URHO AND ROY SAARI FOCUS NATIONAL ATTENTION ON EL SEGUNDO HS

One of the most fabulous father and son teams to be found anywhere in American prep circles is bringing national fame to little El Segundo HS through their exploits in the aquatic sports of water polo and swimming. Urho is the father, who for the past 15 years has devoted his life to teaching the youngsters in the beach city of El Segundo how to swim, and Roy is his strapping 16 year old son, who has been breaking local and state swimming records with monotonous regularity.

Urho "Whitey" Saari is already well known and respected in international aquatic circles, mainly because of his assignment as head coach of the United States Water Polo teams in the Pan American games of 1951 and the Olympic Games of 1952. Both of these teams that represented our country in international competition were composed entirely of boys who had played for Coach Saari at El Segundo HS. It is a truly remarkable record for the boys from one small California high school (enrollment 433 students in 1951) to so dominate the sport of water polo that they were able to defeat all competition in the Olympic trials and earn the right to represent America at Helsinki.

During his 15 year tenure at El Segundo HS, Saari's teams have captured 6 CIF, SS water polo championships and 9 varsity team swimming titles. This has been accomplished against high schools having enrollments three to four times the size of El Segundo. In addition to his local coaching, Whitey has found time to serve as Chairman of the U.S. Olympic Water Polo Committee since 1958 and Chairman of the National A.A.U. Water Polo Committee since 1959.

Regardless of his father's outstanding accomplishments, it now appears that this fuzzy-cheeked high school junior is going to achieve even greater recognition through his ability to swim in record time any event from the 50 yd. free style through the grueling 4 mile distance swim. Roy's accomplishments to date are as follows:

MINUTES OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING — APRIL 19, 1961

The meeting was called to order by Mr. Oliver Corbin, Chairman, at the CIF, SS Office at 2:30 PM, Wednesday, April 19, 1961. Members present included Messrs. Oliver Corbin, Principal of Covina HS; Winston Nelson, Asst. Supt. of Schools at Pomona; Frank O. Hopkins, Principal of Brea-Olinda HS; John R. Taylor, Principal of Nordhoff HS; Robert J. Schilling, Asst. Supt. of Schools at La Puente; Robert D. Ashton, Asst. Supt. of Schools of the Excelsior HS District; John Landrum, Principal of San Marino HS; Harold Wetzler, Vice Principal of Hawthorne HS; Marion C. Hays, Vice Principal of Harvard School; Charles Ronin, Vice Principal of Redlands HS; and Ken Fagans, Commissioner of Athletics.

Mr. Guy Wrinkle, Supervisor of Athletics for the Los Angeles City Schools; Mr. Bill Ruess, Principal of Bell HS; and Mr. Carroll Lockridge, Principal of Westchester HS, all members of the Policy Determining Committee of the Los Angeles Section of the CIF, were also in attendance as guests.

1. It was moved, seconded and carried that the Minutes of the January 21 meeting of the Executive Committee be approved as published in the February, 1961, Monthly Bulletin.

2. It was moved, seconded and carried that the Executive Committee recommend to the Council that the Alondra Jr. HS of Paramount and the new Western HS of Las Vegas, be accepted as associate members of the CIF, SS; and that Savanna HS of Anaheim be accepted as a regular member of the CIF, SS effective with the opening of the 1961-62 school year.

3. The 1961 football schedule of Antelope Valley HS was reviewed and it was moved, seconded and carried that in order to qualify for the 1961 CIF, SS "AAAA" football playoffs, Antelope Valley HS may not lose more than two of the following seven games on its schedule: Baldwin Park HS, Lakewood HS, El Rancho HS, Alhambra HS, Montebello HS, Santa Monica HS, and Cathedral HS.

4. It was moved, seconded and carried that the 1961 Baseball Playoff and Financial Regulations be adopted as presented by the Commissioner and that a copy of these regulations be sent in advance of the playoffs to the principals of all schools qualifying for the 1961 Baseball Playoffs. The regulations are the same as they were for the 1960 Baseball Playoffs.

5. Present regulations provide that a member school may not schedule an inter-school basketball game prior to December 1 of any school year. The Commissioner called attention to the fact that in 1962, December 1 will fall on a Saturday and a number of leagues requested that they be permitted to play their first game on Friday, November 30, 1962.

After some discussion it was moved, seconded and unanimously carried that for the 1962 season only, member schools be permitted to schedule a basketball game on Friday, November 30, 1962. The December 1 rule will prevail in all other years.

6. At various times the CIF, SS Office has need for the use of a movie projector and screen in order to review possible training films, meet films for the purpose of evaluating the correct placement of men in the running events and game films for the purpose of evaluating the officiating. At the present time it is necessary for the Commissioner to take such films to a nearby high school for the purpose of reviewing them. It was moved, seconded and carried to authorize the Commissioner to purchase a 16 mm. sound movie projector and screen during the current budget year.

7. A discussion was held concerning the possible restriction on the use of CIF, SS Courtesy Cards for certain championship activities where there are limited seating facilities. President Corbin instructed Commissioner Fagans to make

suggested changes in the wording on our present Courtesy Cards which would express the thinking of the Executive Committee in this matter and present it for consideration at the next Executive Committee meeting.

8. A joint meeting of representative gymnastics coaches from the Southern and LA City Sections of the CIF was recently held for the purpose of formulating joint gymnastics rules to better serve the needs of both sections. In addition to proposing uniform gymnastics rules, the committee also recommended that a LA City vs Southern Section Gymnastics Championship Meet be held on May 25, 1962. It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the Gymnastics Coaches Meeting and to recommend to the Council the approval of the proposed championship gymnastics meet to be held between LA City and Southern Sections on May 25, 1962.

9. Last fall the Executive Committee ruled that boys attending Camp Owens were eligible to participate on Kern Valley High School athletic teams if they met certain conditions. At the time this ruling was made, there was no one in attendance to present the negative side of the matter. Because of this fact, Mr. A. G. Ogborn, Desert-Inyo League representative, requested that the matter be placed on the agenda of this meeting for review. Because neither Mr. Ogborn nor a representative of the Kern Valley High School District were present, it was impossible to properly review the situation and consequently the original ruling made by the Executive Committee at their fall meeting will stand.

10. The State CIF Council at their meeting held in San Diego on March 27 considered a request from the North Coast Section of the CIF to discontinue the present State Track Meet and replace it with two meets—one for Northern California and one for Southern California. After some discussion this matter was referred back to the sections and will be placed on the agenda of the June Federated Council Meeting.

The SS Executive Committee discussed this matter and by a vote of 9-1 recommended to the Council of the CIF, SS that the present State Track Meet be discontinued and replaced by two meets—one for Northern California and one for Southern California. The following reasons were given for this recommended change:

a. The State Meet, being held in different areas of the state, requires our participants to travel great distances at considerable expense in order to participate.

b. We do not permit state competition in any other sport and to be consistent we should not permit it in track.

c. The establishment of an annual track meet in Southern California for Southern California sections could be held each year in our own area and could develop into an outstanding meet.

11. At the present time CIF, SS rules permit competition in athletic activities only with member schools of the CIF, SS in good standing, except when permission is granted by the Commissioner because of scheduling difficulties. Because a number of schools requested that this rule be changed to permit competition with outside teams, the matter was discussed by the Executive Committee.

After considerable discussion, it was the unanimous opinion of the Executive Committee that this rule should not be changed for the following reasons:

a. There is adequate competition on the high school level for the great majority of our member schools.

b. The majority of junior colleges and colleges in Southern California are interested in competition with high schools mainly for the purpose of getting our teams on their campus for purpose of proselyting.

c. There are many boys club teams and similarly organized groups who have as members of their teams boys who are ineligible for high school competition. When our schools schedule teams representing such organizations, it means that our teams are competing against boys who are ineligible for regular high school athletic competition. This creates a very bad situation.

Our member schools are prohibited from scrimmaging, as well as playing, teams representing non-member schools.

12. At the present time the Southern Section has regulations governing the number of contests that may be played and the opening date for after-school practice in football, basketball, baseball, and track. There is a great need for providing similar regulations for the other seven sports conducted in the CIF, SS. Commissioner Fagans reported that the results of a survey recently taken regarding this matter are available and the committee should be reactivated so that recommendations may be prepared for presentation to the Council at their meeting on May 20. President Corbin directed the Commissioner to call a meeting of the Athletic Regulations Committee for the purpose of preparing recommendations to be submitted directly to the league representatives so they may contact their respective leagues relative to this matter.

13. Present inadequacies of our current Blue Book were discussed and it was pointed out that there is a great need for a general revision and better indexing of the material now included. It would also be of great value to include interpretations that have been made by the Executive Committee concerning present rules and regulations. President Corbin directed the Commissioner's office to present at the next meeting of the Executive Committee some proposals for the revision of our present Blue Book which would include eligibility rulings, pictures and additional

information. It was suggested that the proposed new book should be approximately 5x8 or 6x9 in size.

14. Mr. Allan Burnside, Foothill League representative, appeared before the committee to present an eligibility case involving a golfer from Burbank High School, who during the fall semester passed in four subjects but was ruled ineligible for athletic competition this semester because one of the four subjects was a repeat course, which the boy took for the purpose of raising his grade. The counselor and the administration at Burbank HS were unaware of this situation and it was only after checking the records a short time ago that it was discovered that the boy had only passed in 15 units of new work last semester, thereby making him ineligible. The boy's parents were also present for the purpose of calling attention to the ambiguity of the present rule governing this matter and recommended that the rule be clarified and called to the attention of administrators in all of our member schools to prevent the recurrence of a similar situation.

Mr. Corbin, speaking for the Executive Committee, assured both Mr. Burnside and the parents that his committee was only authorized to interpret the rules and could not set them aside. Therefore, the boy would be ineligible for interscholastic athletics during the current semester. The committee did feel, however, that the rule was not clear, and in line with the revising of our current Blue Book an effort should be made to clarify and explain all of the rules and regulations governing the eligibility of boys for interscholastic athletics.

15. The Commissioner reported that the Track Committee, composed of twelve outstanding track coaches from the Southern Section, had met in the CIF, SS Office for the purpose of establishing dates four years in advance for our major invitational track meets and to review present track policies.

The Track Coaches Committee made the following recommendations:

a. The 440-yd. dash in all SS championship meets should be run in lanes around one turn. This would enable our runners to have an opportunity to better the present National Interscholastic Record under the same conditions as boys from other states. It has also been the policy in the majority of California State Track Meets to run the 440 around one turn, and this would enable our boys to better prepare themselves for this race.

b. The present regulation limiting a boy to only four sanctioned invitational track meets works a hardship on school where individual performers must compete in two or three invitational meets as members of a relay team. To remedy this situation, the present rule should be changed to permit boys to attend four invitation-

al meets as individual performers but allow them to enter two additional invitational meets as a member of a relay team.

In line with the recommendations of the Track Committee, it was moved, seconded and carried that for this year only the Varsity 440-yd. dash be run in lanes around one turn for the 1961 preliminaries, quarter-finals and championship meets. The Commissioner was directed to report back to the Executive Committee the results of this year's trial basis of conducting the 440-yd. dash in lanes around one turn.

The committee took no action on the recommendation pertaining to the amending of our present regulation relative to the number of invitational meets a high school boy may attend, as this matter will be discussed and decided by the Council at their meeting on May 20.

16. Mr. Lockridge, Ruess, and Wrinkle of the Los Angeles City Section of the CIF indicated that they were very interested in establishing a closer working relationship between the sections in the matter of rules and policy. They were particularly concerned that the Southern and L.A. City Sections should maintain the present officials fee schedule and that one section should not deviate from this schedule without conferring with representatives from the other section. Members of the SS Executive Committee were wholeheartedly in agreement with this proposal from the L.A. Section, and President Corbin stated that he would appoint a committee for the purpose of meeting at certain designated times during the school year with representatives from the L.A. City Section for the purpose of better correlating our rules and policies.

There being no further business to come before the committee, the meeting was adjourned at 5:45 PM.

THREE NATIONAL RECORDS LOWERED IN CIF, SS CHAMPIONSHIP SWIM MEET

In a meet featured by many record-breaking performances, California High School scored 37 points to capture the varsity team title in the CIF, SS Championship Swimming Meet held at the Santa Ana College pool on Saturday, May 6, 1961. The host school, Garden Grove, took runner-up honors with 33 points, while the defending champions, Beverly Hills, were able to tally only one point in this tough competition.

The meet produced 16 new CIF, SS records, which included three new national interscholastic standards. Roy Saari, of El Segundo High School, started the record-breaking performances by negotiating the 400 yd. free style in the amazing time of 3:59.5. He then pushed Nick Kirby, of Rosemead HS, in the 200 yd. free style to such an extent that both boys finished

under the existing national record, although Kirby finished in first place with a remarkable time of 1:47.9. It is a sad situation when a boy can break the national record as Saari did and yet only finish second in a Southern Section meet.

Nick Kirby came back later in the program to record a 2:04.6 to lower the present national interscholastic record in the 200 yd. medley. The amazing thing is that Saari is a junior and Kirby is only a sophomore. This means that these two outstanding prep swimmers will be back again next year, and you can look for them to lower the phenomenal marks they established this year.

In the Class B division, Pete Cutino and his young Oxnard team amassed 47 points to easily capture team honors. Second place went to Whittier HS with 32 points, while Downey finished a strong third by scoring 30 points. Nick Shoenman of Glendale continued his record-breaking performances of the past two years by establishing two new CIF, SS records in this meet. Schoenman lowered the 50 yd. free style to 22.6 and the 100 yd. free style record to 50.4.

Santa Monica showed the way in the Class C competition by accumulating 36 points to runner-up Lynwood's 27. Anaheim and Millikan each scored 21 points to tie for third place honors. Although Santa Monica was able to win only one event, the 200 yd. free style relay, in which they set a SS record, they picked up many place points to assure them of victory. Other Class C records were established by Howard Boren of Black Foxe, who swam the 50 yd. breast stroke in 32.4, and Paul Jeffers of Anaheim, who lowered the 200 yd. free style and 100 yd. individual medley records by recording 2:00.1 and 1:02.1 times, respectively.

greatly in the fine times that were recorded but the facility was most inadequate as far as spectators were concerned. Only about 200 persons were able to jam their way into the limited seating area and many hundreds of interested followers had to be turned away. It is indeed unfortunate that we do not have available in Southern California a facility that could be utilized which would enable all interested persons to have the opportunity to witness this meet which has gained the reputation of being one of the outstanding prep swimming meets held anywhere in the United States.

Preliminary meets were held at Lakewood and El Segundo High Schools, with Wellington Rogers and "Whitey" Saari serving as meet managers. Both of these meets were held in the evening and were very well attended.

A free lance meet, for the purpose of qualifying boys into one of the two preliminaries, was held at Upland High School under the direction of Coach Jim Stewart. Although Upland did not have entries in the free lance meet, they were most considerate in making available their fine facilities for this most necessary meet. We would like to extend our thanks and appreciation on behalf of the competing schools to Athletic Director Gerry Bell and swimming coach Jim Stewart for offering their facilities and conducting the free lance meet.

Coach Rick Rowland of Garden Grove served as manager of the championship meet, and he was ably assisted by other swimming coaches from the Sunset League. This is the first time this important meet has been held in Orange County, and we are confident that it did much to stimulate interest in swimming in that area.
