

MEETING OF THE SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA INTERSCHOLASTIC FEDERATION

May 21, 1919.

A meeting of the California Interscholastic Federation, Southern Section, was held at the Y. M. C. A., Los Angeles; California, at 3:30 P. M., May 21, 1919, with the following representatives present:-

After an open discussion the leagues for the year 1919-20 are established and consist of the same schools as in 1918-19. The Council recommends that Harvard Military Academy be invited by the Central League to become a member of that league.

W. L. Richer, of Los Angeles Polytechnic High School, is appointed manager of Swimming and Waterpolo for 1919 and after investigation of the offer of Catalina Island interests may set the place of the meet for June 13.

Referring to last paragraph, page 5, of the Constitution the word season shall be interpreted to mean the space of time between the first and last scheduled games of a sport in a particular league.

No school may enter more than one relay team in the Southern California Track Meet.

A bill of \$65.10 for expenses incurred by the Secretary for printing constitutions, postage, telephone, paper and envelopes, minute books and incidentals was approved covering a period from Feb. 1918 to May 1919.

W. C. Wilson was elected State Representative for the term 1919-1921.
