Champion Baldwin Park Favored in Gymnastics Finals May 15

Defending champion Baldwin Park, the "Yankees" of CIF, SS, gymnastics, shoots for its fourth straight Southern Section title when the Braves host the finals on Friday night, May 15. First event starts at 7:30 p.m.

Coach John Draghi's acrobats have won 64 straight dual meets dating back to 1959. The Braves haven't been defeated in Montview League competition since 1957.

The top three qualifiers in each event from each of four preliminary meets qualify into the finals. Prelims were held on May 8 at El Rancho, California, Millikan, and Pasadena.

Draghi says most of the competition for the team title in the championships will probably come from El Rancho, Pasadena and Montebello.

In the CIF, SS, finals last year, Baldwin Park representatives won four of the eight events and more than doubled the score of second-place El Rancho, in fact, scored more points than the second, third, and fourth-place teams together. The Braves tallied 44 to 19½ for El Rancho, 12 for Lakewood, and 9½ for fourth-place Anaheim.

Baldwin Park's defending titleholder in the horizontal bar, Larry Zamora, and Walt Hilleger, who won the parallel bars, both return for this year's CIF, SS, competition. Draghi is also high on Richard Elkin, who last year placed third in tumbling, fourth in long horse, and fifth in free exercise. Elkin, this year, won all three events in the San Gabriel Invitational, and Draghi says he could be a threat to do the same in the finals.

Another contender to watch is Richard Pascale of Montebello, who just returned from New York where he competed in the National AAU Meet last weekend. Pascale won the free exercise event in the CIF, SS, Meet last year and will be in the same event this year.

He was exempt from qualifying in a preliminary meet due to the conflicting dates with the national meet.

Fullerton, Glendora, Newport Win Team Honors in CIF, SS, Swimming Championship

Six new records were established and one of Roy Saari's "untouchable times" was equalled by Bill Brown of Fullerton to highlight the CIF, SS, Swimming and Diving Championships at Beverly Hills High School's Swim-Gym on Friday night, May 1.

A standing-room-only crowd of more than 1,500 watched the exciting championship meet in person, and thousands more witnessed the KHJ-TV video tape version on Saturday afternoon.

Defending champion, Fullerton, swept to an unexpectedly easy team victory in the varsity meet, while Glendora was even more powerful in claiming the Class B title. Newport, aided by two record-breaking performances, narrowly copped the Class C crown in a nip-and-tuck battle with Fullerton, the Sailors winning, 38-36.

Brown splashed his way into the record book with a nifty 48.7 clocking in the varsity 100-yard freestyle event, with the now co-record holder Roy Saari watching from poolside.

Fullerton also captured the 200-yard medley relay and the 200-yard freestyle relay as well as copping a third in the 100-yard freestyle by Torreey Webb. Members of the winning 200 medley team were Randy Hawkins, Webb, Don Jobe and Brown, with Bob Miller joining Jobe, Webb and Brown on the 200 freestyle team.

In the B division, Glendora's crack 200 freestyle relay team broke the CIF, SS, record for the third time in three weeks, when it was clocked in 1:44.8. Tim Riley, Chuck Worden, John Lambert and Randy Greenfield formed the record-shattering quartet.

Chris Sawyer of Chaffey, who set a Class B CIF, SS, standard in the prelims at Santa Monica, lowered his mark in the finals with a time of 1:52.7. His 1:53.3 time was set in the prelims.

The other B record was also established in the prelims and lowered in the finals. Roger Lyon of Harvard swam the 100-yard backstroke in 58.2 in the finals after navigating the distance in 59.5 in the prelims.

COMMISSIONER'S CORNER

In many issues of the Monthly Bulletin we have tried to present an expanded picture of some of the rules which appear in the Blue Book, but are often misunderstood by administrators or member schools.

This month we will deal with the court order and how it affects the eligibility of a boy competing in interscholastic athletics.

Two variations, which are most commonly brought to the attention of our office, pertain to the court order as issued by a judge placing a boy in a certain school for purposes of rehabilitation or correction and the court order as it is issued in cases of adoption.

Rules of residence will always be waived for eligibility when a boy is transferred from one school to another as a result of a court order. This is most common when the boy is remanded to the custody of a detention school or camp where boys are aided in their adjustment to society. Boys Republic at Chino and Twin Pines Ranch, which is maintained by the County of Riverside, are two Southern Section schools of this nature.

Boys transferred into these institutions by court order are eligible to compete in interscholastic athletics through the automatic waiver of our residence rules, provided they meet (Continued on next page)

CALIFORNIA PENALTIES FOR RULES VIOLATIONS REALLY NOT SO TOUGH AFTER ALL, SURVEY SHOWS

When the Executive Committee of the CIF, SS, disqualified Long Beach Poly from the football playoffs last December, it caused quite a stir in the beach city.

But, of the many letters received by the CIF, SS, indicating displeasure at the decision, twice as many calls and letters were received indicating the overwhelming feeling, outside the city of Long Beach, was that the action taken was not only justified, but necessary. Administrators throughout the Southland commended the decision as the "only thing that could be done."

The disqualification was not the first time such a penalty has been ordered by the Executive Committee. Most recent cases have come up not only in football but in track, basketball, golf, cross country and other sports, too.

But, the fact is, athletic associations of other states are really much stricter than we are here in California, according to Commissioner of Athletics Kenneth Fagans. "I wish more people in our schools would hear of some of the penalties issued by other states, as compared to ours," the Commissioner recently told an interviewer.

Research into some penalties in other states bears out the Commissioner's statement and indicates that California is by no means doing the unusual in disqualifying a team from playoff competition.

Muncie Central High School, the only school to win five Indiana State prep basketball titles, watched the finals this year from the sidelines as a result of a one-year suspension. Not only did the Indiana suspension prohibit the basketball team from competing in the playoffs, but eliminated the school from all sports competition for one year.

The penalty, set down by the Indiana High School Athletic Assn., came about as a result of Muncie's part in a series of incidents during a holiday basketball tournament in December.

In two successive tournament games, including the championship game, Muncie players became involved in unnecessarily rough tactics, topped off when a Muncie player, from an out of bounds position, threw the ball directly into the face of an inbounds opponent.

This was followed by incidents after the game in the parking lot of the arena, during which a cheerleader from the opponent's school was injured.

Other Indiana HSAA actions have also been of the strict variety. Glenn (Ind.) High was barred from competition in 1951 for use of an over-aged player on a basketball team that had won 30 straight.

Jeffersonville (Ind.) High was suspended for a complete basketball season in 1949 for illegal recruiting of two players from a nearby school.

The Arizona Executive Board received a communication from the principal of Alhambra (Ariz.) High School stating that on January 24, 1964, during a junior varsity game, an altercation occurred between a player and an official. The principal reported that the student was immediately suspended from further participation in interscholastic competition for the year. He was also suspended from school for two weeks.

However, in the minutes of the Board's meeting, held on February 26, the following paragraph appears: "The Executive Board wishes to commend the principal for the prompt action taken. However, in view of action taken in the past against schools whenever similar incidents have occurred, it had no alternative but to rule that Alhambra (Ariz.) High School be placed on probation for a period of one year from the date of the game . . ."

Closer to home, the Policy Determining Committee of the Los Angeles City Section of the CIF, slapped Fremont and Washington High Schools with disbarment from any playoffs for a year following student disturbances following a football game in 1954.

The PDC not only refused to allow either football team to enter post-season competition, but ruled that no representative of either school could participate in playoff events, whether it be a team sport or individual sport.

"While the CIF, SS, is not intended to 'police' each school," said the Commissioner, "we are always on the lookout for violations. It could be ideal if the individual schools and leagues could do more of the policing and take subsequent action."

Two cases in recent years where schools and school boards did step in took

Ogborn, Cummings, Martin Awarded Life Passes in Surprise Ceremonies at Council Meeting

Three long-time friends of high school athletics had the surprise of their lives last weekend when they were recipients of the coveted CIF, SS, gold lifetime passes to all Southern Section activities.

Honored by fellow administrators for their many years of service to the high school athletic picture were A. G. (Jerry) Ogborn of Bishop; Vaughn Cummings of Pasadena and Lyle C. Martin of Claremont.

Ogborn and Martin are about to enter the ranks of the retired from their respective duties as Superintendent of the Bishop Union High School District and Principal of Claremont High School. Cummings retired last year as Supervisor of Physical Education for the Pasadena City Schools.

The presentations were made last Saturday, May 9, at the CIF, SS, Council meeting at Harvard School in North Hollywood.

Dr. Nelson Price, President of the Council, made the presentation to Martin; Dick Cordano, President of the Foothill League, surprised Cummings; and Clair Franklin, Desert-Inyo League representative honored Ogborn with the award.

Life passes have been presented by the CIF, SS, since 1955 and in that time just 25 men have been so honored.

To be eligible for consideration for a gold life pass, the honoree must have served as a member of the CIF, SS, Council or Executive Committee; or have been an administrator or coach who over the years has made a significant contribution to interscholastic athletics; or have had long and outstanding record of service to interscholastic athletics in his local community.

Life pass recipients must be nominated by a member of the Council or Executive Committee and be selected by a committee made up of the Council President, Commissioner of Athletics, two members of the Council and one member of the Executive Committee appointed by the Council President.

Here are brief biographical sketches of the three 1964 honorees:

VAUGHN CUMMINGS

Vaughn Cummings started his teaching career in Pasadena as a demonstration physical education teacher in 1926. A year later he was made Chairman of the Physical Education Department of Wilson Junior High where he also coached football and track. His most outstanding track student at Wilson JH was Payton Jordan, now the internationally-known track coach at Stanford.

Cummings took the assignment of Supervisor of Physical Education for the Pasadena City Schools in 1942 and while attached to the central office, couldn't resist the lure of teaching young boys his favorite sport - baseball. He assumed the post of Assistant Director of Recreation for the City of Pasadena and was instrumental in organizing the old "Owl League" in which practically every major league baseball player from Pasadena played at one time. Such stars as Jackie Robinson, Irv Noren and Bobby Lillis were encouraged and instructed in the "Owl League" by Cummings.

Vaughn was a member of the CIF, SS, Council for 18 years, was a member of the Executive Committee, was Chairman of the Council for a year, and served on many crucial committees, including the Junior High football committee, outside baseball competition committee, and was instrumental in negotiating several releaguing problems.

In his presentation, Cordano cited Cummings as having helped to bring "the physical education program to the high place of esteem it now enjoys in the City of Pasadena with particular emphasis on the sports program. Above all, he has the wonderful faculty of getting the best from young athletes and instilling in them the wonderful confidence that only sports can contribute," Cordano concluded.

A. G. (JERRY) OGBORN

"The biggest responsibility of any community is to the education of its young people," is a favorite phrase of A. G. Ogborn, who on July 1 retires after spending 42 years of his life in the field of education.

Jerry Ogborn received his A. B. degree at the University of Redlands before obtaining his Masters Degree from the University of Southern California.

He began his career in education as a coach at Burbank High School and after spending 11 years on the athletic field moved into administration work in Burbank in 1934. Between 1941 and 1955, Ogborn served in the role of Principal in Burbank's elementary school system, junior high school and high school before accept-

other eligibility requirements of the CIF. SS.

When he has completed his term in the detention school, rules of residence are waived and he becomes eligible in any school in which the court places him.

The second area of misunderstanding, regarding court orders, comes when a coach, friend or relative believes he may adopt a boy in order to make him eligible at a particular school. For example, a boy leaves his parents' home and goes to reside in another school district with a grandmother. When he enrolls in the new school he learns that he is residentially ineligible because his parents have not changed their official residence. The grandmother then starts court proceedings which will lead to adoption simply because she wants to make him eligible for athletics.

Under the above circumstances the boy would not be eligible, because the court order making the grandmother the legal guardian, did not cause the boy to transfer to the new school. The guardianship was obtained only for the purpose of making the boy eligible for interscholastic athletics.

On the other hand, if the boy's parents were unable to care for him, and through a court order the boy was placed in custody of relatives in another school district, he would immediately become eligible at the new school

Many of our schools mistakenly honor notarized statements which indicate the parents are turning over the custody of the youngster to another individual. Notarized statements simply verify the parents' signatures and cannot be construed as a court order.

It should be clearly understood that adoption procedures must initiate the transfer and that both are preceded by a court order.

place in Orange and La Puente. Orange track stars had been permitted to enter an excess number of invitational meets, but instead of the problem coming before the CIF, SS, Executive Committee, the school took the necessary action when it disbanded the A, B and C track teams for the remainder of the season and relieved the coach of his track assignment.

La Puente's and Los Altos' cross country teams worked out on a Sunday, prior to the CIF, SS, championship finals, a few years back. The school district discovered the violation and the teams were withdrawn from the meet.

In May of 1962, San Marcos of Santa Barbara and Long Beach Poly had apparently finished one-two in the team golf championships at La Cumbre Country Club in Santa Barbara. It was not until the final results were in that it was discovered that both teams had violated a Southern Section rule by practicing on the Sunday before the tournament on the La Cumbre course. Both teams were disqualified and California High of Whittier, which had apparently finished third, was declared the champion.

It was early in the football season of 1960 when it was discovered that San Marcos High had scrimmaged with a junior college football team, which is not in accord with CIF, SS, rules.

The Executive Committee ruled that San Marcos could compete during the regular season, but would not be eligible for post-season playoff competition. As it turned out, San Marcos won the Frontier League title and appealed to the CIF, SS, Executive Committee. The appeal was denied and San Marcos was not permitted into the playoffs.

Also in 1962, two baseball teams — Holtville and Upland — were ordered to forfeit playoff games when it was discovered that both had held batting practice prior to the game, which is not in accordance with CIF, Blue Book regulations.

Commissioner Fagans, in discussing punitive action in the various sports, noted that it is the Southern Section's wish that "the individual schools and leagues will take necessary action when rule infractions are detected. When they don't, the CIF must step in and take the action.

"I hope, too, that more and more administrators in the Southern Section will become aware of the problems we face in 'policing' and realize the fact that when violators are caught a penalty that means something, such as suspensions, is entirely in order," concluded the Commissioner.

Lawyer, Sharman, Herrera Named Cage "Players-of-Year"

David Lawyer, Jerry Sharman and Andy Herrera each were building additions to their trophy cases with the announcement that they had been selected CIF, SS, "Players of the Year" by the Helms Athletic Foundation's board of basketball writers.

Lawyer, who attends Oxnard High and represents the "AAA" schools' "Player of the Year," was named "Player of the Tournament" at the CIF, SS, championships in Long Beach.

Jerry Sharman, who will probably all his life be referred to as "Bill's son" even though his accomplishments merit individual recognition, scored 750 points on the season in leading Charter Oak into the "AA" play-offs and the quarter-finals before being stopped by Chino.

Herrera scored a unique "double" inasmuch as he was the 1963 football "Player of the Year" after leading Santa Clara to the Small Schools football championship. Now, he has "quarterbacked" the basketball team to its fifth "A" title in six years. Andy scored 113 points in four play-off games, including 21 in the first half of the championship game against Alta Loma.

MINUTES OF CIF, EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING — APRIL 18, 1964

The meeting of the CIF, SS, Executive Committee was called to order by Chairman Keith Gunn at 9:30 a.m. on Saturday, April 18, in the conference room of the Green Tree Inn in Victorville. All members of the Executive Committee were in attendance.

ance.

1. MINUTES APPROVED — It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of March 7, 1964, as published in the April, 1964, Monthly Bulletin.

2. NEW SCHOOL ADMITTED TO MEMBERSHIP—It was moved, seconded and carried to recommend to the Council that the new Lakeside High School of Elsinore be admitted to regular membership in the CIF, SS, effective in September, 1964.

3. APPROVAL OF BASEBALL PLAY-OFF REQUIREMENTS FOR BOSCO TECH—After a review of the baseball schedule of Don Bosco Tech High School, it was moved, seconded and carried that in order to qualify for the "AA" baseball playoffs, Bosco Tech must win eight of the following ten games: March 20, St. Paul; March 31, St. John Bosco; April 3, Salesian; April 10, Mater Dei; April 17, Cantwell; April 25, Chaminade; May 1, Servite; May 2, Lasuen; May 7, Brown Military; May 8, Salesian.

4. APPROVAL OF 1964 BASE-BALL PLAY-OFF REGULATIONS—The 1964 CIF, SS, baseball play-off and financial regulations were discussed by the committee. It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the same regulations as were in effect during the 1963 baseball play-offs.

5. RELEAGUING-

a. It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the report submitted by the Catholic Athletic Association regarding releaguing of the parochial leagues, effective September, 1965.

The proposed releaguing would place eight schools in the Santa Fe League, seven in the Olympic League and six in the Angelus and Camino Real Leagues.

b. It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the formation of the new Mt. Baldy Junior High School League, effective September, 1964. The league will be composed of junior high schools in Pomona and Fontana.

6. EVENT STARTING TIME RULE — It was moved, seconded and carried to waive the rule prohibiting sanctioned tournaments from starting

earlier than 3:00 p.m., to permit the 1964 Trona HS Basketball Tournament to begin at 1:00 p.m. Permission was granted in this case because of the great travel distance encountered by schools located in the resert area.

7. REPORT OF BASKETBALL FEES COMMITTEE—The Commissioner reported that the committee appointed to study the request for a raise in fees by the Basketball Officials Association had met on several occasions and will recommend to the Council that a raise be granted.

The raise will basically affect the schools in the metropolitan Los Angeles area only and will bring with it steps to improve and develop the over-all officiating in Southern California. The committee is recommending that whenever possible two sets of officials be assigned to work basketball doubleheaders. Officials would be classified as either certified or probationary, with certified men working the varsity game at night at \$15.00 and the probationary officials working the JV or "B" game at the rate of \$6.00.

The certified official would be required to attend at least one quarter of the preliminary game for the purpose of observing the new man's work. He would then offer suggestions to the new man for improving his efficiency and would complete an evaluation report, to be submitted to the commissioner. This procedure would assure a training program for new men and would retain many experienced officials who are now quitting basketball officiating because they do not care to work doubleheaders. The committee is also recommending a uniform set of maximum fees for officiating tournament contests.

8. REPORT OF "OFF-SEASON PRACTICE" COMMITTEE — After four meetings the committee agreed upon final recommendations concerning the problem. These boil down to four basic issues, which will be presented to the Council for consideration at the May 9th meeting.

The four recommendations are as follows: (1) establish a closing date for all sports, (2) leave the matter of athletic team practice in physical education classes up to the local league or school, (3) prohibit boys with further high school basketball eligibility from participating in spring basketball leagues prior to the close of the school year, and (4) place no control by the CIF, SS, on summer

vacation athletic activities except to retain the regulations governing the sport of football. An additional recommendation was to rescind the rule now in force which prohibits a basketball coach from directing his team from the bench during a summer league contest.

9. CLASSIFICATION TEAMS—It was moved, seconded and carried to recommend to the Council that Article XXVII of the By-Laws be amended to provide that no high school team of a designated classification can compete against a team of a different classification. It will also restrict the competition of junior high school teams to other junior high school teams and freshman teams from four year high schools.

10. TRACK MEETS HALTED BE-CAUSE OF RAIN — It was moved, seconded and carried to recommend to the Council that Article XXXVII be amended to provide a procedure for handling track meets which are called because of inclement weather.

11. CIF, SS, RULE VIOLATION
—The Executive Committee reviewed
evidence of rules violation of Article
XXXII, Section 21, pertaining to
viewing of game films by coaches from
Long Beach Poly and Westminster
High Schools.

The violation occured on November 17, prior to previously reported violations of the same rule by Long Beach Poly and Centennial football

Consistent with previous action taken by the Executive Committee against Long Beach Poly and Centenniel High Schools, Westminster High School was placed on probation for a period of one year. Inasmuch as the Boards of Education and administration in the two school districts had taken appropriate disciplinary action with regard to coaching personnel, no further action was taken by the Executive Committee.

- 12. TRACK STARTERS ASSOCIATION REQUESTS FEE INCREASE—A communication was read from the Track Officials Association requesting the CIF, SS, to give consideration to increasing the fee paid to track starters. Because this matter would have to be referred to the leagues, it was moved, seconded and carried to table this request until the beginning of the 1964-65 school year.
- 13. FOOTBALL PLAY-OFF RE-QUIREMENTS FOR GLENDALE HOOVER HS—Glendale Hoover HS will not be a member of the Foothill League for football during the 1964 season but will operate on a free lance

basis. Because of this, they are requesting that their 1964 football schedule be evaluated for possible entrance into the CIF, SS play-offs. It was moved, seconded and carried that Glendale Hoover HS, in order to qualify for the 1964 play-offs, must win all four of its games against Foothill League schools and in addition must win three out of the five remaining games on its schedule.

14. ELIGIBILITY RULING — The Commissioner requested a ruling as to the eligibility of two boys who anticipate transferring to a CIF, SS, school next September. The rule involved was the eight semester rule, and after a review of each case, it was ruled that both these boys would be ineligible for interscholastic athletic competition during their senior years because they would be entering their ninth semester in high school.

15. PLAY-OFF GROUPINGS — It was moved, seconded and carried to adopt the following play-off groupings in basketball and baseball for the 1964-65 school year:

"AAA" Division — Bay, Catholic, Channel, Citrus Belt, Coast, Crestview, Foothill, Freeway, Montview, Moore, Pacific, San Gabriel Valley, Sierra, Sky, Suburban, Sunset.

"AA" Division — Angelus, Camino Real, Desert Valley, Frontier, Golden, Imperial Valley, Inland, Irvine, Ivy, Orange, Pioneer, Rio Hondo, San Luis Obispo, Santa Fe, Tri-County.

"A" Division — Academy, Arrowhead, Condor, De Anza, *Desert-Inyo, Hi-Lo, Mt. Desert, Olympic, Prep, San Luis Obispo (minor), *Tri-Valley.

*In the event Santa Clara and Bishop win their respective leagues, the right is reserved to place one or both of these teams in the "AA" playoffs if their season record justifies.

16. REPORT OF VIOLATIONS— The Commissioner reported the following violations of CIF, SS, regulations:

A. Because of unprofessional and unsportsmanlike actions on the part of Coach Ken Wells of Edgewood HS, it was necessary for the umpire in charge to remove Coach Wells from a baseball game involving Arroyo and Edgewood on April 7, 1964, and forfeit the contest to Arroyo HS. The Commissioner was directed to send a full report of the incident to the Superintendent of the West Covina School District.

B. A report was read concerning the unsportsmanlike conduct of Coach Glenn Thompson in a baseball game involving Charter Oak and Covina High Schools played on March 28, 1964. A communication was then read from the principal of Charter Oak HS which indicated that Mr. Thompson had been censured, with this action being placed on his personnel record, and that he has been placed on probation for a period of one year. Because of the action taken by the principal, the Executive Committee felt that no additional action was necessary.

C. Ganesha HS reported that their track team held a time trial with a neighboring school early in the season, and since the publication of the March Bulletin, they learned time trials or any kind of competition with another school counted as one of their permitted number of meets. A review of their schedule indicated that if the time trial was counted, Ganesha would have exhausted their permitted number of dual meets just prior to their final league meet with Pomona HS.

Although Ganesha HS offered to forfeit their final meet with Pomona HS, it was the feeling of the committee that because the rule was open to interpretation and because it would be unfair to Pomona HS, Ganesha be permitted to hold its final dual meet without penalty. The Commissioner was directed to further clarify this rule in the Blue Book so that all coaches and administrators would fully understand its meaning.

C. Leuzinger and Pius X High Schools admitted they violated Article XXV, Section 1, of the By-Laws, which prohibits a CIF, SS, school from competing (scrimmaging, working out or playing) with any school or team which is not a member of the CIF, by playing a baseball game against the USC freshman team. Because of a need to secure more information it was moved, seconded and carried to table action in the matter until the June meeting of the Executive Committee.

17. SANCTIONING OF INVI-TATIONAL ACTIVITIES-A communication from the principal of Edgewood HS indicated concern over present policies pertaining to the sanctioning of invitational meets and tournaments. He pointed out the following problems in connection with this matter: (1) many colleges and junior colleges conduct these activities to attract prospective athletes to their schools, (2) if they are assuming all responsibility, they should get all of the praise or blame, (3) the junior college really does all the organization of these events with the sponsoring high school being just a "patsy" for the college, and (4) many of the sponsoring schools are too far removed from the college to do the actual organization and running of the tournament, even if they were so inclined.

A discussion of the matter indicated that our rules are fairly specific governing this situation, and the Commissioner was directed to see that the principal of any member school applying for sanction of an activity to be sponsored jointly with an outside organization be fully advised of his responsibilities and the rules governing such sanctioning.

There being no further business, the meeting was officially adjourned at 4:15 p.m.

B. L. Bergstrom Baseball Trophy to Be Donated by Long Beach Poly

When a CIF, SS, "AAA" baseball champion is crowned sometime around 5 p.m. on Friday, May 29, the winning team will be on the receiving end of the new B. L. Bergstrom Perpetual Baseball Trophy.

Named after a man who served for 39 years as an educator in the El Monte School District and for 10 years as Chairman of the CIF, SS, Executive Committee, the B. L. Bergstrom Trophy is being donated by the current "AAA" baseball champion, Long Beach Poly High School.

The spectacular award consists of two bronzed baseball bats on either side of a walnut block on which is perched a golden eagle. A bronzed glove and ball has been attached to the bat handles while the entire piece is mounted on a walnut base and black marble backdrop.

Large gold plates have been mounted on the black marble, providing sufficient room for CIF, SS,

"AAA" baseball champions to be recognized.

In total size the trophy stands more than 40" high and is three feet in width.

B. L. Bergstrom, who was superintendent of the El Monte School District and chairman of the Executive Committee at the time of his retirement in 1960, is still residing in El Monte and maintains an active interest in the Southern Section and its programs.

Bergstrom began his teaching career in 1921 at El Monte High, where, as a student in 1910-13, he starred in football, track and baseball, and in 12 years as head football coach won 10 league titles and finished second twice.

After filling the roles of vice principal and principal between 1929 and 1952. Bergstrom became superintendent of the El Monte School District, a post which he held until his retirement.

Throughout his many years in education, Bergstrom played an active

role in the operation of the CIF, SS, serving in such capacities as Chairman of the Executive Committee, league representative to the Council, and chairman of the releaguing committee.

In announcing the donation of the trophy, Neil Phillips, principal at Long Beach Poly, said, "We are proud to be able to donate this trophy to the CIF, SS, for presentation to its outstanding "AAA" baseball team. We are also highly pleased to be able to name the trophy in honor of Mr. B. L. Bergstrom, who has spent so many years doing so much for high school athletics in the Southland."

Play-offs in the "AAA" Division begin on May 15, continuing on May 19, 22, 26 and 29 with league champions and co-champions or second-place teams in 16 leagues participating. The "AA" and "A" Divisions will start on May 19 and conclude on the 29th with a maximum of 16 teams in each bracket.

Southern Section Preliminaries Slated May 16 at Four Locations

Preliminary meets which will each qualify six boys for CIF, SS track semi-finals will be held on four fronts on Saturday, May 16: Fontana, Arroyo, Camarillo and Westminster.

From the prelims, six contestants will advance to the semi-finals at Compton on Friday night, May 22 and Chaffey on Saturday, May 23.

Westminster and Fontana prelim qualifiers will compete at Chaffey, while Camarillo and Arroyo qualifiers will face semi-final competition at Compton.

Southern Section finals will be held on Friday night, May 29 at Cerritos College in Norwalk, with the five top varsity boys in each event advancing to the California State Meet at the Coliseum on June 5 and 6.

While the discus is not conducted on a regular basis in the Southern Section, five boys may still qualify for the event in the State Meet. The qualifying will be held on Monday, May 25, at Compton High, beginning at 2:45 p.m. Each boy will be allotted four throws with the five best boys advancing to the State Meet.

In all four CIF, SS, preliminary meets, as well as the semi-finals, sectional finals and state meet, the 220 will be run on the curve and the 440 on two curves.
