COMPTON WINS 1969 CIF, SS, TRACK TITLE

HALL SETS TWO NATIONAL RECORDS; BUENA WINS SWIMMING CHAMPIONSHIP

Despite two national record-breaking performances by Rancho Alamitos' Gary Hall, Buena High School captured the 1969 CIF, SS, swimming championship at Belmont Plaza Olympic Pool in Long Beach before a capacity crowd on Friday evening, May 9.

Hall, Olympic silver medalist, won the 200-yard individual medley in 1:53.9, shattering the national record of 1:54.4 set in 1967 by Mark Spitz of Santa Clara.

The Rancho Alamitos star came back in the varsity 100-yard backstroke to win in 52.5, erasing the national standard of 53.1 set in 1967 by Fred Haywood of Santa Clara.

In all, 10 new records were set on the varsity, Bee and Cee levels in the competition, which climaxed an outstanding swimming season before a packed house of more than 2,500 spectators at the Belmont Plaza Pool.

Buena racked up 202 points to win the varsity team title, with Long Beach Wilson finishing in the runner-up spot with 113.5 points. Palos Verdes won both the Bee and Cee crowns, with La Serna finishing second in the Bee division and Newport Harbor taking the runner-up spot in the Cee division.

ROLLING HILLS TURNS BACK NEWPORT HARBOR FOR SECOND STRAIGHT CIF TENNIS TITLE

Rolling Hills, paced by Jeff Austin and Jim Armstrong, turned back a determined Newport Harbor aggregation to successfully defend its CIF, SS, "Large Schools" tennis title at the Los Angeles Tennis Club.

Austin and Armstrong both won four singles matches to pace the Titans to their 15-13 victory over Newport Harbor, giving coach Gary Hardesty's crew its second consecutive CIF, SS, tennis crown.

The same two schools met in 1968 for the title, with Rolling Hills emerging victorious, 16-12.

The Titans went into the tournament as the top-seeded entry, turning back Montebello, Beverly Hills and Santa Monica enroute to the championship match. Newport, the Sunset League

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RECORDS FALL IN PRELIMS, SEMIS, FINALS

Compton's Tarbabes, after having played the runner-up role for several years, annexed the 1969 CIF, SS, varsity track title at Cerritos College in a meet which served as the highlight of a record-breaking season.

Coach Willie Williams' Tarbabes won the varsity crown by a scant two points over defending kingpin Centennial in competition which went down to the final event of the evening — the varsity mile relay — before a champion was named.

In the Bee division, Burroughs of Burbank, by virtue of a relay disqualification, won the title by one point over Channel Islands after Long Beach Poly was disqualified in the relay, giving the Indians an additional point after the meet had been concluded.

Oxnard, behind the outstanding individual performance of Terry Lawyer, won the Cee division title over Compton, which finished in the runner-up spot.

Highlight of the evening was the two-mile run where defending champion Ruben Chappins out-kicked a star-studded field of runners to win the event in record-breaking fashion. Chappins was clocked in 9:00.8, which shattered the week-old mark set by Dave White of El Modena in the semi-finals by more than two seconds.

Compton's Bee relay team provided the only other record of the evening as the quartet clicked off a 1:29.5 half-mile, to break the record set last year by San Bernardino by more than a second.

The real excitement of the track season came in the four sectional meets, where three new CIF, SS, standards were established.

In competition at Sentinel Field in Inglewood, South Torrance's Steve Smith pole vaulted 16-4½ to break the old CIF, SS, mark of 16-3 set in 1966 by Paul Heglar of Muir.

Meanwhile, in the Millikan preliminary meet, Rory Kotinek of Millikan

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MINUTES OF CIF, SOUTHERN SECTION, COUNCIL MEETING—MAY 3, 1969

Dr. Paul Berger, principal of Fountain Valley High School, welcomed the group to his school.

Representatives from all but the Hi-Lo League were in attendance. The following guests were introduced: Mr. John Ford, president of the Southern California Football Coaches' Association; Mr. Tex Wallis, president of the Southern California Basketball Coaches' Association and Mr. John Rose, president of the San Luis Athletic League.

1. APPROVE MINUTES—It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the January 25, 1969 Council meeting, as published in the February Monthly Bulletin.

It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of February 14, 1969, as published in the March Monthly Bulletin. It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of April 19, 1969, as published in the April Monthly Bulletin, with a correction of the action taken in regards to the Costa Mesa swimming situation. The motion that was made, seconded and unanimously carried was as follows: "Due to a reinvestigation, and discovering official communications which lend themselves to mis-interpretation of the rule, we feel that we should reverse the decision we made and that we are not penalizing the boys involved."

2. FOOTBALL PLAY-OFF GROUPINGS FOR 1969—Mr. Russell Ball, Chairman of the committee studying CIF football play-off procedures for 1969, reported that his committee recommended a continuation of the present format for the coming season. He indicated that considerable study was given to the matter but it was felt that it was not feasible to restructure

the play-offs at this time. He recommended that the play-off groupings for 1969 be as follows: "AAAA" DIVISION—Angelus, Bay, Del Rey, Channel, Citrus Belt, Coast, Foothill, Irvine, Moore, Pacific, Sunset and Whitmont. "AAA" DIVISION—Camino Real, Crestview, Freeway, Garden Grove City, Montview, Pioneer, Rio Hondo, San Antonio, San Gabriel Valley, Santa Barbara County, Santa Fe, Sierra, Sky, Suburban. "AA" DIVISION—Frontier, Golden, Hacienda, Imperial, Ivy, Orange, San Luis Athletic. "A" DIVISION—De Anza, Desert Valley, Olympic, San Luis (Minor), Tri-Valley, Free Lance. SMALL SCHOOLS DIVISION—Arrowhead, Chaparral, Desert-Inyo (Major), Desert-Inyo (Minor), Pinon, Free Lance. 6-MAN DIVISION—Academy, Delphic, Prep, Tri-County.

Mr. Hobson requested that consideration be given in 1970 towards reducing the football play-offs from four to three weeks. After some discussion it was moved, seconded and carried to approve the football play-off groupings for 1969, as recommended by the committee.

3. BASKETBALL AND BASEBALL PLAY-OFF GROUPINGS FOR 1970—The Commissioner presented his recommendations for play-off groupings in basketball and baseball for the 1970 season. He indicated that these groupings were based primarily on school enrollment, with a few adjustments being made because of outstanding strength in certain leagues. He reported that the Angelus League had requested placement in the "AAAA" division.

Mr. Parks, of the San Gabriel Valley League, registered an objection to his league being classified as "AAAA". The San Gabriel Valley League is the 13th largest in the CIF, however, and Bellflower High School ably represented the league last year in reaching the quarter-finals where they were defeated by the ultimate champion, Compton.

Mr. Ball of the Coast League recommended that all byes in the baseball and basketball pairings be eliminated by placing representative teams in these spots. This matter was discussed and it was moved, seconded and carried that in the 1970 baseball and basketball play-offs, all byes be filled by representative teams, to be selected by a special committee.

It was then moved, seconded and carried to approve the basketball and baseball play-off groupings for 1970 as presented by the Commissioner.

4. WORKSHOP ON CROWD CONTROL—Mr. Spaulding reported that the Executive Committee had been investigating and recommended that the CIF, Southern Section, participate in a special two-day workshop which would deal with proper administration of interscholastic athletic contests. He indicated that the CIF, SS, was the logical organization to assist in this important endeavor, and he recommended that financial assistance, not to exceed \$2,000.00, be authorized for the financing of this workshop.

Considerable discussion took place concerning this activity, and it was the opinion of most of those in attendance that this workshop should be developed, and that a committee representing the Southern Section should be appointed to work with Dr. Richard Perry of USC, who is spearheading the conference. It was then moved, seconded and carried to approve the participation of the CIF, Southern Section, in this activity and to authorize the expenditure of an amount of money, not to exceed \$2,000.00. President Reilly appointed Mr. Richard Spaulding, Mr. Ed Gossard and Mr. Winston Nelson to serve as CIF representatives on the committee.

5. PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT FOR SPRING FOOTBALL PRACTICE—Mr. Larry Rossi, of the Moore League, presented a proposal that AAAA schools only, on an experimental basis for a period of one year, conduct spring football practice in full protective equipment. Mr. Rossi stated that he did not wish the Council to act on this proposal at this meeting, but would like the representatives to present it to their leagues for consideration.

Mr. Rossi stated that a questionnaire had been sent out to administrators to determine how many coaches and administrators would favor such a proposal. The results were as follows:

based upon 225 replies: "AAAA"—80%—Coaches, 53%—Administrators; "AAA"—68%—Coaches, 44%—Administrators; "AA"—80%—Coaches, 45%—Administrators; "A"—59%—Coaches, 35%—Administrators; SS—74%—Coaches, 48%—Administrators.

Mr. Rossi stated that the Moore League had studied the possibility of spring practice in full gear, and they had weighed the pros and cons very carefully. They felt that the advantages were greater than the disadvantages.

Mr. Cordana stated that if such a program were conducted, he would like to request that data be kept, and suggested that one league be used as a test area for compiling the data.

It was pointed out that there is a pre-conditioning period of 15 days in the fall, prior to the first game. Mr. Rossi stated that he felt that the Council was rather restrictive in the sport of football, and that by trying to give some consideration to the sport, would be a more positive approach.

It was pointed out that some of the schools in other divisions would probably like to become involved in such a program.

It was suggested that the leagues discuss this matter from both standpoints. (1) As an experiment in the AAAA Division only, and (2) total involvement. Commissioner Fagans suggested that the classifications (leagues) decide whether or not they wished to participate, and that at the September meeting the matter would be on the agenda.

6. 300-MILE TRAVEL—The Commissioner stated that at the June 7th meeting of the State Federated Council, the CIF, SS, representatives would be required to vote on amending the 300-mile travel rule, and asked that the Council direct those representatives as to how they should vote. Mr. Fagans was asked what his opinion would be. He stated that he felt the 300-mile rule was a good one, and that it be retained.

It was moved, seconded and carried that our representatives be directed to vote in favor of retaining the 300-mile travel rule.

7. SPORTS REGULATIONS COMMITTEE—Mr. Dave Capelouto, chairman of the Sports Regulations Committee presented the recommendations of his committee relative to out-of-season practice in golf, tennis, gymnastics, cross country, track, wrestling, water polo and swimming. He stated that the committee, after many meetings and much study, had reached the conclusion that our approved sports must be handled individually.

He asked the Council to consider the recommendations for all sports except water polo and swimming. The recommendations governing these sports were discussed and it was moved, seconded and carried that the committee's recommendations for changes in out-of-season practice in golf, tennis, gymnastics, cross country, track and wrestling be approved.

Mr. Capelouto then took up the problems connected with water polo and swimming. He reported that with the tremendous AAU program, many problems had developed over the past five or six years. He explained the thinking of the Sports Regulations Committee relative to a complete change in our philosophy governing out-of-season practice in these activities.

The committee originally recommended that the opening date of the swimming season be advanced from February 1, to January 3. It was felt that this would eliminate many of the problems that took place between the close of the water polo and the beginning of the swimming season. The Executive Committee discussed this proposal, however, and after considerable study, it was the recommendation of the Executive Committee that water polo and swimming be combined into one sport known as Aquatics. By doing this, boys could begin water polo practice the day after Labor Day and upon completion of the water polo season could continue right on with swimming. Those schools not fielding a water polo team could begin official swim practice on December 1st.

Discussion brought forth the fact that the recommendation provided that the season be advanced two months, but the close of the season would only be advanced two weeks. It was suggested that an Aquatics season should be established, but that all swimming activity should be completed prior to April 1, or the Easter holiday period, whichever came first. It was then moved, seconded and carried to accept the recommendations of the Sports Regulations Committee regarding the establishment of an Aquatics program, with the stipulation that the swimming season be concluded prior to April 1, or the Easter holiday period, whichever came first.

Mr. Capelouto thanked the Council for their understanding of the problem and indicated that the committee would be more than willing to continue studying the problems of out-of-season practice in other CIF team sports.

8. ELECTION OF OFFICERS—Mr. Richard Palmer, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, supervised the election of officers for the 1969-70

school year.

Mr. Palmer announced that elected to a two-year term on the State Federated Council was Mr. Alex Alexander, principal of Indio High School, and elected to a three-year term was Mr. Steve Miletich, Vice Principal of Beverly Hills High School. Elected to the Executive Committee from Orange County was Mr. Ferren Christensen and from Los Angeles, Mr. Steve Miletich. Mr. Keith Lee, present CIF, SS, Treasurer was re-elected to an additional three-year term.

9. RELEAGUING COMMITTEE REPORT—Mr. Steve Miletich, chairman of the Releaguings Committee, submitted a report of his group's work towards releaguings for the 1970-71 school year. He indicated that the Northern and Southeastern areas were still working on the problem of releaguings, and would not have definite recommendations for another two weeks. He stressed that the report was merely an indication of progress and not a final recommendation. Mr. Miletich reminded the group that final action on releaguings would be taken up at the September 27th Council meeting.

10. EJECTION OF COACH FOR UNSPORTSMANLIKE CONDUCT—Mr. Hobson reported that the Executive Committee had discussed the question of whether or not a contest should be forfeited if the head coach is ejected because of unsportsmanlike conduct. He pointed out that such a rule now governs baseball games, and there was some thought that it should apply to all sports.

A discussion revealed many problems that might develop with such a rule, particularly in the spectator sports of football and basketball. It was finally moved, seconded and carried that this matter be referred back to the leagues for study, and be placed on the agenda of the September Council meeting.

11. TOURNAMENT PARTICIPATION—Mr. Spaulding, of the Freeway League, reported that many invitational tournaments are now being conducted in such a manner that all teams are guaranteed 3, 4, and sometimes as many as 6 games. Our present rule states that for each tournament entered, a team will be charged with two games, regardless of the number played.

It was felt that the present rule should be amended so that teams could not play an excessive number of contests during the season of the sport. After some discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried that beginning with the 1970-71 school year, Article XXI be amended to provide that any

teams entering an invitational tournament will be charged with the number of contests equivalent to the minimum of games guaranteed every team in the tournament. It was suggested that our Sanctioned Event forms be revised to indicate the number of games guaranteed participating schools, and that this information also appear in the published list of sanctioned tournaments.

12. SUMMER SCHOOL WORK—The Commissioner reported that at the next State Federated Council meeting, our representatives would also be required to vote on the question of whether or not summer school work should count towards athletic eligibility. During the discussion, it was pointed out that our present scholarship rules are very lenient and that in many schools in the Southern Section, summer school work was not conducted. It was moved, seconded and carried that our representatives be instructed to vote against any change in the present regulations governing summer school work as it applies to athletic eligibility.

13. OFFICE PERSONNEL—Steve Miletich, chairman of the Executive Committee, reported that the committee had discussed the need for an administrative assistant in the CIF office. At the present time Mr. Fagans is the only one intimately acquainted with the operation of the Southern Section office, and the only person authorized to interpret rules and manage the program. Should he be incapacitated there would be no one with experience available to take over the operation of the organization.

Mr. Miletich indicated that the CIF, SS, had grown from a membership of 200 schools, 10 years ago, divided into 24 leagues, to its present enrollment of 440 schools, operating in 48 leagues. The number of schools in the Southern Section is greater than that in the majority of states where persons of administrative ability are employed to assist the Commissioner.

Mr. Hardesty, a member of the Executive Committee, stated that considering all phases of the program, there was a definite need for help in the administrative capacity at the CIF office, and that it would take some time to train a man to be able to do the additional work that must be done. He also pointed out that the number of sports and play-off participants had increased greatly, and the work load at the CIF office had more than doubled. He suggested that a person should be employed who was familiar with athletics and who had an administrative background.

After considerable discussion, it was moved, seconded and unanimously car-

ried that an administrative committee be appointed to set up procedures for the selection of an administrative assistant, to be employed by the CIF, Southern Section, as soon as possible.

14. CHAMPIONSHIP BASEBALL GAME—The Commissioner reported that negotiations were under way to conduct our CIF "AAAA" baseball championship game as part of a doubleheader with the Los Angeles City Championship game, at Dodger Stadium on Wednesday, June 4, 1969. Because of the difficulty in securing an adequate field for holding this championship game the Commissioner recommended that this change of date and site be approved for this year's final game.

Many of the members of the Council expressed approval of the idea and it was moved, seconded and unanimously carried that the Commissioner be authorized to complete negotiations for the CIF "AAAA" Championship game to be played at Dodger Stadium at 8:00 p.m. on Wednesday, June 4, 1969.

15. REPORT ON DOWNEY'S REQUEST TO WITHDRAW FROM THE COAST LEAGUE—Mr. Ferren Christensen, Sunset League representative, presented a concise report of the recommendations of his committee which had been studying the Downey Unified School District's request to have their two high schools removed from the Coast League as of the close of the current school year. He stated that his committee had met with administrators from the Compton High School District on February 24, and with administrators from the Downey Unified School District on March 18th. Following these individual meetings, a combined group meeting was then held on April 9.

The committee found all parties concerned to be very cooperative and sincere in their desire to work out an equitable solution to the problem. For the first time in a decade or more, the Compton City administration has demonstrated a genuine concern and willingness to cooperate with school officials in the supervision and conduct of school-sponsored activities.

At the conclusion of the joint conference, the CIF committee reconvened for final review. The CIF committee is unanimous in recognizing that mere relegating is not the answer for Downey, Warren, Compton or any other school in the Coast League, in the resolution of their immediate problem. The kinds of demonstrable activities, however, recently exhibited by concerned leadership and dedicated communities are a giant step in the right

direction. The Downey administration suggested that several alternatives be designed to present to the Downey Board of Trustees. In light of the efforts, accomplishments and change noted in both physical facilities, personnel and attitude, coupled with community involvement, the CIF, SS, committee recommends that the Downey Unified School District on behalf of their senior high schools, be given their choice of the following alternatives: (1) Allow Downey and Warren High Schools to withdraw from the Coast League effective with the close of the current school year. Such action if not approved by the Council to result in loss of membership in the CIF, Southern Section and jeopardize future placement of both schools in an athletic league. (2) Commit Downey and Warren High Schools for continued membership in the Coast League for 1969-70 and, if the same spirit of cooperation and action is manifest in the future as exhibited during the committee hearings and at the community level the CIF, SS, school and communities will all be the benefactors. It should be emphasized that this recommendation applies to the 1969-70 athletic season. If Downey and Warren High Schools desire to pursue their present interest to place their two district high schools in separate leagues for 1970-71, they should submit their request for consideration without delay to the CIF relegating representative for the Southeastern section.

In addition, the CIF committee recommends that the Coast League work cooperatively with the CIF committee in the development of their 1969-70 league athletic schedule to determine home and away contests in the best interest of the communities and school involved.

Mr. Shiney, principal of Warren High School, was in attendance at the Council meeting and was asked to take back to the District, the alternative recommendations recommended by the committee. Mr. Shiney addressed the group and commended the committee for its work on this delicate situation. He stated that in the opinion of the Downey District—drastic action had to be taken in order to enable the Downey District to secure the cooperation they needed from community leaders in order to prevent disturbances.

It was moved, seconded and unanimously carried to accept Mr. Christensen's report as presented. Monseigneur Reilly commended Mr. Christensen and his committee for the outstanding accomplishments they had made towards resolving the problem. President Reilly then expressed his thanks

to the Council, the Executive Committee and the Commissioner for the assistance they had rendered to him during his term of office as President of the Council. He stated that it had been a pleasure to serve in this important capacity, and that he had learned much from this experience. The gavel was then turned over to Dr. Russell Reynolds, representative of the Arrowhead League, who will serve as president of the Council for the coming school year.

There being no further business to come before the Council, the meeting was adjourned at 12:30 p.m.
