To date, there are 14 co-authors from the Senate alone and 17 from the Assembly. Additionally, ACSA and CSBA have given their endorsements to Senate Bill 19. Santa Barbara Superior Court Rules

### EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITY FEES LEGAL

The Santa Barbara Superior Court filed a 19-page Opinion which holds that the District's policy of asking students who wish to participate in extra curricular activities to pay a \$25 fee to be used to offset the expenses incurred in conducting the activity is legal.

According to a news release from the Santa Barbara Superintendent's Office, "the legal analysis of the extremely favorable 19-page opinion indicates that the School Board's position was upheld from each of the several different legal perspectives.

Perhaps the most significant legal determination was that the State Board of Education exceeded its authority in adopting a rule attempting to deny local school boards the right to charge a fee without specific authority by the State Board. As an appointed regulatory agency, the State Board cannot, as it attempted in this case, make law. The State Board of Education, in the future, will be required to cite specific legal authority for any new regulation it attempts. In this instance, the State Board of Education clearly attempted to assume legal authority it did not have.

As a result of the Court's ruling the Santa Barbara High School District and many other school districts in California may continue to maintain full, extra curricular activity programs by utilizing a student activities fee. Had the Court upheld the State Board of Education's Rule 350 prohibiting such fees, many local boards of education may have been required to terminate significant portions of their high school athletic and activity programs.

The Superior Court's decision is most welcome because it preserves the athletic and activities programs for students and because it preserves the authority of locally-elected school boards to act in the public's interest without their authority being superseded by the State Board of Education."

### SUMMER COMPETITION RULES REVIEWED

It's just about time for the close to another year and it would be appropriate for athletic directors to review with their staffs the guidelines covering competition during the summer months.

From the close of school in June until the opening of school in the fall semester, there shall be no restriction on high school coaches working with high school students or entering them in summer competition. A member school, however, may not sponsor a team's entry, provide uniforms, transportation or equipment, or otherwise be responsible for students in summer competition.

Further, schools MAY NOT as part of a summer physical education class, engage in competition (scrimmages, etc) with another school or excuse students enrolled in said P.E. classes from attending regular classes so that time may be "made up" while competing in a summer league. In summary, any competition during the summer months is to be divorced from P.E. classes in that instructors are being paid for their teaching services and not not to be compensated for coaching during this time span.

Coaches having teams entered in summer competition should be reminded that their teams may NOT start competition prior to the close of their school year in June — even though the league in which they are entered may have an earlier starting date.

In a news release from Santa Barbara School Board Attorney Thomas P. Anderle regarding the Hartzell vs Santa Barbara Board of Education case, Mr. Anderle states:

"The Plaintiffs in the case argued that the charge violates the "free school" concept, the "equal protection of the laws" concept, and Rule 350 of the State Board of Education. The Court said that there is no constitutional provision which requires the District to establish non-credit, extracurricular activities, nor is there any constitutional requirement that non-credit activities or courses be free. The activities for which the fee is charged are not within the prescribed course of study or necessary for educational progression from grade to grade. A student is not required to participate in the activities to obtain credit toward graduation.

In addition, the Court pointed out that there is no violation of the equal protection of the laws concept. The fee program does not discriminate on the basis of wealth of the student or the parents. All students who wish to participate in an extra-curricular activity or performance can do so. The school administration has adopted an affirmative action program to ensure that no one who wants to participate is excluded because of inability to pay the fee.

Finally, the Court said that Rule 350 of the State Board of Education is not applicable to extra-curricular activities. The legislature specifically stated in 1976 that a school district may initiate any program which is not in conflict with the purpose for which the school district was established. The Santa Barbara School District Board of Education has the authority, therefore, to enact such a program and the authority to charge for it, and Rule 350 is invalid as a basis for attempting to preclude a charge for extra-curricular activities.

In summary, the Opinion said the Santa Barbara School District can charge students a fee to participate in extra-curricular activities and performances."

### SAT TEST DATES SHOULD BE CHECKED!

High school students participating in interscholastic activities often find conflicts between CIF-SS events and college entrance test dates. Students can find a date which avoid interscholastic events if they arrange to take the test on those dates which do not conflict.

High school counselors and principals are urged to call attention of high school students to test dates and dates of CIF-SS events contained in the Southern Section calendar so that test dates can be selected to avoid conflicts.

# MINUTES OF THE CIF-SOUTHERN SECTION EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING OF MARCH 5, 1981

The meeting of the Executive Committee of the California Interscholastic Federation-Southern Section was called to order by Chairman Dr. Hanford Rants at 1:35 p.m. at the CIF-SS Office in Cerritos. All members were present.

1. APPROVÂL OF MINUTES — It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the Executive Committee minutes of February 19, 1981 meeting as mailed.

2. COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE — Mr. Ray Plutko updated the Executive Committee with respect to the extra publicity support given by McDonald's Operators Association and Pro Keds Corporation to the CIF-SS Boys' and Girls' basketball championships.

3. BOYS' ATHLETIC DIRECTOR UP-DATE — Mr. Clyde Francisco, Boys' athletic directors representative, reviewed several concerns related to officiating and budget cutbacks affecting sport programs.

4. SUPERINTENDENTS UPDATE — Dr. Maury Ross, superintendents representative, reported on the progress of Senate Bill 19 and encouraged continued support of the bill through additional contacts by school people to the members of the State Legislature.

5. GIRLS' ATHLETIC DIRECTOR UP-DATE — Mrs. Barbara Wilson, Girls' athletic directors representative, reported on the added interest of the Girls' basketball season indicating particular improvement in the area of publicity; outlined concerns regarding 330 hurdle event for Girls' track and the potential for fewer sports opportunities for girls due to increased financial pressures faced by school districts.

6. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL
(a) Girls' Triple Jump — Mr. Dean Crowley, administrative assistant, presented background information relative to the Girls' triple jump. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to

instruct our State CIF delegates to approve the addition of the triple jump event as a State CIF meet Girls' event for 1982.

(b) Federated Council Representation — Mrs. Barbara Wilson, chairwoman of the State CIF Legislative Committee, apprised the Executive Committee of proposed constitutional amendments to be voted upon at the June meeting of the State Federated Council. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to instruct CIF-SS delegates to approve the addition of one representative from the California School Boards Association, one from the Association of California School Administrators, one from a superintendents group, and two representatives (one male and one female) from the State Athletic Directors Association with one vote and that the vote of the California Coaches Association be split between a female representative and a male representative.

(c) Equal Rights and Minority Questions — Mr. Tony Balsamo presented two additional amendments to be considered for action at the June Federated Council meeting. It was moved, seconded and passed to support the following proposed amendments:

11(g) — To promote equal opportunities for all of the youth in California secondary school athletic programs regardless of race, religion, sex or national origin.

13 — It is the policy of the CIF not to discriminate on the basis of race, religion, sex or national origin in its athletic programs and related activities, in the employment of personnel, or in the selection of delegates to the Federated Council, committee members, officers or other such positions.

(d) State Liability Funding — Mr. Tony Balsamo apprised the Executive Committee of a formula to pro-rate the cost of statewide liability insurance premium for

OR MERCHANDISE GIFTS

The attention of the Southern Section Office has been called to the fact that some

commercial companies are attempting to give track shoes, tennis shoes, rackets, gift

certificates, etc., to outstanding high school athletes as a result of their performances.

"A high school student may not receive from any source an athletic award for CIF-SS

high school competition of more than \$20.00 dollars in value. In the event a high school

student accepts an athletic award above the value stated, that student becomes ineligible

for further high school athletics in that sport and shall automatically be barred from

competition during the remainder of that sport's season and for one full year thereafter,

and further until reinstated as an amateur by the California Interscholastic Federation

Federated Council. The \$20.00 dollar value for the individual award is the actual cost

of the item exclusive of engraving. Such award cannot be cash, a gift certificate, or

merchandise alone. It may be merchandise such as a badge, medal, plaque, ribbon,

picture, certificate or trophy, provided it is suitably engraved or identified as an award.

Awards of not more than \$50.00 in value to students who are members of CIF-SS

the 1981-82 school year. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to send Southern Section representatives uninstructed on this issue.

(e) Constitutional Amendments — Dr. Robert Packer reviewed several proposed amendments to the State CIF Constitution regarding Articles 8 and 9 and Items 80 and 90 on "Committees and CIF Executive Committee" formation. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to instruct our State delegates to oppose the constitutional amendment as written and to seek changes in the format of committee reports.

(f) State Rule 214 — Dr. Robert Packer outlined the changes in proposed State CIF By-Law 214. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend passage of the amended rule change to CIF-SS Council with action on this item at the May Council meeting.

7. IVY LEAGUE APPEAL — Mr. Joe Rile, principal of Riverside Poly, Mr. Mike Churchill, Riverside Poly football coach, Mr. William Conlon, Ivy League president, met with the Executive Committee to review an appeal of a league recommendation and decision regarding a football incident. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to sustain the action of the Ivy League.

8. TREASURER'S REPORT — Mr. Jim Faul, treasurer, reviewed the 1981-82 proposed CIF-SS budget indicating an increase in support income, the addition made to the reserves and that there would be no additional costs to member schools next year. The budget will be presented to the CIF-SS Council as an information item in March and as an action item at its May meeting.

9. NOMINATING COMMITTEE REPORT — Dr. Hanford Rants presented the report of the nominating committee as it related to upcoming terms of office on the CIF-SS Executive Committee. The first reading of the report will take place at the March Council meeting with a vote to be taken at the May Council meeting.

10. JUNIOR HIGH SYMPOSIUM — Ms. Margaret Davis, administrative assistant, outlined plans for the upcoming Junior High Symposium slated for March 31, 1981 at the Buena Park Convention Center.

11. NEW MEMBERSHIP — Mr. Bruce Keuning, private school representative, presented requests for membership. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve membership for Valley Christian Heritage (El Centro), Leffingwell Christian School (Norwalk) and Redondo Christian School (Redondo Beach).

12. BLUE BOOK COMMITTEE RE-PORT — Mr. Ray Plutko, commissioner, outlined several recommended changes in the CIF-SS Blue Book as proposed by the CONTINUED ON PAGE 5

Aircal has been named the official airline for the California Interscholastic Federation due to its support for our young athletes involved in the California Interscholastic Federation.




Aircal has been serving the West since 1976 with routes to 13 cities and three states, California, Nevada, Oregon and soon to Seattle, Washington.

### AN AMAZING COMEBACK FOR LB POLY

San Marcos High's quest for a perfect basketball season and a CIF-SS championship came up moments short at the Los Angeles Sports Arena.

Long Beach Poly, the CIF-SS runner-up three of the last four years, made the big plays down the stretch and defeated the Royals 65-63 before a championship game crowd of over 10.000.

Poly's Leroy Washington swished a turn-around 14-foot jump shot with one second left in the game to cap a ferocious Jackrabbit rally and give Long Beach its first CIF-SS cage title since 1976.

The loss has to be especially hard for San Marcos. The Royals, whose season ends at 26-1, led by as much as 12 points and held a 10-point advantage most of the second half. San Marcos held a 62-52 margin with just 2:18 left.

But when things went sour for Coach Maury Halleck's Royals, it happened with astonishing quickness and with seemingly irreversible momentum. It left the Royals shaking their head with disbelief and a LB Poly crowd wild in their excitement with the victory.

It wasn't until the final seconds that coach Jack Errion showed traces of a grin - his Corona del Mar Sea Kings had the CIF-SS 3A basketball championship in the bag. Playing with patience and poise, the Sea Kings outplayed a good Tustin team to capture the 3A title 69-54 at the LA Sports Arena.

Glendale defeated Foothill League rival Blair for the third time this season, 60-59 to win the CIF-SS 2A crown. A strong Blair team built up a 33-27 halftime lead with Glendale coming back to hold off the Vikings led by All-CIF Shawn Holiday who scored 22 points in the game.

Santa Clara, under the direction of veteran coach Lou Cvijanovich, won its second straight CIF-SS 1A title defeating Whittier Christian 59-39. It was Cvijanovich and Santa Clara's seventh 1A crown since 1958.

Forward Tom McKay hit two free throws with 55 seconds left to lift *Montclair Prep* to a 63-62 victory over Nelles in the Small School championship at the Sports Arena.





### GOOD SPORTSMANSHIP: A CONSTANT CHALLENGE

We have a challenge, a constant challenge, we who believe high school sports serve an educational purpose in the lives of teenage boys and girls.

The challenge is sportsmanship—good sportsmanship or bad sportsmanship, for interscholastic athletics will live or die, respectfully, by sportsmanship that is good or bad.

Four "characters" are involved in the challenge of sportsmanship—administrator, coach, player, and spectator. The listing is alphabetical but only by coincidence. The listing, primarily, is in order of responsibility.

The administrator holds the key to the issue of sportsmanship. If he/she appreciates the importance of it by insisting that sportsmanship be good at any cost, then his/her school cannot go wrong. If he/she realizes the value of sportsmanship but fails to implement its good practice, then his/her school cannot help but run into problems.

The coach is the "standard-bearer" of sportsmanship. His/her role is a crucial one. He/she has the awesome double power of either making his/her contest a real showcase for education or turning it into a meaningless exercise in winning or losing. He/she can hold player and spectator in the palm of his/her hand through self-control and dignity, or he/she can incite either or both to act contrary to the aims and objectives of schoolboy (and girl) athletics.

The player to a great extent mirrors the coaching in projecting sportsmanship. Many, of course do not need the coach's reflection;

they know "how you play the game" is the No. 1 thing. And, obviously, the player is neither a puppet nor a matured individual, therefore, susceptible to inconsistent sportsmanship. The coach—the good coach—knows how to handle, even in front of spectators, these situations.

And what about the spectator? Most of them know what high school sports is all about. But the irritating minority apparently always will be with us. The influence of the "bad guys", hopefully, will be minimized by the "good guys" in the audience. But if it isn't, then all the more reason for the players to present themselves well, for the coach to be above reproach at all times and for the administrator to prepare and enforce procedures to keep fans in line.

As long as there exists within all of us that human characteristic to win, we will have to be concerned in the area of sportsmanship. The desire to win is not bad by any means; on the contrary, it is good. It is the proper attitude for approaching any endeavor. To do otherwise would be to vote for failure instead of success. But while the desire to win must not be stifled, the quest to win must be honorable, and in athletics the quest must be with the vivid realization that somebody is not going to win. In high school sport, winning cannot be the "only thing"; the role of the loser is equally as educational, therefore equally as important, as the role of the winner.

Remember—high school sports will live or die not by contests won or lost but by sportsmanship, good or bad!



# SOUTH HILLS, KISTLER: DOMINATE CIF-SS WRESTLING CHAMPIONSHIPS

In 1980, the South Hills Huskies were favorites to claim their first CIF-SS wrestling title. However, after winning the Valle Vista league crown, the Huskies finished a disappointing fourth behind league rivals La Puente and Nogales.

With virtually everyone returning, South Hills left no doubt in anyone's mind who was this year's top wrestling squad. The South Hills contingent tied the CIF-SS team scoring record of 106½ points set by Fountain Valley in 1977. South Hills didn't have an individual champion but exhibited excellent team balance qualifying six wrestlers to the State meet.

As dominant as South Hills has been to Southern Section teams, it can't compare to the four year stranglehold Marty Kistler has had on the CIF-SS gold medal in his weight divisions. Kistler (Notre Dame, Riverside) became the first wrestler in Southern Section history to win four consecutive championships. If this was not sufficient, consider his record in the state tournament. Kistler was runner-up in 1978 and 1979 and won the state title in 1980. Kistler has controlled everyone this season and appears to be headed for his second state crown.

David Ciprian (La Sierra) and Howard Lawson (El Dorado) won their second CIF-SS championships in their weight divisions. Ciprian won the 106 lb. title in 1979 and repeated this year at 115 lbs. Lawson, a defending State champion, won the 141 lb. title last year. Lawson had an easy time in claiming the 158 lb. crown.

Lakewood's Ray Gulmatico was this year's outstanding lightweight wrestler. Gulmatico, a State champion as a sophomore, won his first CIF-SS crown by pinning Mario Acosta, Lawndale, in the finals.

This year's outstanding upperweight was Brea-Olinda's Mike Greenleaf. The 203 pound Greenleaf extended his amazing record of consecutive falls by pinning all of his opponents in the championship tournament.

# CIF STATE WRESTLING CHAMPIONSHIPS— A SOUTHERN SECTION FEAST

The Southern Section has always been a "powerhouse" in wrestling. The Southern Section sends five representatives to the State championships, more than any other section. However, 1981 was a banner year even for the Southern Section. CIF-SS wrestlers claimed seven individual state titles as well as the team title. In many weights, the Southern Section placed four wrestlers in the top six.

South Hills became the first Southern Section school to win the State CIF team championship in the eight year history of the tournament. The Huskies accomplished this by sending two individuals to the championship finals and placing two more wrestlers in the consolation bracket.

Three Southern Section wrestlers claimed the second CIF State individual title. Ray Gulmatico, Lakewood, won his title by easily outclassing Shastas undefeated Brian Stevens in the finals. Marty Kistler (Notre Dame) finished an unbeaten season by pinning Scott Bilyeu (Clovis) in the championship bout. El Dorado's Howard Lawson was the last in the trio of Southern Section wrestlers to claim two State titles. Lawson faced season long rival Troy Osborne of South Hills for the title. Lawson pinned Osborne with a spectacular throw in the initial period to claim his crown.

An outstanding wrestler award was not issued, but Mike Greenleaf, Brea-Olinda, would have been the top candidate for the award. Greenleaf once again pinned all of his opponents to win the State Championship. Greenleaf ended the year by pinning all his opponents through preliminary, sectional, and State competition.

The March meeting of the Southern Section of the California Interscholastic Federation was called to order by Chairman Dr. Hanford Rants at 9:15 a.m., Thursday, March 19, 1981 at the Saddleback Inn. All leagues were represented with the exception of the Angelus, Heritage, Mission, Pinon and Westside leagues.

1. APPROVAL OF MINUTES — It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the minutes of the CIF-SS Council meeting of January 22, 1981 as published in the March issue of the CIF-SS Bulletin and the CIF-SS Executive Committee meeting of February 19, 1981 as published in the March issue of the CIF-SS Bulletin.

2. COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE — Mr. Ray Plutko, commissioner, reported on the just completed winter playoff season.

3. STATE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION UPDATE/SENATE BILL 19 - Dr. Maury Ross, superintendents' representative, and Mrs. Barbara Wilson, Executive Committee member, reported on the time line of Senate Bill 19 and reiterated the importance of continued contacts with members of the State Legislature in this regard. Attention was also drawn to the importance of encouraging qualified women to serve on governing bodies where possi-

Mr. Tony Balsamo, past-president of the CIF-SS Council, reported on continuing discussions between representatives of the State Department of Education and the

4. NOMINATING COMMITTEE REPORT - Mr. Bruce Kitchen outlined the work of the Nominating Committee as it relates to filling vacancies on the CIF-Southern Section Executive Committee. It was moved, seconded and passed to close the nominations with the following slate proposal for a vote at the May meeting of the Council.

5. TREASURER'S REPORT — Mr. James Faul presented the proposed 1981-82 CIF-SS budget, which will become an action item at the May Council meeting.

6. STUDENT/COACH ASSOCIATION COMMITTEE - Mr. Robert Paisola presented three phases suggested for Council consideration with primary focus on phase one, targeting an implementation effective with the summer prior to 1982-83 school year. Following discussion, the Council was directed to take back any or all of the proposals for league discussion with a vote to be taken at the May meeting.

Points for consideration.

(PHASE ONE) A dead month where no association between coach and student athlete take place between the dates of July 15 and August 15. (Dead time is defined as a period of time during which there shall be no association, activity or contact between a coach or representative of the school and students with potential athletic eligibility for the purpose of competition, practice or any other activity, the purpose or effect of which is the development, improvement or maintenance of the student's athletic ability or physical conditioning.

(PHASE TWO) One week of dead time, exclusive of playoffs, be implemented between the fall and winter season of sports, and the winter and spring season of sports. The dead week would be Monday through Friday for purposes of arranging school calendars. (Please note: It is recommended that this be implemented at Phase Two to allow sufficient time for the CIF-SS Office to coordinate its calendar with the State CIF calendar and this will necessitate lead time).

(PHASE THREE) Further suggestions for implementation. Suggestions include balance of restricted summer contact to practice only and no competition; competition only and no practice; elimination of all summer contact; elimination and/or modification of May 1 practice ruling, etc. 7. BAY LEAGUE SOCCER PROPOSAL

- Mrs. Melvina Marble, Bay League representative, and Mr. Roger Bryant, South Torrance athletic director, presented for Council consideration a soccer proprosal which would allow teams the option of playing a 19th game instead of a scrimmage effective the 1981-82 school year. This will be an action item at the May Council meeting.

8. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL -Dr. Robert Packer presented a proposed State CIF constitutional change in By-Law 214 for consideration by the Council. Rationale for the by-law change was presented by Dr. Packer and Dr. Hanford Rants with the proposal to be voted upon at the May

The change in By-Law 214 to read as

"214. A student who transfers from school A to school B without a change of residence on the part of the parents or legal guardian from school attendance area A to school attendance area B shall be residentially eligible for all athletic competition, except varsity level competition in sports in which the student has competed in interscholastic competition during the twelve calendar months

preceding the date of such transfer, provided the athletic eligibility is approved by both principals of the schools involved. Each CIF Section shall establish rules and procedures to review an individual case in the event that either principal declines to approve such athletic eligibility, upon appeal by the student to the CIF Section. Each CIF Section may waive the ineligibility at varsity level provided the Section establishes rules and procedures regulating same. This rule also applies to students 18 years of age or older."

9. BLUE BOOK COMMITTEE REPORT - Mr. Gene Hartley, chairman of the Blue Book Committee, outlined several proposed Blue Book changes designed to clarify existing regulations and to bring the CIF-SS Blue Book in line with the State CIF constitution. The Council will be asked to vote on the proposed changes at the May meeting.

Mr. Hartley also gave background material relevant to the pending Santa Barbara court decision involving fees for athletic participation.

10. PÎONEER LEAGUE WRESTLING PROPOSAL - Mr. Carroll Adams, Pioneer League president, presented a request to the Council for consideration of playoff groupings for CIF-SS post season competition in wrestling, effective the 1981-82 school year. This will be an action item at the next Council meeting.

11. RELEAGUING TWO-YEAR CY-CLE — It was moved, seconded and passed to lengthen the releaguing process from a one to a two-year cycle effective September of 1982 for the 1982-84 period. The Releaguing Committee will remain on active call to handle individual school and area appeals during the interim year in the two-year releaguing process for situations such as closing of a school, major drop in enrollment, new schools, etc.

12. GIRLS' WATER POLO SEASON OF SPORT — It was moved, seconded and passed to deny the request of the Whitmont League to conduct Girls' water polo during the winter season.

13. WOMEN ON GOVERNING BODIES - Dr. Hanford Rants called to the attention of the Council the continuing need for involving qualified women in various levels of athletic administration throughout the Southern Section.

There being no further business to come before the Council, the meeting adjourned at 11:45 a.m.

### **CIF-SS COURTESY CARD INFORMATION**


