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KINTER HAMILTON ANNOUNCES RETIREMENT

The story of high school athletics, in Southern California, is indelibly associated with the C.I.F., Southern Section. The story of the C.I.F., Southern Section, in much the same way, is associated with the name of Kinter Hamilton. Mr. Hamilton was a prime mover in the C.I.F. when it started, and has been the chairman of the Executive Committee since it was first established. Mr. Hamilton has been so much a part of the high school athletic set up in Southern California, for almost fifty years, that we will always think of him as an integral part of the picture.

Kinter Hamilton came to the Harvard School (North Hollywood) as a teacher of Latin, in 1902. At first he coached football and track, and he continued to coach track for some ten years. His interest in boys brought him in contact with the C.I.F., Southern Section, as it was organized in 1914. Mr. Hamilton's experience and abilities well qualified him for his great share in directing the growth and development of high school athletics in Southern California. When the Executive Committee was organized in 1930, Mr. Hamilton was elected a Charter Member of the body. He has served continuously from that time until the present date. His annual election to this all-important committee shows the regard in which he is held by the high school men of our area. This is especially noteworthy when you consider that the bulk of member schools are public high schools and Mr. Hamilton was from a small private boys' school. His service on the Executive Committee always reflected his interest in boy's athletics as it concerned all high schools in Southern California.

Kinter Hamilton grew up in Western Pennsylvania and graduated from Grove City College where he played quarterback and ran the sprints. He went on to law school at the University of Pennsylvania where he also competed in football and track. He transferred to the University of Michigan Law School and received his degree in law from that University. His legal training was of great value to the C.I.F. since Mr. Hamilton was able to understand both sides of a case and work towards a solution acceptable to both parties.

He has always been an active worker in A.A.U. circles and was President of the Southern Pacific Association of the A.A.U. as well as a member of the National Track and Field Committee. In 1932, he made a trip to Chicago and won

a memorable battle to bring the final A.A.U. tryouts for the 1932 Olympic Games, to Los Angeles. He has always been interested in improving the caliber of officiating at track meets. Recently he has assisted the C.I.F. Office in publishing a manual on instructions for track starters and referees.

Kinter Hamilton has announced his retirement from the C.I.F., to be effective at the end of this school year. He will be associated with the Douglas Aircraft Association, working in their welfare department in the field of recreation. Certainly his talents and experience qualify him to organize the thousands of men and women of the Douglas Aircraft Association into recreational groups for their own benefit.

Without Mr. Hamilton's knowledge the Executive Committee, by unanimous vote, authorized the presentation of the "Certificate of Appreciation" to Kinter Hamilton "for Distinctive Service in the Field of Athletics in the High Schools of Southern California." This certificate, suitably framed, was signed by Mr. B. L. Bergstrom of the Executive Committee, and William Russell, Commissioner of Athletics. The certificate was presented by Mr. Russell to Mr. Hamilton, April 18th, 1951, at a meeting of the Preparatory League, held in his honor that night.

The best wishes of the C.I.F., Southern Section will follow Kinter Hamilton wherever he may go.

THE GERALD AYRES MILE TROPHY

Whose name will be added to the four now engraved upon the beautiful Gerald Ayres Mile Trophy, at present residing in the trophy case at Glendale High School, Glendale, California?

In the Spring of 1947, the C.I.F. Executive Committee accepted the donation of the beautiful trophy and 15 gold medals which are awarded for the Class A Mile in the C.I.F., Southern Section Championship Meet. The donation of the trophy was made by the family of Gerald Ayres in memory of his devotion to clean amateur sports. During the decade of 1930-1940 Gerald Ayres was one of the well known officials and boosters for amateur athletics in Southern California. During this period he was Boys' Vice-Principal at South Pasadena Junior High School and at Beverly Hills High School. For quite some time he served as track coach at the South Pasadena High School. Mr. Ayres was one of the most competent football and basketball offi-

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cial in the Southern California area. He worked among the high schools, junior colleges and the universities. At the time of his death in 1946, he was a popular and respected official.

Following his death Mrs. Ayres offered to present to the high schools of the C.I.F., Southern Section a trophy in memory of his interest in high school track and field. The Cup was recommended and approved by the Executive Committee. It is a perpetual trophy and it is lodged at the school of the boy winning the mile championship. The boy is awarded an individual Gerald Ayres medal. This splendid trophy should be an inspiration to the high school milers in our area.

BASEBALL PLAYOFFS START SECOND WEEK IN MAY

Following the same plan in operation last year, the 1951 C.I.F., Southern Section Baseball Championships will be determined in each of the Northern, Southern and Central groups of leagues. League winners must be ready for the first playoff game in baseball by the second weekend in May.

Schools which are in contention for their league baseball championship should keep in close touch with their league representative so that he may advise the C.I.F. Office at the earliest possible date which school will represent his league.

El Centro won the 1950 Southern group baseball championship; Santa Maria won the Northern group finals; and Woodrow Wilson High School of Long Beach defeated Santa Barbara before 1700 spectators to win the Central Group championship.

CLASS A INDIVIDUAL TENNIS CHAMPIONSHIP

The 1951 C.I.F., Southern Section, Class A Tennis Championship will be held Saturday, May 26th, at the Long Beach City College court. Matches through the quarter final rounds will be played on the twenty new cement courts at the College. Semi-final and final matches will be played Saturday afternoon, May 26th, at the Lakewood Tennis Club, tournament play permitting.

Entry blanks will be sent to the various league representatives in the near future. Under the Blue Book regulations, entries are restricted to any high school boy who has placed first or second in his league meet. Class A tennis championship includes both singles and doubles events. A boy cannot compete in both singles and doubles. C.I.F., Southern Section championship medals will be awarded to those boys winning first and second places in singles and doubles. The entry fee will be \$1.00 per boy entered.

CLASS A TEAM TENNIS CHAMPIONSHIP

With the beautiful Southern California Tennis Patrons' Association trophy at stake, play in the Class A team tennis championships will begin the first week in May, according to C.I.F. Blue Book regulations. Entry blanks have been sent to the twenty-five league representatives.

Each league is at liberty to determine its own rules in deciding its league's tennis championship, but the rules outlined in the C.I.F. Blue Book, page 36, will govern the team tennis playoffs.

Each team shall consist of eight boys, four singles players and two doubles teams. No boy may enter play in both singles and doubles. In singles playoff matches each contestant shall play one set with each of the players of the opposing team. In doubles a round robin shall be played with each team playing two sets with each opposing doubles team. Each set won in singles shall count one point, and each doubles set shall count one and one-half points for the winning school. In the event of a tie in points, when sets are counted, the number of games won during the match shall determine the winner.

The home team shall furnish the tennis balls for the match and the visiting team shall pay its own traveling expense. The used tennis balls shall be divided between the two teams.

Santa Monica High School won the 1950 team tennis championship, defeating Anaheim in the final match.

CLASS B AND C TENNIS CHAMPIONSHIPS

Congratulations are in order for South Pasadena and Grossmont High Schools for winning the team championships in the Class B and Class C Tennis Tournament respectively, completed at Santa Ana High School's battery of courts Saturday, April 21. The entry list numbered 144 boys, competing in singles and doubles in both Classes.

Fedro Yanez of El Monte High School won the Class B singles; Albert Hernandez of La Jolla won the Class C singles; Ray Pentz and William Foote of South Pasadena captured the B doubles title; and Donald Pearce teamed with Frank McCabe to win the C doubles title for Grossmont.
