CHULA VISTA REPEATS AS TEAM GOLF CHAMPION

Successfully defending the championship they won in 1957, the five-man team representing Chula Vista HS came in with an aggregate score of 386 to capture the CIF, SS team golf championship, played on the Brookside Course in Pasadena, on Monday, May 26, 1958. The title was not won without a terrific struggle, as Beverly Hills posted a 387 and Muir came in with a 388 to keep the outcome in doubt until the final golfer had completed his round.

Coach Verne Ollinger's winning team was composed of Mike Rombold who shot a 73, Hugh Skinner a 75, Dave Cotton a 78, and Allan Campbell and Mike Hall who toured the course in 80. This did not compare with the fantastic 371 total turned in by the Chula Vista fivesome in 1957, but it was creditable shooting for five boys representing one high school.

One hundred seventy-five golfers participated in the days competition and low medal honors were captured by Ed Cleveland of Garden Grove HS who shot a brilliant 69 on the difficult and long course. Although an effort had been made to limit the field to outstanding teams, a number of coaches entered teams that had no right to compete in such a championship affair. Plans are now under way to set up restrictions for the 1959 tournament so that we will have a maximum of about 20 of the best teams instead of the 36 entries which teed off this year.

We would like to express our appreciation to Mr. Halverson and the Brookside Golf Club for extending our high school golfers the use of their excellent facilities. We are also grateful to Mr. Ed Laurenson, former Athletic Director at Muir HS, who served as Starter and did such an excellent job in keeping things moving.

SAN LUIS OBISPO NORTHERN GROUP CHAMPS

The San Luis Obispo Tigers kept the CIF, Northern Group of league baseball championship in the north when they took the measure of a battling, but inexperienced nine from Dominguez HS 17 to 5, in a game played Wednesday, May 28, in Compton Municipal Stadium. Blasting out 17 hits the Tigers scored 4 runs in the opening inning and were never headed. The Dominguez nine, on the other hand, suffered a bad case of the jitters in the field, committing 10 errors and giving up 11 unearned runs.

To reach the finals San Luis Obispo defeated Hart HS 8 to 4 and then nipped a good Harvard team 3 to 2 in a game played in the northern city. Dominguez, representing the Crescent League, whitewashed Artesia 5 to 0 in the opening round encounter and then traveled to Barstow where they walloped the Golden League champions 10 to 3, to qualify for the championship contest.

Dominguez HS is to be congratulated upon an outstanding season, because this was the first year in existence for this new Compton high school. All members of their team will return for another year of varsity competition, and with the experience gained this year Dominguez will be a real threat for the 1959 baseball championship.

NEEDLES HS CAPTURES SMALL SCHOOL BASEBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

The miraculous Mustangs of Needles high are the new 1958 champions of the CIF, SS small schools division. Playing for the first time under the lights of their new \$100,000 diamond, Tuesday, May 27, Coach Dean Gordon's amazing aggregation blasted Tri-Valley League champions, Villanova, by an unprecedented 14 to 3 score. The victory climaxed a fantastic season which saw the Mustangs win 22 games, losing only one contest, a 2 to 1 loss to Barstow, champions of the Golden League.

Villanova drew a Bye in the 1st round, then easily defeated Ramona, Southern League champions, 14 to 4 in a semifinal contest played in Ramona, to earn the right to participate in the championship encounter. Needles also drew a 1st round Bye and then gave an indication of what was to come when they overpowered Bishop HS 24 to 6 at Bishop. With eight of their nine starters returning, it appears that Needles HS will be a power to be reckoned with in the 1959 CIF playoffs. Scores of all games played follow:

MINUTES OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING — MAY 23, 1958

The meeting of the Executive Committee was called to order by Mr. B. L. Bergstrom, Chairman, at 7:30 P.M., May 23, 1958, at Morrow's Restaurant in El Monte. Those present included Messrs. B. L. Bergstrom, Supt. of Schools in El Monte; Keith Gunn, Principal of Victor Valley HS; Ben F. Jamison, Principal of Centennial HS; John Taylor, Principal of Nordhoff HS; Frank O. Hopkins, Principal of Brea-Olinda HS; George W. Phelps, Jr. Principal of Arroyo HS; Father Lawrence Caruso, Athletic Director of St. Francis HS; Matt Korwin, Principal of San Dieguito HS; and Kenneth Fagans, Commissioner of Athletics. Mr. Robert Schilling, Principal of the new Los Altos HS in La Puente was also in attendance.

1. It was moved, seconded and carried that the Minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of April 14, 1958, be approved as published in the April, 1958, Monthly Bulletin.

2. It was moved, seconded, and carried that the Executive Committee recommend to the SS Council that Salesian HS of Los Angeles, Indio HS, and the Verdemont Ranch School of San Bernardino County be accepted for membership as of September, 1958.

3. The 1958 football schedule of Don Bosco Tech was reviewed and it was moved, seconded, and carried that in order to qualify for the 1958 "AA" football playoffs, Don Bosco HS must win all but one of the following six games on their 1958 schedule: Bell-Jeff, Alemany, St. Paul, Chaminade, Black Foxe, and Laguna Beach.

4. The Hi-Lo League officially requested that Death Valley HS be dropped from membership in their league as of the close of the 1957-58 school year, because with only seven boys in attendance at Death Valley HS it was impossible for them to meet their league commitments. The secretary informed the group that Death Valley HS had been contacted and approved of this action. It was moved, seconded, and unanimously carried that beginning with the 1958-59 school year, Death Valley HS be removed from the Hi-Lo League and placed on free lance status.

5. Mr. A. R. Coke, District Director of the Babe Ruth League of California, requested that CIF, SS regulations pertaining to participation by high school athletes in outside baseball practice, be relaxed to permit high school boys to attend three tryouts for Babe Ruth League teams on the first three Saturdays in April. Boys participating would be limited to those youngsters who have not in previous years tried out for these teams, and the tryouts would not include any type of scrimmage or game. The Babe Ruth League would also be very willing to abide by the CIF, SS rule which does not permit practice with an outside team prior to May 1, and does not allow a boy to participate in a game

until his high school team has finished its season. It was moved, seconded, and carried that the CIF, SS should not make an exception to its present policy pertaining to the participation of high school athletes in practice, and in contests with outside teams.

6. A letter was read from the Southern California Water Polo and Swimming Officials and Coaches Association, in which they stated that their organization was now entering its third year of organized activity, that they have developed a well-planned program of instruction, testing and certification of officials for water polo, swimming and diving, and that they would be in a position beginning with the 1958-59 school year to provide an adequate list of trained men to fill the needs of our high schools in this field. Therefore, they earnestly request the consideration and assistance of the CIF, SS in establishing a policy which will make mandatory the assignment of only certified officials of the Southern California Water Polo and Swimming Officials' Association in all water polo and swimming events in the CIF, SS program. After some discussion it was moved, seconded, and carried that it be mandatory for SS schools served by the Southern California Water Polo and Swimming Officials' Association, to employ only certified officials who are members in good standing of this association for all interscholastic water polo games and swimming meets.

7. The eligibility cases involving Henry Salvatore, a student at Notre Dame HS, and Jerry Cronin, a student at Loyola HS, relative to the State CIF eight-semester rule was discussed. Because a State Rule was involved it was the consensus of opinion that the matter should be referred to the State Federated Council. It was moved, seconded, and carried that our state representatives be instructed to request that this matter be placed on the Agenda of the State Federated Council meeting scheduled for May 30, 1958, at the Statler Hotel in Los Angeles.

8. The Commissioner of Athletics reported on the progress of a plan to conduct orientation meetings in football and basketball for coaches and administrators in the metropolitan Los Angeles area. It was moved, seconded, and carried that the report be accepted, and that it be recommended to the Council that the plan be put into operation in all areas of the SS.

9. Mr. Frank Hopkins, Chairman of the Housing Committee, reported that his committee after looking over many available sites was recommending the purchase of some vacant property located on the NW corner of Carmona and Washington Blvds., in Los Angeles, as a suitable location for the new CIF, SS Office. After a discussion of the matter it was moved, seconded, and carried to endorse the recommendation of the Housing Committee, and direct Mr. Hopkins to present his report to the Council, with the recommendation of the Executive Committee that the above described property be purchased.

10. Mr. George W. Phelps, Jr. gave a progress report on a recent survey conducted by his committee relative to the responsibilities of the CIF in the administration of the interscholastic athletic program. It was moved, seconded, and carried to accept the report and to authorize Mr. Phelps to present the findings and recommendations of his committee to the Council.

11. There being no further business to come before the committee it was moved, seconded, and carried to adjourn at 10:30 P.M.

MINUTES OF CIF, SS COUNCIL MEETING — MAY 24, 1958

The regular meeting of the CIF, SS Council was called to order by President, Rev. Lawrence Caruso, in the library of Arroyo HS, at 10:00 AM, May 24, 1958. Representatives from all leagues, with the exception of the Riverside County League, were in attendance.

1. It was moved, seconded, and carried that the Minutes of the Council meeting of February 8, 1958, as published in the February, 1958, Monthly Bulletin be approved.

2. It was moved, seconded, and carried that the Minutes of the Executive Committee meetings of April 14 and May 23, 1958, be approved as read.

3. Mr. Oliver Corbin, Chairman of Awards Committee, reported that the proposal of the SS to modify the present state CIF awards rule was defeated by a 7 to 6 vote. Mr. Corbin then presented a new recommendation of his committee which would propose that each section be permitted to establish their own rule limiting awards, provided it did not violate AAU regulations. This matter was discussed, and it was moved, seconded, and carried to authorize Mr. Corbin to present this new proposal to the State Federated Council for their consideration.

4. President Caruso announced a deviation from the Agenda for the purpose of making a special presentation. Mr. B. L. Bergstrom, Chairman of the Executive Committee, informed the Council of the recent retirement of Mr. Ed J. Laurenson, former Athletic Director at Muir HS in Pasadena, after 30 years of distinguished service. During that time Mr. Laurenson had served as league representative to the CIF, SS on numerous occasions and was President of the SS Council for the 1949-50 school year.

Mr. Laurenson began his coaching career in Idaho, moved to Arizona for a year and then joined the faculty at Muir HS in 1919, where he was to remain until his retirement in June, 1957. During his long tenure at Muir HS Ed produced many championship teams and was always ready to assist the SS in staging various athletic activities. For the past five years Mr. Laurenson arranged for the use of the facilities at Brookside Golf Course for our team championship

tournament and graciously consented to serve as official Starter for this annual event. In recognition of his long and outstanding service, Mr. Bergstrom presented Mr. Laurenson with a CIF, SS Gold Life Pass. Mr. Laurenson thanked the group for this high honor and assured them that the happiest memories that he had of his teaching and coaching career were associated with CIF activities. He remarked that he was enjoying his retirement immensely, but that he was desirous of maintaining close contact with the CIF interscholastic athletic program and the men responsible for its administration.

5. Mr. Don Cruickshank, Sunset League representative, reported that his league had directed him to recommend to the Council that present rules pertaining to the CIF, SS team tennis playoffs be modified to permit the entries of 2nd place teams in the playoff. Mr. Cruickshank put this in the form of a motion, but there was no second, so motion died.

6. Mr. B. L. Bergstrom, Chairman of Re-leaguings Committee for the 1959-60 school year, reported that the group had held their first meeting and it appeared that in most areas we did not expect to encounter too many problems. He advised principals of schools in districts where problems were anticipated however, to contact at the earliest possible moment, the re-leaguings committee member in his area. The names of all members of the 1959-60 re-leaguings committee were published in the April, 1958, Monthly Bulletin.

7. The Commissioner was asked to report on the progress of a plan that had been recommended by the Executive Committee, to hold orientation meetings in football and basketball for coaches and administrators in the metropolitan Los Angeles area. Mr. Fagans reported that the meetings had been tentatively scheduled for El Monte HS on September 22, and at Compton HS for September 23, with basketball meeting to be held in the San Marino area on December 2, and in the Compton area on December 3, 1958. At the football meetings an administrator would discuss the problems of game administration, the instructional chairman of the football association would explain the new rules, and give correct interpretations of controversial play situations, while the CIF Commissioner would explain all phases of training, assigning and rating of officials. The same general plan would be followed for the basketball meetings. Arrangements have been made with the County Superintendent of Schools office to provide that all school personnel attending these meetings may secure institute credit.

It was unanimously agreed that such a plan would do much to eliminate many of the problems now existent in our interscholastic athletic program, the league representatives from our outlying areas pointed out the need for such meetings in all areas of the SS. The Commis-

sioner announced that there were funds available in the budget to assist outlying leagues in the conducting of clinics and orientation meetings and that the SS office would stand ready and willing to assist whenever requested. After a brief discussion it was moved, seconded, and carried that approval be given to the meeting setup for the metropolitan Los Angeles area, and that the Commissioner be directed to assist in conducting similar meetings when requested in the outlying areas, and to bring a full and complete report of all such meetings to the December Council meeting.

8. Mr. George W. Phelps, Jr. gave a progress report on a recent survey conducted by his committee relative to the responsibility of the CIF in the administration of the interscholastic athletic program. A total of 250 questionnaires were mailed to principals of our member schools, and to date we have received 218 returns. Although no attempt has been made at this time to compile or interpret the results, there is an indication that the great majority of principals would like the CIF to take a more active part in establishing starting practice dates in all sports, set a limit for the number of contests scheduled by member schools in all sports, and investigate the problems connected with summer league basketball. It was moved, seconded, and carried to accept the progress report and to instruct Mr. Phelps and his committee to prepare a compilation of the results to be distributed to all principals at the beginning of the next school year.

9. The Chairman of the Housing Committee, Mr. Frank O. Hopkins, was called upon to make the report for his committee. Mr. Hopkins announced that at the direction of the SS Council his committee had been working on plans to secure more adequate housing for the SS office. He then called upon the Treasurer, Mr. Winston Nelson, to advise the Council as to the financial position of the SS at this time.

Mr. Nelson reported that the SS was in sound financial condition, and that the necessary funds had been set aside to purchase a lot and erect a suitable building to house the SS offices. The outlay of money necessary for this undertaking would not necessitate a raise in dues at this time, or in the near future. Although it might seem wise to erect a building which would have income property attached, the additional expense involved and the uncertainty of renting eliminated that possibility.

Mr. Hopkins stated that his committee had investigated many possible sites, and it appeared that a lot located on the NW corner of Carmona and Washington Blvds., in Los Angeles, would best meet our needs. This particular piece of property has a frontage of 85 feet on Washington Blvd., is bounded on one side by an apartment building and in the rear by a church. An office building could be erected on this

property with plenty of space available for adequate parking. The asking price of this property is \$13,500, but the owner will accept an offer of \$12,000.

The matter was discussed at great length and it was moved, seconded, and carried that the CIF, SS should purchase the property described as Lots 1 and 2 in Block 4 of Tract No. 5281, in the city of Los Angeles as per map recorded in Book 56, page 80, of Maps in the County Recorder of Los Angeles County for \$12,000 plus necessary fees to gain title to said property. A roll call vote was called for on the motion. The motion passed with 33 votes being cast for the motion, and 3 in opposition.

10. The question was raised as to the status of football practice in the SS at the present time. Mr. George Phelps, Jr., Chairman of the football regulations committee, advised the Council that the following regulations pertaining to football practice was adopted by the Council at the February meeting:

"There shall be no football practice between December 1 of any school year and the FOLLOWING JUNE 15, except in gym suits. Football shoes may be used, but no protective equipment. Between June 15 and the authorized date for the starting of regular organized football practice in September, a member school shall not conduct any type of team instruction or practice.

The matter was discussed and it was moved, seconded, and carried to change the last sentence of the above regulation to read as follows:

"Between June 15 and the authorized date for the starting of regular organized football practice in September, a member school OR ITS REPRESENTATIVE shall not conduct any type of team instruction or practice."

It was moved, seconded, and carried that the Commissioner of Athletics shall prepare a bulletin which will include all CIF, SS rules pertaining to football and mail 5 copies to the principal of each high school conducting a football schedule, with a request that a copy be given to each member of the staff who is officially connected with the schools football program.

11. The election of SS officers was the next item of business.

(a) In accordance with the CIF, SS Constitution the Pasadena Jr. HS League will succeed to the presidency for the 1958-59 school year. Rev. Lawrence Caruso, outgoing Council President turned the meeting over to the incoming President, Mr. Vaughn Cummings, official representative of the Pasadena JHS League.

(b) In similar manner the Pioneer League representative, Mr. Ray Charlson of Culver City HS, was announced as Vice President of the Council for the 1958-59 year.

(c) It was moved, seconded, and carried to cast an unanimous ballot for the re-election

of Winston Nelson as Treasurer of the CIF, SS for the 1958-59 school year.

(d) It was moved, seconded, and carried that Mr. Winston Nelson of Ganesha HS, be re-elected for a term of two years as SS representative to the State CIF Federated Council.

(e) Nominations were opened for a representative from Los Angeles County schools to serve as a member of the Executive Committee for a 4-year term. Mr. H. C. Uhls of Aviation HS, and Mr. B. F. Jamison of Centennial HS were nominated. A ballot was cast, and Jamison was elected to a 4-year term as a member of the SS Executive Committee.

12. Mr. Roger Weeks, San Gabriel Valley League representative, presented a proposal from his league for consideration—The San Gabriel Valley League feels that in the light of the present athletic program as carried on by member schools of the CIF, SS, there is no real need for vacation tournaments or athletic contests, and requests that the CIF, SS no longer sanction such events. The reasons advanced for eliminating school vacation tournaments and athletic contests are as follows:

(a) A current investigation of athletic programs indicates that athletics may be coming too dominate a factor in the life of boys

(b) Coaches, faculty members, and boys need vacations. If vacations are good, they should be good for all

(c) Coaches feel the pressure to enter tournaments—hence give up their vacations

(d) Extra duties bring pressure for extra pay.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that this matter be referred for study to Mr. George W. Phelps, Jr.'s committee on football regulations.

13. It was moved, seconded, and unanimously carried that the SS Council express its appreciations to outgoing President, Rev. Lawrence Caruso of St. Francis HS, for outstanding service during his past term of office.

14. It was moved, seconded, and unanimously carried that a vote of appreciation and confidence be extended to Kenneth Fagans for the excellent manner in which he has conducted the business of the SS during the past year in his position as Commissioner of Athletics.

15. It was moved, seconded, and carried to thank Mr. George Phelps, Jr. and Arroyo HS for hosting this meeting of the Council.

16. The meeting was adjourned at 12:00 noon in time for a very delicious lunch served to the Council members in the Arroyo HS cafeteria. After the luncheon the Council members enjoyed the 1958 CIF, SS championship track and field meet, held on the Arroyo HS athletic facilities.

BEVERLY HILLS HOSTS CIF CHAMPIONSHIP SWIM MEET

Record breaking performances which began in the preliminaries, continued in the semi-finals and culminated in the finals highlighted the 1958 CIF, SS championship swim meet. Seventeen news marks were established during the 3-day competition, with 11 of them being set in the final nights competition which was held in the beautiful Beverly Hills pool before a capacity throng of thrilled onlookers on Friday night, May 2, 1958.

Coach Whitey Saari's varsity team from El Segundo successfully defended their CIF championship as they scored a 58 to 50 victory over Black Foxe. The issue was in doubt down to the final event of the evening—the free style relay. In this race however, El Segundo captured second place while Black Foxe finished out of the money. Host Beverly Hills thrilled a partisan crowd by walking away with the Class B championship as they amassed 51 points to runner-up Wilson 40. The Class C division provided close competition for the team championship between Newport Harbor and Whittier, with the lead seesawing back and forth all evening. After the final event however, the scoreboard showed 44½ for Newport and 43 for Whittier, to give the Tars possession of the 1st place trophy.

Individual stars of the meet were Lance Larson of El Monte, Joe Alkire of San Diego, and Denny Weldon of El Segundo. Larson was clocked in 54.6 in the 100-yd. butterfly, and 50.7 in the 100-yd. free style to establish new CIF, SS records in these events. Joe Alkire, a sophomore from San Diego HS, erased a record in the 50-yd. free style that had stood for 11 years when he negotiated the distance in 23 seconds flat. Although Weldon did not win any races he finished a close second to Larson in both the 100-yd. free style and butterfly, and then anchored the relay team to a second place finish which gave his school the team championship. Weldon is only a junior so we can look for both he and Alkire to lower our records even more next year.

Coach Rudy Kroon managed the Inglewood preliminary swim meet, with Buck Jarnagan managing the other preliminary at Montebello HS on April 25. Both meets were well organized and a number of fast times were recorded. The semi-finals and finals were held at Beverly Hills HS, under the skillful direction of John Marrow.
