SWIMMING

The Secretary was instructed to inform Mr. Weisman that the C.I.F. (s.s.) wished the Swimming meet held at Pasadena as planned. It was agreed that the events would be as planned by Mr. Weisman. Only one relay team from each school would be allowed. Temperature of water to be between 70 and 80 degrees, Low board to be used in all diving and the meet to be held in the day time at Pasadena.

COLLEGES and A.A.U.

It was moved, seconded and carried that a committee be appointed by the president to meet the athletic Board of each college in Southern California and also the A.A.U. Board and ask for their co-operation in the work which we are trying to do. The chair appointed T. E. Hughes, G.M.Green and R. H. Blee.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

It was moved, seconded and carried that in any sport in which semi-finals and finals are played under our jurisdiction, we give the proper plaque.

It was agreed that the money from the Pasadena - San Bernardino game should be returned to San Bernardino, if the following statements be found to be facts: That all of the expenses of the S. B. team had not been paid.

This is the rule which governs such cases. All expenses, such as officials, grounds and teams, are to be paid and then the remainder be divided 40 - 40 - 20. The 20% to go to the C. I. F. If the gate is not large enough to meet all expenses then the deficit must be met 50 - 50 by the two schools.

It was further agreed that a third school might assume charge of a semi-final provided the schools in the semi-final agreed to it, and provided the third school agreed to meet all expenses and pay 20% of the net gate to the C. I. F.

Managers

Mr. H. J. Moore made his report on permanent managers. His plan was amended, adopted, and ordered printed in our booklet.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that the president be authorized to appoint a representative to attend any game or meet and to

report the conduct of any individual or team, and that the expenses of this delegate be paid by the C. I. F.

Report of Committee on Booklet

The report of the Committee of revision of Constitution and eligibility rules was corrected, amended and then adopted. It was moved, seconded and carried that all necessary forms and blanks be printed by this Committee together with an edition of 2000 booklets.

State Representative

It was moved, seconded and carried that Mr Oliver be elected State Representative to succeed himself.

It was moved, seconded and carried that we recommend to schools that "Letters" be given at the end of each semester to those members of a team who had maintained scholarship standing during the whole semester.

There being no further business the board adjourned at 7:00 P. M. in the rain.

Please call a meeting of your league and read to the league the following report, then come to the meeting, May 21st, at 9:30 A. M. at Y. M. C. A. Come prepared to stay all day. We will have lunch together and your expenses will be paid.

Report of Committee on Revision of Constitution and Eligibility: Amendments

Art II. Sec.1. "All" Southern Calif. H. S. and etc.  
Sec.2. All Southern California High Schools must be either active or passive members of some league. Passive members are schools which do not take an active part in the regular league schedule. Passive schools may enter the "open events" of their league or the "open events" of the C. I. F., provided they live up to all league and C. I. F.-S-S requirements

Art. III. Sec.3.(c) .....shall be final, and the party making the protest shall make the protest on proper forms furnished for that purpose and deposit the sum of five dollars with the protest. If the protest is sustained, the money shall be refunded.  
(addition)

Sec.4. The members of the Council from the leagues shall be the official C. I. F. Representatives in the leagues to see that the C. I. F. rules and regulations are understood and enforced by the individual schools, and also to see that all protests are properly investigated and tried by the league.  
(New)

Sec. 5. Each established league shall be furnished with all forms and blanks necessary for the transaction of C. I. F. -S-S business.

Art IV. Sec. 1 There shall be two regular meetings annually, one on the first Saturday in October and the other on the third Saturday in May. Said meetings to be called to order at 9:30 A. M. and Leagues which are not represented at the two regular meetings may be suspended for the following semester.  
(change)

Eligibility Rules

A. No pupil shall contest in any game or meet with another school who has reached his twenty-first birthday.

B. The A. A. U. rule for professional is the rule of this Federation and is as follows.....

C. No pupil shall compete in Athletic Contests with another school after he has been in attendance eight semesters. Furthermore, he shall not compete for more than four seasons in any branch of athletics.

Ten weeks or over shall count as a semester's residence.

Participation in one or more athletic contests including practice games, between teams of different schools or organizations shall count as a semesters residence.

D. Post-graduates shall be ineligible to compete. ( A pupil who has graduated from any High School or academy)

E. No pupil shall take part in any game or contest under the auspices of this Federation who has not been a member of a high school for at least ten weeks of the semester immediately preceding. This rule does not apply to pupils entering from a grammar school or Junior High School.

Pupils who are compelled to transfer from one school to another because of a change of residence of legal parent or guardian are not barred from competition by this rule.

F. Pupils who are compelled to transfer from one school to another must have been a member of the first school for at least ten weeks of the semester immediately preceding the change of schools and must bring evidence that he was passing in the required amount of work ( See G. ) during the semester immediately preceding the transfer and that he was compelled to transfer an account of a change of residence of legal parent or guardian.

G. No pupil shall compete in any game or contest with another school who has not made a passing grade in 3 out of 16; 9 out of 48; or 30 out of 160 units of new work ( according to the University of California entrance credits) for the semester immediately preceding the semester in which the game or contest take place.

Further, no pupil shall compete in any game with another school who is not making a passing grade in the above number of units of new work for the current semester up to the time he was certified for the contest.

Further, a passing grade in new work shall be construed to mean that the pupil must have a passing grade in each of the subjects, for all work completed by the class during the current semester to date of certification.

Further, credit to be counted must have been made by ten or more weeks of actual class attendance.

Further, by new work is meant studies in which pupil has not previously made a passing grade. Further, the three units cannot be made in one subject such as Agriculture, Printing, Manual Training, Music.

Further, work in Physical Training and Military Drill shall not be considered in this connection.

- H. The Principal of each school shall be held responsible for the amateur standing and eligibility of his teams under these rules and shall certify to each member in a line-up to be exchanged with, and in the hands of, the Principal of the opposing team at least twenty-four hours before a practice game.  
For league games, semi-finals, and finals, such line-up shall be exchanged not less than three days before the meet or game, using the standard blank forms to be furnished by C. I. F.-S-S.
- I. In the event that a member of a team is shown to be ineligible for any championship game in which he has participated, the entire school shall become liable to suspension from inter-school athletics for the remainder of the year, or for the succeeding semester if the violation occurs during the Spring semester.
- J. No visiting team shall be recognized by the captain of the home team or by the Principal of the school, unless accompanied by a faculty representative who shall be responsible for the conduct and line-up of his team, and it shall be the duty of the respective faculty representative in charge of the two teams, to exchange lists of the players that go out on the field.  
The names of all substitutes shall be reported at the time of substitution by an official to the opposing team.
- K. No school under the jurisdiction of the C. I. F. Southern Section shall play ineligible men at any time even in practice games whether such games are played with schools under the jurisdiction of the C. I. F. or not, and any school violating this rule may become liable to suspension from participation in such sport for the succeeding season.

## Recommendations

1. Not over 40 men in State Meet.
2. Not over 10 men from one school in State Meet.
3. No school to enter more than one relay team in League-So. Cal. or State Meet.
4. Only men in relay team who place in trial heat shall be eligible to compete in final heat.
5. Head official shall ascertain the time of sunset and set watch accordingly and his time shall be the official time of game.
6. Schools which agree to officials and allow the game to start cannot protest game because of decisions of judgment.
7. Managers of sports should report winners of semi-finals and finals giving names of officials opposing teams and score.
8. Incomplete grades shall be considered as failing grades and if "made up" shall not count as one of the three "units of work" unless the "incomplete" was due to absence of more than ten days caused by sickness or quarantine of pupil during the last five weeks of the semester and must be made up during the first five weeks of the succeeding semester.
9. We recommend the Illinois High School Athletic Association's form for Eligibility Lists, to be printed by us and distributed to the leagues.
10. We recommend the Long Beach plan for keeping the record of eligibility.
11. We recommend that a perpetual cup be bought to be given in turn to the league winning the greatest number of points in the Southern California Track Meet. The City League to be handicapped or excluded.
12. In all C. I. F.-S-S track-tennis-swimming-meets, only winners of places in regular league schedules shall be allowed to enter.

RULINGS ASKED FOR

- A Can a league make a rule contrary to the rules of the California Interscholastic Federation-Southern Section? Case in point. March 16, 1921 Oxnard case was referred to Northern League for action. May 21, 1921, E. C. Franklin of Santa Paula reported that Oxnard had not broken any rule of the Ventura League and therefore no action had been taken.
- B Can a League make a rule stronger or more drastic than the C. I. F. rule. Cases at point: Bay League in weight teams "Weights in" before the first game of the schedule instead of before each game. Bay League does not allow the transfer of men from one weight team to another
- C Can a team be excused because we omitted a rule on page 9? Case at bar: The Principal of "C" school certifies to three men who made but one unit of work each for last semester. Coach of "H" school would not allow these three boys to play. Two weeks later, Principal of "C" certifies again to one of these men and the man plays against "D" school. Will the Council excuse this because of the omission on Page 9?
- D May 21, 1921 committee of three, T. E. Hughes, G. M. Green, and R. H. Blee, was appointed to confer with the colleges and A. A. U. Question- What shall the committee do without a chairman?
- E. June 12, 1921, J. S. Malcolm, E. W. Oliver and H. J. Moore were appointed a committee to arrange for a meeting when the Council and press might meet and break bread. Question- When do we meet?
- F Coronado submits this question to Secretary: " Boy fails in his work in the Spring Semester. After ten weeks of attendance from the opening of school this year, and passing in all his work, does he become eligible to play? " Secretary's answer:- Boy who is ineligible first day of semester is ineligible the whole of the semester.

That the Second Rule on Page 8 be amended by adding the following words...and the request for such consent shall be made in writing by the Principal of the High School and such consent shall be granted by majority vote of the whole council in meeting assembled.

Your letter was very carefully read and considered.

It was voted that the Secretary be instructed to write in answer to your letter our point of view.

These twelve men were the chosen representatives of the 94 High Schools of Southern California and were expected to use judgement and justice in dealing with the schools of Southern California.

After an all day session, which adjourned at 7:00 P.M., the wisdom of these men decreed that for next year the schools be placed in leagues as per enclosed list.

They realized that the growth of schools would render this division subject to change next year, but thought that the best interests of all would be conserved by this division into leagues.

Your reasons 1--Distractions, 2--expense, 3--Chaperonage, apply to each school and league in Southern California.

In view of the above facts, the California Interscholastic Federation Southern Section in Council assembled, instructed its Secretary to ask you to accept the judgement and decision of the meeting of May 21, 1921 as final, or if this cannot be done to ask you to assume full control of all the City High Schools, thus placing Hollywood, Jefferson, Polytechnic, Lincoln, Los Angeles High School, ~~Pasadena~~, San Pedro, Wilmington, Owensmouth, San Fernando, Van Nuys and Franklin under your jurisdiction in one league.

Gentlemen:

At a meeting held yesterday by principals and vice principals of the high and intermediate schools of Los Angeles city, the following resolution was passed:

"It is moved that we ask our vice principals who represent us on the C. I. F. to insist that our athletic league for next year be limited to six city high schools and five contests to avoid multiplication of events. Also that we cannot to advantage arrange any schedule with a school in an outside city."

On motion of Mr. Fonda it was agreed that the secretary send to the C. I. F. all the reasons why the principals of city schools want the activities limited. These reasons were summed up under three heads, viz., 1--Distractions. 2--Expense. 3--Chaperonage.

The first reason is the one with the greatest weight since one of the growing evils of the big high school is the limitless list of events which distract from actual school work and increase the number of failures. The following is an incomplete list of the "meets" which take place each term for which the large high schools must arrange a schedule.

Under the head of chaperonage, it was the concensus of opinion that the greatest difficulties attend taking very great numbers of students outside of the city.

It was greatly desired by all principals that their deep appreciation of the work of the C. I. F. in organizing, standardizing and improving athletics in California be expressed and that representatives from outside schools be assured that there is no prejudice against outside schools contained in the resolution. The first work of the principals in the coming semester will be to cut down events distracting to studies which occur under the head of other school activities.
