COTHILL TAKES ANOTHER SWIMMING CROWN

Foothill High School didn't have as asy a romp this time around, but the hights won their second consecutive mining championship at Belmont laza May 5.

Tom DeLong's team won only one ment, but it was worth 32 points—the word freestyle relay. The fourme of Peter Spurzem, Bill Smith, Dave Sodaro, and Larry Johnson and a record time of 3:15.4, breaking

their own week-old mark.

Foothill had 131 points to Sunny Hills' 1111/2 and Buena's 91.

It wasn't the only record broken in the varsity, or in the meet. In fact 11 records were shattered and another tied. Jack Babashoff of Fountain Valley and John Halladay of North Torrance put on a fine show as expected. Babashoff opened with a 1:42.4 200 freestyle to bump Frank

Then it was Halladay's turn. He obliterated Gary Hall's old record by more than three seconds in the 400 free with a 3:36

Heckl's old mark and edge Halladay

who had 1:42.5.

In the Class B, records fell in six of the 10 events. Darell Fick of Lynwood led the way, shattering the records set by Halladay a year ago in the 200 and 400. Fick's double was 1:45.8 and 3:42.6 Bruce Krumpholz of Corona del Mar broke the B 100 record twice, with a 49.1 in the prelims, then 48.9 in the finals. He also helped the 400 free relay team to a new record. Hoover's Eric Gorges established the 50 mark of 22.1 in the prelims, then equalled it in the finals. And after Alhambra's John Stanton ticked a 1:02.2 in the 100 breast, Costa Mesa's Mike Yarwood beat Stanton in the finals, equalling the latter's prelim

Muir's John Utsunomiya highlighted the Mustangs' second straight Class C title with a record-tieing 57.7 in the 100 IM. Tustin's Sam Franklin went 24.0 in the 50 fly for a new standard and came back in the 50 back to ink his name in the book again with a 26.0.

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SERVITE USES INELIGIBLE SWIMMER, MUST GIVE UP TROPHY

Servite High of Anaheim, which scored enough points to place second in the team standings in the recent Class C swimming championships, has been asked to return its runner-up trophy and relinquish its second place standing in the meet.

The reason is that Servite was found to have entered an ineligible swimmer in the CIF, SS, prelims at Santa Monica the previous week. Using an ineligible player in a championship event (the prelims are part of the championships) makes a school ineligible to win CIF team honors.

The swimmer, Larry Gates, transferred to Servite from Corona del Mar High School early in February.

The swimmer's ineligibility in CIF post-season competition stems from

the rule in Article XI of the "Blue Book" which covers the transfer of boys from public to private schools or vice-versa. Without a change of residence, a boy may transfer from public to private or private to public and maintain eligibility for other than varsity teams, if a "Form 99" is signed by both school's principals. However, if granted eligibility through a "Form 99", a boy may not enter post season CIF, SS, playoff competition during that year.

JESSE OWENS KEYNOTES CAL POLY (SLO) WORKSHOP

Experts from all fields of athletics are among the panel of participants at the 25th annual California Workshop for physical education and athletic coaching, set for Aug. 7 through Aug. 18 at Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo.

Keynote speaker for the affair will be Jesse Owens, U.S. Olympic track and field hero in 1936 and first high school sprinter to be clocked in 9.4 for the 100-yard dash.

Seminars are slated in football, basketball, baseball, wrestling and track; with coverage in such other sports as golf, tennis bowling, badminton and underwater.

The event is co-sponsored by the California State Department of Education, the California Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation (CAPHER) and Cal Poly SLO.

John Seixas, athletic director at San Gabriel HS, and a member of the workshop committee has pointed out several of the outstanding personalities who will compose the staff. Included will be University of Colorado head football coach Eddie Crowder, Cal State Long Beach's basketball mentor Jerry Tarkanian; Bob Covey, Bakersfield College track coach, Bob Bennett of Fresno State (baseball) and Vaughan Hitchock of CPSLO in wrestling.

MINUTES OF CIF, SS, COUNCIL MEETING May 6, 1972

The Spring meeting of the CIF, Southern Section, Council was held on Saturday, May 6, 1972, at Lakewood High School.

The meeting was called to order at 9:30 a.m. by Council President Rev. Lawrence Dunphy, Principal, St. Bernard High School.

Representatives from all but the following leagues were in attendance: ANGELUS, DE ANZA, DELPHIC, HI-LO, PINON, and SANTA FE.

Mr. Harold Judson, Principal, Lakewood High School, welcomed the Council to his school for the meeting.

The following guests were introduced: Mr. Walt Bynum (Rolling Hills High School), President, Southern California Basketball Coaches' Association; Mr. Don Cogswell, Vice-Principal, Mira Costa High School; Mr. Harold DeBie, Athletic Director, Valley Christian High School; Mr. Jack Errion, Athletic Director, St. Anthony High School; Mr. Bob Herrold (Crescenta Valley High School), Secretary, Foothill League; Mr. Jack Kennedy, Athletic Director, Marina High School; Mr. Donald McKim, Principal, Magnolia High School; Dr. Hanford Rants, Principal, Gahr High School; Mr. Leonard Sexton, Athletic Director, Downey High School; and Mr. Clare Van Hoorebeke, Athletic Director, Anaheim High School.

1. APPROVAL OF MINUTES.

a. It was moved, seconded, and passed to approve the minutes of the Council meeting of January 29, 1972, as published in the February,

1972, Monthly Bulletin.
b. It was moved, seconded, and passed to approve the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of March 10, 1972, as published in the April, 1972, Monthly Bulletin.

c. It was moved, seconded, and passed to approve the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of April 21, 1972, as summarized for the Council by the Commissioner.

2. SUPERINTENDENTS' PRO-POSAL. Mr. Steve Miletich (Vice-Principal, Beverly Hills High School) reviewed with the Council recommendations from the Ad Hoc Committee which was appointed to study the proposal of the Orange County superintendents made at the Council meeting of January 29, 1972. These recommendations involved means of developing areas of improvement to attempt to more actively involve superintendents in the organizational and/or legislative structure of the CIF, SS.

The following procedural recommendations were endorsed by the Council: a) Regular and consistent communication should be established by the CIF, SS, Office with all superintendents, to include the continued mailing of all Council and Executive Committee minutes and summary letters from the Commissioner explaining important legislation or policy matters being considered by the Council;

b) Leagues be directed to send copies of the minutes of all league meetings to the superintendents of member schools;

c) Encourage regional superintendents' organizations to solicit, when deemed necessary or appropriate, visitations by CIF, SS, representatives to explain and/or clarify issues affecting interscholastic athletics.

In addition, the Ad Hoc Committee presented recommendations for the following constitutional revisions:

a) To create an additional position on the Executive Committee specifically for a superintendent, in order to provide for representation from this level of school organization in the decision and policy-making processes of the CIF, SS. This would be an elective position, determined in accordance with established procedures used for the election of other members of the Executive Committee. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded, and passed to amend Article VII, Section 1, of the CIF, SS, Constitution to read as follows:

"The Executive Committee of the CIF, Southern Section, shall consist of eight members from representative districts and one superintendents' representative elected at the regular May meeting for a term of four years each . . . The superintendents' representative to the Executive Committee may be from any school district within the CIF, Southern Section; an alternate superintendents' representative shall also be elected to be available to attend in any absence of the regular representative."

(b) To require by regulation that league representatives to the Council be either principals, vice-principals, or from the superintendents level in order to make the chief legislative body of the CIF, SS, as responsive as possible to administrative needs and to insure qualified accountability. Following discussion of this proposal, the Council concluded that it would not be in the (Continued on Page 3)

best interests of member leagues to strictly limit the responsibility of league representative to one of these three administrative capacities, nor would it be absolutely necessary to require a person to have served for at least two years in that capacity at a CIF, SS, school, as recommended by the committee. Appropriate changes were made in the proposal, and it was then moved, seconded, and passed to amend Article III, Section 2, of the CIF, SS, Constitution to read as follows:

"Each established league (Art. III, Sec. 3, D) shall no later than the final league meeting of each school year, elect a representative to the Council for the succeeding year. Membership on the Council shall be confined to superintendents, assistant superintendents, principals, or other authorized school administrators. Alternates designated to attend Council meetings must also meet the above qualifications; no other representatives (i.e., coach) shall have voting privileges."

3. RELEAGUING COMMITTEE.

1. Kenneth Bullock (Principal, San Marino High School), Chairman, Reaguing Committee, presented a brief rogress report to the Council containing releaguing for the 1973-74 thool year. COACHES' ORIENTATION EETINGS. Mr. Truck Lindsey Athletic Director, Chaffey High hool), representing the Officials' mmittee, reviewed with the Council recommendations for coaches' oriation meetings which were approved the Executive Committee at its eting of March 10, 1972. Tentative tes and locations have been estabhed for orientation meetings for the orts of football, water polo and nming, basketball and wrestling, seball, and soccer; the main purses of these meetings will be to make coaches aware of the increasing cern over crowd control problems CIF, SS, athletic events and to inm them of their responsibilities and uired standards of conduct and rtsmanship.

Later in the meeting, a question was used concerning the requirement would make these meetings and atory for all coaches. Following

discussion, the Council re-emphasized the importance of this project as a positive means of preventing crowd control incidents, and moved, seconded, and passed to reaffirm that attendance at these orientation meetings be mandatory for all affected coaches at all levels of the particular sport at CIF, SS, member schools. It was indicated to the Council that the meetings would be scheduled in approximately 12 different locations and on two different dates in order to afford maximum opportunities for attendance.

The CIF, SS, Office, working with Area Commissioners of Officials, will be responsible for the conduct of these meetings. The Area Commissioners would also be required to attend meetings of the officials' associations for the purpose of informing all officials of the procedures and standards of conduct expected of both coaches and officials at high school athletic

5. LIFE PASS AWARD. The CIF, Southern Section, presented a gold Life Pass award to Mr. Truck Lindsey, Citrus Belt League representative who will retire as Athletic Director at Chaffey High Schol at the end of the current school year, in recognition of his outstanding dedication and many contributions to the CIF, SS, and interscholastic athletics during his distinguished career.

6. ELECTION OF OFFICERS. Mr. Truck Lindsey, Chairman, Nominating Committee, supervised the election of CIF, SS, officers for the 1972-73 school year. Following are the results of the election:

e) Executive Committee (Eastern district, 4-year term)—Mr. Tony Balsamo, Principal, Apple Valley High School.

f) Executive Committee (Superintendents' Representative, 4-year term)—Dr. Lowell Jackson, Superintendent, Centinela Valley High School District.

g) State Federated Council (4year term)—Mr. Steve Miletich.

7. FINANCIAL POLICIES. The Council resumed discussion of the following two items pertaining to financial policies for CIF, SS, playoffs: 1) The proposal from the Sunset League to admit "classified personnel" from member schools free of charge to playoff games; and 2) The proposal from the Freeway League to re-examine the current policy regarding the issuance of CIF, SS, Courtesy Cards. At the direction of the Executive Committee from its meeting of April 21, 1972, the Commissioner took this opportunity to explain to the Council in detail the history of the development of the current financial policies and procedures of the CIF, SS. He outlined the philosophy of funding the majority of the operation of the CIF, SS, Office from playoff receipts in order to be able to offer increased services while maintaining membership dues at the same rate of 4¢ per student as when the organization was formed in 1914. Now, for the first time ever, there has been a severe budgetary deficit caused by the shortage of income from the 1971-72 football and basketball playoffs, and the Executive Committee has expressed concern because the two proposals under discussion would have a definite effect upon the income potential for CIF, SS, playoffs. The Council agreed that the entire matter of funding the CIF, SS, should be given very serious consideration following the sharp decrease in playoff income this year, and moved, seconded, and passed to have this matter referred for review to the CIF, SS, Administrative Committee, and to request the committee to prepare any recommendations concerning financial policies and procedures which it may deem appropriate as a result of the 8. OUT OF SEASON PRACTICE.

8. OUT OF SEASON PRACTICE. The Bay League presented a proposal to the Council to amend Article XXXX (Baseball Regulations), Section 3, of the Blue Book in order to permit high school baseball coaches to work with summer baseball programs involving boys from their school between the end of the season and the (Continued on Page 4)

close of school in June. It was pointed out that a large percentage of high school coaches assist with these outside baseball programs, and the present regulation which forces a coach to discontinue his association with his players for this short period of time, when in fact these programs begin around June 1, creates an unnecessary hardship for all concerned.

Regarding this same matter, Mr. Walt Bynum, President, Southern California Basketball Coaches' Association, made a request on behalf of the basketball coaches to have a similar restriction for out of season practice for the sport of basketball changed to June 1, instead of "the close of school in June" as presently stated in Article XXXXI (Basketball Regulations) of the Blue Book. Mr. Bynum explained that the basketball coaches were of the opinion that the two-week period in June in which they would be allowed to practice with potential team members after school and in summer league competition was extremely important for adequate preparation and development. He further emphasized that the coaches would be in favor of an additional restriction prohibiting inter-school scrimmages during this period, in order to attempt to curtail some of the abuses of these practice privileges.

The Council diccussed the matter, and felt that to allow exceptions for one or more sports such as this would destroy the purpose of the out of season practice rule as it was intended and is applied to all CIF, SS, approved sports. It was moved, seconded, and passed to defeat the proposal of the Bay League.

9. CROWD MANAGEMENT EN-FORCEMENT CODE. Mr. James Faul (Principal, Workman High School), representing the Crowd Management Committee, reviewed with the Council the revised recommendations for an "enforcement code" which will be used as a guide in assessing penalties against schools and/or individuals responsible for crowd control incidents occurring at CIF, SS, athletic events. It was moved, seconded, and passed to approve these recommendations as presented, and to direct the Commissioner to include the "enforcement code" in an appropriate section of the Blue Book for the 1972-73 school year. In addition, a special Enforcement Committee will be appointed to review in detail all incident reports which are submitted for further action by member schools, and to recommend to the Executive Committee appropriate disposition of each case in accordance with the provisions of the "enforcement code.'

10. SUNSET LEAGUE PROPO-SALS.

A. Ten-Game Football Schedule-The Sunset League submitted a proposal to amend Article XXXXIII (Football Regulations), Section 2, of the Blue Book in order to permit a school to schedule and play in ten football games during the regular season. This would be one more game than presently allowed, with the intent being to attempt to increase revenue sources for athletic programs by providing the option to schedule a game in lieu of the inter-school scrimmage now permitted during the week prior to the beginning of the regular season. This extra game would be on a voluntary basis at the varsity level, thereby allowing schools the option of continuing with the regular scrimmage if they so desire. The Council discussed all aspects of this recommendation, and moved, seconded, and passed to deny the Sunset League request on the basis that it would complicate existing preseason practice requirements and subject school administrators to possible criticism by lengthening the high school football season, which already includes 13 games and one scrimmage for teams reaching the finals of the CIF, SS, playoffs, strictly for financial considerations.

B. Increase In Water Polo Games -The Sunset League also recommended that Article L (Water Polo Regulations), Section 4, of the Blue Book be amended in order to increase the number of allowable water polo games for CIF, SS, teams from 12 to 14 and the number of tournaments a team or individual may enter from two to three per season. This proposal was made in order to allow more flexibility in scheduling due to the increase in the number of teams playing water polo, and to provide additional tournament opportunities as means of obtaining revenue to finance programs. Following discussion, the Council was of the opinion that an increased schedule would create additional burdens for many school budgets which are already being severely taxed, and moved, seconded, and passed to defeat the proposal.

Later in the meeting it was suggested that the above recommendation be represented as two motions to determine whether or not the Council would be favorable to increasing either the number of games or the number of tournaments separately. However, it was moved, seconded, and passed to defeat a separate proposal to increase just the number of games from 12 to 14 and a second proposal to increase just the

number of tournaments from two to

C. Revision Of Fees For Baseball Umpires—In view of action taken by the Executive Committee at its meeting of April 21, 1972, to authorize a study of officials' fees in all CIF, SS, ap proved sports during the 1972-73 school year, the Sunset League with drew its proposal for recommended adjustments in baseball umpires' fees with the stipulation that its suggestions and the related information be brought to the attention of the committee mak. ing this study for consideration at that

11. BOXING RULE. Upon advice that the State CIF Federated Council had recently liberalized its rule governing the participation of high school students in outside boxing activities. the Council moved, seconded, and passed to amend Article XXIV (Box. ing) of the Blue Book in order to conform with the new state rule. This will provide the opportunity for a high school boy to compete in amateur boxing not under the jurisdiction of his high school at any time that he is not a member of a high school athletic team; Article XXIV of the CIF, SS. By-Laws will now read as follows:

"Any boy who takes part in an exhibition of boxing or competes in "Golden Gloves" tournaments during the high school season of any sport in which he participates, shall be barred from further high school athletic competition of any kind for a period of one year from the date of the last offense."

12. LENGTH OF QUARTERS, BASKETBALL GAMES. The Council considered a recommendation from the Executive Committee which would establish the length of quarters for all basketball games involving teams from three or four year high schools at 8 minutes, an increase of two minutes for Class C, D, or Freshman games. This proposal was made on the basis that the number of boys participating in inter-cholastic basketball is highest at the lower levels, but the limited amount of playing time presently available with 6 minute quarters is not sufficient to provide ample opportunities for all interested boys to be included. It was pointed out that, as the new rule was to be stated, conflicts would exist for games where high school Class C or Freshman teams were playing against Junior High School teams and the Council concluded that it would be in the best interests of the total program to make this rule appli cable for CIF, SS, basketball games at all levels. It was then moved, seconded, and passed to amend Article (Continued on Page 5)

3. PLAYOFFS.

Separate Playoffs, Public and vivate Schools - The Commissioner ported to the Council that correndence had been received from five ferent member leagues proposing separate playoff divisions be estabhed within the CIF, SS, for public d private schools. It is the contenof these leagues that public and wate schools are not bound by simirules with regard to such matters attendance boundaries, admission licies, and requirements for certifition of coaches. Because of these hets, it is felt that private schools we the advantage and should be ompeting only against schools with milar advantages, and that separate avoff divisions should be established both public and private schools in rder to afford equal opportunities or all schools to win CIF, SS, chamonships. This subject was discussed length, and several representatives m other leagues verbally indicated eir support for the proposal. The ouncil concluded that an issue of uch importance should not be decided hout providing for further study nd discussion by all member leagues,

and it was moved, seconded, and passed to direct the President of the Council to appoint a special committee of Council members to investigate the possibility of establishing separate playoff groupings for public and private schools in all sports, and to submit recommendations concerning this matter to the Council at its next scheduled meeting on September 30, 1972.

B. Playoff Groupings, 1972-73-It was moved, seconded, and passed to approve playoff groupings, as proposed to the Council, for the sports of football, basketball, baseball, and cross country for the 1972-73 school year.

"AA" Baseball Playoffs - The Rio Hondo League introduced a special motion to amend Article XXXX (Baseball Regulations), Section 13(A), of the CIF, SS, By-Laws in order to provide for two teams from each league to be included in the "AA" baseball playoffs. Present regulations allow for only league champions to qualify for the "AA" and "A" baseball playoffs, due mainly to the diversity in geographical location of these leagues and the resultant travel expense involved in conducting playoff competition. The Council agreed that only those eight leagues that would be affected by the decision should vote on this matter; it was then moved, seconded, and passed by a vote of 5-1

(Note: The De Anza League was not represented at the meeting, and the Desert Valleys League abstained from voting) to approve the recommendation of the Rio Hondo League and include league champions and secondplace teams from each league in the "AA" basbeall playoffs, effective beginning with the 1973 season.

14. CLASSIFICATION OF ATH-LETIC TEAMS. The Freeway League presented information concerning its recent recommendation that post-season competition in CIF, SS, events be limited to varsity participants only. The Council spent considerable time discussing the implications of such a proposal with regard to the popularity and success of the competition in "B" and "C" classifications which is presently conducted in CIF, SS, playoffs for the sports of swimming and track. It was then decided that it would be advantageous to have available some alternatives for the structure of CIF, SS, post-season championship competition prior to taking action on the issue. The Council moved, seconded, and passed to table this item until its next scheduled meeting of September 30, 1972, and directed the President of the Council to appoint a special committee to study the CIF, SS, championship playoffs with the specific intent of recommending possible alternatives to member leagues in the event that post-season Class "B" and "C" competition would be eliminated.

Later in the meeting, the question of attirely eliminating "B" and "C"

entirely eliminating "B" and "C" classifications for CIF, SS, athletic teams was raised, in light of the information that, for the 1972-73 school year, 47 of 49 leagues will field grade level teams in football and 40 of 49 leagues will field grade level teams in basketball. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded, and passed to have this item placed on the agenda of the September meeting of the Council, and to request that action be taken after the results of the study by the special committee with regard to postseason playoffs (see above paragraph) have been made available to all leagues.

15. WHITMONT LEAGUE RE-QUEST. Mr. Ron Parks (Principal, California High School), acting on behalf of the proposed 1972-73 Whitmont League, appealed to the Council for permission for Class "C" football teams from Whitmont League schools to be able to compete against freshman teams from other schools in nonleague games, and for similar permission for Class "B" football teams to compete against sophomore teams. He explained that he was making the motion in view of the fact that the Whitmont League would be the only league in the CIF, SS, utilizing the exponent classification system for football teams next season. This request would necessitate a waiver of the rule approved by the Council at its meeting of January 29, 1972, which stated "when schools utilizing different classification systems schedule a non-league contest in a sport, the grade level system of classification shall be used for the conduct of such competition." Mr. Parks' motion died for lack of a second.

16. ORANGE LEAGUE RE-QUEST. Mr. Joe Merlo (Principal, Sonora High School), Orange League representative, informed the Council that half of the schools in his league would not be able to financially afford to conduct summer school this year, and thus could not have the opportunity to schedule football activity as a unit or part of the instruction during a regular summer school physical education class as allowed by Article XXXXII (Football Regulations), Section 16, of the Blue Book. He felt that this would place these schools at a disadvantage for the fall football season, and requested that schools without summer school programs be permitted to conduct recreation programs, or other similar types of programs as might be authorized by the Board of Education, which would include the football instructional activities currently allowed during a summer school

MINUTES OF THE CIF, SS, EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE April 21, 1972

The April meeting of the CIF, Southern Section, Executive Committee was called to order by Chairman Steve Miletich at 1:30 p.m. on Friday, April 21, 1972, at the CIF, SS, Office.

program. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded, and passed to defeat this proposal and to maintain all present CIF, SS, regulations governing summer football activity.

17. 1973 SWIMMING SEASON. The Channel League requested the Council to reconsider its action of January 29, 1972, in which the boys' swimming season for the 1972-73 school year was established as January 2 through April 13. The Council emphasized that these dates had been recommended in order to create definite, non-conflicting seasons for both boys' and girls' swimming teams at member schools, and moved, seconded, and passed to defeat the proposal of the Channel League and to retain the previously established dates for the 1973 boys' swimming season (Ref.: Page 3, February Monthly Bulletin).

18. 1972-73 WRESTLING SEA-SON. The Council was notified that the ending date for the 1972-73 CIF, SS, wrestling season would have to be adjusted in order for representatives to be able to participate in the first State CIF Wrestling Tournament, as approved at the Council meeting of January 29, 1972.

A question was raised as to why the State Tournament was scheduled on March 3 in conflict with the CIF, SS, finals and whether or not it would be advisable for the Southern Section to leave its championship dates as originally planned. However, following discussion, the Council was of the opinion that the action taken at its meeting of January 29 had obligated the Southern Section to participate in this tournament, and based on this assumption, most leagues had already made the necessary adjustments in their schedules. It was moved, seconded, and passed to reassign the date (Continued on Page 12)

6. FOOTBALL CARNIVAL,

CHANNEL LEAGUE. A request was

submitted by the Channel League for permission to conduct a league football carnival in accordance with Article XXXXIII (Football Regulations), Section 14 (B) (2), of the Blue Book, on Saturday, September 16, 1972, at UC Santa Barbara. In addition, the league asked approval for a North-South format for the carnival in which each team would play two 10-minute periods against the same team. This would be a deviation from current CIF, SS, regulations which allow teams to play a maximum of two 12-minute periods, but they must be against different opponents. However, it was felt by the Channel League that an arrangement such as it has proposed would provide for a better learning situation by permitting teams to have consecutive periods of competition against a common opponent. This would eliminate extended waits between appearances for any one team during the carnival and also preclude the preparations and adjustments necessary to play two different opponents in one night. The Executive Committee discussed the matter, and moved, seconded, and passed to approve the Channel League Football Carnival as requested on a one-year experimental basis. The Commissioner was asked to have the league submit a report containing its comments and recommendations following the Carnival in order to determine the feasibility of continuing with such a format in the future.

7. FINANCIAL REPORT. The Commissioner presented a preliminary financial report, as of March 31, 1972, to the Executive Committee, indicating a severe budgetary deficit based on income that has been received so far during this fiscal year from the football and basketball playoffs. The committee discussed at length the financial policies and procedures of the CIF, SS, and moved, seconded, and passed that a similar presentation be made at the next meeting of the Council relative to the increased costs and decreased income which threaten the financial stability of the CIF, SS. It was further directed that all pertinent information be mimeographed and distributed for Council members to be able to report in detail back to their respective

8. TOUCH FOOTBALL, WATTS SUMMER GAMES. The Watts Sum-

mer Games Committee requested special permission for teams from CIF, SS, member schools to be able to participate in the seven-man touch football competition which is sponsored as part of the annual Summer Games. The proposal would call for procedures to be established whereby different teams would be selected each year in order to insure representation for all interested schools and to prevent teams from competing during consecutive years. The Executive Committee discussed the matter but was of the opinion that such a deviation in order to allow participation in this touch football tournament would not be consistent with the intent of current CIF, SS, regulations governing summer football activities. It was moved, seconded, and passed to have the Commissioner inform the Watts Summer Games Committee that this request could not be granted because of the stipulations which presently apply.

- 9. SANCTION FOR SPORT OF VOLLEYBALL. The Executive Committee was advised that contact had been made with the Commissioner regarding sanction for volleyball as an approved CIF, SS, sport. The committee recognized the fast-growing popularity of volleyball and the widespread participation among member schools, and moved, seconded, and passed to authorize the CIF, SS, Office to continue to work with interested parties in the development and promotion of the sport. In addition, it was recommended that the CIF, SS, assist with the conduct of a volleyball tournament on an experimental basis during the 1972-73 school year in order to provide for further study of the interest and demand for making it an approved
- 10. WATER POLO OFFICIAT-ING FEES. The Executive Committee reviewed a recommendation from the Southern California Aquatics Federation to increase the CIF, SS, fees for water polo officials. There was considerable discussion concerning this matter, and the committee concluded that it would be in the best interests of the total program to arrange for a study of the structures of officials' fees for all sports during the 1972-73 school year. Therefore, it was moved, seconded, and passed to deny the request of the Aquatics Federation at the present time, and to have the Commissioner notify the SCAF Board of Directors that the CIF, SS, is contemplating a thorough study and analyzation of all officials' fees in the near future.

Advisory Board, reviewed with the Executive Committee the proposed content for the "position paper" to be sent to all superintendents, principals, and girls' athletics advisors to summarize the aims and objectives of the girls' interscholastic division of the CIF, SS. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded, and passed to endorse the distribution of this special bulletin to member districts and schools in order to clarify proposed plans for the girls' program.

12. APPEAL, CENTENNIAL HIGH SCHOOL. Representatives from Centennial High School appeared before the Executive Committee to appeal a recent decision made by the Bay League in which Centennial was denied the opportunity to host any home league athletic events in spring sports for the remainder of the current 1971-72 school year because of repeated crowd control incidents and related problems involving the school.

Persons in attendance for this special hearing included: Mr. Frederick Kennedy, Area Administrator, and Mr. Norman Fox, Compton Unified School District; Mr. Wendell Page, Principal, Centennial High School; Mr. Porter Leach, President, and Mr. Richard Turner, Secretary, Bay League; Mr. Leonard Lifton, Principal, and Mr. Robert Janko, Phyiscal Education Department Chairman, North Torrance High School; Mr. Carl Benson, Vice-Principal, and Mr. Ron Dinnel, Basketball Coach, South Torrance High School; and Mr. James Lockner, Vice-Principal, Torrance High School.

Mr. Leach summarized for the Executive Committee the events leading up to the decision of the Bay League Athletic Council, and reviewed the administrative procedures employed by the league in arriving at, sustaining, and implementing the decision.

Mr. Kennedy then presented an appeal on behalf of Centennial High School, requesting that the Executive Committee not support the decision of the league. Mr. Kennedy stated that there should have been a more thorough investigation involving Centennial High School prior to any action being taken, and maintained that the school was never given any advance warning that a severe decision such as this might occur if corrective and preventive crowd control measures were not evident. In addition, he indicated that he and other district administrators did not feel that it was fair to penalize the baseball team for incidents which occurred during the basketball season.

The Executive Committee then thanked all persons present for their complete cooperation in this matter, and adjourned to executive session to review the information which had been presented.

Following a lengthy discussion, it was moved, seconded, and passed to uphold the decision of the Bay League Athletic Council as a means of enforcement and curtailment of serious or repeated crowd control problems. Although the testimony had indicated that a series of incidents had preceded this action, the committee felt that the league's decision could have more clearly stated that it was based on all incidents rather than alluding to a single basketball incident which occurred on February 16, 1972. The committee was also of the opinion that the league should have taken appropriate action by issuing letters of warning each time previous incidents had occurred, in order to allow for the opportunity for recommendations for corrective action to be established.

The Executive Committee did wish to compliment the Bay League for positive action resulting from this matter in the form of more effective communication among the principals of the member schools. It was felt that the league's foresight in recognizing the need for and taking steps to establish this type of communication would result in the prevention of similar problems and improved crowd management procedures.

13. CROWD MANAGEMENT "INCIDENT REPORT FORM." As a result of the discussion concerning the appeal by Centennial High School in paragraph 12 above, the Executive Committee moved, seconded, and passed to make it a mandatory requirement that each submitting school send a copy of each CIF, SS, Incident Report Form to the principal of the other school involved in the report. This will insure that all affected administrators are made aware of crowd control incidents and related problems in order to be able to adequately provide for corrective action.

14. BASKETBALL PLAYOFF IN-CIDENT. The Commissioner presented to the Executive Committee information concerning an incident which occurred at the Garey High School - Katella High School "AAA" basketball playoff game held at Chino High School on February 29, 1972. The incident involved a series of altercations in the parking lot after the completion of the game, resulting in injuries to several persons. Following a review of all reports and investigation findings which had been submitted, the committee moved, sec-

onded, and passed to direct the Commissioner to send a letter of warning to Garey High School concerning this incident. However, it was further tequested that this letter also include commendation to the Principal of Garey High School for his thorough investigation and for his actions within the school and community in attempting to take positive steps to prevent similar recurrences.

15. 1972-73 PLAYOFF GROUP. INGS. The Executive Committee re viewed proposed playoff groupings for the sports of football, basketball, base ball, and cross country for the 1972.78 school year. Because of the lack of numbers of leagues available for the "A" and "Small Schools" football groupings, it was suggested that these two groupings be combined into one for the 1972 playoffs. This would bring the football playoffs into alignment with other CIF, SS, playoff, where it has been an estabilshed policy to have competition in four different divisions. It was then moved, seeonded, and passed to recommend these proposed playoff groupings, including the consolidation to four divisions for football, to the Council for approval at its next scheduled meeting.

16. CLASSIFICATION CARDS The Commissioner discussed with the Executive Committee the policy which has been in effect whereby the CIF. SS, Office makes available printed exponent classification cards for use by member schools. In light of the increased cost of providing this particular service, and the acceptance by most schools of the recent trend away from exponent teams in all sports, it was moved, seconded, and passed by the committee to discontinue this policy effective immediately, and to recommend that schools desiring to classify their student-athletes by exponents use the "athletic classification table" as it appears in Article XXXIX of the Blue Book each year to prepare their own classification cards or forms.

17. TRACK PROTEST, BREA-OLINDA HIGH SCHOOL. Brea-Olinda High School appealed to the Executive Committee a recent decision by the Orange League which overruled a protest from the school regarding the results of a track meet against Laguna Beach High School on March 9, 1972. The protest involved the 180 yard low hurdle race in which the starter allowed four participants from Laguna Beach and only two from Brea to be entered in the competition; his decision was based on the fact that Brea provided enough hurdles for only six lanes, and since the Laguna Beach team had four hurdlers, all of these (Continued on page 9)

Commissioner's Corner

STUDY HARDSHIP CASES BEFORE SEEKING ELIGIBILITY WAIVER

A clarification of philosophy seems to be in order.

Article XI, Section 12, of our By-Laws reads as follows:

"Under certain conditions beyond a student's control or in certain hardship cases, the Executive Committee may waive the residence rule. Such cases must be presented in writing to the Executive Committee by the principal of the school in which the boy is enrolled. Such a request would have added weight if it had league approval."

We are now receiving many communications from principals regarding requests for a waiver of our eligibility rule based on hardship conditions. Here are some examples of recent cases presented to the Executive Committee:

A boy moved from residence with his natural mother to another community to reside in the home of a brother and sister-in-law. A sophomore, the boy ". . . had to assume full support of himself because his mother did not have a job and was not able to keep one because of her drinking problem. He was advised by his brother to move to his home. It was felt by the brother that the boy was in a bad home environment which was hazardous to continuing his education." The boy was described as a good student and a fine athlete.

Another recent request described the subject student as follows: "...did poorly in school, had attendance problems, was in several scrapes with law enforcement authorities and school officials, and in general was unsuccessful in school and other areas.

"He did not participate in athletics in his previous school and would probably not be a great asset to our program. However, he is interested in a particular sport and we feel that this might provide him with the opportunity for further improvement and additional activities."

The key difference in these two cases lies in the reason for the boys' change of schools. In the first case the hardship condition was one which was beyond the boy's control. His mother was an alcoholic and the home was not a fit place for the boy. In such cases, the Executive Committee, after checking with the sending school to verify the facts, will generally grant a waiver of our rule.

In the second situation the boy's transfer was caused because of his own misdeeds. He had attendance problems and was in "several scrapes with law enforcement officials." In many cases of this nature, the boy is quietly told to change schools because of an involvment on the drug scene.

Principals who have boys entering their school under this or similar conditions should not request a waiver of the CIF, SS residence rule. These boys are transferring because they have not been good citizens and the Executive Committee feels that they should spend their period of ineligibility in the new school and prove that they have earned the right to participate in interscholastic athletics. After all, athletics is a privilege and not a right, and a boy must meet many standards before he is entitled to participate. All young men must prove that they are ready to accept the responsibilities which go with the privilege of participation.

We would respectfully suggest that all school administrators keep this philosophy uppermost in mind when considering the submission of a request to waive our residence rule in order to grant eligibility to a student-athlete.

FORMER CIF CHAMP HIGH NCAA FINISHER

Alan Albright, a two time CIF 157 pound wrestling champion and the outstanding wrestler of the 1971 CIF finals tournament, wrestled for Oklahoma State University this year and placed 3rd in the NCAA Championship Tournament.
