This soon-to-conclude school year was one of "FOCUS ON SPORTSMANSHIP" throughout the CIF Southern Section and it was anything but rhetoric when it came to active participation by our member schools.

Not only did the schools assume a high-visibility role in reaching their respective communities, but it was even more apparent at the league level in their cooperative effort to perpetuate the ideals of sportsmanship.

Stimulating a keen awareness among the student body, school board, community groups and the Media were all part of the game plan and the focal point comes the evening of May 27.

As part of the pre-game festivities at Dodger Stadium, 62 students — representing a school from each of the CIF Southern Section's 62 leagues — will receive a sportsmanship plaque on behalf of their respective school's outstanding efforts.

However, these 62 are but a mirror image of the nearly 500 members in the CIF Southern Section and it's their combined effort which should be heralded.

But, for some reason, there are always a few outstanding feats which fail to reach the public's eye.

Two in particular are in a class by themselves.

In a baseball game earlier this season, the score was tied in the final inning with a runner at third base. In a deceptive move, the adult coach at third base called to the opposing pitcher — asking to examine the ball.

The youngster on the mound, tossed the ball to the coach, who stepped aside, allowing the ball to roll into foul territory as the winning run scored.

The teams went their separate ways after the game, but the next day, the athletic director of the winning school called his counterpart at the opposing school and forfeited the game, responding, "We are not going to win a game in that manner. We're here to set an example for the kids. The game is yours."

The second display of outstanding sportsmanship was witnessed by your Commissioner and occurred in a championship basketball game at the Long Beach Arena.

CIF SOUTHERN SECTION COUNCIL MINUTES OF MEETING OF MARCH 17, 1983

The March meeting of the CIF Southern Section Council was called to order by Chairman Dr. Robert Packer at 9:35 a.m. on Thursday, March 17, 1983 at the Saddleback Inn in Norwalk. All leagues were represented with the exceptions of the Del Rey, Heritage, Pinon, South Coast, Tri-County and Westside.

1. **APPROVAL OF MINUTES** — It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the minutes of the CIF Southern Section Council meeting of January 20, 1983 as published in the February issue of "The Bulletin" and the minutes of the CIF Southern Section Executive Committee meeting of February 17, 1983 as mailed to the Council.

2. **PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE** — Dr. Robert Packer, president of the CIF Southern Section provided an update on the actions of the CIF-SS Administrative and Executive Committees. In addition, Dr. Packer commended the Office staff for administration of the winter playoffs and paid tribute to those schools and individual athletes who participated in the playoffs.

3. **COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE** — Mr. Ray Plutko, Commissioner of Athletics, provided an overview of the 1982-83 school year to date, in addition to programs for the spring semester and projections for the 1983-84 school year.

4. **TREASURER'S UPDATE** — Mr. Bruce Keuning, treasurer, reviewed the proposed 1983-84 budget which will become an action item at the May meeting of the CIF-SS Council. Additionally, Mr. Keuning provided the Council an update with respect to the current 1982-83 financial budget.

5. **SUNKIST LEAGUE VOLLEYBALL PROPOSAL** — Mr. Joe Enserro, principal of Elsinore High School reviewed with the Council

a proposal calling for an amendment of the CIF-SS Blue Book Rule 2112.1 as it pertains to the number of students who may participate on an outside team outside the season of sport in volleyball.

The proposal calls for an increase of the number of allowable students from two to four and will become an action item at the May meeting of the CIF-SS Council.

6. **STATE CIF UPDATE** —

(a) Mr. Moe Chavez, member of the CIF-SS Executive Committee, reviewed with the Council the proposed 1983-84 budget for the State CIF. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to send the Southern Section delegates to the State CIF Federated Council meeting uninstructed on this item.

(b) Mrs. Barbara Wilson, member of the CIF-SS Executive Committee, reviewed with the Council the background information relative to State Rules 801 and 802 pertaining to the limitation of awards for invitational tournaments. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to send the Southern Section delegates to the State CIF Federated Council meeting to vote that Rule 801 be deleted and Rule 802 be amended to exclude the word "coach".

(c) Mrs. Barbara Wilson, member of the CIF-SS Executive Committee, provided background information relative to the latest discussions held at the State Federated Council level in the area of scholastic eligibility.

7. **BLUE BOOK COMMITTEE REPORT** — Mr. Clyde Francisco, member of the Executive and Blue Book Committees, provided background information as it relates to the following three proposals by way of the Blue Book Committee. These items will be voted

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SANCTIONED EVENTS

By action of the State Federated Council and the Southern Section Executive Committee the rules regarding the sanctioning of inter state competition have been changed. Schools who are traveling to other sections within the state for a tournament or invitational must now request approval from the southern section commissioner, in writing 60 days prior to the event. All requests must state dates, location, sport, levels of competition and indicate the number of guaranteed contests for the tournament or invitational.

It was felt that this procedure will help alleviate problems that might arise when schools are traveling to other California Sections for contests where 4 or more schools are involved. This change does not affect any other sanctioning rule except inter state competition involving 4 or more schools.

STARTING DATES FOR 1983 FOOTBALL SEASON

By action taken at the March 17, 1983 CIF-SS Council meeting, the following changes regarding starting date and conditioning period will be in effect for the 1983 football season.

1. No football practice will be allowed prior to AUGUST 22, 1983.

2. If a school chooses to workout August 22 through August 24, these days must be used for a physical conditioning program.

3. Football shoes and footballs will be permitted. There will be no equipment such as blocking or tackling dummies, sleds, pads, helmets, etc.

4. No body contact such as tackling or blocking will be allowed during conditioning sessions.

5. Schools will not be allowed to participate in full pads until August 25, 1983.

Hopefully this will clarify the matter for all coaches and administrators.

upon at the May meeting of the CIF-SS Council.

(a) The first proposal would provide uniformity with respect to the number of tournament and/or invitationals being part of the overall number of allowable contests in each sport. Additionally, an entry by one student or more from a school would count as one of the allowable number of tournaments and/or contests. It should be noted that currently, select sports have an unlimited number of invitationals and/or tournaments in which students may enter, while other sports have specific limitations.

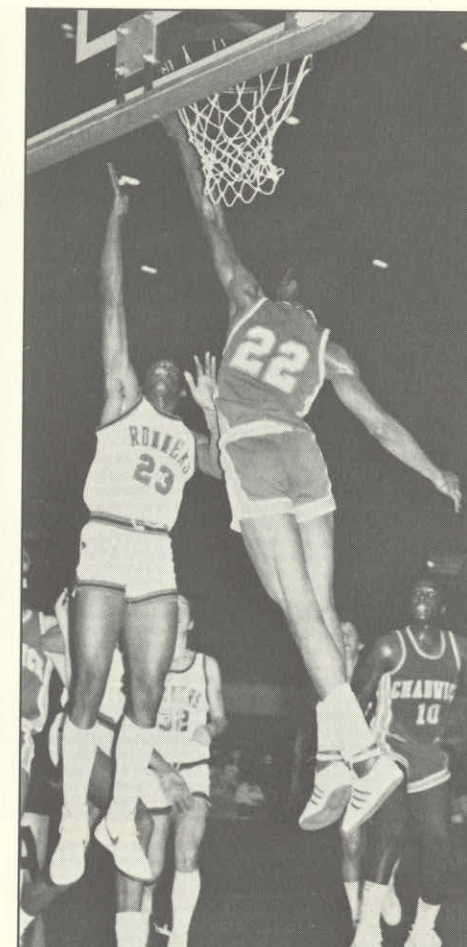
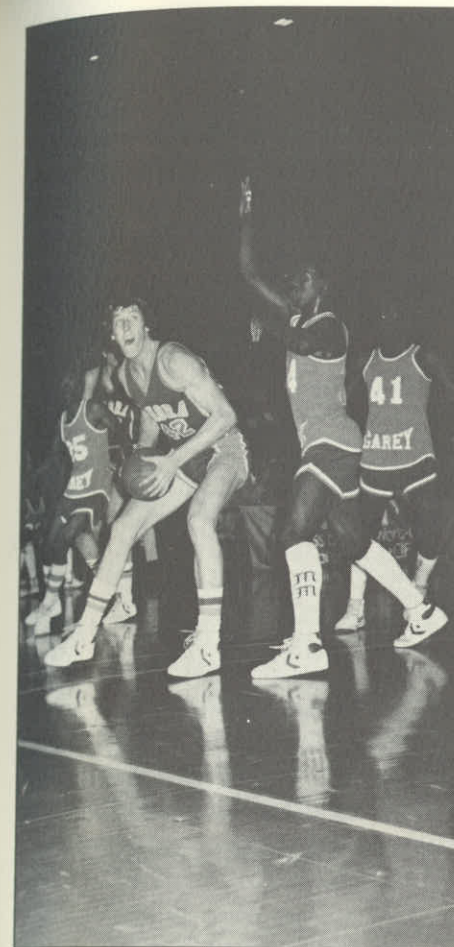
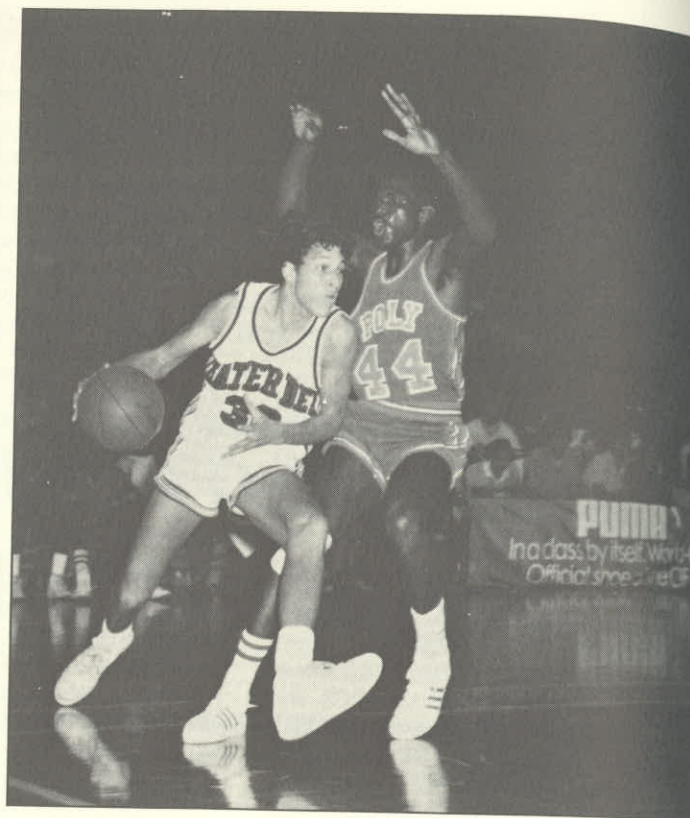
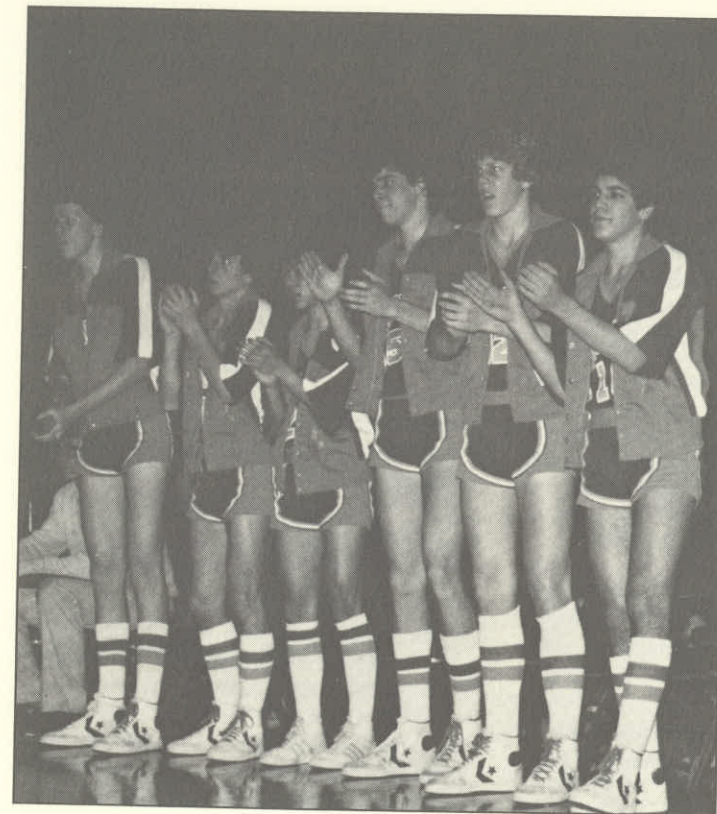
(b) The second proposal would bring the Southern Section in line with the National Federation Rules in the sport of basketball which specify the home team will wear the white (light) color uniforms and the visiting team will wear the dark color uniforms.

(c) The third proposal would amend By-Law 2902 to include that leagues will specify its priority with regard to any at-large considerations.

8. **NOMINATING COMMITTEE REPORT** — Mr. Bruce Kitchen, chairman of the Nominating Committee, presented the report of the Committee as it relates to upcoming elections for positions on the Executive Committee. It was moved, seconded and passed to accept the slate as presented for a vote at the May meeting of the CIF-SS Council.

They're either pelted with praise and pep-rallied to death, or they're ignored. They're cradled and pampered or they're completely overlooked, at least until they're standing on the victory stand.

Consequently, they're misunderstood.

What this country needs is a fool-proof method of honoring the champions before the season begins. Why before? Because Americans love a winner, a champion. Any champion. We're fickle. We excuse bad manners or natural talent untapped, so long as the end result is notched in the win column.

Sure, one or two purists appreciate the level of play, taking into consideration nothing else. They understand all that goes into a championship effort and they're willing to pardon those little spats of poor sportsmanship.

But more fans aren't. They allow themselves to be sidetracked from enjoying the sport as nothing more than a sport. Therein lies the misunderstanding of champions. Fans are not really fans. They're curious onlookers, caught up in the celebration of the celebration of victory, rather than in the celebration of the victory itself.

In other words, another excuse to raise Cain.

The champions themselves know better. The players and coaches understand and appreciate victory for what it is: The culmination of a process. Fans see victory as the result of a two-hour game. Coaches and players see it as the reward

for a year-long battle. They remember the torturous hours running up and down the hardwood floors of a steamy gym. They remember the three-hour workouts under the relentless blaze of a mid-August sun, and those bone-chilling January mornings, hitting the cross country trail in preparation for a district 3200-meter run, two months away.

In this special section, we wanted to honor the champions by giving them the opportunity to tell their own stories. Remarkably enough, most failed to mention the moment the team reached the top. Instead, they dwelled on the climb to the top.

"Teamwork became our battle cry," one coach said.

"The desire to sacrifice and practice hard to improve individually was a big plus," another said. "The team discipline and the motivation of the players were the keys to our success."

"The championship proves that ability may get you to the top, but that it takes character and pride to keep you there," added another. "It emphasizes that a man will make mistakes, but he is not a failure until he starts blaming someone else."

These lessons make athletics so important to a young person's development. They learn that the dream can come true . . . if they're willing to make it come true.

9. **PROTESTS OF PLAYOFF CONTESTS** — Mrs. Barbara Wilson, member of the CIF-SS Executive Committee, reviewed with the Council a proposal dealing with protests of playoff contests only and the recommendation that the Southern Section fall in line with the National Federation rules which do not provide for same once a contest has been completed. Following discussion, the proposal passed by a 50-8 vote.

10. **PACIFIC LEAGUE FOOTBALL PROPOSAL** — Mr. Sam Nicholson, principal of Crescenta Valley High School, and Mr. Gordon Warnock, varsity football coach, reviewed with the Council a proposal on behalf of the Pacific League which will alter the starting and ending dates of the football season of sport effective with the fall term of the 1984 school year. Following discussion, the proposal failed to carry the necessary majority by a 36-14 vote.

11. **RIO HONDO FOOTBALL PROPOSAL** — Mr. Mickey McNamee, Rio Hondo League Representative, reviewed with the Council a proposal on behalf of the league which will alter the starting date for pre-season football contests effective with the fall term of 1983. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded

and passed to approve the proposal by a 41-9 vote.

12. **CENTURY LEAGUE PLAYOFF ENTRY PROPOSAL** — Mr. Jim Turner, Century League President, reviewed with the Council a proposal on behalf of the league which calls for amending the Constitution and By-Laws to provide that more than three entries be permitted in the playoffs in the sport of water polo when byes exist. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the proposal by a 24-16 vote, effective with the 1983-84 school year.

13. **SEAVIEW LEAGUE PLAYOFF ENTRY PROPOSAL** — Mr. Dennis Evans, Seaview League Representative, reviewed with the Council a proposal on behalf of the league to provide that more than three entries be permitted to enter the playoffs to fill any byes which exist in the opening round. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the proposal by a 30-16 vote, effective with the 1983-84 school year.

14. **FOOTBALL PLAYOFF FILM/TAPE EXCHANGE PROPOSAL** — Mr. Robert Paisola, chairman of the Film/Video Tape Committee reviewed with the Council a proposal by way of the committee as so constituted by the Executive Committee calling for specific guidelines in the exchange of film and video tape. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the proposal by a 52-2 vote, effective with the 1985 fall

school term.

15. **PLAYOFF GROUPINGS TWO-YEAR CYCLE PROPOSAL** — Mr. Frank Cano, chairman of the Playoff Groupings Committee, reviewed with the Council a proposal by way of the committee calling for the procedures to be conducted every two years effective with the 1984-86 cycle and thus combining the cycles of Playoff Groupings with Releaguering. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve by a 54-3 vote the proposal effective with the 1984-86 cycle.

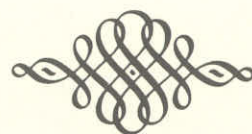

MINUTES OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

APRIL 21, 1983

The meeting of the California Interscholastic Federation Southern Section Executive Committee was called to order by Chairman Dr. Robert Packer at 10:10 a.m. in the Anaheim Room at Anaheim Stadium. All members were present with the exceptions of Sheila Burrud and Clyde Francisco.

1. **PRESIDENT'S UPDATE:** Dr. Robert Packer welcomed Mr. Thomas E. Byrnes, State Commissioner of Athletics. In addition, he commended the staff for their administration of the winter playoffs.

2. **COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE:** Mr. Ray Plutko, Commissioner, reviewed with the Committee, the recently completed winter playoffs. In addition, Commissioner Plutko reviewed the development of a five-year working plan for the Section. Included in this will be: a symposium of sports marketing and fund raising; seminar for officers of officials' associations; coaches workshops dealing with Blue Book rules and regulations; athletic administrators' symposium; National Athletic Health Institute regional athletic injury workshops; superintendents and board members symposium. In addition, the Commissioner will start another cycle on his league visitation which is slated for the 1983-84 school year. In 1987-88 one of the major focal points of the Office will be the 75th anniversary of the CIF Southern Section. He also apprised the Committee on the current status of the sportsmanship program relative to the Dodger visitation to member schools.

3. **BOYS' ATHLETIC DIRECTORS' UPDATE:** The report dealt with concerns relative to re-leaguering. In addition, items were presented from the regional athletic directors' association and general positive comments dealing with the structure of the winter playoffs.

4. **GIRLS' ATHLETIC DIRECTORS' UPDATE:** The report included information dealing with academic eligibility standards as they have affected the student athlete, and the overall effect on spring athletic programs due to the excessive rainouts which could pose a problem with the upcoming playoffs, particularly in girls' softball and boys' baseball. Also included in the report were concerns relative to school financing and cutbacks being faced by member schools due to the increasing financial burden that has been placed on schools in the state.

5. **SUPERINTENDENTS' UPDATE:** Dr. Maury Ross reported on the condition of John Klumb who is recuperating after a recent heart attack. Dr. Ross reviewed with the Committee concerns relative to school finance and bills currently being discussed in Sacramento relative to current issues in school finance.

6. **TREASURER'S UPDATE:** Mr. Bruce Keuning, Treasurer, updated the Committee on the 1982-83 working budget as it relates to the winter playoffs and the upcoming spring playoffs in that the Section is making progress with reference to the deficit carried over from football.

7. STATE REPORT:

(A) *State Commissioner's Update:* State CIF Commissioner Thomas E. Byrnes commended the CIF Southern Section for its role in conducting the Southern California Regional and State Basketball Championships. In addition, Commissioner Byrnes updated the area of legislation and the need to continue our efforts to work with members of the State Legislature in keeping lines of communication open.

(B) *Committee Reports:*

(1) **SECTION RELATIONS** — Dr. Robert Packer reported on the March meeting held in San Francisco which reviewed the three recently conducted regional hearings and the long-range goals and possible models that the Committee might like to look at in preparation for its report to the State Federated Council in May.

(2) **MEDIA PROMOTIONS** — Mr. Tony Balsamo reviewed with the Committee, a publicity proposal relative to the development of an alumni association; contract discussions with Baden Sports and the use of their basketballs and volleyballs for State championship competition; the Committee's recommendation to the State CIF Federated Council regarding live telecasts crossing Section lines; and the status of the proposed State CIF Magazine.

(3) **WAYS AND MEANS** — Mr. Moe Chavez reviewed with the Committee, the proposed State CIF budget.

(4) **LEGISLATIVE** — Mrs. Barbara Wilson reported on the upcoming meeting of the Committee which will include discussions dealing with the Seymour Bill; the impact of eligibility standards; current legislation on student participation fees; and other school finance bills being discussed by the State Legislature. Mrs. Wilson stressed with the Committee that continuing efforts be made in working with our State Legislators and local school board members in a positive way.

(5) **COMPETITION** — Commissioner Ray Plutko reported on work being done by the Committee and several items that will be presented to the State Federated Council relative to clarifying language in the State Constitution.

(6) **OTHER ITEMS** —

(a) **STATE CIF BUDGET** — The Southern Section will be sending its delegates to the State Federated Council meeting uninstructed on this item.

(b) **SCHOLASTIC ELIGIBILITY** — The Southern Section position relative to this issue will be to retain the present rules and regulations.

(c) **VOLLEYBALL STATE PLAYOFF ADJUSTMENT** — The Southern Section delegates will support the Committee recommendation relative to this matter.

(d) **NATIONAL FEDERATION BASKETBALL RULE CHANGE** — Commissioner Plutko reviewed concerns relative to the recently adopted time-out rule in National Federa-

tion Boys' and Girls' basketball rules. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to express the concern of the Southern Section with reference to making any rule change without input. It was further passed to direct the Office to poll coaches in the Southern Section, and if warranted, make a recommendation to the State Federated Council for modification of this new rule.

8. **CALENDAR MEETING DATES FOR 1983-84:** The calendar for the 1983-84 school year was approved.

9. **MIRALESTE HIGH SCHOOL BASKETBALL REVIEW:** Dean Crowley, Administrator, reviewed with the Committee, a violation of Rules 231, 303 and 305 by Miraleste High School during the just-completed Boys' Basketball playoffs. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to invite representatives of Miraleste High School to appear before the Executive Committee on Thursday, May 12, 1983.

10. **RIM OF THE WORLD HIGH SCHOOL OUTSIDE COMPETITION REQUEST:** Karen Hellyer, Administrator, reviewed a request from Rim of the World High School to seek a waiver of the two-player outside competition rule in volleyball. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to deny the request.

11. **CENTENNIAL HIGH SCHOOL REVIEW:** Commissioner Ray Plutko reviewed correspondence received from the Principal of Centennial High School with reference to a basketball incident. Following discussion, it was the decision of the Executive Committee to acknowledge receipt of the letter from the school Principal. It be further noted that the Committee retain its earlier recommendation to the school regarding this matter.

12. **MATER DEI UPDATE:** Fr. Charles Hill reviewed with the Committee the Angelus League's review and findings regarding Mater Dei's basketball program. It was the consensus of the League, at this time, that there is no evidence of violation of the rules and regulations of the CIF Southern Section, and that Mater Dei has adequately responded to the charges. Following discussion, the Council accepted the report as presented.

13. **SUPERINTENDENTS' REPRESENTATIVE:** Dr. Maury Ross, due to additional responsibilities associated with his current assignment, announced with regret, his resignation as Superintendents' Representative to the CIF Southern Section Executive Committee, effective with the close of the current school year. It was the decision of the Executive Committee to develop a list of individuals as possible replacements for his unexpired term of one year.

14. **LEE VINING HIGH SCHOOL STATUS:** Ray Plutko, Commissioner, reviewed with the Committee the status of Lee Vining High School, member of the Nevada State

WHAT'S HAPPENIN' IN THE OTHER 49 STATES

ITEM: IOWA PREPS TO USE THREE-POINT PLAY

The spirit of rules experimentation that is prevalent in college basketball has filtered to the high school level.

The board of directors of the Iowa Girls High School Athletic Union has approved a three-point play for use in 1982-83. The distance of the play has not been determined. Iowa, which still plays six-on-six women's basketball, is believed to be the first state to conduct a three-point experiment.

organization, in reference to the CIF Southern Section baseball playoffs. The Southern Section will maintain its current position that schools which are members of other State associations and have cross-leagued into a league in the Southern Section will not qualify for post-season playoff competition.

15. **CIF-SS BASKETBALL CHAMPIONSHIPS FOR 1983-84:** Commissioner Plutko reviewed with the Committee the format for the 1983-84 basketball championship contests that will be conducted at the L.A. Sports Arena. In that there will be a reduced number of dates, the Boys' 4A and 3A semi-final contests will be played at the L.A. Sports Arena on Tuesday and Wednesday, February 28 and 29, 1984. The Girls' 4A, 3A and 2A championship contests will be played on Thursday night, March 1, 1984. The championship game featuring the Girls' 1A and all five boys' divisions will be played on Saturday, March 3, 1984.

16. **NORDHOFF HIGH SCHOOL WAIVER REQUEST:** Commissioner Plutko presented a request from Nordhoff High School to waive State Rule 308 (Sunday competition) in order that they may complete competition in the Ojai Valley Tennis Tournament, due to recent rains. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to deny the request.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, the meeting was adjourned at 4:10 p.m.

Jay Moreno is the oldest of four children. He is 17 years old and has a commendable G.P.A. of 3.4. He competes in several sports and is a part-time actor.

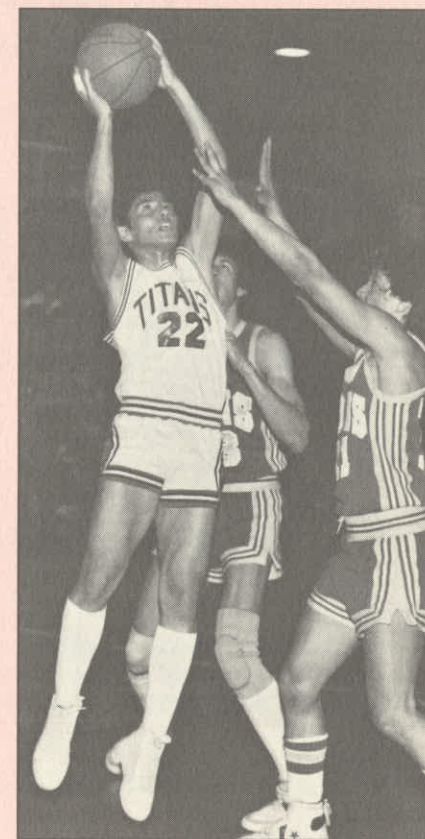
Moreno is an all-around sports star, starting on Pioneer's varsity football team for the last two years as a wide receiver and running back. 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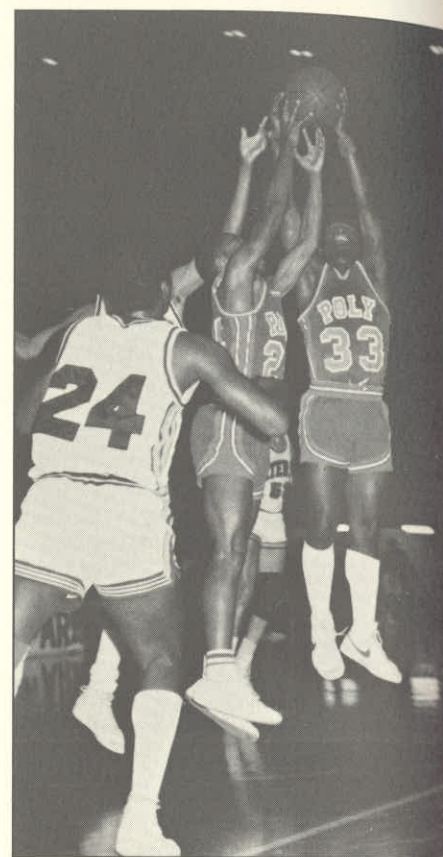
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Don't Be Caught Unprepared CHECK THESE SAT TEST DATES
