May 17, 1924

The Council of the California Inter-Scholastic Federation Southern Section met in Annual Meeting at the Y. M. C. A. in Los Angeles at 9:30 A. M. May 17, 1924.

5. The question of Re-leaguing Southern California was then taken up. It was moved, Seconded and Carried that Victorville, Barston and Needles be made passive Schools of the Citrus League instead of the Riverside League.

It was moved Seconded and Carried that Avalon be made a passive School attached to the Coast League.

6. The Secretary reported that the vote by mail on changing the number of passing units from three to four had been received as follows:

8. The report of the Committee on revision of the Constitution and Rules was discussed, revised and referred back for further consideration.

By this time over half of the members had left the room. The Secretary was instructed to request the members to come to our meetings prepared to spend more time in consideration of our business, at the Annual Meeting the first Saturday in October; October 4, 1924.

C. I. F. RULINGS FROM THE MINUTES

March 16, 1921

Man not allowed on two weight teams in same week.

An institutional team (college or prep combined) may play out of league season.

Managers paid as follows:

Football	\$100 and expenses
Baseball	50 and expenses
Basketball	50 and expenses
Track	50 and expenses
Swimming and Polo	50 and expenses
Tennis	25 and expenses

President authorized to appoint a representative at any time to attend any game or meet, and to report conduct of any individual or team at the expense of C. I. F.-S. S.

June 13, 1921

Hereafter five places in S. C. track meet.

October 15, 1921

In order to be reinstated a suspended school must abide by the rules of the C. I. F.-S. S. during suspension.

Schools playing games with schools outside of the C. I. F. must file eligibility list with the secretary.

October 29, 1921

Pupils in grammar school districts annexed by supervisors to high school "A" who were attending high school "B," may stay in "B" and be eligible, but would also be eligible if they entered "A."

If pupil is marked "4" by teacher, the teacher must make it clear that the grade was "passing" but with held for change to higher rating.

November 12, 1921

One semester does not end until the next semester begins.

Request to play with schools outside of California must be made in writing by the Principal of the school and consent granted only by a majority vote of the whole Council in meeting assembled.

Sports conducted so that part of schedule is in each semester shall count as one season of that sport.

League cannot rule contrary to rules of the C.I.F. but may make rule more drastic.

Boy ineligible first day of semester is ineligible whole semester. Some Principals, coaches and pupils seem to think that ten weeks attendance removes ineligibility.

December 10, 1921

Man may play on unlimited and 130-lb. teams in semi-finals provided he is not played on both teams the same week.

Referee is acting within his rights when he reverses his decision regarding an explicit rule of the game and if the score is affected the score may be declared changed.

League must inform Manager that the league intends to enter the semi-finals before the schedule is drawn up. No school will be allowed to enter after the schedule starts.

January 21, 1922

Basketball game must run full time, unless shortened by mutual agreement before game starts, to be called a game.

If the two teams cannot agree basketball manager shall have semi-finals and finals played on a court about 35'x70' with clear space of three feet and overhead clearance of at least 20'.

If one school demands two officials in semi-finals or final games, two must be supplied.

In S.C. Track one boy to enter only three events and relay.

Free-lance schools must win all games in approved schedule of five games in order to enter semi-finals.

No school may charge traveling expenses in excess of the railroad or stage fare except by mutual consent of the two schools.

March 11, 1922

Imperial Valley League granted permission to play Yuma if she lives up to C.I.F. rules.

April 22, 1922

If school coach coaches from first or third base box the game is forfeited.

No team shall be allowed in semi-finals or finals weight contests unless it has won approved or league schedule of at least three games.

First round of baseball semi-finals fourth Saturday in May.

One boy be allowed to enter but two of these three events ¼, ½ and mile races in one-track-meet.

Pupils in separate Junior High Schools cannot represent Senior High Schools.

All boys to be weighed in during the first two weeks of school of each semester.

STATE COUNCIL

May 5, 1922

Each section limited to four men in each event in State Track Meet.

There will be no State Championship in Baseball hereafter.

Order of Events in Swimming

50 yard, 220 yard, 100 yard breast fancy diving, 100 yard free, 50 yard back, 440 yard free, plunge, relay.

November 29, 1922

Hollywood to appoint manager for swimming and water polo.

Basketball schedules must begin by second Saturday in January and no league would be allowed to enter the semi-finals later than March 3.

Teams to enter semi-finals must have won a schedule.

No league may prevent a championship team from entering the semi-finals.

Some Decisions Made by Secretary

- A. Boy from San Diego writes, "End of first semester I received an incomplete in mechanical drawing. Two days after the end of the semester I completed the work. The grade was not entered on my permanent grade card. I passed in two other subjects."

Ans. Up to conscience of your Principal. No one has access to your school record. C. I. F. rule is as follows: "An incomplete on the books shall count as a failure unless teacher writes after the incomplete that the grade is withheld to change a 3 to a 2 or a 1. If you were in Inglewood, I would not let you play, for your letter states you made up a failure the second semester."

- B. Vernon Augustine of Manual Arts states that he played on an institutional team for U. S. C. vs Stanford when he was in U. S. C. High School. School was not in a league at the time.

Ans. Rule of C. I. F. of March 16, 1921 -- "Any school may play an institutional team, provided this team did not play during the league season for the sport."

- C. Boy leaves High School "A" on account of trouble with Principal and attends High School "B". Parents live in "A". He has been in attendance for 26 weeks at "B". Is he eligible to compete for "B"?

Ans. If the boy attends "B" for 26 weeks and has a passing grade in 3 out of 16 units, he may play provided he does not violate rules A. B. C. D.

- D. Letter from Mr. C. B. Moore of Franklin.
1. Would Harvard be in any sense a competitor for Central League Championship?

Ans. No

2. Would Harvard man, placing 1 - 2 - 3 - 4, debar a Central League man taking 5 from the Southern California.

Ans. Yes. Same is true for all "passive" schools.

- E. Central League protests Harvard being placed in League Meet.

- F. Telegram from San Diego: "Can man, who entered in February, play whole season of basket ball even if it extends into his 9th semester?"

Ans. No. Eight semesters only.

G. From Mr. McIntosh of Covina
"Boy forced to leave school for good reason, to support
parent paralyzed; in 9 weeks; played in several games.
Would this count as a semester?"

Ans. Yes-one practice game makes a semester.

H. Mr. Collins of Imperial
"May League send substitute to C. I. F. meetings?"

Ans. Yes

I. Mr. Westcott of Santa Ynez
"Boy ineligible first semester- First semester closes
Friday- Second semester opens Monday. May he play
Saturday?"

Ans. No-first semester did not end until 9:00 A.M.
Monday.

J. Mr. Benson of Calipatria
"Small school with few boys- Have boy 13 months over
age who can "pitch". Coaches of league willing to let
boy play.

To High Schools Having Mileage due from the C. I. F.
for Track Athletics:

Southern California Meet.

Boys who took part in the Southern California Meet are allowed mileage at the rate five cents (5¢) per mile one way for distance they traveled, less twenty-five miles, in attending the meet. Boys who live twenty-five or less miles from where the meet was held receive no mileage.

State Meet.

Boys who competed in the State Meet are allowed five cents (5¢) one way for distance traveled in getting to Taft. The distance allowed from Los Angeles to Taft has been set at 160 miles. That is the distance through Bakersfield over the paved road.

The check stub indicates the purpose for which the money is being paid.
