LOYOLA HS FINALLY CAPTURES ELUSIVE BASKETBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

In his 25th year of coaching and teaching English at Loyola High School, Coach Bill Barnett's 1953 basketball squad brought to its school honors which had eluded them during all these years, the highly prized C.I.F., Southern Section basketball championship for the Central Group of Leagues.

In the championship game, played before almost 2000 enthusiastic spectators in the Long Beach City College Pavilion Saturday, March 14, Loyola faced Compton HS, the defending champions who had turned back the 1952 Loyola bid for the title. But the 1953 squad was not to be denied, turning in an outstanding defensive game to hold the high scoring Tarbabes from Compton to but 31 points, while marking up 40 in a ball-control exhibition.

Colton HS turned back Redondo, 66-56, in the

game for third place honors.

The championship game was brilliantly played, with both teams going all out on defense, yet playing the game cleanly. There were but 14 fouls called in the titular contest, 6 on Loyola and 8 against Compton. These same two teams met earlier in the season at the Compton HS Invitational Basketball Tournament, and again the fouls were few, with but 15 called.

The playoff games were played in the various communities involved, with attendance somewhat increased from previous years. Both first and second place teams from the leagues in the Central Group.

MINUTES OF COUNCIL MEETING MAY 23

The meeting of the C.I.F., Southern Section Council was called to order at the Oxnard High School by President Sam Packwood of Central High School, El Centro, on Saturday, May 23, 1953 at 9:45 A.M. The roll of league representatives was called, with 22 present

1. It was moved by Mr. Gunn, seconded by Mr. Brumwell, and carried to dispense with the reading of the Minutes of the February Meeting of the Council, which had been published in the Monthly Bulletin.

2. It was moved by Mr. Clark, seconded by Mr. Cameron, and carried to accept the application of Pacific High School of San Bernardino for regular membership, and the application of Brophy High School of Phoenix, Arizona for associate membership,

3. The report of the Committee on Officials was read to the Council. The Committee report suggested that schools be permitted, if they so desired, to raise the officiating fee by \$3.00 for night contests in all sports. It was moved by Mr. Clark, seconded by Mr. Ashton, and carried that officials fees remain the same as is now listed in the Blue Book, page 28.

4. The topic of Professional Baseball and its relationship to the high school athletic program came up for considerable discussion. It was moved by Mr. Moore, seconded by Mr. Price, and carried that the Council go on record as opposing Senate Bill 1955 (McCarthy Bill) since the provisions of this bill are contrary to the best interests of the high school boy, both physically and financially; because it will jeopar-dize the amateur standing of all high school boys who fall under its provisions; and because it is in opposition to the best interests of the entire California high school athletic program, which is recognized as one of the outstanding programs in the United States.

5. It was moved by Mr. Clark, seconded by Mr. Ashton, and carried that the request of the Ventura League in regard to limiting basketball tournaments in January and February be referred back to the Ventura League for action within the league if they see fit.

6. Football playoff dates for 1954 and 1955 were discussed. It was moved by Mr. Bonnet, seconded by Mr. Smith, and carried, to establish dates for starting football playoffs in 1954 and 1955 on the same weekends as in 1953, namely November 26 in 1954; and November 25 in 1955. The 1953 date is Nov. 27.

7. Football practice starting dates were discussed. I was moved by Mr. Smith, seconded by Mr. Gray, and carried by a roll call vote of 11-3, to rescind the action of the Council in the December 1952 meeting in reference to starting dates for football practice; and to establish the following dates for 1954 and 1955: September 6 in 1954, and September 5 in 1955. (Editor's note: refer to Blue Book, Paragraph 8, pages 29 and 30.) The authorized date for start of 1953 foot

ball practice is September 1. 3. The election of officers for the coming year was the next item of business. It was moved by Mr. Clark. seconded by Mr. Gunn, and carried to elect the Metropolitan League representative to the presidency of the Council, and the Mt. Baldy League representative to the vice-presidency for the 1953-54 school year. Mr. Joseph Rindone, Jr., of Chula Vista HS, will be the new President; and Mr. Joseph Bonnett of Fremont Ir. HS in Page 2011. Jr. HS in Pomona, will be the new Vice-president. Mr. S. Chester McIntosh is retiring as Superintendent

and Principal of Puente HS, and accordingly is resigning as Treasurer of the C.I.F., Southern Section. It was moved by Mr. Clark, seconded by Mr. McIntosh, and carried to elect Mr. Winston Nelson of Pomona HS as Treasurer.

Mr. Russell, Commissioner of Athletics and Secretary of the Council, excused himself from the room, while the Council considered election of the Commissioner of Athletics. It was moved by Mr. Gunn, seconded by Mr. Clark, and carried to cast a unanimous ballot for William Russell as Commissioner. It was moved by Mr. Smith, seconded by Mr. Gray, and carried to commend Mr. Russell for his work on behalf of the C.I.F., Southern Section.

It was moved by Mr. McIntosh, seconded by Mr. Clark, and carried to elect Mr. Floyd Johnson of Hoover HS in San Diego, to the two year term July 1, 1953 to June 30, 1955 as C.I.F., Southern Section Representative to the California State Federated C. I. F. Council, to replace Mr. McIntosh.

Election of the Executive Committee (5 members) was next on the agenda. The following men were elected to the Executive Committee for the 1953-54 school vear: B. L. Bergstrom, El Monte; Harvey J. Holt, Santa Barbara; Floyd Johnson, Hoover of San Diego; Oliver Corbin, Covina; and Bruce Lawson, Keppel of Alhambra. The President of the Council and the Treasurer are ex-officio members of the Executive Committee, as is the Commissioner of Athletics.

9. It was moved by Mr. Clark, seconded by Mr. Moore, and carried to officially express the Council's appreciation for Mr. S. Chester McIntosh's work and service to the youth of California. It was moved by Mr. Gunn, seconded by Mr. Bonnet, and carried, to present Mr. McIntosh with a life pass to all C.I.F., Southern Section athletic events.

10. Mr. Hartmann, coach at Compton HS, wrote to the Council suggesting that the "season of sport' as defined in the Blue Book, page 18, might be changed, since some sports seasons are defined in terms of league games and other sports by calendar dates. After some iscussion, it was moved by Mr. Moore, seconded by Mr. Price, and carried to propose for consideration at the December 1953 meeting of the Council the amendment of the Blue Book Section IX, Season Of A Sport, page 18 by deleting paragraphs 1, 2, and 3; and inserting in place thereof: "The season of any sport is defined as that period which starts with the first contest by a school, (practice, league, or tournament) and ends with the last contest, (practice, league, tournament, or C.I.F. playoffs).'

The season of a sport rule pertains to the time during which a boy may not play on any team other than his high school team. Refer to page 44 of the Blue Book, paragraphs 6 and 7.

11. It was moved by Mr. Moore, seconded by Mr. Gray, and carried to establish the following dates for C.I.F., Southern Section playoffs in the 1953-54 school

Cross Country: Prelims Dec. 4; Finals Dec. 11 Basketball: Central Group, March 2, 5, 9, 12, 13. Northern and Southern Groups, March 2, 5, 12. Baseball: Central Group, May 25, 28, June 1, 4. Northern and Southern Groups, May 25, 28,

Track: May 15, C.I.F. Prelims; May 18, Semi-finals; Finals, May 22; State C.I.F.

Meet at Berkeley, May 29.

Team Tennis: May 26, 29, June 2, 5 12. The following are dates on which invitational track meets may be held (inter-league in scope) during the 1954 track season: March 6, 7, 12, 13, 26, 27; anytime during Easter vacation week except Good Friday; and anytime during the entire season provided the leagues involved officially approve the date and all schools of the league are invited, and provided the Commissioner approves. It is suggested that schools desiring to hold invitational track meets on dates other than March 6, 7, 12, 13, 26, and 27, contact the Commissioner relative to procedures and practices involved, before the schools announce their meets.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:15 P.M. in time for lunch and the Championship Track Meet. Respectfully submitted, William W. Russell

1953 INVITATION SWIMMING MEET BIGGEST IN C.I.F. HISTORY

When the water in the new Long Beach Polytechnic HS swimming pool finally quieted down after the 1953 Invitational Swimming Championship meet, one thing was certain: the 1953 Invitational was the biggest and best in C.I.F., Southern Section annals.

Thirty two schools entered boys in the Invitational, formerly called the Midwinter Swim Meet, with the result that there were some 850 entries in the meet. Fifty seven heats were required in each of the two preliminary meets held at Wilson HS and Beverly Hills HS.

Perhaps the most noteworthy individual performance came from Robin Moore of North Phoenix HS, when he cut three seconds off the old Class A 100 yd. breast stroke mark set by D. McIlroy of El Segundo, 1:05.3 in 1951. Moore broke the record in the prelims with a 1:03.8 time, and then further reduced his time in the finals with an outstanding 1:02.3 record. In all, six new records were written into the Invitational Meet records.

Wilson HS won the Class A title, with El Segundo nosing out Whittier for second place. Whittier was the Class B champion followed by Huntington Beach and Black Foxe. The Class C title also went to Whittier, with Wilson second and Riverside third.
