Three distinguished educators who are retiring at the end of the school year, were honored at the CIF, SS spring council meeting for outstanding service rendered to the Section. The three who received Gold Life Passes were Jim Kemp, principal at Keppel High in Alhambra R. H. "Bud" Ewing vice-principal of Atascadero; and Verrill Townsend, principal of Orange High School.

Kemp, who began his teaching career in 1934 at El Segundo, has served 16 years in administration at Alhambra Schools. He has also been a basketball and football official for 30 years. The current president of the Pacific League, he has twice been a council member. Dr. Richard W. Cordano, principal of Arcadia HS and current member of the executive committee presented Kemp with his pass.

A council member since 1961, Bud Ewing made as many as 15 round trips between Atascadero and the metropolitan Los Angeles area during his tenure as council president 10 years ago. His dedication to CIF activities was outlined by Commissioner Ken Fagans, during the presentation of his pass.

Townsend has been an employee of the Orange Unified district for 36 years, beginning as an English teacher in 1935. For the past 17 years he's served as Orange High's principal and has been the council representative from the Crestview League for five years. In presenting the Life Pass, former executive committee member and CIF Administrative Assistant Lou Joseph described Townsend as "the type of person you want to work for."

Life passes are awarded periodically to those persons who have contributed to the CIF, SS program, and are honored for admission to all CIF-sanctioned events.

# COACHES GROUP ANNOUNCES REVIVAL OF CITY-CIF CAGE TILT

Walt Bynum, of Rolling Hills, incoming president of the Southern California Interscholasitic Basketball Coaches Association, and general game chairman Ollie Butler of Victor Valley have announced that with the help of the Southern California district of Lions International, the CIF vs. City All-Star basketball game will be revived this summer.

The game was first held in 1968, but was suspended last year. With new sponsorship the attraction for the best of the graduated seniors from the L.A. City Section and the CIF's AAAA division has been scheduled for July 14 at the L.A. Sports Arena.

A preliminary game involving AAA, AA and A players in a North vs. South alignment, will begin at 7:30 p.m. with the feature game to follow.

Coaches for the two games have already been selected. Willie West, coach of City champion Crenshaw High, will oppose Howard Lyon, who guided Millikan High to the CIF AAAA title in 1970. Don Volpi of Dos Pueblos and Jack Bogdanovich of Bellflower will clash once again in the prelim game. The two met for the AAA CIF title last March, with Volpi's Chargers winning.

Players on the various teams, and such details as ticket availability will be released by the Lions Club later, according to chairman Butler. Each team will be made up of 12 players.

## MINUTES OF CIF, SS, COUNCIL MEETING May 1, 1971

The Spring meeting of the CIF, Southern Section, Council was held on Saturday, May 1, 1971, at Villa Park High School. The meeting was called to order at 9:30 a.m. by Council President Mr. Donald Cogswell, Vice-Principal, Mira Costa High School.

Representatives from all but the following leagues were in attendance: ANGELUS, CONDOR, DELPHIC, and HI-LO.

Mr. Lou Joseph, Principal, Villa Park High School, welcomed the Council to his school.

1. APPROVAL OF MINUTES. It was moved, seconded, and passed to approve the minutes of the Council meeting of January 30, 1971, as published in the February, 1971, Monthly Bulletin.

It was moved, seconded, and passed to approve the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of March 27, 1971, as published in the April, 1971, Monthly Bulletin.

2. COMMITTEE REPORTS. a. RELEAGUING. Rev. Alexander Manville (Principal, Bishop Diego High School), Chairman, Releaguing Committee, presented a brief report to the Council concerning releaguing for the 1972-73 school year. He indicated that the committee had met several times already, and that the preliminary releaguing recommendations would be sent to all CIF, SS, member schools in the near future.

Rev. Manville further reported the results of the recent releaguing survey conducted among principals and superintendents, and revealed that the survey showed that school enrollment was

considered to be the single most im portant factor in grouping schools into leagues.

b. CROWD CONTROL COMMIT TEE. Dr. Richard Cordano (Principal) Arcadia High School), Chairman Crowd Control Committee, reported to the Council that his committee has recommended that the conference on crowd control scheduled for Septem ber be conducted as a one-day clinic on the following two dates: Thurs day, September 2, at Rosemead High School, and Tuesday, September 7, Beverly Hills High School. The committee felt that it would be best to sponsor the conference on these two different dates in order to provide school administrators with an opportunity to select the session which they would prefer to attend.

Dr. Cordano presented other preliminary information regarding the conference, and stated that it would be expected that every CIF, SS, member school would be represented by the principal or his delegated representative. He emphasized that while many areas have not yet faced crowd control problems, it is still necessary and vital, especially with our extensive playoff program, that all schools be informed of recommended procedures for anticipating and resolving potential problem areas.

The Council moved, seconded, and passed to approve the recommendations of the committee, and further authorized the development of a policy handbook which would contain an enforcement code for use in administering crowd control incidents which

are reported. c. PLAYOFF COMMITTEE. Mr. Ted Andrews (Vice-Principal, Creecenta Valley High School), Chairman Playoff Committee, presented proposed playoff groupings for the 1971-71 school year for the sports of football basketball, baseball, and tennis. It was moved, seconded, and passed to approve these groupings with the follow ing changes:

1. The Whitmont League, at its own request, will be elevated to the AAAA division for all sports;

2. The Tri-Country League will be added to the AA division for the sport of tennis.

Beach averaged 7.28 for the six events, and is a sophomore.

In the team championships at El Rancho High, Lakewood grabbed the lead on the second event, free exercise, but had to hold off a strong Westminster performance in the final test, the rings, to take the title with 149.76, a seasonal high total for CIF, SS schools. Westminster, which had the all-around leader in Ruzics, scored 148.30 and South Hills trailed with 137.25. For coach Dick Flood, it was the second CIF title in four years.

It was Lakewood depth that captured the team title. Only John Herried, who went on to become the sectional individual champ in the side horse, was an event winner for the Lancers in the team competition. They had at least two men in the top five in each event except the rings.

South Hills' Deon Carrico topped the long horse competitors, Ruzics won the free exercise and high bar on his way to the all-around leadership, Steve Munson of Westminster won the parallel bars and Gene Johnson, the 1970 individual champ captured the rings for Westminster.

The two top teams, not surprisingly, battled for supremacy among the individuals at Anaheim HS, with Lakewood coming up with three champs in Herried, Glen Tidwell in the parallel bars and Mark Wheel in the rings. The Lancers averaged 8.07 per competitor overall in unofficial team totals. Westminster scored higher (with more competitors) and averaged 7.08.

Beach was a medalist in the parallel bars (fourth) and free exercise (fifth) as well as winning the high bar.

Rod Moore of San Gabriel and Wheel scored mild upsets in their events, Moore capturing the long horse. Mike Zapp gave Pasadena a first in

the free-ex.

Good crowds were on hand for both competitions, with commendations due Frank Mazzotta at El Rancho and Larry Bestmann at Anaheim for their management efforts.

(Continued from Page 2) School), Chairman, Girls' Interscholastic Athletics Committee, informed the Council of the results of the survey which was conducted recently among principals of CIF, SS, member schools with regard to the administration of girls' athletics. Mr. O'Rourke stated that these results were overwhelmingly in favor of the CIF, SS, being the proper organization to provide leadership for the regulation of girls' athletics. The survey further revealed that this leadership should be initiated as soon as possible with a study to determine the most effective methods by which to proceed, and that member schools are in favor of an increase in CIF, SS, membership dues in order to underwrite the additional funding required for this project.

The Council endorsed the recommendation of the committee that the results of the survey provided a mandate for the CIF, SS, to assume the management of girls' athletics, and moved, seconded, and passed that a permanent committee be created to further study specific areas and to recommend guidelines for the organization of a girls' athletic program under the direction of the CIF, SS.

- 3. INCREASE IN NUMBER OF WRESTLING MATCHES. The Council moved, seconded, and passed to DEFEAT the proposal submitted by the Bay League to increase the number of allowable wrestling matches from 16 to 20. Wrestling teams will therefore be allowed to schedule 16 matches for the 1971-72 season in accordance with paragraph 4, Article LI (Wrestling Regulations) of the CIF, SS, Blue Book.
- 4. LENGTH OF CROSS COUN-TRY COURSE. The Council moved, seconded, and passed to DEFEAT the proposal submitted by the Moore League to increase the length of the course in the preliminary and championship cross country meets from two to three miles. The course will remain at two miles as indicated in paragraph 13, Article XXXXII (Cross Country Regulations) of the CIF, SS, Blue Book.
- 5. NIGHT FOOTBALL SCRIM-MAGES. The Council moved, seconded, and passed to approve the proposal submitted by the Moore League to eliminate the restriction that "no inter-school scrimmage shall start after 6:00 p.m." in order to permit preseason inter-school football scrimmages to be conducted at night. Paragraph 23 (B) (4) of Article XXXXIII (Football Regulations) of the CIF, SS, Blue Book has been amended to read as follows: "Only two teams may be in-

TOTAL CONTROL OF THE PROPERTY KNOW YOUR BLUE BOOK: **RULES FOR SUMMER ACTIVITIES** 

OUESTION: What are the CIF, SS, regulations governing organized summer athletic competition and contact between high school coaches and their prospective team members during the summer?

ANSWER: From June 1 until the opening day of school in the fall semester, there is no restriction on high school coaches working with high school boys or entering them in summer competition in any sport except football. However, a member school may not pay entry fees. permit the use of school uniforms or equipment, provide insurance, or furnish transportation for summer league competition in any sport.

volved in an inter-school scrimmage;" all other by-laws pertaining to fall football practice as listed on pages 67 and 68 of the Blue Book remain in effect. Night scrimmages may be scheduled, if schools desire, beginning with the 1971 season.

6. NOISEMAKERS, BASKET-BALL AND FOOTBALL GAMES. The Executive Committee, in accordance with instructions from the Council, studied the reported problems caused by the use of mechanical noisemakers and cheering devices at practice and league basketball games and recommended that the present CIF, SS, rule prohibiting such devices at playoff games be expanded to apply to all basketball games. The Council moved, seconded, and passed to approve that the following regulation be added to Section XXXXI (Basketball Regulations) of the Blue Book:

No mechanical noisemakers (horns, bells, victory bells, sirens, chimes, musical instruments other than those in the band, etc.) will be permitted inside the gymnasium at any CIF, SS, basketball game (practice, league, tournament, or playoff). Cheering devices such as wooden blocks, or other similar objects, are prohibited. Megaphones shall be used only by uniformed cheerleaders for the purpose of directing and controlling rooting sections. The improper use of any of the above-listed devices by supporters of a team would subject that team to possible forfeiture of the contest.

It was further moved, seconded, and passed to direct the Commissioner to prepare a similar rule to apply to all CIF, SS, football games (practice, league, and playoff) and to add it to Section XXXXIII (Football Regulations) of the Blue Book.

7. ELECTION OF OFFICERS. Mr. Truck Lindsey (Athletic Director, Chaffey High School), Chairman, Nominating Committee, supervised the election of CIF, Southern Section, officers for the 1971-72 school year. Following are the results of the election: a) Executive Committee (Metropolitan Los Angeles County district, 4-year

term) - Mr. James Faul, Principal Workman High School; b) Executive Committee (Northern district, 4-year term) - Rev. Alexander Manville. Principal, Bishop Diego High School c) State Federated Council (4-year term) - Mr. Alex Alexander, Prince pal, Desert Sands High School

8. SUMMER SCHOOL CREDITS Discussion was held concerning a new rule recently approved by the State CIF Federated Council which would allow credits earned during summer school to be counted towards athletic eligibility. The present CIF, Southern Section, regulation pertaining to summer school credits, as listed in paragraph 4, Article X (Scholastic Requirements) of the Blue Book, states that work taken in summer school counts neither for nor against a boy in determining athletic eligibility. It was felt that this matter should be studied in more detail, and the Council moved seconded, and passed to table the subject until the fall meeting. The Commissioner was directed to appoint a committee to investigate this proposal and to prepare a recommendation for presentation to the Council.

9. CLASSIFICATION OF ATH LETIC TEAMS. The Council discussed at length the following recommendations for the 1971-72 school year as presented by the Classification Committee at the meeting of January 30,

a) That CIF, SS, schools continue at this time to follow the exponent system in classifying boys for teams in the sports of swimming, water poloand track and field, with further study of the matter to be conducted by the committee:

b) That the sport of basketball continue as it is presently being conducted with each league making its own determination as to the type of teams to be fielded;

c) That in the sport of football the CIF, SS, experiment during the 1971 season with teams classified as Varsing Junior Varsity, and the balance of the teams according to grade level fie

Sophomore, Freshman, Frosh-Soph). Seniors would be eligible for Junior Varsity teams.

It was moved and seconded to approve the recommendations of the committee.

Mr. Jack Mele, Whitmont League representative, proposed an amendment to the above motion which would permit those leagues which desired to do so to remain with the exponent system for football. Mr. Mele indicated that his league felt there is enough experience at this point to provide the information needed for a decision on the matter of exponents vs. grade level competition without requiring all leagues to field grade level football teams during the 1971 season. This amendment was defeated by a vote of

The Council then considered the original motion, and, by a vote of 27-17, approved the recommendations of the committee. It will be mandatory for all CIF, SS, member schools to field football teams on a grade level basis for a one-year experimental period during the 1971 season. Schools would, according to their size, have Varsity, Junior Varsity, Sophomore, Freshman, or Frosh-Soph football teams. If, after the above teams have been fielded in accordance with the directive, there are still smaller boys who wish to participate in football, a

school would have the option to organize a Class C team.

This trial basis for grade level footbal teams during the 1971 season is hoped to provide the necessary information and experience for all schools and leagues to properly evaluate the matter of exponents vs. grade level competition.

Later in the meeting, Dr. Kenneth Bullock, Rio Hondo League representative, introduced a motion stating that since the CIF, SS, had elected to eliminate exponent teams in the sport of football for 1971-72, then exponent teams should also be eliminated in the other sports of basketball, track and field, swimming, and water polo on a one-year experimental basis for 1971-72. The total athletic programs at all member schools would then be consistent with the experience of a trial basis for grade level teams. The motion was seconded, and the stipulation was added that the vote on this motion would be by mail ballot of league representatives with the implied fact that this matter will be presented and discussed at league meetings. The motion was passed, and the Commissioner was instructed to send the mail ballots to league representatives and request that they be returned by June 1 so that the results of the vote could be announced prior to the close of the school year.

10. EXPONENT RULE INTER-PRETATION, LA CANADA HIGH SCHOOL. The Commissioner in-

formed the Council that it had been reported and verified that La Canada High School had permitted two student-athletes who measured less in height than the previous year to compete on its Class B track team this season. Paragraph 6 of Article XXXVIII (Exponent Classification) of the CIF, SS, Blue Book states that "no boy shall measure less in height than the previous classification or year for exponent classification purposes Information was presented to the Council concerning the exponents that had been reported for each boy and their actual current height and weight measurements.

The question asked of the Council for official interpretation was whether or not this violation of the rule should make the athletes ineligible this year for Class B competition. This would of course, necessitate forfeiture of all meets in which the boys had participated.

Mr. James Eaton, athletic director La Canada High School, appeared before the Council to explain that this had been an error by the school in not carefully checking the heights which had been previously reported for these athletes. He also indicated that this height differential was due to the lengths of the haircuts these boys had at the times they were measured

After considerable discussion, the Council moved, seconded, and passed to declare the two athletes ineligible

the Blue Book be amended accordingly.

13. OUTSIDE COMPETITION. SWIMMING. The State CIF Federated Council recently approved a new rule which would allow a member of a high school swimming team to compete in two additional, or a total of three. outside meets during the season of the sport. The present CIF, SS, regulation, as listed in paragraph 7 of Article XXXXVII (Swimming Regulations), allows only unattached individual entry in the SPAAU and National AAU championship meets during the season of the sport. The Council discussed whether or not to amend the Southern Section rule to be in conformance with the new State rule, and then moved, seconded, and passed to refer this matter to the leagues for discussion before bringing it back to the Council for a vote at the September meeting.

14. CONTACT BY COACHES WITH 8TH AND 9TH GRADE STUDENTS IN JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOLS. The subject of allowable contact by senior high school coaches with 8th and 9th grade students in junior high schools was discussed by the Council. It was concluded that it would not be possible to establish a section-wide policy which could assure effective control of this matter because of the great diversity of school and district organization among CIF, SS, members. The Council moved, seconded, and passed to delegate to member leagues this responsibility of establishing guidelines governing the contact with junior high school students by senior high school coaches. This would govern all forms of contact, including the involvement of participation by 8th and 9th graders on teams composed of high school boys in summer athletic leagues.

However, leagues could not set aside paragraph 28 of Article XXXXIII (Football Regulations) concerning participation by 8th and 9th graders in the spring football practice at the high school. The rule which denies high school coaches the right to conduct spring football practice at elementary or junior high schools involving boys from those schools would also still be in effect.

The Commissioner was instructed to make the appropriate corrections in the Blue Book to reflect this new policy.

15. FOOTBALL REGULATIONS The Council was presented with a request from high school coaches who serve on the Board of Directors of the Southern California Football Coaches' Association to modify certain CIF, SS, regulations governing the activity of high school football coaches and players who have further high school eligi-

bility. The coaches, several of whom appeared before the Council to offer information and answer questions, were concerned with the fact that players and coaches in all sports except football are permitted to conduct practice sessions and participate in recreational leagues during the summer vacation period. They feel that the present rules should be relaxed in order to permit certain football activity during the summer months.

Following are the recommendations which were proposed to the Council: 1) That schools be allowed to organize flag or touch football teams in summer recreation leagues without limitation as to the number of players on that team from a particular high school and that high school coaches could manage, direct, or coach such teams (Note: These teams could not, however, be officially sponsored by the high school); 2) That restricted football practice (i.e., no live tackling, no protective equipment, etc.) or conditioning could be conducted during a regular physical education class which is part of the high school's summer school program; and 3) That during the period from the close of school in June until the start of fall practice, high school football coaches would be permitted to instruct boys with further high school eligibility in the skills of the sport of football, with certain restrictions as to uniform, equipment, etc., in effect.

The Council moved, seconded, and passed to refer each of the above three items to league representatives by mail for a poll among their member schools with the instructions that the ballot must be returned to the CIF, SS, Office by June 1, 1971, in order that the Commissioner may inform all schools of the results as soon as possible. If the vote is favorable, these recommendations would be adopted for the summer of 1971.

16. BASKETBALL SEASON. Mr. Charles Clustka, Olympic League representative, introduced a proposal to the Council to begin the basketball season one week later than presently scheduled. The recommendation is that the basketball playoff dates begin one week later, and that the opening date for the first game be December 8 instead of December 1. The basic reason for this proposal, as stated by the Olympic League, is that there are a great number of boys, especially in the smaller schools, who play both football and basketball. The extra week between the seasons would allow additional time for the transition from football to basketball and preparation for
