## LONG BEACH MILLIKAN WINS TEAM GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP

## LONG BEACH WILSON CAPTURES FIRST DUAL MEET GYMNASTICS CHAMPIONSHIP

Coach Jack Elder's Bruins team had wins over La Serna and Muir High School before advancing to the finals. Fred Bellmar's Millikan team defeated Westminster and South Hills as they entered the finals.

The new gymnastics scoring system, where emphasis is placed on the entire team performance, has increased spectator interest and participant competitiveness in the sport of gymnastics.

**MINUTES OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING  
MAY 2, 1970**

The May meeting of the CIF, Southern Section, Executive Committee was called to order by Chairman Steve Miletich at 9:30 a.m. on Saturday, May 2, at the CIF State office in Santa Barbara. The following members were in attendance: Chairman Miletich, Vice Principal, Beverly Hills High School; Keith J. Lee, Principal, Yucca Valley High School; Claud Hardesty, Principal, Santa Barbara High School; Monsignor Thomas Kiefer, Principal, Bishop Amat High School; Keith Gunn, Principal, Victor Valley High School; James Faul, Principal, Workman High School; Alex Alexander, Assistant Superintendent, Desert Sands USD; Arthur Hobson, Assistant Superintendent, Whittier UHSD; Dr. Russell Reynolds, Principal, Big Bear High School; J. Kenneth Fagans, Commissioner of Athletics, and Lou Joseph, Administrative Assistant, CIF, Southern Section.

Guests in attendance were William W. Russell, State CIF Commissioner; Gene Hartley, Principal, San Marcos HS; Sheldon Hentschke, Athletic Director, San Marcos HS.

The group was greeted by our host, Bill Russell, the state CIF commissioner, who took the Executive Committee on a tour of the state offices.

**1. APPROVED MINUTES.** It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the executive committee meeting of March 14, 1970, as published in the April monthly bulletin.

**2. REINSTATEMENT OF COLBERT SCHOOL.** After repeated ef-

forts in notifying the Colbert School of their delinquency in paying their CIF, Southern Section, dues, the Commissioner suspended the Colbert School for the remainder of the 1969-70 school year. Schools in the Delphic League were notified that they could not participate in interscholastic athletics with the Colbert School. Upon payment of their dues, the Colbert School applied for reinstatement. It was moved, seconded and carried to place the Colbert School on probation and reinstate them for the 1970-71 school year if there will be assurance by the administration that the Colbert School will comply with all CIF, SS, regulations in the future.

**3. REQUEST FROM ORANGE UNIFIED DISTRICT** — Action by the Orange Unified District school board has changed boundary lines in the attendance area of El Modena and Villa Park High Schools. Due to this action by the board, it was moved, seconded and carried to permit the students affected by this change in boundaries to participate in spring football practice at the school the student will be attending in the fall.

**4. REVIEW OF 300 MILE TRAVEL RULE** — The State CIF has requested that each section review the 300 mile travel restriction. After considerable discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to recommend to the Southern Section council that the Southern Section endorse the concept of the 300 mile rule; that there are sufficient schools within our section for schools to schedule opponents and that the loss of school time and excessive transportation charges would be kept at a minimum if the present rule were retained. The committee also recommended in order to clarify the present state rule that it be amended to read as follows: "Schools be permitted to travel up to 300 miles to schedule interscholastic athletic contests with schools in adjoining states within the Continental United States and Mexico."

**5. REVIEW OF SAN JACINTO ELIGIBILITY REQUEST** — San Jacinto High School requested the Executive Committee to reconsider the eligibility of Tom Pedrola. It was moved, seconded and carried to DENY this request and not waive the residence eligibility rule for Tom Pedrola.

**6. REVIEW OF PENALTIES IMPOSED BY CIF, SOUTHERN SECTION.** The De Anza League requested the CIF, Southern Section, Executive Committee review its policy in regard to disciplinary measures imposed against schools who violate CIF, Southern Section, regulations. They

felt that recent letters of censure put in personnel files of Elsinore High School personnel by the Elsinore School board was extreme. The Committee directed the Commissioner to inform the De Anza League that the CIF, Southern Section, Executive Committee in no way was responsible for this action and that the specific action of denying Elsinore High School entry into the basketball play-offs was the only penalty imposed. The Executive Committee cannot be responsible for actions of other agencies or organizations.

**7. LIMITING LENGTH OF JV BASEBALL GAMES.** It has been brought to the attention of the Commissioner that in some junior varsity baseball games, when the score has become lopsided, the possibility be considered to establish a time limit. It was moved, seconded and carried to have the Commissioner survey the leagues as to their feeling on the two optional rules that are contained in the National Alliance rule book; one pertaining to the suspension of a game when, after 5 innings of a 7 inning game, a team is 10 or more points ahead and has completed its turn at bat, the game will be over; and secondly, if the schools wish to use the free substitution rule. In the 1968 CIF, SS, survey that was taken of the baseball coaches, they preferred not to exercise either of these options.

**8. GIRLS ATHLETIC ADVISORY COMMITTEE.** The Executive Committee directed the chairman to appoint a 5 woman committee to serve as an advisory committee to the girls' athletic program. During this discussion, the concept of girls being allowed to play on boys' teams was mentioned. It was stated that in 1967 when the Girls' Athletic by-laws and constitution were drawn up, it clearly indicated that there is a need for a girl's athletic program and it should be separate from the boys' program and that the athletic program at the present time has been established for participation only by boys.

**9. SAN MARCOS HIGH SCHOOL VIOLATION.** In conducting the Golden West Swim Meet held at the University of California, Santa Barbara, on February 14, swimmers were allowed to enter an excessive number of events. This is contrary to our CIF, Southern Section, swimming regulations which permit a boy to enter only three events. Mr. Gene Hartley, Principal, and Mr. Sheldon Hentschke, Athletic Director at San Marcos HS, appeared before the committee to explain why CIF, Southern Section were not followed. After con-

considerable discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried that a letter of reprimand be sent to San Marcos High School for not properly conducting a sanction event. In addition, it was felt that all CIF, Southern Section, personnel be reminded that it is the responsibility of every school that sponsors a sanction event to know the particular CIF rules which govern that sport or event. If they are sponsoring this in cooperation with a junior college, college or outside organization, they cannot relinquish the management responsibility to one of these groups — responsibility has to remain with the high school. No deviation can be made from the CIF, Southern Section, rules unless permission has been received from the Executive Committee.

**10. MEDICAL ADVISOR TO CIF, SOUTHERN SECTION.** Recently a letter was received in the CIF, SS, office from Dr. H. Kay Dooley, a practicing physician in Pomona, who indicated that after looking at the membership on our Executive Committee and Council, he found no one with a background in medicine. Because of the nature of our athletic program he felt that a man with medical training would be a valuable asset to our committee. Dr. Dooley volunteered his services without remuneration as a medical advisor to the CIF, SS.

The matter was then thoroughly discussed and the committee expressed appreciation for Dr. Dooley's generous offer. It was felt, however, that more study should be conducted before a decision is reached in the matter. The Commissioner was, therefore, directed to contact the California Medical Association to learn whether or not they had a committee that might serve in this capacity, or whether we should try to solicit the aid of a practicing physician. The Commissioner was directed to report back at the September meeting of the Executive Committee.

**11. RETIREMENT PROGRAM.** The Commissioner brought to the attention of the committee that at the present time, we have no retirement program other than Social Security for members of the CIF, SS, office staff. The matter of retirement was then discussed and suggestions were made that information be secured from related school organizations and other retirement agencies to learn whether or not a retirement program might be feasible for office personnel. Mr. Joseph was directed to research this matter and report back at the next meeting of the Executive Committee.

**12. STATE TRACK MEET.** The Commissioner informed the committee that housing and transportation arrangements have been made for CIF, SS, athletes and coaches who will qualify for participation in the State High School Track and Field Meet, to be held at the University of California, Berkeley, on June 6 and 7, 1970. In accordance with past policy the CIF, SS, will provide free air transportation and bus service while in the Bay Area for qualified athletes and coaches.

As all athletes and coaches will be staying at the Claremont Hotel, the commissioner recommended that the CIF, SS, assume hotel bills for all of the official party. This would mean that the participating schools would only be responsible for getting their athletes to and from the L. A. airport and for meal expense incurred while in Berkeley.

A discussion of the matter revealed that the majority of the Executive Committee were in favor of assisting our member schools financially whenever possible. It was therefore moved, seconded and carried that the CIF, SS, assume all costs for qualified athletes and coaches involving transportation and lodging in connection with the State Track Meet.

**13. SAN GABRIEL MISSION HS ELIGIBILITY CASE.** Official notice has been received in the CIF, SS, office that effective with the close of the current school year, San Gabriel Mission High School will officially close its doors. The school will be open in the fall to take care of those seniors who wish to remain and graduate, but any athletic program carried on will be a very limited one.

To insure an orderly transfer of boys from San Gabriel Mission to other high schools, our Executive Committee directed that the names of all boys transferring to other schools next fall be submitted to the Commissioner. When these lists were officially approved in the CIF office, those students transferring to other schools would then become eligible to participate in the new school's spring football practice.

After submitting the names of students transferring to Bishop Amat High School, a communication was received from San Gabriel Mission HS indicating that Mark Upstill had changed his mind and preferred to go to Bishop Amat, rather than to Keppel High School. It was therefore requested that Mark be permitted to enroll at Amat High School, without loss of athletic eligibility.

It was pointed out that CIF policy in matters of this kind has always provided that a boy be given one opportunity to transfer and that any subsequent choice would be governed by our existing transfer rule. It was, therefore, moved, seconded and carried that Mark Upstill not be granted athletic eligibility at Bishop Amat High School.

**14. ELIGIBILITY CASES.** After a careful consideration of each case it was moved, seconded and carried to waive our residence rule to permit Antonio Moya of Pacifica HS; Leo Begay of Palmdale HS, Michael Ser-gott of Western HS, and Richard Terrill of Paramount HS to be immediately eligible for interscholastic athletics.

It was moved, seconded and carried to DENY the request to waive the semesters of competition rule for Don Barbray, North Torrance, for the Spring semester of 1971.

It was moved, seconded and carried to DENY the request to waive the residence and scholastic rule for Allen Hanson, Rosemead HS.

There being no further business to come before the Executive Committee, the meeting adjourned at 12:15 p.m.

# MINUTES OF CIF, SOUTHERN SECTION, COUNCIL MEETING — MAY 9, 1970

The spring meeting of the CIF, Southern Section Council was held on Saturday, May 9, 1970, at Beverly Hills High School. The meeting was called to order at 9:35 a.m. by Council president, Dr. Russ Reynolds, Principal, Big Bear HS. Representatives of all but the CAMINO REAL, CHAPARRAL, CONDOR, DESERT INYO, HI-LO, PREP and SAN LUIS Leagues were in attendance.

Steve Miletich, Assistant Principal of our host school, Beverly Hills HS, welcomed the group. The following guests were in attendance: Ted Gosard, Principal, Aviation HS; Tony Balsamo, Principal, Apple Valley HS; John Ford, Past President, Southern California Football Coaches' Association; Jack Rankin, Assistant Principal, San Marino HS; George Richardson, Assistant Principal, Arcadia HS; Bob Herrold, Secretary of the Foothill League and Clair Vanhourebeke, Anaheim HS.

**1. APPROVED MINUTES** — It was moved, seconded and carried to approve council meeting minutes of January 31, 1970, as published in the March 1970 bulletin. It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of March 14 as published in the April monthly bulletin. It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the May 12, 1970, Executive Committee meeting as reported by the Commissioner.

**2. SMOG COMMITTEE REPORT** — Dr. Kenneth Bullock, Principal, San Marino High School, the chairman of the smog committee, reported on the progress of the smog committee and presented their recommendations to the Council. It was moved, seconded and carried to accept the proposal of the smog committee but for guideline purposes only for the school year 1970-71, the guideline being:

"No interscholastic athletic contest may be conducted when the smog ozone count reaches the school smog warning stage of 0.35 at the site of the contest. The determination as to whether or not the ozone count has reached 0.35 shall be the responsibility of the principal of the home school or his designated representative. If a contest is cancelled or postponed because of smog conditions, the rescheduling of such a contest would have to be mutually agreed upon by officials of both schools."

It was suggested that the smog committee meet this summer to continue study of the problem and develop fur-

ther recommendations. The president thanked Dr. Bullock and members of his committee, Dr. French of Fullerton, Dr. Drake of Santa Monica, and Art Hobson of Whittier Union High School District for their work on this committee.

**3. CLASSIFICATION COMMITTEE REPORT** — Don Cogswell, Bay League representative, and chairman of the Classification Committee, gave a progress report on that committee's study of the exponent system. It was moved, seconded and carried that for the 1970-71 school year: "In all sports, schools on grade classification, by mutual consent, be allowed to compete against schools who classify by the exponent system." A roll call vote was taken on the by-laws change and a 2/3 "Aye" vote carried the motion. The classification committee was directed to continue study and formulate further proposals for classification. The president thanked Mr. Cogswell and members of his committee for their work on this important problem.

**4. SPORTS REGULATION COMMITTEE** — Dick Cordano, Principal, Arcadia HS, Pacific League representative, submitted the Sports Regulation Committee's recommendation for the starting dates of water polo and swimming. It was moved, seconded and carried to adopt the recommendation of this committee. Water polo practice for 1970-71 may begin Monday, August 31. Swimming practice may begin on Monday, January 4, 1971. No interschool swimming scrimmage or competition may be held prior to Monday, February 1.

**5. RELEAGUING COMMITTEE REPORT** — Ferren Christensen, member of the releguing committee, gave a progress report on the releguing alignment for 1971-72. He stated that on Tuesday, May 19, at 3 p.m., all schools that are dissatisfied with the present alignment should be present at this meeting to express their concern.

**6. LIFE PASS AWARDS** — Due to their outstanding dedication and contributions over the years to the CIF, Southern Section, Keith Gunn, Principal of Victory Valley HS, and Claud Hardesty, Principal of Santa Barbara HS, were awarded CIF, Southern Section, life passes as they begin retirement July 1, 1970. In addition, Mr. A. R. Veenker, retired administrator at Santa Monica and member of CIF, Southern Section executive committee and council, was presented with a life pass in recognition of his past contributions.

**7. RESIDENCE ELIGIBILITY RULE** — Because of certain alleged recruiting incidents, a few years ago a by-laws regulations was passed to limit the residence eligibility of junior high school graduates. Instead of eliminating recruiting of 9th grade students, it simply caused persons who were interested in securing good athletes to concentrate on 8th grade students. The new rule caused problems in public high schools where districts needed to enroll students in other high schools in a district because of subject selection, lack of facilities, or to create ethnic balance. It was therefore moved, seconded and carried to rescind Article X, Section 3, A and B, and state that a boy has residence eligibility when he enters any Southern Section high school as a graduate of the ninth grade of a Jr. HS.

**8. 300 MILE TRAVEL RULE** — It was moved, seconded and carried to direct our state representatives to vote in favor of maintaining the present state regulation of restriction schools to 300 miles in scheduling interscholastic athletic contests.

**9. INCREASE IN NUMBER OF BASEBALL GAMES** — The Pioneer League has recommended that Article XXXIX, Section 5, be amended to allow schools to schedule 22 baseball games. They stated the following reasons for this proposal: (a) that it coincides with the number of games now authorized for basketball; that in some leagues a 15 game schedule is played with participation in an Easter week tournament leaving only three practice games and two scrimmages to prepare a team for the league season; (b) baseball is a game meant to be played, not practiced to excess; (c) it gives those boys coming out from basketball and wrestling an equal opportunity to make the team. It was moved, seconded and carried to adopt this recommendation effective with the 1970-71 school year.

**10. CIF, SOUTHERN SECTION, COURTESY CARDS** — The Freeway League proposed that CIF passes be honored for all basketball play-off games, since many of the later games are now being played in large gymnasiums and seating is really no longer a problem. It was moved, seconded and carried to adopt this proposal of the Freeway League and allow CIF passes to be honored during the Basketball Play-offs.

**11. FACULTY PERMITTED TO ATTEND PLAY-OFF GAMES** — The Freeway League recommended

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that faculty of participating schools in the play-offs be admitted free to all CIF play-off games. It was moved, seconded and carried to adopt this recommendation.

**12. TRACK AND FIELD 8 DAY COMPETITION RULE** — The Freeway League proposed that interschool competition in track and field not be restricted to the 8-day practice period for boys who have been out for a previous sport and come out for the track team as soon as the previous sport season ends. It was moved, seconded and defeated not to change this regulation. It was suggested that a question of this nature be directed to the County Medical Association committee on sports for their opinion.

**13. PLAY-OFF GROUPINGS FOR 1970-71.** The Commissioner presented football, baseball and basketball play-off groupings for 1970-71. It was moved, seconded and carried to accept the Commissioner's proposal. Play-off groupings are as follows:

**14. ELECTION OF OFFICERS** — Election of officers was held and the following men were selected to represent the CIF, Southern Section: State Federated Council, Office A, 3 year term—Keith Lee, Principal, Yucca Valley HS; State Federated Council, Office B, 4 year term—Ferren Christensen, Principal, Westminister HS; Executive Committee, Desert Area, 4 year term—Alex Alexander, Assistant Superintendent, Desert Sands Unified

School District; Executive Committee, Los Angeles County, 4 year term—Dick Cordano, Principal, Arcadia HS; Executive Committee, Citrus Belt Area, 2 year term, Tony Balsamo, Principal, Apple Valley HS.

**15. INTERSCHOOL FOOTBALL SCRIMMAGE** — During the past few years, abuses have taken place during the interschool football scrimmages. Many schools have been holding their scrimmage at night and have publicized the activity, solicited donations from booster clubs, and included three and even four schools in the activity, and in general have made the interschool football scrimmage like a regular practice game. In reviewing this problem, the Executive Committee felt that the activity should be a controlled scrimmage in the afternoon with spectators not in attendance, and therefore recommended that Article XLII, Section 23, Paragraph B, be amended as follows:

"The following conditions shall govern inter-school scrimmages:

1. A team is permitted one interschool scrimmage which must be held prior to the first game of the regular season.

2. Only two teams may be involved and such scrimmage shall not start after 6:00 p.m., nor may the lights be turned on.

3. Officials may be used.

4. No admission may be charged, donations may not be collected or solicited and spectators shall not be encouraged to attend. (Special arrangements shall not be made to invite Booster Club members to the scrimmage.)

5. A scrimmage is defined as practice where the teams alternate in carrying the ball, downs are not counted, no score is kept, and the coaches are on the field directing play."

It was moved, seconded and carried to accept this recommendation by the Executive Committee and make it effective immediately with the 1970 football season.

**16. SUMMER FOOTBALL CAMPS** — Between June 15 and the authorized date for starting of regular organized football practice in September, a member school or its representative shall not directly or indirectly conduct any type of team instruction or practice. The rule further prohibits participation in an instructional recreation program which stresses instruction in football. Since the intent of the rule was to prohibit coaches from working with their boys during the summer, it was moved, seconded and carried to

permit boys to enroll in summer foot-  
ball camps whether they are diversified  
or not, as long as there are no members  
of their high school football staff on  
the instructional staff.

**17. GLENDALE HS BASEBALL REQUEST** — The American Legion baseball program is beginning two weeks earlier than usual. It was felt that since the baseball season of a school is completed, that there would be no advantage in the baseball coach working with members of his team in American Legion baseball prior to June 1, as long as the season of that team is over. He would normally handle these boys again in two weeks under our present regulations. It was moved, seconded and carried to permit baseball coaches to coach their team in legion baseball as soon as their high school season has ended.

**18. SPRING FOOTBALL IN FULL GEAR** — The Sunset League requested, on an experimental basis, in cooperation with the Moore and Angelus League, to be allowed to conduct their spring football practice in full gear. A comprehensive study and evaluation would be reported back to the Council in September as to number of injuries, the financial problems and if the philosophy of over-emphasis was present. It was moved, seconded and carried that since this matter was not on the prepared agenda, league representatives were not able to discuss this with their respective leagues, that it be tabled.

There being no further business to come before the council, the meeting was adjourned at 12:15 p.m. to a luncheon hosted by Beverly Hills High School and a tour of their new materials and student center.

BASEBALL VIOLATION

It is evident from the number of reports of forfeits and boys being taken off baseball squads that many baseball coaches are not familiar with the regulations that prohibit members of their team from playing or practicing with Pony League, Babe Ruth League, and other recreation sponsored teams. Section 6 of Article XXXIX of the baseball regulations is as follows:

"After the beginning of the season of the sport a member of a high school baseball team (varsity, junior varsity, sophomore or freshman team) may not practice, work out or try out with a community, recreation or other similarly sponsored baseball team prior to May 1. The season of the sport of baseball is defined as that period which starts with the first inter-school contest (practice game, inter-school scrimmage, league game, or tournament) and ends with the last contest (league, non-league, or play-off games). On or after May 1 he may practice, work out or try out only on weekends until the close of the high school baseball season. A boy may not start playing in baseball games on one of these outside sponsored teams while he is a member of a high school baseball team.

Annual Summer PE & COACHES' WORKSHOP AT CAL POLY S.L.O.

John Ralston, Head football coach at Stanford University, Dr. Thomas Cureton, Director of the Physical Fitness Laboratory at the University of Illinois and Stan Wright, varsity track and field coach at Sacramento State College, head the faculty for the 23rd Annual California Workshop for Physical Education and Athletic Coaching Instructors.

The two sessions are scheduled on the campus of California Polytechnic College, San Luis Obispo, for August 3-7 and August 10-14.

Outstanding coaching and physical education personalities will be featured at these workshops which annually attract over 500 California men and women physical educators and coaches.

WATTS SUMMER GAMES

The CIF, SS, is pleased to endorse the Watts Summer Games scheduled for June 27 and 28, and publish the following information for use by CIF, SS, schools.

Two new sports have been added this year to the Watts Summer Games athletic event sponsored jointly by the Los Angeles Junior Chamber of Commerce and Pacific Mutual Life Insurance Company.

Soccer and wrestling will be added to track and field, basketball, swimming, volleyball and gymnastics. The Watts Summer Games (formerly Watts Junior Olympics) are scheduled for Saturday, June 27, and Sunday, June 28, at California State College at Los Angeles. Preliminaries will be held during the week if required.

The sponsors announced that high school athletic directors from Los Angeles and Orange Counties are receiving registration forms and instructions in the mail. Deadline for registering individuals and teams is May 27.

Last year almost 600 boys from more than 60 schools representing every community in the Los Angeles area participated in the event.

This year for the first time, girls are being added to the event. They will compete in swimming only, which has been sanctioned by the AAU.

Some interesting changes in track were announced. Replacing the normal hurdles event will be the 220 and 330 intermediate hurdle races. In track and field, boys will compete in one of three age classifications: 15 and under, 16 and over and Open. The Open class is expected to be the stronger athletes.

Basketball competition will be in varsity and junior varsity. Last year Morningside defeated Jordan in the finals.

The sponsors are asking for help from the schools in relaying the information and registration forms to interested youngsters.

"DOC" SOOTER, COVINA, RECEIVES DISTRICT 8 "COACH OF THE YEAR" AWARD

Doc Sooter, for twenty two years the age mentor at Covina High School, has been honored as the District 8 Coach of the Year by the National High School Athletic Coaches' Association. District 8 is composed of California, Washington, Oregon, Nevada, Arizona, Utah, Idaho, Montana, New Mexico, Hawaii and Alaska.

Sooter's record at Covina has been 498 victories compared to only 135 defeats. He has won the League Championship 14 times and from 1959 to 1969 missed the title only in 1964, and has finished second 4 times. Prior to coming to Covina, he coached in Missouri four years and won 4 consecutive championships.

The selection of Coach of the Year for District 8 was based not only on records but what a coach has done in the past to further basketball and youth in general. Doc has impressive credentials in both categories.

As coach at Covina, Sooter founded and nurtured the Christmas Basketball Tournament. The tourney, a 32 team affair, is one of the largest in the United States. Doc advanced from the physical education department in 1967 to full time counseling, but still continues as hoop mentor.

Aside from school, Doc organized a youth athletic program in Covina, was the first player agent for Little League in 1954, past president of the Southern California Basketball Coaches Association, and has helped not only Boy Scouts, but also Girl Scouts and countless other organizations. He is the proud father of three children and has one son graduated from college, another graduating this year and daughter Julie in the 9th grade.

TRACK INTERPRETATION

For the benefit of track coaches, Section 8 of Article XLVIII, Track and Field Regulations, is interpreted as follows:

In any Class A meet, a boy may enter a total of not more than 4 events including relays. He could enter two track and one field or one track and two field plus the relays. If a boy wishes to enter a second relay, he may do so by substituting the second relay for one of the track events. He could enter two relays, one track and one field event. Under no circumstances could a boy enter 3 track events. He may compete in only one of the 660, 880, mile and two mile events. He may not enter two field and two track events unless one of the track events is a relay.

There have been some violations of this rule this past season in that coaches have entered boys in two track and two field events with neither track event being a relay. This is illegal and you would have to forfeit your meet if you are guilty of this violation due to the fact that you now have an ineligible competitor participating.
