FOOTBALL PLAYOFF COMMITTEE APPOINTED

President Joseph Rindone of the CIF, Southern Section Council has announced the appointment of a special committee which will determine which second place teams in the Central Group of Leagues will be eligible to enter the 1954 Central Group Football Playoffs, in accordance with recent Council instructions.

Mr. Vernon Weybright, Principal of Burroughs HS of Burbank; Mr. Heber Holloway, Principal of California HS in Whittier; and Mr. Ernie Payne, Principal of Chaffey HS in Ontario; and William Russell, CIF Commissioner will form the committee. Sufficient second place teams will be qualified to provide a full bracket of 16 teams, so that all teams will compete on an equal footing with no byes. The committee will meet early in November as the football season approaches its climax.

CLASS B AND C TENNIS TITLES TO LA JOLLA AND CHAFFEY

ROBIN MOORE, NO. PHOENIX HS, SETS NATIONAL SWIM RECORD IN CIF MIDWINTER MEET

A new national interscholastic record in the 100 yard breaststroke by Robin Moore of North Phoenix High School, and five new CIF Midwinter Invitational Swim Meet records highlighted the annual March event, with the finals held at the Long Beach Jordan HS pool March 26, 1954.

Moore swam the 100 yard breast stroke event in one minute flat. Five watches were used in timing first place with four recording 1:00 and the other reading 59.9.

An enthusiastic and capacity crowd saw Whittier capture Class A honors, Harvard the B title, and Chadwick the Class C championship. El Segundo and Black Foxe gave Whittier a run for the varsity crown, Whittier gaining 44 points to El Segundo's 34, and Black Foxe's 33. Wilson was six points behind Harvard's 45, and Whittier ran third with 29, in the B division. Chadwick's 22 points was high in the C ranks, with Beverly Hills and Wilson closely trailing with 19 and 18 respectively.

As has been the case each year recently, the entry list again was bigger than the previous years, and the calibre of the competition equally keen.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING MAY 22, 1954 MINUTES

The meeting was called to order at Excelsior High School at 8:05 A.M. by Chairman Mr. B. L. Bergstrom. The following members were present: Mr. Oliver Corbin, Mr. Harvey Holt, Mr. Floyd A. Johnson, Mr. Winston Nelson, Mr. Joseph Rindone, Jr., Mr. B. L. Bergstrom, and Mr. Wm. W. Russell.

1. The eligibility case of a boy from Hart High School was considered. The boy will fall two days short of fulfilling the requirement for a minimum of ten full weeks residence at a school in a semester immediately preceding the semester in which he competes. Although the committee expressed sympathy with the unusual nature of the case the boy was held ineligible under C.I.F. rules.

2. Clarification was requested by a member school which had been offered an air horn for use at football games. The school had requested the C.I.F. to rule on the use of the air horn. The Executive Committee stated that the C.I.F. policy is to discourage any type of noise makers or other demonstration which tends to unduly emphasize the score or embarrass the opponent. It was felt that the schools request should be referred to the league for final action.

3. Mr. Russell presented for review the recent ruling by the Executive Committee on an eligibility case arising when a high school baseball player participated in a basketball game at a recreational activity. The committee originally expressed its opinion by mail vote. The Executive Committee reaffirmed its policy which permits a high school team member to participate in a spontaneous recreational activity or game

1954 SWIMMING RELAYS AT WHITTIER BIGGEST IN HISTORY

The swimming program in the C.I.F., Southern Section high schools continues to grow not only in numbers but also in quality, as evidenced by the entries and the marks established at the annual swimming relays at Whittier HS, held February 23 and 26, 1954. A total of 215 relay teams competed in the preliminaries in this year's event, compared with 172 last year and the 1953 meet was bigger than any previous relays event. 763 boys splashed into Whittier's outdoor pool in bright and warm weather usually experienced in June or July.

Three Class B records went into the record books, but the Class A and Class C marks were not broken for the first time in several years. Whittier's Bees set new marks in both the four man 200 ft. and six man 100 ft. free style relays, lowering the former by one tenth of a second to 2:28.9, and the latter to 1:38.3 from the old record of 1:39.2. Both previous marks were held by Whittier. Long Beach Wilson smashed El Segundo's old mark of 3:09.2 in the four man 200 ft. breast stroke relay, with a brilliant time of 3:05.9. The El Segundo record was set in 1950, and the fact that it had stood for three years indicates further the outstanding performance by the Wilson team. The oldest records on the Relays is the four man by 200 ft. Class A breast stroke mark set by Fullerton HS in 1948; only three of the 15 records were made in 1949.

Team scoring titles went to host Whittier in Class A and B, while Beverly Hills edged out Newport Harbor HS for the Class C crown.

C.I.F., SOUTHERN SECTION COUNCIL MEETING — MAY 22, 1954 MINUTES

The regular May meeting of the C.I.F., Southern Section Council was called to order by President Joseph Rindone, Jr., in the library of the Excelsior High School in Norwalk at 9:45 A.M., May 22, 1954. The roll of league representatives was taken with the following members present: Bay, Harold Waldon, Redondo High School; Catholic, Brother Augustine, Cathedral High School; Coast, Richard Cline, Jordan Long Beach; Desert-Inyo, Keith Gunn, Victor Valley HS; Foothill, Art North, Burroughs HS; Metropolitan, Joseph Rindone, Jr., Chula Vista HS; Mt. Baldy, Joseph Bonnet, Fremont Jr. HS Pomona; Pacific, George Burnett, El Monte HS; Pioneer, H. C. Uhls, Mira Costa HS; Preparatory, Pat Dowd, Black Foxe; San Diego City, Marvin Clark, La Jolla; San Gabriel Valley, Ted Gorrell, Baldwin Park; San Luis Obispo, George Flamson, Paso Robles HS; Tri-county, Lyle Martin, Claremont HS; Alfred Snyder, Tri-State, Needles, HS; Ventura, George Harris, Hart HS; State C.I.F. Representative, Harry J. Moore, Long Beach; State C.I.F. Representative, Floyd Johnson, San Diego Hoover HS; Executive Committee members—Oliver Corbin, Covina HS; Harvey Holt, Santa Barbara HS; Winston Nelson, Pomona HS; and Wm. W. Russell, Commissioner of Athletics.

Representatives were absent from the following leagues: Arrowhead, Citrus Belt, Imperial, Orange, Parochial, Pasadena Jr. H.S., Riverside County, Southern, Sunset, and Tri-Valley.

1. The minutes of the special meeting of the Council of February 27, 1954 were approved as published in the March, 1954 Monthly Bulletin.

2. Mr. Russell reported on the action of the Executive Committee at its meeting of May 22, 1954. It was moved, seconded and carried that the actions of the Executive Committee be approved.

3. At the February 27 Council Meeting it was voted to ask the leagues to consider three alternatives on officials fees:

- Raise the maximum fee to \$15 for all contests.
- Raise the maximum fee to \$15 for night games, with day games to remain at \$12;
- Continue the present scale of \$12.

Four leagues whose representatives could not attend the May 22 meeting sent in their vote with 3 voting for (c) and one voting for (a). The roll was called to record the votes of leagues present. The complete tabulation recorded 5 leagues in favor of (a), one in favor of (b), and 13 in favor of (c). As a result the present schedule of officials fees as printed on page 28 of the Blue Book will continue in effect.

4. Applications for membership in the C.I.F., Southern Section were presented from (a) Artesia High School of the Excelsior Union High School District; (b) Temple City High

School; (c) Lutheran High School of Los Angeles; (d) La Habra High School of the Fullerton Union High School District. Representatives from Artesia High School, Temple City High School, and Lutheran High School were present at the meeting and spoke briefly. It was moved, seconded, and carried that the above four schools be accepted for membership in the C.I.F., Southern Section. Each school will be placed on a free lance basis for the 1954-55 school year.

5. Santa Ana High School offered to hold an Invitational Relay Track Meet the first part of June to include relay events recognized nationally in the National Federation Track and Field Honor Roll, but which are not a regular C.I.F., Southern Section event. It was suggested that Southern California schools and boys did not have the opportunity for recognition on a national honor roll in these particular relay events at the present time. The request for the 1954 June date was not approved.

It was the general opinion of the Council that the C.I.F. should not encourage track competition after the conclusion of the C.I.F., Southern Section Championship meet, except for participation in the State C.I.F. State Track Meet. Each athletic season should be terminated with the C.I.F. Championship playoffs in the various sports.

6. Mr. Harry J. Moore, one of the two C.I.F., Southern Section representatives to the State Federated Council of the C.I.F. announced he did not wish to be a candidate to succeed himself for the two-year term July 1954 to June 1956. It was moved, seconded and carried that Mr. Winston Nelson of Pomona High School be elected as the Southern Section representative to the State C.I.F. Council, from July 1954 to June 1956.

7. The election of the Southern Section Council officers was next item of business.

a. In accordance with the C.I.F. Constitution the Mt. Baldy league will succeed to the Presidency for the 1954-55 school year. Mr. Joseph Rindone, Jr., out going Council President turned the meeting over to the incoming president, Mr. Joseph Bonnet of Fremont Jr. High School in Pomona.

b. In similar manner the Orange league representative, Mr. Donald Jordan of Garden Grove High School, was announced as Vice-President of the Council for the 1954-55 school year.

c. It was moved, seconded, and carried that Mr. Winston Nelson of Pomona High School be re-elected as Treasurer for 1954-55 year.

d. It was moved, seconded, and carried that Mr. Wm. Russell be re-elected as Commissioner for the 1954-55 school year.

e. It was moved, seconded, and carried that Mr. Bergstrom, Mr. Holt, Mr. Johnson, and Mr. Lawson and Mr. Corbin be re-elected to the Executive Committee for the 1954-55 year.

8. The council discussed the present method of conducting our track and field championship events, including the preliminaries, semi-finals and finals. It was moved, seconded, and carried that the Commissioner send out a questionnaire to all track coaches asking their recommendation and suggestions relative to the possibility of holding a separate C.I.F., Southern Section track championship meet for the larger schools, and a separate C.I.F. championship track and field meet for the smaller schools. The questionnaire returns are to be tabulated and presented to the track committee for consideration. The present track committee is composed of Mr. Ed Laurenson of Muir High School, Mr. Harry Bigger, Fillmore High School, and Mr. Bruce Lawson of Keppel High School.

9. The C.I.F. Bluebook water polo regulations on page 38 states that all water polo schedules must be completed by start of Christmas vacation. One of the leagues has expressed a desire to conduct its water polo season to run until later in the first semester. It was moved, seconded and carried that the water polo season schedule problem be referred to the meeting of the swimming and water polo coaches on June 7, 1954, for consideration and recommendation to the Southern Section Council at the December, 1954 Council Meeting.

10. It was moved, seconded and carried that the Southern Section Council extend its appreciation to outgoing President, Joseph Rindone, Jr., of Chula Vista High School for outstanding service during his past term of office.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:30 A.M. in time for a delicious luncheon served the Council members at the Excelsior High School cafeteria. After the lunch the Council members enjoyed the 1954 C.I.F., Southern Section Championship Track and Field Meet held at Excelsior High School field.
