FOURTH MEETING

MAY 15, 1926

The Council of the California Inter-scholastic Federation, Southern Section, met in regular Annual Meeting on the third Saturday in May, May 15, 1926, at the Y. M. C. A., Los Angeles, California.

Meeting called to order by the Secretary at 9:30 A. M. there being a quorum present. The Secretary called Mr. Lewis Foley to the chair. Mr. Foley conducted the meeting with dignity and dispatch.

1. FIRST ORDER OF BUSINESS—

WEIGHT AND HEIGHT—Tabled at last meeting. It was moved by Green and seconded by Oliver that the following motion be taken from the table. Carried.

11. WEIGHT AND HEIGHT.

It was moved by Wadsworth and seconded by Green that the following rules in reference to weight and height be passed—

- a. All boys should be weighed in at the beginning of the gymnasium periods during the first two weeks of school and this weight and height so measured must be understood as the boy's normal weight and height.
- b. We especially recommend that the C. I. F. go on record as against the practice of any boy attempting to vary his normal weight in order to change his four point classification.
- c. Should it be proven that any boy deliberately trains down to make lower classification under the four point system, it is the duty of the boy's school to declare him ineligible for competition during that semester.

The original motion was then carried unanimously.

2. RESOLUTION OF APPRECIATION OF MR. SETH F. VAN PATTEN

For over twenty years Mr. Van Patten has been a dominant figure in the development of interscholastic track athletics in Southern California. Before the organization of the California Inter-scholastic Federation in 1912, Mr. Van Patten wherever he taught, was a vital factor in developing the play spirit among boys, in securing contests with other schools, endeavoring to find fair and satisfactory rules of eligibility, and in encouraging a spirit of kindly relations and good sportsmanship between schools.

When the California Interscholastic Federation was organized in Los Angeles in 1912, at the old Y. M. C. A. playground on Stevenson Avenue in Boyle Heights, Mr. Van Patten was one of the prominent educators in Southern California to give his approval of the movement and to urge other men of South-

ern California to fall in line with this progressive movement in athletics. Since the organization of the California Interscholastic Federation, Mr. Van Patten has been the recognized leader in track athletics. He has been the manager all these years and has developed Southern California competition from an unorganized group of a few schools into what is, without question, the best, largest, and most efficient organization of competitive track athletics in America. All of this has taken a tremendous amount of energy, ability, time, and effort, which he has given gladly.

Therefore, the Southern Council of the California Interscholastic Federation hereby goes on record as desiring to show its appreciation of the great services Mr. Van Patten has rendered the cause of athletics in Southern California, and hereby presents him with a watch, that he can time his steps with, and a stop watch that he can use at all future contests of the California Interscholastic Federation, which we hope will be many.

It is hereby enacted that Mr. Seth F. Van Patten is declared to be a life member of the Southern Council of the California Interscholastic Federation, with all its honors and privileges.

It was pointed out that this Council and also the State Council had gone on record as opposed to sending High School boys outside of the State. That we were convinced that there was very little good for the boy in such a trip and that the only result was advertising for the town.

5. It was moved by Moore and seconded by Monroe that the Southern Council go on record as approving the action of the State Council in regard to the Inter-state Competition. Motion was carried unanimously.

6. TRACK MANAGER—James Reinhard made the following suggestions:

- a. What men are qualified for the State Meet? This question should be answered before the next meeting.
- b. Some schools have not sent in a report on the sale of tickets at school.
- c. Some schools have not sent in expense for mileage
- d. What does Rule 5, Page 19, mean?
- e. Place the javelin back?

7.—RULE 5, PAGE 10—

It was moved by Malcom and seconded by Collins, and carried, that in paying expenses to the Southern California meets each school up to 100 miles from the place of holding the So. Cal. Meet shall be reimbursed as follows:

- For distances under 25 miles—no reimbursement.
- For distances 26 to 100 miles, at 5c per mile, per man, for each mile traveled one way, and for distances greater than 100 miles, at 6c per mile, per man, each mile traveled one way.

Was referred to the several leagues for consideration.

9. A. A. U. HIGH SCHOOL RELAY—

It was moved by Foley and seconded by Green that we request the A. A. U. to hold the High School Relay Meet on March 5th or 12th.

10. CLASS COMPETITION—

It was moved by Monroe and seconded by Moore, and carried, that any athlete competing in a So. Cal. playoff becomes ineligible for competition in any lower class of that same sport.
