

Burbank, Roger Lyon Spotlight CIF Swim Championship Meet

Individually, Roger Lyon of Harard School was not to be outdone in a CIF swim finals at UC Irvine on atturday, May 6. His dad said he got mad at the world and wouldn't talk. hat was to be a good sign.

All Roger did was smash the nationinterscholastic 100 yard butterfly word by 1.1 sec. when he swam the stance in 50.8 sec. The old national word was 51.9 set by Mark Spitz of Santa Clara in 1966. Lyon held the old record of 52.3 set last year. Lyon also won the 200 yard freestyle event in record time. His 1:44.4 broke Greg Charlton's (Arcadia) CIF mark of 1:45.2 set last year.

Burbank's four man team — Ken Powers, Pat Fligg, John Ferguson and Tim Thomas—had what it took when it counted and captured the varsity team championship in a tense head-to-head duel with Corona del Mar. Going into the final event, the 400 free relay, the two were even in point standings with 21 each.

After three legs of the relay it was still anybody's race. Then Ken Powers turned it on and Burbank won the

event in 3:16.8, another CIF record down the drain. CdM was second in 3:18.5. Corona del Mar had held the old mark of 3:18.4, set last year.

For Burbank, Powers finished second in the 50 freestyle and won the 100 freestyle in 48.3. Ferguson was second in the 200 individual medley and third in the 100 yard backstroke.

Gary Hall, sensational freshman from Rancho Alamitos, tied a CIF varsity record when he swam 2:01.8 in the 200 individual medley. The mark equals the times of Roy Saari of El Segundo in 1962 and Phil Houser of Chadwick in 1966.

All told, it was a great day for records. In Class B competition, five records were smashed on the 10-event program and in Class C races, six marks were established out of nine events.

Norwalk won the B team championship with 31 followed by Palos Verdes with 24. Estancia High of Costa Mesa captured C team honors with 25 while Newport was second with 23.

The meet was hosted by Corona del Mar High School with UCI assistant swim coach Ed Newland serving as meet manager and CdM coach Dave Millovich assistant meet manager.

A standing room only crowd estimated at 1500 witnessed what Al Schoenfeld, publisher of Swimming World, called "one of the greatest high school meets of all times."

CIF Council Honors Bruce Lawson, Frank Holt, Carl Metten With Gold Life Passes to Southern Section Events

Three retiring school men, who between them have devoted nearly 120 years to the field of education, were honored by the CIF, Southern Section, Council on Saturday, May 6, when they were presented with gold life passes to all CIF events.

The three honorees were Carl Metten, retiring supervisor of physical education for the Pasadena Junior High Schools; Bruce Lawson, retiring principal of Mark Keppel High School in Alhambra; and Frank Holt, retiring principal of San Luis Obispo High School.

The presentations were made by Commissioner of Athletics, Ken Fagans (to Metten), Harry Bigger (to Lawson) and Chet Shirk (to Holt).

Metten has been with the Pasadena school system since 1930 when he began coaching at McKinley Junior High School, after graduation from Oregon State and Pasadena Junior College.

He coached the first high school gymnastics team in the Southern Section in Pasadena and also coached football, basketball and track.

Holt spent 39 of his 40 years in the field of education at San Luis Obispo.

He started at Nogales (Arizona) High then moved to San Luis in 1928 where he was hired for the post of head for ball coach and head of the boys physical cal education department.

From 1928 through '46 he served in that capacity. Since then, Frank has taught at both the high school and SLO Junior College, was adult school principal, junior college principal and since '53, high school principal.

His teams won eight league cham pionships in football, basketball, base ball and track.

Holt was instrumental in the organ izing of the California Central Coast Officials Association and served commissioner of officials in that are for 20 years. He is currently president of the San Luis League.

"United States Water Polo", a 24 minute, sound and color motion picture designed to stimulate interest and enthusiasm for the sport of water polo as well as teach techniques of the game, has been purchased by the CIF, SS, office and is being made available to member schools for use at no cost.

The film, narrated by Burt Lancaster, and featuring such outstanding water polo stars as Stan Cole, Bob Saari and Russ Webb, recently was awarded the grand prize for excellence at the Cortina International Sports Film Festival.

Coaches Bob Horn, Vic Larson, Monty Niyzkovsky, Urho Saari and James Smith were instrumental in screening and selecting material to be used in the film which is produced by Sport and Art Films of Los Angeles.

Repeated slow-motion, stop action and underwater photography are used as teaching techniques in the film. Exercises in the film are daily routines of the best players in the country demonstrating swimming techniques, ball handling, passing, shooting, goalie training and team tactics.

MINUTES OF CIF, SOUTHERN SECTION, EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING — APRIL 12, 1967

The meeting of the CIF, Southern Section, Executive Committee was called to order by Chairman Marion Hays at 3:00 p.m. on Wednesday, April 12, in the CIF, Southern Section office.

The following members were in attendance: Chairman Hays, vice principal, Harvard School; Clair Franklin, principal, Trona High School; Arthur H. North, assistant superintendent, Azusa USD; Steve Miletich, vice-principal, Beverly Hills HS; Richard H. Spaulding, principal, Buena Park High School: Alex Alexander, principal, Indio High School; Arthur T. Hobson, assistant superintendent, Whittier UHSD; Chester R. Shirk, principal, Anaheim High School; Keith J. Lee, principal, Dominguez High School; Robert D. Ashton, assistant superintendent, Norwalk-La Mirada USD and Commissioner of Athletics J. Kenneth Fagans.

William W. Russell, executive secretary of the State CIF, was a guest at the meeting.

- 1. APPLICATION FOR MEMBERSHIP It was moved, seconded and carried to recommend to the Council that Norco High School of the Corona High School District be admitted to regular membership in the CIF, SS.
- 2. NEEDLES FOOTBALL RE-QUEST It was moved, seconded and carried to approve a request from Needles High School to begin football practice one week early so that they might play a football game with Bishop Gorman High School of Las Vegas on September 15. This request was granted in order that Needles High School might complete a representative football schedule which might not otherwise be possible due to their geographic location. They will not schedule in excess of the permitted nine games.

It was also moved, seconded and carried that for Needles High to qualify for the 1967 CIF football play-offs, Needles may not lose more than two of the following seven games: September 29, Boulder City; October 6, Palo Verde, October 13, Twentynine Palms; October 20, Calipatria; October 27, Basic; November 4, Holtville; November 10, Kingman.

3. PALO VERDE (BLYTHE) RE-QUEST — It was moved, seconded and carried to approve a request from Palo Verde High School in Blythe to participate in a post-Christmas basketball tournament at Flagstaff, Arizona. This would permit Palo Verde to complete a representative basketball schedule which might not otherwise be possible due to their geographic location.

- 4. ELIGIBILITY CASES The Executive Committee discussed and acted upon the following eligibility cases:
- a. Cabrillo Ruled a student eligible at Cabrillo High School via waiver of the transfer rule.
- b. San Gorgonio Approved the eligibility of Francis Berry at San Gorgonio after substantiating that he had moved from Texas to San Bernardino with his legal guardian.
- 5. BASEBALL PLAY-OFF PRO-POSAL — Because of the tremendous number of rained out baseball games in recent weeks, which must be made

up before the start of CIF play-offs, it was moved, seconded and carried that the play-off dates be set back as follows:

AAA division — May 23, 26, 31, June 2, 6



MINUTES OF CIF, SOUTHERN SECTION EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING — MAY 5, 1967

The meeting of the CIF, Southern Section, Executive Committee was called to order by Chairman Marion C. Hays at 2:30 p.m. on Friday, May 5, 1967 in the Southern Section office.

The following members were in atrendance: Chairman Hays, vice-principal, Harvard School; Harry L. Bigger, principal, Fillmore HS; Clair Franklin, principal, Trona HS; Steve Miletich, vice-principal, Beverly Hills HS; Arthur H. North, assistant superintendent, Azusa USD; Richard H. Scaulding, principal, Buena Park HS; Arthur Hobson, assistant superintendwhittier UHSD; Alex Alexander, principal, Indio HS; Keith Gunn, prinopal, Victor Valley HS; Robert D. Ashton, assistant superintendent, Noralk-La Mirada SD; Chester R. Shirk, principal, Anaheim HS; Keith J. Lee, principal, Dominguez HS; and Commissioner of Athletics Ken Fagans.

1. APPROVE MINUTES — It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of April 12, 1967 as read by the Commissioner.

2. APPLICATION FOR MEMBERSHIP — It was moved, seconded and carried to recommend to the Council that Los Alamitos High School of the Anaheim district, the Catalina Island School for Boys and the Harbor City Christian School be admitted to regular membership in the CIF, SS, and that Kolb Junior High of Rialto and Berkeley Junior High of Anaheim be admitted to associate membership a the CIF, SS.

MORRO BAY FOOTBALL RE-QUEST — A request was read from Morro Bay High School seeking perission to free lance in football during the 1967 season. It was reported that similar request to the San Luis Athtic League had been denied. After the borough discussion of the matter it moved, seconded and carried to any the request but recommend to Releaguing Committee that it study possibility of Morro Bay's freelang in 1968.

WATER POLO OFFICIALS RE-UEST — The Water Polo Coaches Officials Association sought per-

mission to have the fees for water polo officials adjusted from the present system of \$15 per man on a two-man game to a \$17-\$13 arrangement. This would not raise the total fee paid by a school to its officials but would give a certified official a slight increase while the probationary or new man assigned to a game would receive the lesser fee. This plan was adopted by the water polo association in hopes that it could attract more men to join the organization to aid a sport that is badly in need of qualified officials. The request also sought permission for schools to pay mileage to water polo officials who travel great distances to accept assignments.

It was moved, seconded and carried to adopt the water polo officials recommendation for a one year period.

6. EL RANCHO ELIGIBILITY REQUEST — El Rancho High sought waiver of the 19-year-old rule to permit a boy who had missed two years of school because of polio to participate next year (his senior year). It was moved, seconded and carried to deny the request.

7. ATHLETIC SCHOLARSHIP — The Executive Committee referred to the Catholic Athletic Assn. a case involving student in a Catholic HS who had allegedly been the recipient of an athletic scholarship.

8. TRACK RECOMMENDATION

— The Track Committee recommended to the Executive Committee that scoring in the CIF, SS, Championship Track Meet be changed to conform with the NCAA Track and Field Guide scoring of 6-4-3-2-1 instead of our present 5-4-3-2-1.

It was moved, seconded and carried to adopt the recommendation, effective immediately.

9. AREA COMMISSIONERS OF OFFICIALS MEETING — The CIF, Southern Section, has now assumed the responsibility for the employment of personnel in our outlying areas whose main duty will be to assign officials for all interscholastic athletic contests in their respective areas. In an effort to define responsibilities and coordinate and standardize procedures a meeting of all area commissioners was held in the SS office. The group is recommending that our by-laws be amended to cover rain out procedures, protests and the pay scale for Saturday afternoon and holiday athletic contests. The Commissioner was directed to present these recommendations in writing at the next meeting of the Executive Committee.

10. SPRING FOOTBALL PRAC-TICE VIOLATION - Mr. Clifton Patterson, principal, and Mr. Cliffy Meyer, athletic director at Jordan HS of Long Beach, appeared before the committee to report on an alleged violation of the out-of-season football practice rule. They admitted that a violation had occurred early in February and that as a result the coach responsible had been removed from his coaching assignment. After studying all aspects of the case it was moved, seconded and carried to permit Jordan HS to conduct only 10 days of spring practice instead of the normal allotment of 15 days for violating the spring football practice. 11. PROPOSALS OF JUNIOR

HIGH LEAGUE REPRESENTA-TIVES — Commissioner Fagans reported that he had met recently with representatives of several of our junior high school league representatives for the purpose of evaluating the junior high schools' positions in the CIF, SS.

While the meeting was constructive, it was the recommendations of these league representatives that such meetings with junior high representatives be held twice each year for the purpose of discussing problems which are pretinent only to the junior high program.

It was moved, seconded and carried to recommend to the Council that two such meetings be held annually.

It was further recommended by the junior high representatives and subsequently moved, seconded and carried by the Executive Committee to recommend to the Council that the Junior high schools adopt an age limit rule similar to the high school's 19-year-old rule. The junior high rule will read that "a boy may not compete after he has reached his 16th birthday on or before August 31. If a boy reaches his 16th birthday on or after September 1, he is eligible during the entire school year."

12. REVIEW OF BASKETBALL PROBLEM — More correspondence on the previously discussed problem of unsportsmanlike conduct at one of our play-off basketball games was reviewed. No further action was taken at this time as the schools involved are still continuing investigation of the case.

13. LEE VINING FOOTBALL RE-QUEST — Lee Vining High School sought permission to begin football practice earlier than the prescribed date so that they might schedule a game with a neighboring out of state school. Because of the geographical location of the school and the difficulty in completing a representative football schedule, the request was granted for one year.

There being no further business to come before the Committee, the meeting was adjourned at 5:45 p.m.

MINUTES OF CIF, SOUTHERN SECTION COUNCIL MEETING — MAY 6, 1967

The spring meeting of the CIF, Southern Section, Council was held on Saturday, May 6, 1967, in the auditorium at Loyola High School. The meeting was called to order at 9:30 a.m. by Council President Chester R. Shirk, principal, Anaheim high School.

Representatives of all but the Del-

Representatives of all but the Delphic Santa Barbara County and Moore Leagues were in attendance.

Rev. John Geiszel, vice principal of Loyola High, welcomed the Council

members to Loyola.

The following guests in attendance were introduced: C. A. Van Hoorebeke, athletic director, Anaheim High School; Bruce Lawson, principal, Keppell High School; Frank Holt, principal, San Luis Obispo High School; Rev. Lawrence Leeds, new representative for the Camino Real League, Rev. Laurence Walsh, principal of Pius X; Rev. Keifer of Pius X; Carl Metten of Pasadena City Schools; George Scott of the Pasadena City Schools; Russ Reynolds, principal, Bib Bear High and new Arrowhead League representative; Bob Herrold, secretary of the Foothill League; Charlie Ledbetter, vice-principal, Gahr High School.

1. APPROVAL OF MINUTES—was moved, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the Council meeting of January 21, 1967 as published in the February Monthly Bulletin

It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of May 5, 1967 as read by the Commissioner.

2. BAY LEAGUE CROSS COUNTRY PROPOSAL — Dave Capeluto, representative of the Bay League, proposed to the Council that Article XXXVIII be amended to include that all cross country runners must wear shoes tion. This regulation will not apply until the 1968-69 season.

It was moved, seconded and carried by a vote of 22 yes, 14 no that this amendment be approved.

3. BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT PROPOSAL—It was moved, seconded and carried to amend Article XXX-VII, Section 6, of the By-Laws to restrict basketball teams to participation in three tournaments each season, excluding CIF, SS, play-off competition. This regulation will not apply until the 1968-69 season.

4. ESTABLISH PLAY-OFF GROUPINGS—

a. Football—The Board of Directors of the Southern California Interscholastic Football Coaches Association, working in conjunction with the Commissioner of Athletics recommended to the Council the adoption of the fol-

lowing groupings for the 1967 foot ball play-offs:

AAA Division—Angelus, Bay, Catholic, Channel, Citrus Belt, Coast, Foothill, Moore, Pacific, Santa Fe, Sietta and Sunset.

AAA Division—Camina Real, Crese view, Freeway, Garden Grove, Irvine Montview, Pioneer, Rio Hondo, Sa Antonio, San Gabriel Valley, Sann Barbara County, Sky, and Suburban

AA Division — Frontier, Golden Hacienda, Imperial, Ivy, San La Obispo.

A Division—De Anza, Desert-Valley, Olympic, Orange, Tri-Valley.

Small School Division—Arrowhead Desert Inyo (major), Desert-Inyo (minor), Mountain Desert, Pinon.

Six-man Division — Academy, Dephic, Prep, Tri-County.

It was moved, seconded and carried to adopt the above for the 1967 football play-offs.

b. Baseball and Basketball—Groupings of leagues for the 1968 basketball play-offs was discussed and a recommended division of leagues was proposed.

It was moved, seconded and carried to adopt the following for the 1981 baseball and basketball play-offs.

AAA Division—Moore, Citrus Bel Pacific, Sunset, Bay, Coast, Footh Channel, Freeway, Sky, Sierra, Subban, San Gabriel Valley, Irvine, Mose view, and Catholic.

AA Division — San Antonio, Imperial Valley, Golden, Craview, Imperial Valley, Rio Honser, Hacienda, Orange, Deservalley, Garden Grove, Angelus, San Fe, Frontier, Camino Real, and San Luis Obispo.

A Division—De Anza, Arrowhea Tri-Valley, Olympic, Desert-Inyo, Peon, Mountain Desert, Condor, paratory, Academy, Tri-County, Delphic.

5. GIRLS ATHLETIC REPORT
Robert D. Ashton, member of a Survival of the CIF Committee studying girls scholastic athletics, reported to Council on the proposed framework of the girls athletic program will be put before the State Federal Council in June for statewide proval.

It was moved, seconded and care to instruct the Southern Section resentative to the State Council vote in favor of the proposed Byto on the State level.

This action does not indicate the

is mandatory for Southern Section schools to engage in interscholastic girls athletics or for the Southern Section office to interpret rules and regulations for girls competition. The action merely will place girls sports in the State CIF Constitution from where it may be adopted by the sections when they so choose.

6. CONSIDER INCREASE IN OF-FICIATING FEES IN BASEBALL, WRESTLING AND TRACK — Each of the above officials groups sought increases in officiating fees for the 1967-68 school year. It was the opinion of the Commissioner that an overall study of our officiating fee scale was in order. He recommended to the Council that a committee be appointed by the president to study the total officiating fee problem. The committee is to make recomendations of fees for the 1968-69 school year at the lanuary Council meeting.

7. STATE ELIGIBILITY RULES

Steve Miletich, representative of the Southern Section on a State CIF committee studying a series of proposed changes in eligibility rules, reported to the Council on his committee's recommendations.

Following discussion of each of the five regulations it was moved, seconded and carried to instruct Southern Section representatives to the State Federated Council to vote in favor of adoption of all five proposals.

These rules, if passed on the state level, would then be studied at the sectional level for possible inclusion in our regulations at a later date.

Briefly, the five proposals provide:
1) That each section be given authority to establish rules and procedures

for waiving the limitation on semesters of competition.

2) That in order for a boy to be considered a 24 hour boarding school student, he must reside in the boarding school for a period of 50 school days prior to any transfer.

3) That each section may establish rules and procedures for waiving the requirements of days of attendance, number of passing units, and semesters of competition provided serious illness, travel, hardship has kept a boy out of school.

4) That the section may more liberally interpret the transfer rule and establish certain provisions for such

interpretation.

5) That a boy is ineligible to compete in interscholastic athletics while attending continuation schools but provides for his eligibility upon return to the regular school.

All of these proposals will be sent to schools principals in detail following adoption by the State and subsequent action by the Southern Section Executive Committee or Council.

8. ELECTION OF OFFICERS — Leon C. Meeks, chairman of the Nominating Committee, conducted the election of officers. The following men were elected: State Council (two year term) - Robert D. Ashton, assistant superintendent, Norwalk - La Mirada USD: State Council (two year term) -Steve Miletich, vice principal, Beverly Hills School; Executive Committee (Northern Area-four year term) — Claud Hardesty, principal, Santa Barbara High School; Executive Committee (Los Angeles County - four year term) - Walter Newland, principal, Long Beach Polytechnic High School.

The Commissioner of Athletics, J. Kenneth Fagans, was elected to a four year term with salary to be set by the Executive Committee.

9. ELIGIBILITY OF JR. HS GRA-DUATES — It was moved, seconded and carried to amend Article XI of the by-laws to restrict the eligibility of graduates of the ninth grade of a Jr. HS, to the public school in the attendance area in which the boy's parents reside. The eligibility committee was directed to prepare the wording in the new rule for presentation to the Executive Committee at its June meeting.

10. RELEAGUING COMMITTEE REPORT — Steve Miletich, chairman of the Releaguing Committee, reported that his group had issued its first

progress report for all areas but the Southeast area. He asked that schools and leagues which have proposed changes in recommendations for the 1968-69 school year should contact their area representative. The Southeast area's progress report, issued by Walt Newland, was sent to league representatives just prior to the Council meeting. A Southeast area meeting has been scheduled for Monday, May 22, at Gahr High School.

Final releaguing recommendations for the 1968-69 school year will be presented to the Council in September.

11. PIUS X APPEAL OF RECOM-MENDED PENALTY — Rev. Lawrence Walsh, principal of Pius X High of Downey, asked for a modification of the Executive Committee's recommended penalty for the school's violation of the undue influence rule.

The Executive Committee had recommended to the Council that "Pius X High School be placed on strict probation for one calendar year, during which time the school's athletic teams would not be permitted competition beyond the league level. This would deny any individual or team representing Pius X HS participation in CIF post-season competition in any sport."

Rev. Walsh stated that the school accepted the penalty as far as team sports were concerned but asked for a modification to permit individual qualifiers in cross country and track to enter CIF competition next year.

Following discussion of the matter, it was moved, seconded and carried to modify the penalty to permit individuals in cross country and track to participate in CIF competition during the 1967-68 school year.

It was further clarified that the probation was for the 1967-68 school year.

12. SOCCER — It was moved, seconded and carried to adopt the soccer by-laws as presented by the Commissioner for inclusion in the 1967-68 Blue Book and to stipulate that the Condor League be given permission to continue conducting its soccer program during the fall of the year.

Out-going president Chet Shirk thanked the Council for its cooperation during the school year and turned the gavel over to Rev. Alexander Manville, principal, Bishop Diego High School of Santa Barbara, representative of the Tri-Valley League and new Council president.

There being no further business to come before the Council, the meeting was adjourned at 11:45 p.m.
