIF, SS has a fulltime staff of eight, including a commissioner administrative assistant, assignment secretary, publicist, and secretarial staff.

It provides rule books in all sports in which high school rules are published; conducts clinics free of charge to leagues and officials associations; maintains an instructional film library, available to member schools at no cost; publishes annually its constitution and by laws, Blue Book, press and record book and membership directory furnished to member schools free of charge; supplies various eligibility and entry forms and cards for schools; publishes an informational bulletin monthly; purchases awards for teams and individuals earning CIF, SS, championships or runner-up positions; makes available a quantity of stopwatches for use, free, by schools at invitational track or swimming meets; and compiles master schedule in four spots.

Not to mention conducting playoffs in 12 approved spots, and providing tickets, posters and handbooks to schools at no cost.

At four cents a student, that's a great deal in any year.

TO PRODUCE NATIONAL TRACK RULES FILM AT CHAFFEY HS

"Track and Field Today," a film to illustrate proper techniques and procedures in officiating track and field athletics, will be produced in the Southern Section next month, according to the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations and Official Sports Films, Inc.

April 5-9 are the filming dates and Chaffey High School in Ontario is the site. The filming will be under the sanction and supervision of the NFSHSAA, with the aid, of the CIF, SS, Chaffey HS athletic director Truck Lindsey, track coach Carl Skvarna, and members of his team.

The film is the 30th in a series of official rules films and the second on track and field. It is due for release July 1, 1971, and will be distributed throughout the U.S. and Canada.

Track and field rules experts, representatives of the National Alliance Track Rules and Records Committee and track officials from California will participate in the film.

OUESTIONNAIRE ON GIRLS ATHLETICS SENT

Increased interest in girls interscholastic athletics has prompted the formation of a special CIF, SS committee, and subsequent study of the situation, beginning with a questionnaire mailed recently to all member schools, plus private and parochial non-member schools.

On the committee are Bill O'Rourke (chairman) vice-principal at Rolling Hills High School, Joe Merlo, principal of Sonora HS, Woody Smith, principal of Huntington Beach HS and Alex Alexander, principal of Desert Sands HS.

Both school principals and persons in charge of schools girls athletics programs have been polled in the twopart questionnaire, with the main inquiry that of whether or not the CIF should become active in the development and management of the girls athletic program.

In conjunction with the CIF, SS, study, a state CIF advisory committee, consisting of Carol Hintze (chairman), Betty Staley, Genevieve Dexter and Alex Alexander, recently made the recommendation that emphasis be redirected to the "grass roots" level in girls athletics - that is to laying proper groundwork at individual school and league organization levels.

SO. SECTION RULES APPLY

The State Federated Council met Feb. 20 at Santa Barbara. Action was taken to modify a number of rules at the state level at the meeting, which will be outlined in a communication from the state office.

Southern section member schools are reminded that state rulings do not necessarily always apply immediately and automatically to the Southern Section. In some cases, SS rules are more stringent or restrictive than state CIF laws and any state modifications are not applicable to CIF, SS members until modified at the section level.

When in doubt, refer to the SS Blue Book, in which all state rules, and Southern Section modifications thereof, are published.

KNOW YOUR BLUE BOOK

QUESTION: May a coach in a practice swim or track meet permit an ineligible boy to compete if he places him in an outside lane and does not count his points?

ANSWER: An ineligible boy may not suit up or compete in any capacity in an interscholastic athletic contest. However, he may practice or work out with a high school squad—unless there is a school or league rule which might prohibit him from practicing because of disciplinary or scholastic reasons.
