IT'S BEEN A

Needless to say, we as teachers, administrators and coaches will share that hollow feeling.

But, also left behind will be memories of an occasional tear shed; those moments when called upon to act as a counselor, substitute parent or for that matter, just a friend, and the inner happiness of having seen them reach for a challenge and succeed.

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MINUTES OF CIF-SS COUNCIL MEETING MARCH 22, 1984

The general meeting of the CIF Southern Section Council was called to order by Dr. Robert Packer at 9:35 a.m. on Thursday, March 22, at the Saddleback Inn in Norwalk. All leagues were present, with the exception of the Heritage, Pinon, Liberty, South Coast and All Girls' Representative.

1. **APPROVAL OF MINUTES** - It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the minutes of the CIF-SS Council meeting of January 19, 1984 as corrected to reflect a change in item 9. **OFFICIALS FEES** (which should read): "Gene Knott, representing the Officials' Fees Committee, reported to the Council that a recent recommendation from the Sunset League relative to an adjustment in officials' fees has been tabled until the current fees contract expires;" and the minutes of the CIF-SS Executive Committee meeting of February 16, 1984 as mailed to the Council.

2. **PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE** - Dr. Robert Packer, President of the CIF Southern Section, commended the teams that participated in the Southern Section winter playoff activities and extended special congratulations to Long Beach Poly and Buena High Schools for their success in winning the State Championships in Boys' Division I and Girls' Division I, and also Pasadena Poly High School for their effort as runner-up in Boys' Division III competition.

3. **COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE** - Mr. Ray Plutko, Commissioner, paid tribute to the various league representatives for their efforts and assistance to the Office during the recent winter playoff activities. In addition,

Commissioner Plutko announced that the W.R. Moody league awards would be renewed for the upcoming 1984-85 school year. It was also reported to the Council that current eligibility requests to the Office are running quite smoothly; there is a positive projection for 1984-85 relative to corporate sponsorships; and an update on walk-on coach legislation was given.

4. **TREASURER'S REPORT** - Bruce Keuning reviewed with the Council the financial report of the winter playoffs and an update of the current working budget. Mr. Keuning reviewed with the Council a recommendation relative to the purchase of an IBM word processor and data processor system for the Southern Section Office. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to use \$5,000 which has been set aside in the present 1983-84 working budget, coupled with a one-time \$47 assessment to member schools to purchase this equipment. Additionally, Mr. Keuning reviewed the proposed 1984-85 budget which will become an action item at the May meeting of the CIF Southern Section Council.

5. **STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL REPORT** -

(A) **EQUAL OPPORTUNITIES PROPOSAL**: Sheila Burrud, State Federated Council Representative, reviewed with the Council a report of the State Equal Opportunities Committee relative to the female voting participation on Section governing boards. Following a report from Marge Godfrey, Chairperson of the Southern Section Equal Opportunities

DODGERS, ADOHR FARMS TO JOIN CIF-SS AGAIN IN "SHAKE FOR SPORTSMANSHIP" AWARD

CERRITOS - The Los Angeles Dodgers and Adohr Farms will again join forces with the CIF Southern Section this year in the annual "Shake For Sportsmanship" awards program. The focal point of the program will be the honoring of 62 high schools representing each of the leagues in the Southern Section that have distinguished themselves in the principles of positive sportsmanship.

The popular program, which first honored schools representing the 62 leagues of the CIF Southern Section last year, has been expanded to include the seven leagues of Los Angeles City Section for 1984. The "Shake For Sportsmanship" program will encompass a grand total of some 520 high schools this year.

The Dodgers, who have assisted with the design and printing of the official "Shake For Sportsmanship" logo and poster, will provide the services of new rightfielder Terry Whitfield as the spokesman for the event. Whitfield, along with representatives of Adohr Farms and the two CIF sections will present the awards to representative athletes of each school at Dodger Stadium prior to the Dodgers-Houston Astros game on June 1. The game is slated for a 7:35 p.m. starting time.

Adohr Farms will underwrite the entire cost of commemorative plaques for each of the winning schools, in addition to large perpetual plaques noting all of the honorees. The perpetual pla-

ques will be on display at both the CIF Southern Section and Los Angeles City Headquarters.

The high schools to be singled out will be determined at the league level by meetings of the athletic administrators from each school during the month of May. The criteria by which the winning schools will be chosen rests with the individual leagues, but selections will be made on the basis of spirit, enthusiasm and general sportsmanship.

Whitfield, who came to the Dodgers this season after three successful campaigns with the Seibu Lions in Japan, is a former All-CIF and All-American outfielder from Palo Verde High School in Blythe. He has played in the major leagues with the New York Yankees and San Francisco Giants as well as the Dodgers.

"We in the CIF Southern Section are ecstatic about our relationship in the corporate sponsorship being provided by the Dodgers and Adohr Farms," noted CIF-SS Commissioner Ray Plutko. "The need to create a unified public awareness and to provide an accountability of the high school activities program we foster is an obligation of the highest priority."

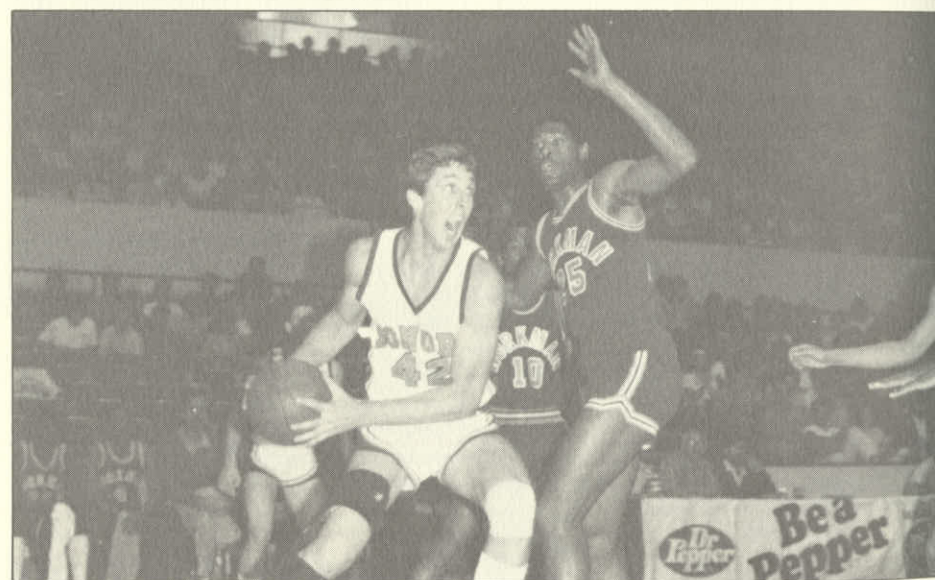
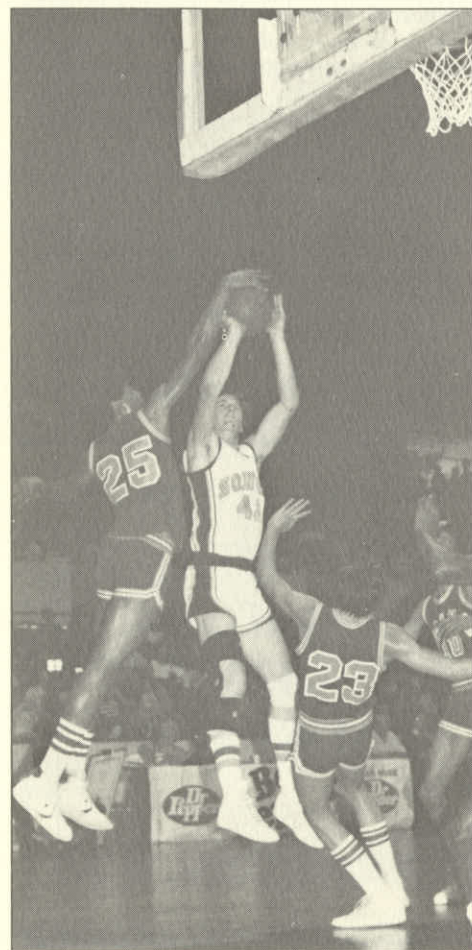
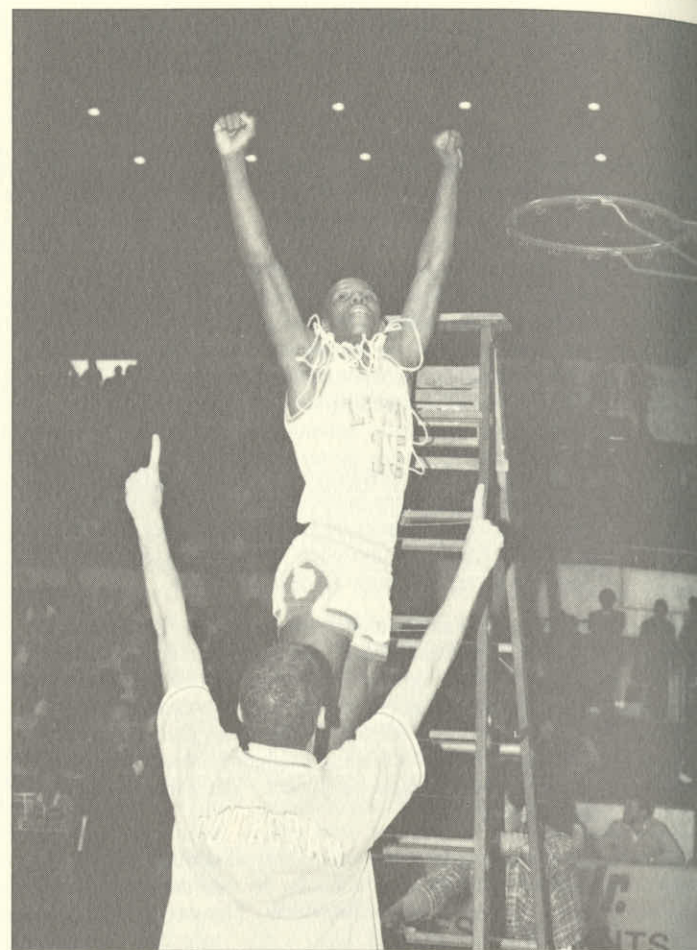
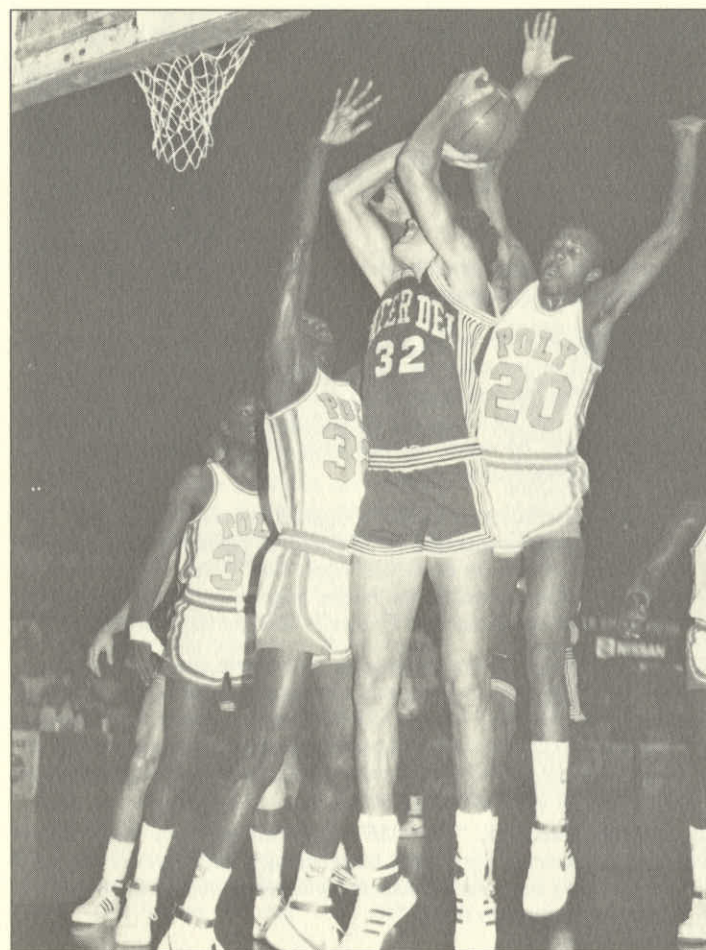

FIRST ANNUAL HALL OF FAME AWARDS RECIPIENTS

LESTER "BUS" MCKNIGHT

Lester "Bus" McKnight, teacher, coach administrator, official and community leader in the fields of physical education, recreation and athletics, served the Santa Ana Unified School District with outstanding merit for 33 years (1946-79).



Though his career touched on several areas, Bus McKnight was first and foremost a coach, with all of the qualities that the word "coach" implies. He was a counselor, a teacher and a caring individual who prepared his teams well and was a winner.

From 1955 to 1967, he was the Head Football Coach at Santa Ana High School, directing the Saints to a pair of Sunset League titles along the way. He was also the Head Basketball Coach at Santa Ana for six years, taking his team to three league crowns. In 1959 McKnight was named the Los Angeles Times Orange County Coach of the Year and the same year was appointed Co-Head Coach of the Orange County Lions Club North-South All-Star Football game.

McKnight was active as a member of the California Coaches Association and the National Coaches Association as well as serving on the board of directors that founded the Southern California Football Coaches Association.

As an official, McKnight was involved in several CIF Southern Section playoff and championship contests in football, basketball and baseball. A member of the Orange County Officials association for 35 years, he officiated the sports of football, basketball, baseball and was a track and swimming starter as well. McKnight twice served as President of the Orange County Officials Association, and was recognized by the association for 20 years of service in 1975. In 1980 he was awarded the John McDonough Sportsmanship Award for his outstanding contribution to Orange County athletics by the association. He also served the OCOA as an instructor in the sports of football, basketball and baseball.

In 1976 McKnight was recognized by the California State Athletic Directors Association for outstanding achievement and in 1979 he was awarded a plaque by the CIF-SS for his contribution to interscholastic athletics. Perhaps his greatest honor came in 1979, when the Board of Education for the Santa Ana Unified School District authorized the naming of the Saddleback High School Gymnasium, The "Lester McKnight Gymnasium".

In addition, McKnight was awarded the Medallion of Excellence from Saddleback High School for service to the Community and the school, and in 1984 was given an award for devoted, meritorious service to Orange County Athletics by the Orange County Athletic Directors Association.

JAMES A. FAUL

An outstanding teacher, coach and administrator in Southern California secondary schools for over 32 years, James A. Faul was a noted member of the CIF Southern Section Executive Committee for two terms, 1967-75 and 1976-82. Over his long tenure, Jim Faul set a prime example of dedication and



ability, both in the fields of education and athletics.

In addition to his duties as a member of the CIF-SS Executive Committee, Faul served as treasurer of the organization from 1976-82. He was also active as member of the Re-Leaguings Committee, Season of Sports Committee, Nominating Committee and Playoff Committee. Faul also lent his expertise to the betterment of high school athletics in Southern California as a League Representative for 15 years (1960-75).

Faul began his career in education and athletics as a teacher and coach at Bishop High School in 1948. In 1950 he moved on to Banning High School, where he coached no less than four sports: football, basketball, track and field and tennis. In 1952, he was named the Riverside County "Coach of the Year".

After leaving Banning at the end of the 1953 school year, Faul moved to South Pasadena High School, where he spent one year, again directing the athletic fortunes of his school in multiple sports programs: coaching, football, basketball and baseball.

In 1954, Faul moved to La Puente High School, where he successfully coached the football and baseball teams for the next 11 years. During this period, he also entered into the field of educational administration, serving as the assistant principal.

When Workman High School opened in the City of Industry in 1965, Faul was named its first principal. In the following seven years, he guided the progress and growth of the school, establishing many outstanding programs.

In 1972, Faul became the principal of Wilson High School in Hacienda Heights, where he again served a highly successful educational program. Under Faul, Wilson established an outstanding reputation for its curriculum and extracurricular activities as well.

Through the years, Faul dedicated literally thousands of hours of his personal time to providing advancement and quality to the programs of the interscholastic scene.

LEON S. GEORGE

Two words - dedication and professionalism - stand out in summarizing the career of Leon S. George, who has been a teacher, coach, athletic director and administrator in CIF Southern Section schools for the past 35 years. The Assistant Principal at Ganesha High School in Pomona, George will retire at the end of the current school year.

His teaching and coaching career dates back to 1949, when he became the head baseball coach and an assistant on the varsity football staff at Cochella



Valley High School. In three years at Cochella, George directed his baseball team to three league championships and compiled a record of 117-24. In the next school year (1953-54), he held similar positions at Banning High School.

George became the head football coach at Pomona's newly opened Garey High School in 1961, where he would also serve as director of athletics, head of the physical education department and J.V. baseball coach for the next 10 years. While at the helm of the Viking football team, George led his squad to another pair of league championships. His dedication and professional direction is the cornerstone of the fine athletic program Garey has build over the years.

In 1971, George moved to Ganesha High School in Pomona. As an assistant principal for the past 13 years, he has overseen the administration of the school's athletic department in addition to school supervision, plant operation and security.

George has been a member of the Southern California Football Coaches Association, the National Education Association, the California Teachers Association and the Associated Pomona Teachers.

ROLAND T. DAVIS

A man who continually demonstrated a high degree of integrity, honesty and professional competence during his 30-year career at Woodrow Wilson High School in Long Beach, Roland T. "Rollie" Davis was a prominent leader in the development and growth of the athletic program at his school as well as the CIF Southern Section.



At Wilson High, Davis served as Department Chairman of Physical Education, Director of Athletics, coach and teacher from 1932 until his retirement in 1962. In addition to administering the athletic program at Wilson, Davis was the league council representative to the CIF-SS Executive Council for each of the five leagues that Wilson belonged to during his tenure.

Davis' first coaching assignment at Wilson was a four year stint at the helm of the Bruin varsity baseball team (1932-35). In 1936, he became the head golf coach and proceeded to set a standard of success that may never be equalled in CIF-SS competition. Over a 19-year span, Davis directed this golf team to 19 straight league championships and a remarkable 17 CIF-SS titles. From 1938 to 1946, Wilson won an unprecedented nine consecutive CIF-SS championships, a feat that earned Davis the medallion of merit from the Helms Athletic Foundation.

During his employment in the Long Beach Unified School District, Davis co-authored three teacher guides in health education and one in physical education. He was a versatile and dedicated member of the Wilson High School staff, excelling as a model teacher and efficient administrator.

Rollie Davis, who passed away in September, 1983, was known as a soft spoken leader and an outstanding gentleman who was well respected by his contemporaries. He was a principled man who consistently carried out the in-

tent and spirit of the rules. He actively pursued the concept of good sportsmanship in all of his endeavors.

GEORGE E. TROTTER, JR.

Recognized by his community and coworkers as "Mr. Tustin High School", George Trotter was highly successful in his 17-year career as the Head Basketball Coach of the Tillers (1956-73).



Trotter, who was also the Varsity Baseball Coach at Tustin for three years, was highly regarded by his contemporaries during the entire length of his career. His coaching and guidance of the young student-athletes who played for him produced teams and individuals that were a source of pride to the school and community in which he worked. He displayed a consistent ability to evaluate people in a fair and equitable manner and was always aware of maintaining a balance between academics and athletics.

While at Tustin, Trotter produced three league basketball championships and five second place finishes. His team reached the CIF Southern Section semifinals in 1961 and returned to the quarterfinals the following year. His 1962 team went 21-5 and in 1973, his final campaign at Tustin, the Tillers were 20-8 on the season.

In 1966, Trotter was deservedly named the Crestview League Coach of the Year. In 1974, he was honored with the Award of Merit by the Southern California Interscholastic Basketball Coaches Association.

Trotter coached a total of 20 all-league players and five All-CIF selections while at the Tiller helm. In addition, he coached two players that earned All-Orange County honors, including Jeff Cunningham, who was the county Co-Player of the Year in 1966.

Coach Trotter began his career at Stronghurst (Illinois) High School in 1947 as the head football, basketball and track coach. In 1952 he moved to Bushnell High School in Prairie City Illinois, where he coached the football, basketball, track and baseball teams for four years prior to moving to California in 1956. His 22-year all-time basketball coaching record stands at 287-268.

WILLIAM J. WORTHINGTON

William J. Worthington is a name synonymous with the sport of golf in the CIF Southern Section. In a career that spanned 41 years, Worthington coached the sport at Inglewood High School and initiated developments that led to its growth and expansion as a popular CIF-SS prep activity.

Worthington, who began his coaching career at Inglewood High in

1930, took over the Sentinel golf program in its infancy. In those days, sport was conducted at the club level, with occasional informal matches. But through the efforts of Worthington, it was a short period of time before golf was included as an active athletic competition in the Bay League.

In 1937, Worthington initiated the Bay League Golf Tournament, and in 1939 he was able to obtain CIF sanctioning for the Inglewood High School Invitational Golf, Driving and Putting Tournament. He managed the latter for every year until his retirement in 1971.

In 1946, Worthington originated the Kiwanis Club Golf Team Try-out Tournament (also a CIF sanctioned event), and managed it for 25 years as well. In addition, he initiated and managed the Inglewood Recreation and Parks Tournament for a period of eight years.

Some of the more notable players who participated in Worthington's Inglewood Invitational included Billy Casper, Al Geiberger, Gene Littler, Howard Smith, Dave Stockton and Tommy Jacobs. As a coach, he directed the Sentinels to a CIF-SS individual championship, five Bay League crowns and two second-place finishes in CIF-SS team competition.

Worthington was also involved in prep sports as the Secretary-Treasurer of the Bay League Athletic Council for eight years (1952-60), in addition to serving as an official at the Inglewood Relays, the Bay League Track and Field Championships and numerous CIF-SS meets.

He is a past Chairman of the Inglewood Chapter of the American Red Cross, President of the Inglewood Chamber of Commerce, President of the California Business Educators Association, Chairman of the Centinela Valley CTA, a member of the Kiwanis Club of Inglewood Legion of Honor and a California Teachers' Association Member of Council.

Worthington has also been a past President of the Inglewood Coaches Association and the Managing Director for "Noteworthy Contribution to Prep School Athletics".

CLARENCE H. SCHUTTE

Clarence H. Schutte, who served for over forty years as a coach and athletic director at Santa Barbara High School (1925-1966), was without question, the single person responsible for the rich athletic tradition of one of California's truly outstanding prep institutions.



Schutte was the football, basketball and baseball coach at Santa Barbara High from 1925 to 1941, before interrupting his career for a tour of duty as a Lt. Colonel in the United States Air Force during World War II. He returned to Santa Barbara at the end of the war and coached football until 1951 and golf until 1965. During that entire period of time, he served as Director of Athletics and Chairman of the Physical Education Department.

Quite possibly, the most notable and outstanding achievement in the legendary coaching career of Clarence Schutte was the fact that he directed Don teams to CIF Southern Section Championships in four different sports: football in 1935, 1938 and 1940; basketball in 1934 and 1935; baseball in 1941 and golf in 1954. In addition to

the seven championships, he coached runner-up teams in football, basketball and baseball eight other times. The seven CIF-SS titles, coupled with the eight runner-up teams, add up to a total of 15 appearances in CIF-SS championship contests.

But for Schutte, the exploits of his famed Santa Barbara High football teams of the 1920's, 30's and 40's stand out above all else in his illustrious career. He was truly a football genius, a coach far ahead of his time in the aspects of strategy and technique. As early as the 1920's, Schutte installed a spread single-wing attack into the Dons' offense, featuring a sophisticated passing attack and the innovation of option football.

Schutte, who passed away at the age of 69 in 1970, was forever loyal, dedicated and deeply committed to his student-athletes. His list of disciples includes senators, judges, coaches, professional athletes, surgeons, professors and educators. Of the hundreds of athletes he coached, he was especially proud of the accomplishments of three: Marv Goux, Al Mathews and Al Geiberger.

In addition to his accomplishments on the athletic field, Coach Schutte was an outstanding educator. As Chairman of the Boys' Physical Education Department, he guided the Santa Barbara High School physical education program to statewide as well as national honors. Under his leadership, the school became a demonstration center for the State Department of Education.

DONALD N. HOWELL

An inspiration to thousands of students during his 22-year career as a teacher, coach and department chairman at Corona Junior High School, Donald N. "Dixie" Howell was always able to bring out the best in the students he worked with.



Howell, who has coached football, baseball, basketball, track and field and softball at Corona Junior High School will retire at the conclusion of the current school year. In addition to his teaching and coaching duties at Corona, Howell has been the Physical Education Department Head, Curriculum Council Representative and Director of Intramural Activities at his school.

Though he has conducted a diverse career as an athletic coach, Howell will best be remembered for his success in directing the fortunes of the Falcon football team. In 18 seasons as the head football coach, 1965-77 and 1978-83, Howell compiled a record of 65 wins, 36 losses and 7 ties for a winning percentage of .634. Corona completed five undefeated seasons during Howell's reign, in 1966, 1967, 1970, 1971 and 1983. His last team's unblemished mark may have been the sweetest, however, as the Falcons went winless for the two previous seasons.

Howell coached the Corona Junior High School baseball team for five seasons (1963-67) and compiled a 34-23 mark. His 1965 diamonds went 9-3 in his best year. He was also the Falcon basketball coach for three years, producing an overall record of 26-13 (.667). As was the case with his final football squad, Howell's 1983-84 cagers completed an undefeated (9-0) campaign.

In addition to coaching, Howell served the CIF Southern Section as an official for 20 years. During that period,

he officiated baseball, basketball and softball on the high school level.

DON LIEBHART

Don Liebhart will long be remembered in the annals of the CIF Southern Section as a highly successful basketball coach who was renowned for his innovative style and mastery of the technical aspects of the game.



Liebhart, who currently serves as the District Office Assistant-Superintendent of the Anaheim Union High School District, has had a broad and diverse 31-year career in education. He has been a teacher, coach, athletic director and school district administrator.

He broke into coaching at Santa Ana High School in 1953, handling the fortunes of the Saint basketball team for three seasons and the tennis team for two. In 1955, he took the Santa Ana netters to the CIF-SS semifinals with a record of 18-2.

In 1956, Liebhart left Santa Ana to take the reigns of the basketball program at Anaheim High School, which he built into one of the finest in the CIF-SS over the ensuing eight years. Under Liebhart, the Colonists won six league championships and entered the CIF-SS playoffs as many times. His 1959-60 team reached the CIF-SS championship game and finished the season with a sparkling record of 30-2. In 1961-62, the Colonists were again one of the top teams in the section with a record of 29-2. Anaheim compiled a 170-58 record during the Liebhart era for winning percentage of .746.

Liebhart was considered a "teacher of coaches" during his career and was well respected in Southern Californian basketball circles as a strategist who was ahead of his time. His innovative ideas on "man defense" and the passing game offense made him a major clinic attraction.

An original founder of the Southern California Coaches Association, Liebhart was also a member of the Orange County and Southern California Athletic Directors Associations. In addition, he was the National Chairman of the Association of Athletics, Physical Education and Recreation convention in 1974. In 1978, he was awarded the Merit Arrow by the Southern California Interscholastic Basketball Coaches Association.

DR. PHILLIP U. "DUFFY" LEWIS

A man who spent some 41 years as a coach and athletic director in CIF Southern Section schools, Dr. Phillip J. "Duffy" Lewis is credited with the establishment and growth of the entire athletic and physical education program of La Salle High School in Pasadena.

Lewis became the first Director of Athletics at La Salle when it opened in



1955. An all-boys Catholic school with an enrollment of less than 500 students, La Salle quickly developed a reputation of quality and determination in its athletic programs under the guidance of Lewis.

"We will play anyone for money, marbles or chalk," was the motto that Lewis lived by during his years at La Salle. He was the type of coach who would shy away from any competition, no matter how superior it may have seemed. His belief was that if you don't meet those considered better than yourself, you lessen the chances of improving beyond your lowest capabilities.

Lewis served as the head varsity basketball and baseball coach for 10 years at La Salle, in addition to heading the track team for three seasons. He was also a consultant at the school for four years and served as Vice Principal for two years.

Though he coached many sports, Lewis was most noted for his basketball program at La Salle. His best seasons included records of 22-6 (1962), 19-1 (1963), 17-3 (1965) and 18-4 (1977). In each of those seasons, Lewis took his squad into the CIF-SS playoffs. His all-time basketball record was a sparkling 352-74.

Possibly the greatest honor bestowed upon the Lancer coach came in 1981, when the school alumni dedicated the La Salle gymnasium in his name. When the La Salle gym, now known as the "Dr. Phillip J. 'Duffy' Lewis Gymnasium" was first constructed in 1960, Lewis was a major contributor to its design.

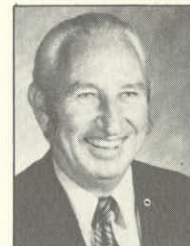
Lewis began his coaching career at Montebello High School in 1937, where he headed the football and track teams. After four years he moved on to Burbank High School, where he coached football and baseball for eight years, followed by a four year stint at Notre Dame High in Sherman Oaks, where he also handled the football and track squads. Before taking the job at La Salle, Lewis spent a single year at Cathedral High School in Los Angeles, where he led the varsity baseball team to a fine 13-1 season and a CIF-SS playoff berth.

Lewis was President of the Park and Recreation Commission for the City of Burbank for a six-year period, in addition to his teaching and coaching duties. He was also a member of the American Football Coaches Association and a charter member of the National Football Hall of Fame. He belonged to the National Athletic Directors Association and the Southern California Basketball and Football Association.

He was awarded a plaque by the Catholic Athletic Association for Coaching excellence and service to athletics and was also named the Santa Fe League Coach of the Year in 1978.

LEON QUELL FORMAN

Leon Forman, who for 22 years guided the track and field fortunes of one of the CIF Southern Section's traditional athletic giants - Long Beach Poly High School - compiled an outstanding record over his long and illustrious career. He not only achieved great success as a coach, but has received national attention as an official of the sport as well.



Forman became the Head Track Coach at Poly in 1946 and produced championship teams and individuals

with regularity until stepping down in 1968. In his final year, Forman topped the 100-win mark in dual meet competition on the varsity level. He completed his coaching reign at Poly with a total of 340 dual meet wins in all divisions (varsity, "B" and "C"), and established a winning percentage of .737.

Under Forman, Poly collected no less than 33 Pacific Coast and Moore League titles. His teams also won five CIF-SS championships and three CIF State crowns. In 1965, Forman's Poly High track team was proclaimed National Champions by Track and Field News and Power Magazine.

During the Forman era, Poly also had an abundance of individual champions, including 93 league, 27 CIF-SS and 10 CIF State title holders. More than 100 trophies and awards (Individual and League) were added to the Poly display case during his career. In a survey conducted by Track and Field News, Forman stands tied for the top spot among the nation's prep track coaches (with Vern Wolfe, USC Head Coach) for having produced the most All-American athletes (14) in the high school ranks.

In 1968, Forman was honored by the Helms Athletic Foundation for noteworthy coaching achievements and in 1977 was presented the Oscar Contratto Award for aiding community athletics by the Long Beach Century Club. In 1978, he was honored by the Long Beach Coaches Federation for his many contributions to young athletes.

Many of Forman's disciples have gone on to great achievements in colleges, universities and the Olympic games. Some of his most outstanding athletes include John Rambo, Martha Watson, Earl McCullough, Dee Andrews and Johnny Morris.

Forman's career as a track and field official is equally impressive and dates back to 1937. He joined the Southern California Track Starters Association in 1948 and has officiated continuously as a starter, timer, judge, inspector, referee, and field event official. He has worked the CIF-SS, CIF-LAS, NCAA and Pac-10 championship meets, the Indoor and Outdoor National and International Championships among countless others.

The highlight of his career as an official, however, will take place in the summer of 1984, when he officiates at the track and field competition of the 23rd Olympiad at Los Angeles. A member of The Athletic Congress (TAC), Forman has been selected as a timer and judge for the event.

From 1946 to 1950, he also served the CIF-SS as a football official for five seasons.

JACK O. ROBERTS

Jack O. Roberts, who has distinguished himself for the past 37 years in the fields of athletic officiation, education and administration, has been a tremen-



dous asset to the growth and quality of football officiating in the CIF Southern Section.

Roberts, who will retire this June, has been the Assistant Principal at Pacifica High School in Garden Grove for the past 14 years. He has keynoted an outstanding career as an authority on football officiating, an endeavor he began in his native state of Pennsylvania in 1947. His marked success in the field is highlighted by his position as the Supervisor of Football Officials for the Pacific Coast Athletic Association, which makes him one of only 13 major college supervisors in the nation.

Roberts officiated high school football, basketball and baseball in Pennsylvania from 1947 to 1961. He worked the Western Pennsylvania High School Playoffs in all three sports from 1954 to 1961 and the state finals for football in 1961. He moved to California in 1962 and became a member of both the Los Angeles Unit and Orange County Unit of the Southern California Football Officials Association. He officiated football for the CIF-SS from 1962 to 1970 and also worked the playoffs during those years. He was also a member of the instructional staff for the Los Angeles Unit and the Orange County Unit of the Southern California Football Officials Association.

In addition, Roberts was instrumental in forming the Long Beach Unit of the SCFOA, which started an instructional trend of local associations that could be of more service to the officials and schools they handled. He was also the first instructional chairman of the Long Beach Unit.

In 1965, Roberts joined the officiating staff of the Pacific-10 Football Conference and later became the president and treasurer of the Los Angeles Unit of Pac-10 Officials. Of the more notable games Roberts has worked in his career have been the 1974 and 1980 Rose Bowl games and the 1970 and 1976 East-West Shrine All-Star games. He retired from active officiating in 1980.

At Pacifica High School, Roberts has overseen the school athletic program from his Vice Principal post since 1969. Under his guidance, the Mariners won 11 league championships in football and reached the CIF-SS finals in 1978, won six league titles in baseball, three league crowns in soccer and a CIF-SS championship, and no less than 18 additional league championships in other boys' and girls' sports.

FRED ALVIN "AL" JOHNSON

As the head football and baseball coach at Woodrow Wilson High School in Long Beach during the 1930's and 40's, Fred Alvin "Al" Johnson compiled an outstanding record and was a positive influence on literally thousands of young men.



Whoever it was that quoted the phrase "Nice guys finish last," never came across the likes of Coach Al Johnson. For as a winner, Johnson was unparalleled and he was well liked and respected as a person could possibly be. To the many people who came to know him during his 31-year career as a coach, teacher and athletic director in Long Beach, "Coach Al" was always referred to with genuine affection as a "wonderful guy".

Johnson began his career at Wilson High School in the 1936-37 school year, taking the helm of the Bruin varsity football and baseball teams. Over the following ten-year period, his gridders forged a record of 49-26-7 (a winning percentage of .640), and won six league championships. During the same period, Johnson guided the Bruin baseball team to a remarkable record of 191-43 (a winning percentage of .818) and won no less than seven league crowns.

Four of Johnson's football players went on to play professionally: Norm Standlee, Dick Ottele, Carl Fennema and Dick Horn. In addition, he sent 16 baseball players into the professional ranks, including All-Star pitcher Bob Lemon.

The Al Johnson era at Wilson High ended in 1946, when he left to become the head baseball coach and athletic director at Long Beach City College. However, Johnson returned to Wilson in 1949, and served as an assistant football coach and athletic director until his retirement in 1967.

In October of 1980, the entire athletic complex at Wilson High was dedicated in Johnson's name. He was also honored by the Long Beach Century Club as an inductee into the organization's Hall of Fame in 1974.

Johnson began his coaching career at Wichita, Kansas, where he served the local high school for eight years. He coached for one year at Portland, Maine before moving to Long Beach to accept the football and baseball positions at Wilson High in 1936.

EUGENE NORMAN WEST

A coach who achieved great success in his 24-year career at Hemet High School, Norman West will be remembered as a man who worked extremely well with his many fine student-athletes in the development of high moral standards and ethical character.



West, who doubled as the Director of Athletics at Hemet, played an integral role in the growth and development of the modern athletic program that the school is well known for today.

Norman West began his coaching career at Hemet High in 1957, directing the fortunes of the Bulldog junior varsity football and baseball teams. In 1958 he was appointed head varsity baseball coach, a position in which his greatest successes would be realized.

West guided the Hemet baseball team through 20 consecutive winning seasons (1958-1978). During this period, the Bulldogs won an impressive eight league championships (1961, 62, 63, 66, 67, 73, 74 and 78) and reached the pinnacle of success with three CIF Southern Section titles (1963, 66 and 73). Hemet baseball squads became well known and respected throughout the CIF-SS while West was at the helm.

West was also an assistant coach for the Bulldog varsity football team for six seasons, 1960 to 1965. During his stint as a member of the football coaching staff, Hemet High produced five league championship teams (1961, 62, 63, 64, 65). In addition, West was an assistant coach for the Bulldog varsity basketball team from 1960 to 1964.

In 1966, West became Athletic Director at both Hemet High School and Junior High, a position he held until his retirement in 1981. He directed growth of a program with five existing sports at the time of his appointment, through the turbulent years that left the school with 15 sports and as many as 60 coaching assignments per year. Through it all, West maintained a quality and successful program that is thriving to this day.

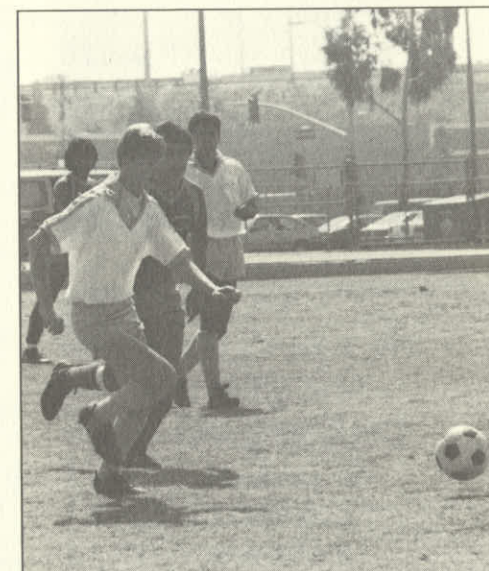

8. **BLUE BOOK COMMITTEE REPORT** - Mr. Stan Thomas, principal of Foothill High School and member of the Committee, provided background information as it relates to the following two proposals by way of the Blue Book Committee.

(A) The first proposal would bring track and field in line with the wording and intent of contests being allowed in the sport of cross country.

1505. **MAXIMUM TEAM CONTESTS** (Delete)

Amend 1506. to read:

MAXIMUM CONTESTS -

An individual of a track and field team will be permitted to enter and participate in no more than a total of 13 dual, triangular or invitational (sanctioned) meets during the season, not including all league or CIF-SS championships.

1527. **MAXIMUM CONTESTS -CROSS COUNTRY**

Team - (Delete)

Individual - (Leave as is)

(B) The second proposal would give flexibility to districts which are forced to employ walk-on individuals, many of whom are from within the junior high school or elementary schools within the districts and/or neighboring districts. This proposal would add Section 510.3 to the CIF-SS Blue Book.

RULE 510 - UNDUE INFLUENCE

510.3 - Individuals who are employed at a junior high school as a teacher and/or coach and who also are considered for employment as a coach at the high school level, must receive annual approval of the appropriate CIF-SS form which will require the signature of the high school district, principal of the specific high school where employed and the Southern Section Office.

9. **SCHOOL MEMBERSHIP** - Mr. Lon Hardgrave, CIF-SS Executive Committee member, reviewed with the Council a proposal dealing with schools falling into the category of California Youth Authority and Probationary Schools. This item will be referred back to leagues for discussion and will be voted upon at the May 10, 1984 meeting of the CIF Southern Section Council.

10. **PRIVATE/PUBLIC SCHOOL STUDY UPDATE** - Mr. Tom Jacobson, Chairperson of the Private/Public School Study Committee, provided an update of work currently being done by this Commit-

tee, with the Committee planning another meeting in April and a projected final report to be presented to the full Council in September, 1984.

11. **BAY LEAGUE TRACK PROPOSAL** - Mrs. Melvina Marble, representing the Bay League, reviewed a proposal calling for a recommendation to the State CIF that all Sections return to the two-day State Track Meet format in lieu of the present regional format, effective the 1984-85 school year. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the proposal.

12. **AREA RE-LEAGUING APPEALS** -

(A) **PALM SPRINGS HIGH SCHOOL** - Dr. Perris Earls, Principal, presented an appeal relative to the placement of Palm Springs High School in the Citrus Belt League for the 1984-85 re-leaguings cycle. Following discussion, a motion to approve the request failed to carry the necessary majority.

(B) **LA SIERRA/NORTE VISTA HIGH SCHOOLS** - Mr. Jim Romo, representing the Alvord Unified School District, presented an appeal relative to the placement of La Sierra and Norte Vista high schools in the San Andreas League for the 1984-85 re-leaguings cycle. Following discussion, a motion to approve the request failed to carry the necessary majority.

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MINUTES OF THE CIF-SS EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING APRIL 27, 1984

The April meeting of the California Interscholastic Federation Southern Section Executive Committee was called to order by Chairman Dr. Robert Packer at 10:10 a.m. in the Anaheim Room at Anaheim Stadium. All members were present with the exception of Rev. Charles Motsko, Bruce Keuning and Andrew Patterson.

1. COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE

Commissioner Ray Plutko reviewed with the Committee plans for the upcoming June and August Executive Committee meetings; the May 19 corporate sponsors' meeting; and that the response on the office computer system from schools is excellent. Additionally, he apprised the Committee on the status of the corporate support which looks very positive at this time; status on the football contract with Anaheim Stadium was reviewed; the yearly in-service day with staff; and the new Hall of Fame Program will begin this spring, with 14 inductees to be recognized.

2. BOYS ATHLETIC DIRECTORS' UPDATE - Mr. Mike Moropoulos reported on the concerns relative to officiating needs and walk-on coaches. In addition, the program for the State Athletic Directors Conference was reviewed.

3. GIRLS ATHLETIC DIRECTORS' UPDATE - Ms. Sheila Burrud reviewed the positive response to the newly developed addition of the Big "5" in Girls' Volleyball playoffs.

4. SUPERINTENDENT'S UPDATE - Ms. Cynthia Grennan reviewed with the Committee the need for personal letters of support to be sent to Dr. Bill Honeig of the State Board of Education regarding the need for walk-on coaches. The vote by the State Board of Education will take place May 10.

5. TREASURER'S UPDATE - The Commissioner updated the Committee on the basketball playoff budget and the progress to date in collecting dues for the computer.

6. STATE REPORT

A) State Budget and Goals Meeting - Mr. Tony Balsamo reviewed with the Committee the progress of goals development and status of the revised State CIF budget.

1) Article 2, Section 21 - It was moved, seconded and passed that the Committee would vote for deletion of Article 2, Section 21 if the State budget is passed. Additionally, the by-laws of the Southern Section would still reflect \$30 dues which would be amended to read state liability and defense fund. Any monies in excess of assessment would be borne by CIF-SS reserves.

B) Section Relations Update -The Commissioner reviewed the regional budget and the Southern Regional format which will be revised with the Southern Section withdrawal. The Northern Regional format will remain the same.

D) Interschola Exchange Program - It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the Interschola Exchange Program.

E) Legislative Committee Proposal - Mr. Moe Chavez presented the resolution on legislative positions by the California Interscholastic Federation. Following discussion concerning the possible effects this resolution would have on our organization, it was moved, seconded and passed to send delegates uninstructed.

7. CALENDAR FOR 1984-85 - The calendar meeting dates of the 1984-85 school year was approved as amended.

8. PALM SPRINGS HIGH SCHOOL RECONSIDERATION - Mr. Tony Balsamo reviewed the appeal of Palm Springs High school for reconsideration of league placement. Following discussion, the Commissioner was instructed to notify Palm Springs High School that the appeals process has been exhausted within the Southern Section and any further consideration would come under a State appeal.

9. PRIVATE AND PUBLIC STUDY UPDATE - Mr. Tom Jacobson reviewed the progress of the Committee to date. In addition, he discussed the newly-developed survey which will be sent to all leagues for input with a possible report forthcoming for the September meeting.

10. SOCCER REVIEW -Background information on a CIF-SS Office study as it pertains to the sport of soccer was presented by Mr. Dean Crowley and concern for the extraordinary increase in major incidents at all levels, i.e. athletes, officials, coaches, spectators and administrative supervision. Following lengthy discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend that a formal presentation be made to the CIF-SS Council and that the data be shared with the Council included in the recommendation to be that the sport of soccer be placed on probation for the 1984-85 school term. Further, it was moved, seconded and passed that a detailed program of constructive orientations be developed by the Southern Section Office and be part of the recommendation to the Council to involve all of the above mentioned areas.

11. NEW SCHOOL MEMBERSHIP -It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the membership of Temple Christian (Perris); La Sierra Academy (Riverside); and Baptist Christian (Hemet), effective this date.

12. ALTA LOMA HIGH SCHOOL REVIEW - Mr. Ray Rayburn, principal of Alta Loma High School, appeared before the Committee relative to providing additional background on the reinstatement of a student-athlete as it pertained to an altercation in a soccer post-season playoff contest. Following discussion it was moved, seconded and passed that an administrative censure be served relative to the process of reinstatement of the athlete in that the prior decision had been reached with consultation of the CIF-SS and the case formally closed. Further, it was the recommendation of the Committee that consideration for re-evaluation of the

case be made to include not only the student in question, but the actions of the coach and other students who may have been involved. Additionally, the soccer program at Alta Loma High School is to be placed on probation for the 1984-85 school term and officials who work the varsity league contests are to file a report with the Area Assigner following each league game in an effort to ascertain whether corrective measures are in evidence with regard to qualifying for post-season playoff consideration next year.

13. CROSS-LEAGUING REVIEW -Mr. Bill Clark, Administrator, reviewed background regarding the cross-leaguings procedures and a recommended amendment for same. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to support the change and send it to Council for consideration.

14. WALNUT HIGH SCHOOL REVIEW -Commissioner Plutko reviewed the background of the Walnut High School correspondence. Following discussion, the Committee directed the Commissioner to respond to Dr. David L. Brown, superintendent, Walnut Valley Unified School District, regarding the questions raised and to commend his posture on the administration of the current rules of the organization.

There being no further business to come before the Committee, the meeting was adjourned at 2:05 p.m.
