W. R. MOODY TO DONATE TROPHIES



When it comes to a tip of the 'ol hat, one is definitely in order for the W. R. Moody Company!

"Simply fantastic," says CIF Southern Section Commissioner Ray Plutko in describing an agreement with the W. R. Moody Company, which will directly benefit every league within the CIF-SS.

Under the arrangement, which becomes effective the 1983-84 school year, W. R. Moody Company will donate a trophy for each Boys and Girls' varsity sport conducted at the league level, accounting for all 62 member alignments.

"I've been working with the schools in the Southern Section for a number of years now and in one respect, it's a direct means of saying thanks," responded Bill Moody, owner of the company, which specializes in trophies and awards.

"Athletics play an important role in the schools and it's important they are maintained," added the personable Moody.

The agreement is an outgrowth of the sports marketing and promotion concept developed over the past two years by Commissioner Plutko.

"For the fourth straight year our schools will not encounter a raise in dues and although that is a major achievement in itself, I was looking for something additional to provide impact on our membership," said Plutko.

"At times, it's difficult to understand how the corporate support fits into the overall budget, but I'm certain the generosity of Bill Moody will clear that question in a hurry."

When one considers the number of varsity trophies purchased at the league level each year, the direct donation will have an immediate and major impact on each league budget — a direct financial savings to the 500 members of the Southern Section.

Plutko admitted he had been working on the idea over the past year and believed the time was right to approach Moody with the concept.

"Actually, whenever I talk about our schools and the benefits derived by the students from interscholastic athletics, it makes the task that much easier.

"Bill Moody felt the same way after listening to my concerns for maintaining the programs and as a credit to Bill, it didn't take him long to agree with those concerns," added Commissioner Plutko.

Plans call for the Southern Section Office to contact each league representative early next year and verify the varsity sports being offered, with the W. R. Moody Company then placing the respective orders.

The one year notice will allow leagues the opportunity to make plans for the 1983-84 school term.

A salute is indeed due to the W. R. Moody Company.



IT'S BACK TO TOP BILLING

Refreshing!

When it comes to words, just one aptly describes the overall status of eligibility for the 1981-82 school year.

Initially, for the first time in the last four years, there was no attempt to seek redress through the court system as it pertained to the Southern Section post-season playoffs.

Needless to say, this is indeed refreshing, particularly when reflecting on the aims and objectives of the organization and its most prized commodity — the student/athlete.

As a result, the fall, winter and spring playoffs provided an arena where the ideals of sportsmanship, ethical conduct and fair play once again drew top billing.

But the new-found aura was hardly confined to post-season competition.

This past school year marked the introduction of the new residence transfer rule — Rule 214 — one designed to provide some level of limited participation for those students not meeting the basic requirement of a bonafide change of residence by their parents to a new attendance area.

In previous years, only a segment of the student body was afforded an avenue for some form of restricted eligibility. This group covered those transferring from a public to private and/or private to public campus (Form 99).

In theory, the limitations were believed to be a means of discouraging "undue influence" and movement of the often-termed "blue-chip athlete."

But, was it being done at the expense of others? What of the hundreds of students transferring for a different program in band, debate or change in curriculum?

No doubt, the vast majority would have treasured the opportunity to participate at a level other than varsity, but the rules prevented same.

Thus, the spawning of Rule 214. However, it was not to be without apprehension in some corners.

Was it successful?

Simply stated, refreshingly successful.

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MINUTES OF THE CIF SOUTHERN SECTION EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING February 18, 1982

The meeting of the Executive Committee of the California Interscholastic Federation, Southern Section, was called to order by Chairman Dr. Robert Packer, at 1:25 p.m. at the CIF-SS Office in Cerritos. All members were present with the exception of Andrew Patterson, Blinn Tenney and Barbara Wilson.

1. **COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE:** Mr. Ray Plutko, Commissioner, reviewed with the Committee the upcoming Basketball Playoffs, sponsorship of the Tournament of Champions at the Long Beach Arena by Thrifty Drug and Big Five Sporting Goods, and the promotion of basketball playoffs on KABC Talk Radio Sports. In addition, the Commissioner expressed his concern relative to the number of basketball and soccer games not completed due to the fact that coaches had pulled their teams prior to the conclusion of the contest.

2. **BOYS' ATHLETIC DIRECTORS' UPDATE:** Clyde Francisco updated the Committee on the ongoing activity of the Athletic Administrators Advisory Committee and its plan to solicit input from all geographical areas of the Section.

3. **GIRLS' ATHLETIC DIRECTORS' UPDATE:** Sheila Burrud reviewed with the Committee the Pacific League Walk-on Coach Certification Program and the Pacific League corporate sponsorship program for their swimming and badminton championships.

4. **SUPERINTENDENT'S UPDATE:** Dr. Maury Ross reported the ongoing implementation of SB 19.

5. **TREASURER'S UPDATE:** Mr. Jim Faul reviewed with the Committee the proposed 1982-83 budget, which will be presented to the CIF-SS Council at the March meeting.

6. **STATE REPORT:** (a) **STATE BY-LAW 515 AND 516** — Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to support the proposed By-law amendments which would update the due process provisions in Section and State appellate procedures.

(b) **STATE BY-LAW 205** — Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to maintain the Council's earlier position of non-support for the By-law change relative to incomplete grades.

(c) **YESHIVA HIGH SCHOOL** — Commissioner Plutko reviewed with the Committee Yeshiva High School's appeal to the State with reference to its religious holidays as it relates to the interscholastic athletic program.

(d) **NORCAL CROSS COUNTRY CHAMPIONSHIPS** — Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed for non-support of the proposal and to follow the State-adopted priority list when sports are added for regional and state CIF competition.

(e) **CLASSIFICATION SYSTEM** — Mr. Bruce Keuning and Commissioner Plutko reviewed the recommended classification system for State championship playoffs, which will be directed to the Council for vote.

(f) **STATE REGIONAL TRACK** — Mr. Dean Crowley, administrative assistant, reviewed the proposed State Regional Track format with the Committee, which will be directed to the Council for vote.

(g) **STATE REGIONAL WRESTLING** — Mr. Bill Clark, administrative assistant, reviewed the proposed State Regional Wrestling Format with the Committee, which will be directed to the Council for vote.

(h) **STATE BUDGET** — Mr. Bruce Keuning reviewed with the Committee the proposed State Budget for 1982-83. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to send our delegates uninstructed with reference to adoption.

7. **CONTINUATION SCHOOL PROPOSAL:** Mrs. Anna Roop, principal Wintersburg School in the Huntington Beach Unified School District; and Mr. U. Edwin Harding, administrator Student Services, Orange County Department of Education, appeared before the Committee to present a proposal allowing students who voluntarily transfer to a continuation school to compete as representatives of a CIF member home school. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed not to support the proposal as submitted at the CIF Southern Section level. The Southern Section representatives will carry the proposal to the State CIF Federated Council as directed in that the rule in question is a State rule.

"The Real Challenge . . . SUPPORT INTERSCHOLASTIC ATHLETICS"

"It will be the largest public relations ever attempted by the CIF Southern Section." That's the way Commissioner Ray Plutko describes a planned major effort for the 1982-83 school year, one which will focus an awareness on the Other Half of Education.

The format calls for a concentrated two-week period — October 17-30 — one which will adopt the theme, "THE REAL CHALLENGE . . . SUPPORT INTERSCHOLASTIC ATHLETICS."

Plans call for bumper stickers; posters; newspaper, radio and television blitzes; special recognition days (i.e., Coaches Day, Community Day, Pep Squad Day, Band Day, Prep Sportswriter Day, etc.), and the start of a league sportsmanship award program.

Under the latter guidelines, each of the 62 leagues in the Southern Section will receive a perpetual sportsmanship trophy, with the league membership developing criteria for the awarding of same by way of study body involvement over the course of the entire school term.

However, the program won't stop there as the optional football key chain sale — by which participating schools may generate a 200 per cent profit on each key chain sold — will be highlighted during this two-week span.

The overall format of the two weeks will be tied in with the National Federation program for the support of all high school activities and it should indeed be a banner 14-day period.

Boys' Basketball Championships LAKEWOOD LANCERS WIN THEIR FIRST-EVER BASKETBALL CIF-SS TITLE

It was the proverbial "thrill of victory and agony of defeat", as two closely-matched teams battled for the 1982 4A Boys' Basketball title. A crowd of 9188 fans were on hand at the LB Arena for the CIF-Southern Section/Thrifty-Big Five Championships to witness the Lakewood Lancers win their first-ever basketball crown against Inglewood, 82-70.

Lakewood had to make adjustments in its zone to shut down the Sentinels 9 for 9 shooting in the first quarter. The game was won by Lakewood in the third quarter as the Lancers piled up a 21 point lead.

Lancer Todd Murphy proved his worth as he scored 21 points and 10 rebounds. He subsequently earned the tournament MVP honor.

In the earlier match-up, top seeded St. Bernard defeated Hoover of Glendale 57-59 to win the 3A Division title.

Although never in the position of trailing scorewise, the mighty Vikings did not live up to their "one of the best teams in the state" reputation as they led by only two points with only 5:03 to play in the fourth quarter. However, teamwork, determination and a couple of free throws came together for the victory.

2A action saw the Burros of Burroughs Ridgecrest roll over Capistrano Valley, 66-55. It seemed that the whole town of Ridgecrest turned out to witness their Burros win their first CIF-SS basketball title by shooting 76 percent and jumping out to a 44-28 halftime lead. Even a cool-down period during the second half for Burroughs didn't help the Cougars put it together.

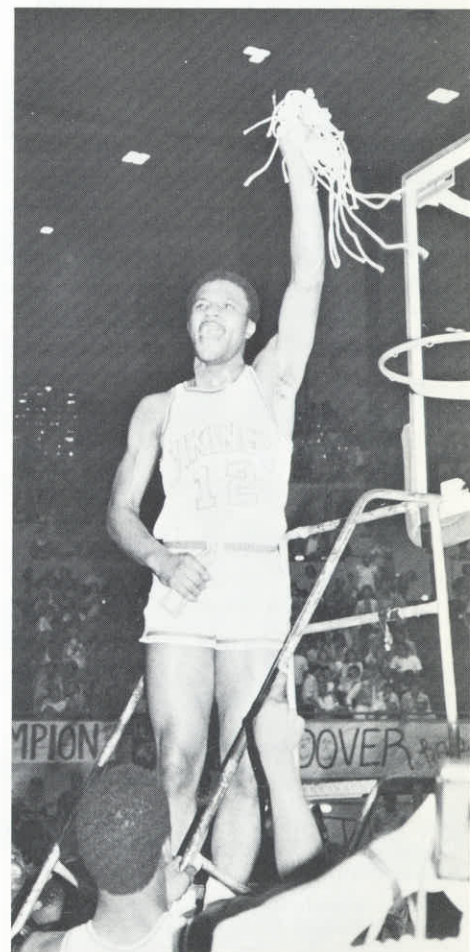
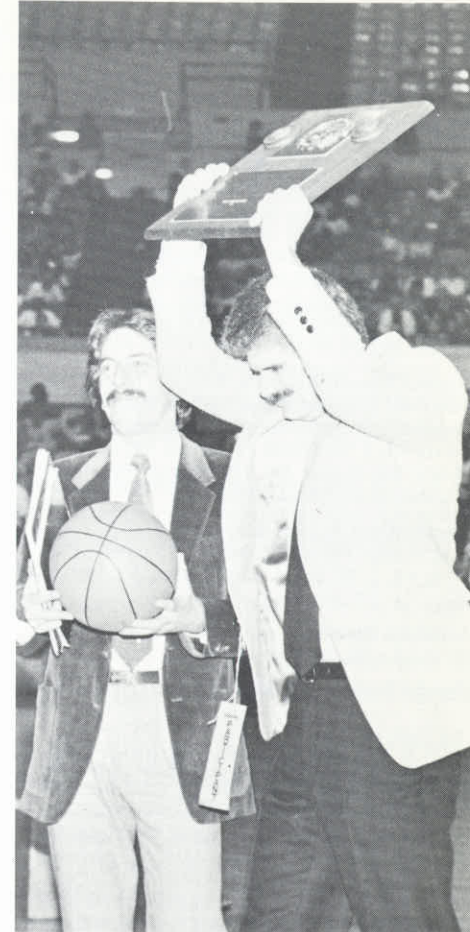
Dalton Heywood contributed greatly to the Burros win, as he scored a game-high 21 points and grabbed 18 rebounds.

It was quickness and sharp shooting that made the difference in the 1A division championship as Banning narrowly won over St. Joseph of Santa Maria, 54-52, to earn themselves the 1A division title.

Free throws in the last seconds of the game by the Broncos made the difference and gave Banning its third CIF-SS crown in the closest game of the day.

Small School division finalists Crossroads and Montclair Prep met for the third time of the season in the championship game and it was the Crossroads Roadrunners which emerged victorious and won the divisional title, 52-46.

The early session of the day had 5271 basketball fans in attendance and combined with the evening session of 9188 made the total 15,459, the third largest crowd since 1964.

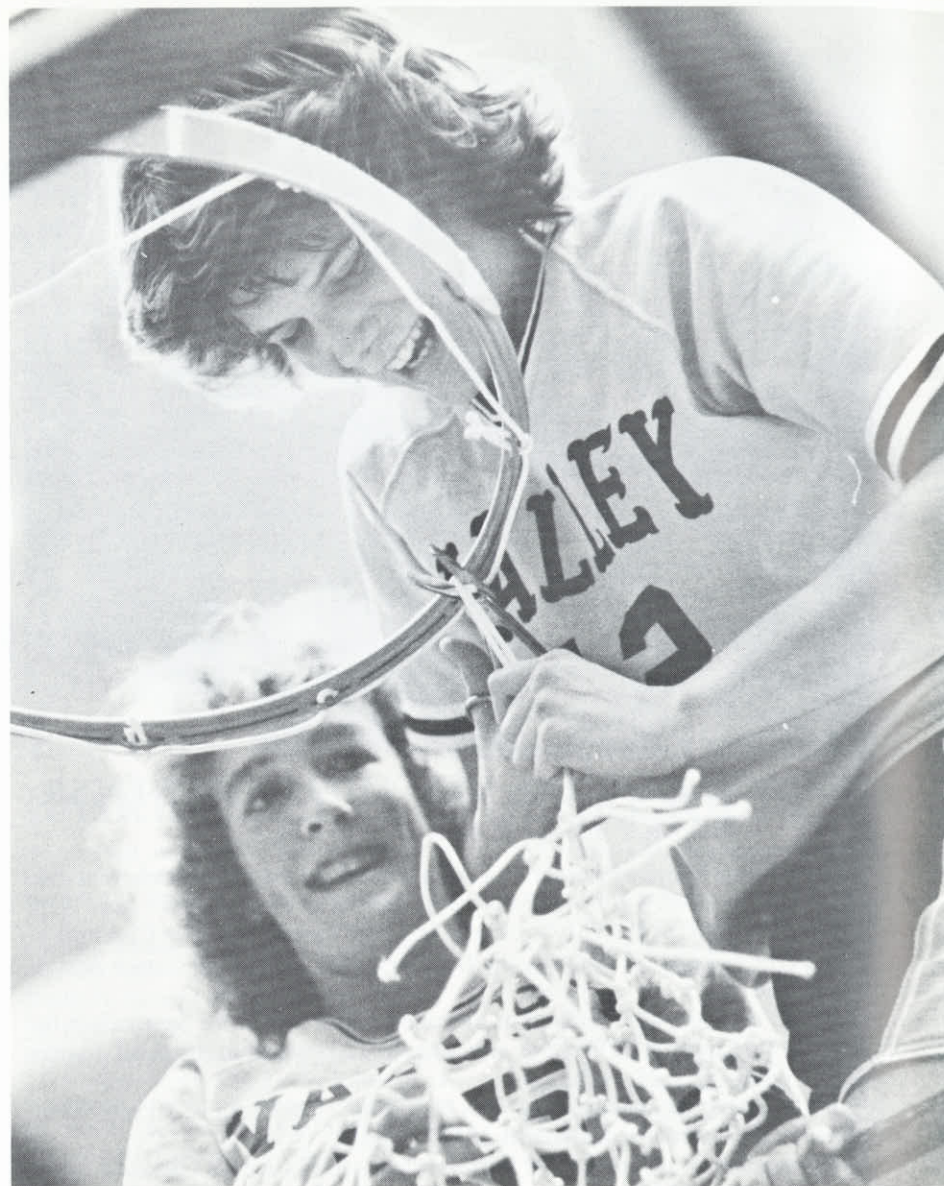

RIVERSIDE POLY WINS 4A GIRLS DIVISIONAL CROWN

Fifteen of the points were scored by Miller on a severely sprained knee, suffered in the third quarter. After she sat on the bench with the trainer attending to her knee, and watched Gahr cut the lead down to 4 points, the plucky superstar refused to stay down. Limping badly, she went back in the game and again took control, proving that she deserves the reputation that she is the best girls high school basketball player to come along.

In an earlier game, Alta Loma defeated a determined Alemany team, 57-54 to win the 3A championship. It was the closest game of the evening as the Alemany Indian Maidens came within 1 point twice in the final minutes. An intercepted pass and a free throw by the Braves finally decided the game.

2A action saw Mission Viejo easily roll over the Artesia Pioneers, 69-53, to capture the CIF-SS Girls 2A championship.

Going into the final game with a 26-2 record, the Diablos were top-ranked all year. The championship was a first for Mission Viejo, as they lost in the final game last year to Chino.

Valley Christian, after failing in three previous attempts, finally emerged a winner as they beat 1A division defending champs San Bernardino, 57-47.

All-CIF, 6-0 center, Cindy De Young's contribution of 22 points and 17 rebounds didn't make it easier for San Bernardino, who led by as many as eight points in the first half but had key players foul out early in the second half.

The Small Schools championship was easily won by the 29 Palms Wildcats, after they rolled over Rio Hondo Prep, 63-37. The win meant more than just a divisional crown to 29 Palms, as the 1982 Wildcats are the first team in the history of the school to win a CIF-SS title.

EL DORADO CAPTURES CIF-SS WRESTLING TITLE

Acting like the CIF-SS Championships weren't any different than the Southern Regionals at Cypress College, El Dorado High School sent five wrestlers to the finals in the 1982 tournament, winning the CIF-SS Wrestling Title over runner-up Dos Pueblos, 112½-90.

The Golden Hawks relied on champions Scott Lawson (145) and Ty Pembleton (200) for the largest point output, but Coach Frank Gonzales credited 119 lb. runner-up, Mark Alex with igniting El Dorado. "Mark's overtime victory in the semis (over Chris Butler of Nogales) really caught everyone on fire," commented Gonzales.

The 98 lb. finals saw a rematch between two Eastern Regional combatants Sam Dorane of Bloomington and Scott Heitz of Rim of the World. Dorane avenged an earlier loss by bettering Heitz, 4-1.

At 105 lbs., the first of El Dorado's contingents, Ken Iwanaga, faced Coachella Valley's Alfred Castro. Iwanaga broke to an early lead with a quick dunkunder for a takedown, but the rangy Castro controlled the remainder of the match with a physical cross body leg attack and prevailed, 7-2.

Perhaps the most anticipated final of the evening was in the 112 lbs. Channel Islands' Frank Lopez, a returning state place winner, met Isaac Leyva of Dos Pueblos. Lopez battled down Leyva to the last second, falling to the muscular senior, 7-6.

Dos Pueblos got another chance for a champion in the next weight (119) and Mike Yamasaki delivered, giving El Dorado's Mark Alex a lesson in takedowns and winning, 19-11.

A thrilling conclusion marked the 126 lb. final as Nogales' Roger Palacios erased a carefully built lead by Bellflower's Abel

Saenz with a head lock in the last 32 seconds and triumphed, 7-5.

Getting his work done early, Geno Segura of Cabrillo took a 6-2 first period lead over Russ Stacer and hung on to nail down a 8-6 victory at 132 lbs. and win the lightweight MVP award.

At 138 lbs., Vince Silva of Santa Maria nipped Kennedy's Brian Folsom 8-5 for his title.

Using a cradle that crushed opponents all day, Scott Lawson pinned Tustin's Mike Jackman in 2:50 of the 145 lbs. finale giving El Dorado their first champion and himself the upper weight MVP.

The Golden Hawks' Mark Torres tried to follow Lawson's lead, but found South Hills' Brian Smith a bit too much, falling to Smith in 5:50.

South Hills did accomplish the back-to-back trick as Eric Osborne defeated Scott Autenreith of Hemet 8-5 to pace South Hills to a fourth place finish.

Another good cradle did its job in the 185 lbs. final as Dos Pueblos crowned its second champion, Tim Barroca, after he nearfalled Villa Park's Steve Granito for a 6-3 victory.

Ty Pembleton closed out champion El Dorado's scoring with a resounding 13-2 win over Hemet's Mike Teeters. Pembleton used superior quickness to handle the bigger Teeters.

Hemet did get a champion, however, as well as a third place finish, when massive Jim McCullough decisioned Barstow's Pete Barela 13-5.

All in all, the big winners were the spectators who enjoyed the rugged battles.

MINUTES OF THE CIF SOUTHERN SECTION COUNCIL MEETING March 18, 1982

The March meeting of the California Interscholastic Federation Southern Section Council was called to order by Chairman Dr. Robert Packer at 9:30 a.m., Thursday, March 18, 1982 at the Saddleback Inn. All leagues were represented with the exceptions of the Los Padres, Sunrise, Sunshine, Tri-County and Westside.

1. **APPROVAL OF MINUTES:** It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the minutes of the CIF Southern Section Council meeting of January 21, 1982 as mailed to the Council; and the CIF Southern Section Executive Committee meeting of February 18, 1982, as mailed to the Council.

2. **PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE:** Dr. Robert Packer, president of the CIF Southern Section, commended the Office staff for administration of the winter playoffs and paid tribute to those schools and individual athletes who participated in the winter playoffs and particularly, those schools which participated in the State and State Regional Basketball Championships.

3. **COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE:** Ray Plutko, commissioner, apprised the Committee relative to increased concerns of coaches taking players from the court and/or field prior to the end of an official contest, and that this action is considered one of the most serious breaches by a coach within the Southern Section. He requested that the Council review this item at the league level in preparing for the spring and the 1982-83 season.

Commissioner Plutko also provided an overview and update of the Southern Section Basketball Championships and the State Regional Basketball Championships conducted at the Long Beach Arena, and reviewed with the Council, management of State events in the future.

Commissioner Plutko reviewed with the Council a new program being offered to leagues effective with the 1982-83 school year where instructional chairpersons of the appropriate officials' organizations will meet with those leagues and/or areas desiring to have an orientation program of the new sport rules and regulations.

Also reviewed were corporate sponsorships on multi-year contracts, and the new Blue Book format for the 1982-83 school year.

4. **TREASURER'S REPORT:** Mr. Jim Faul, treasurer, submitted to the Council the proposed 1982-83 working budget for the CIF Southern Section, which will become an action item at the May Council meeting.

5. **NOMINATING COMMITTEE REPORT:** Mr. Verne Horton, representative of the Nominating Committee, outlined the work of the committee as it relates to filling vacancies on the CIF Southern Section Executive Committee. It was moved, seconded

and passed to accept the following slate of nominees for a vote at the May meeting of the Council:

7. **STATE CIF UPDATE:** Mr. Tony Balsamo, past-president of the CIF Southern Section and president-elect of the State CIF Federated Council, presented a review of the January State CIF Federated Council meeting and the state-wide telecast of the basketball championships from Oakland.

8. **CENTURY/SAN FERNANDO VALLEY LEAGUE GIRLS' VOLLEYBALL PROPOSAL:** Following discussion, the Century/San Fernando Valley Leagues proposal that girls' volleyball revert to the past 2 out of 3 as opposed to the current 3 out of 5 matches was tabled until the May meeting, pending input of a State CIF survey as it relates to the championship format.

9. **OFFICIALS' FEES COMMITTEE PROPOSAL:** Mr. H. L. Looney, chairperson of the combined L.A. City/Southern Section Officials' Fees Committee, presented a four-year package proposal on officials' fees. The proposal was voted on in four parts:

(a) It was moved, seconded and passed, beginning with the 1982-83 school year and continuing through the 1985-86 school year, a \$1.00 across the board increase for all basic rate fees.

(b) An adjustment in the specified sports as it relates to one official working a contest,

doubleheader assignments, ammunition increases, volleyball up and down officials, and wrestling wrestlebacks was defeated. (Several leagues indicated they will direct correspondence to the Official's Fees Committee with regard to possible reconsideration of specific areas.)

(c) The paying of a \$3.00 premium for afternoon contests in all sports as opposed to the current night fee was defeated.

(d) It was moved, seconded and passed to eliminate the "B" classification schedule on officials' fees and to make all fees equitable in all schools, effective the 1984-85 school year.

10. **MARMONTE LEAGUE SOCCER PROPOSAL:** Mr. Ron Barney presented a proposal on behalf of the Marmonte League calling for an amendment to the CIF Southern Section By-Laws in the sport of soccer. Under the proposal, a member of a soccer team who receives a red card in a contest would be ineligible to play in the next scheduled contest. Following discussion, the proposal was defeated.

11. **STATE CIF PROPOSALS:** Several proposals were brought before the Council in order that the CIF Southern Section delegates to the State Federated Council have voting direction at the upcoming May meeting:

(a) Following discussion, the CIF Southern Section delegates to the State Federated Council are to be directed to cast a negative vote with regard to the format presented for the State CIF Regional Wrestling Championships.

(b) Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to direct the CIF Southern Section delegates to vote in favor of the recommended classification system for state playoff competition in team sports.

(c) Following discussion, the CIF Southern Section delegates to the State Federated Council were directed to cast an affirmative vote for the one-day format for the State CIF Regional track championships.

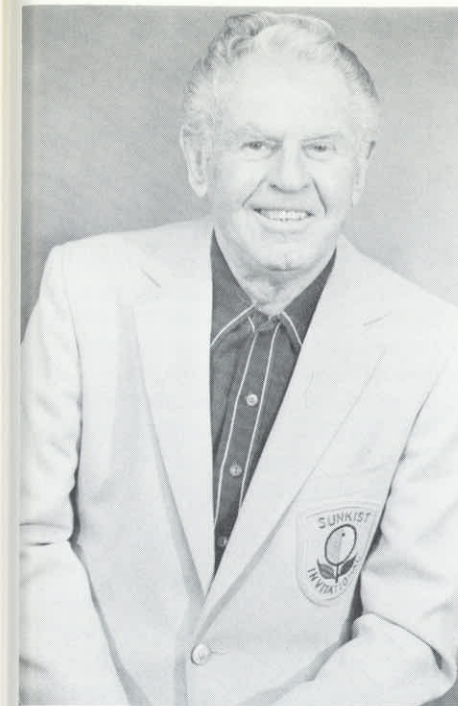
(d) Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to send the CIF Southern Section delegates uninstructed with regard to the proposed 1982-83 State CIF Budget.

There being no further business to come before the Council, the meeting was adjourned at 11:36 a.m.

GILL — ELECTED TO COACHES HALL OF FAME

After more than 30 years of coaching on the high school level, Bill Gill was honored by his peers in the California Coaches Association this year by being elected to the Coaches Hall of Fame.

It didn't take Gill long to make his mark in track and field. When Centennial opened its doors in 1953, Gill was its first track and basketball coach. In 1955 under Gill's direction the Centennial High track squad won its first California State High School Championship. It was the first of three state titles during his tenure at the Compton School, and one of his five CIF championship teams.

Along the way, he coached the Burmese National Team to its first points ever in the 1959 Asian Games. Burma finished ninth in the 20-nation competition.

A year after coaching his final state winner, Gill was honored as National High School Coach Of The Year. He left Centennial following the 1968 title. He then moved to the Centennial Valley District High School and took charge of administering the track programs along with assuming coaching duties at Hawthorne High School.

He retired from coaching four years ago, but continues to run the high school portion of the Sunkist Meet annually at the Sports Arena.

Another Look at the Budget AREA ASSIGNERS SERVE AS FACILITATORS

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is the fourth in a series of feature articles by Commissioner Ray Plutko, dealing with the structure and various insights to the CIF Southern Section Budget.)

Just where does the money go?

Over the past few months, we have attempted to provide an inside look at the CIF Southern Section's annual working budget and this time around the focus is on the category of officials.

However, the title itself is somewhat misleading, one which accounts for \$88,700 and is the second largest category of the budget.

The funds are directed to pay the services of 13 area assignment coordinators — those individuals directly charged with the task of assigning officials to specific contests as requested by the member schools.

It should be pointed out the Southern Section Office, not the area assignment coordinators have direct charge over the officials themselves.

Officials are members of various "Unit Associations" and are governed by their own board of directors and by-laws. It is at this level the recruitment and training of officials takes place.

But, back to the budget item at hand.

Each of the area assignment coordinators are assigned a specific number of schools — based on geographical areas — and work directly with the schools, generally in the persons of the Boys and Girls' athletic directors.

The assignment coordinators are paid a flat rate of \$217 per school serviced, with that figure scaled down in the event of an all-Boys or Girls' school.

It is from this base the budget figure of \$88,700 is derived.

The area assignment coordinators are responsible for their own postage, mailings and duplicated materials, not to mention a usual hefty telephone bill.

As for their position, any time an opening occurs, open notification is made by the Southern Section Office and the initial screening of all applicants takes place.

When the applicants have been screened to a workable number — generally six — the league representatives of the area being serviced further screens the candidates by way of a personal interview and recommends one for employment by the Southern Section Office.

The assignment coordinators are then evaluated twice each year by the league representatives, in addition to having two orientation meetings each year with the administrator in charge of officials by way of the CIF-SS Office.

At one time, when the number of member schools were few in number, there was one assignment coordinator who operated from the Southern Section Office. But as the membership grew and continues to grow, it was soon determined services could better be met by hiring individuals to service specific geographical areas.

A large but necessary item indeed in your Southern Section working budget.

BASKETBALL EXPERIMENTAL CLOCK APPROVED:

By action of the State Federated Council, schools conducting Boys' Basketball Invitational Tournaments may make use of a 30 or 45 second clock on an experimental basis. Tournament Directors wishing to exercise this option for the 1982-83 basketball season are to direct their request to experiment with the 30 or 45 clock for their boys' basketball tournament to Commissioner Plutko at the CIF Southern Section Office in advance of the basketball season.



WHAT'S HAPPENIN' IN THE OTHER 49 STATES

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is another in a series of monthly articles covering items of interest throughout California and other State Associations in the administration of high school athletics.)

ITEM: VIOLATORS PAY

Comment: The Montana Association's Board of Directors issues fines to schools for violation of rules. For example:

1. Failure to file a record of transfer form before allowing transfer students to participate. Fine — \$100.
2. Using girls basketball players in more than five quarters in one evening — Fine — \$100, plus forfeiture of games.
3. Use of ineligible student. Fine — \$200, plus forfeiture of all contests won and individual awards won by ineligible student.

ITEM: FAILURE TO PARTICIPATE

Comment: In Arkansas failure to participate in a sport after declaring may result in a school being fined \$25.

ITEM: COACHES TRACK RULES MEETING REQUIRED

Comment: Kansas State Activities Association regulations require that the head Boys' and head Girls' track coach attend an Association-sponsored rules meeting. Attendance cards are presented to certify attendance. Head coaches not attending are required to take an open-book examination on the rules. Assistant coaches are also urged to attend.

ITEM: SCHOOL FINED FOR INELIGIBLE PLAYER

Comment: Hillcrest High School in Tuscaloosa, Alabama was fined \$250 and placed on probation for one year by the Alabama High School Athletic Association for using an ineligible player. Also, the rules infraction will require Hillcrest to forfeit all games in which the ineligible player participated. The probationary period is a warning that should other rules violations occur, it will jeopardize the school's membership in the AHSAA.

VOLLEYBALL RULE CHANGE

In the 1982-83 edition of the National Federation Boys' and Girls' Volleyball Rule Book, the following rule change has been made by the National Federation Rules Committee:

DELETE THIS NEW RULE:

RULE 9. SECTION 7 NET PLAY

- *ART. 1 . . . Reaching over the net is permitted during:
- (a) The follow-through of a hit made on the player's own side;
 - (b) An attempt to hit;
 - (c) A fake hit.

- *ART. 2 . . . Contacting a ball which is entirely on the opponent's side of the net shall not be permitted.

Athletic Directors and coaches please note that by action of the CIF State Federated Council, the State of California and Sections will NOT play by this rule for the 1982-83 season.

The rule as stated in the 1981 National Federation Volleyball Rule Book will be in effect for the 1982-83 Boys' and Girls' Volleyball seasons as follows:

ACCEPTED RULE FOR CALIFORNIA

RULE 9. SECTION 7 NET PLAY

- *ART. 1 . . . Reaching over the net is permitted during:
- (a) A follow-through of a hit or an attempt to hit made on the player's own side;
 - (b) A block or an attempted block.
- *ART. 2 . . . Contacting a ball, other than a serve, which is entirely on the opponent's side of the net is permitted only when blocking a ball which is moving toward the net.

The expected rash of transfers by those concerned never took place. In fact, a detailed statistical chart comparing the new and old rule over the past two years reveals just the opposite.

Here's a breakdown for Rule 214 over the past 11 months:

. . . eligibility forms processed of students transferring from a private to another private school — 72.

. . . eligibility forms processed of students transferring from a public to another public school — 161.

. . . eligibility forms processed of students transferring from a private to a public school — 117.

. . . eligibility forms processed of students transferring from a public to a private school — 83.

With the trusty use of a calculator, that totals 433 petitions for some form of restricted participation. Additionally, there were 83 hardship appeals, with only TWO of the above 516 eligibility cases finding their way to the courts.

As for a comparison, the previous school year (1980-81) found the CIF-SS Office processing 157 Form 99 (private to public and/or public to private transfer only), but there were 319 hardship appeals and 14 sought further redress in the courts.

The expected volley of transfers never materialized, a difference of just 39 cases between the two years.

What should be noted, however, is the opportunity being afforded those students desiring some aspect of limited participation at other than the varsity level; the decrease in court appearances and costs; and the additional administrative time created for the school principals and the CIF-SS Office.

Refreshing, indeed!

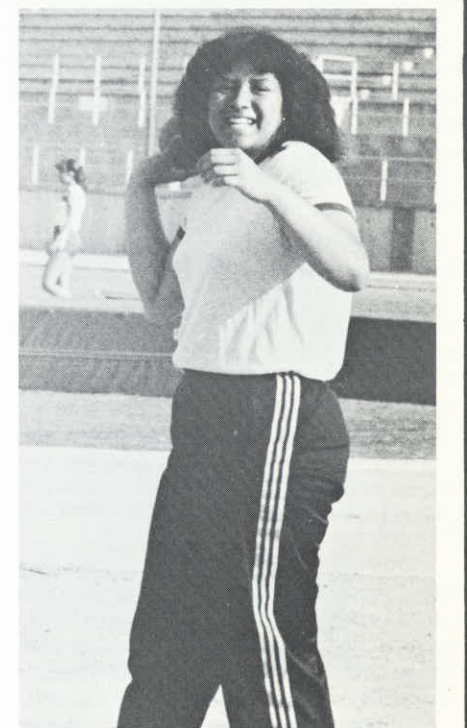
The spotlight this month focuses on Natalie Kaaiawahia, a 16-year-old junior from Fullerton High School.

This super-athlete needs no introduction to track enthusiasts, as she holds CIF Southern Section, State and national records for her achievements in the shot put.

Kaaiawahia's talent in the shot put was evident in her first year of CIF-SS competition, having won the event in the 1980 State Track Meet with a distance of 48-4½. As a sophomore in 1981 she repeated as State champ, with a distance of 51-10. She also won the discus event in that same meet.

Honors accorded Kaaiawahia are numerous. She was named to the All-American track list for 2 years running, has been recognized by Sports Illustrated and Scholastic Coach magazines, and was featured on both Channel 4 — Super Kids and Channel 7 — Athlete of the Week.

Although track is her first love, it is not Natalie's only sport. She played basketball at Fullerton for two years and volleyball for three. She was named "All Orange County" for her achievements in volleyball.



Kaaiawahia's most recent achievement is a discus throw of 173-3 in a dual meet which gives her the national lead and makes her the number two discus thrower in prep history.

MINUTES OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

April 15, 1982

The meeting of the California Interscholastic Federation, Southern Section, Executive Committee was called to order by Chairman Dr. Robert Packer at 9:40 a.m. in the Anaheim Room at Anaheim Stadium. All members were present with the exception of Gene Knott.

1. PRESIDENT'S UPDATE: Dr. Robert Packer reviewed with the Committee a letter from Dr. Lou Joseph, chairman of the Blue Book Committee, commending the staff for developing the new format for the 1982-83 edition of the CIF Southern Section Blue Book.

2. COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE: Mr. Ray Plutko, commissioner, welcomed Mr. Thomas Byrnes, state commissioner of athletics. In addition, Commissioner Plutko reviewed with the Committee the theme for next year (1982-83), focusing on the area of orientating the respective communities to the CIF and its member schools and to the realm of sportsmanship. The Southern Section Office has earmarked a two-week period from October 17-30, 1982 as "FOCUS ON THE OTHER HALF OF EDUCATION."

Other items covered by the Commissioner were the feasibility of continuing to conduct championships in boys' gymnastics and girls' field hockey, communication with current corporate sponsors, and the Hacienda League concerns relative to the playoffs.

Of major importance, Commissioner Plutko reported to the Committee that effective with the 1983-84 school year, through the efforts of The W. R. Moody Co., each league will be provided with league championship trophies for each sport conducted at the varsity level for Boys and Girls at no cost to the league.

3. BOYS' ATHLETIC DIRECTOR: Mr. Clyde Francisco, Boys' A.D. representative, reviewed with the Committee concerns relative to the attitude of officials when schools are required to start athletic contests later than the scheduled time due to no fault of the schools involved; problems relative to teams not completing contests due to a coach removing his/her team from the playing facility; 30 second clock in girls' basketball; and concerns relative to the ALL-CIF selection process.

4. GIRLS' ATHLETIC DIRECTOR: Ms. Sheila Burrud, Girls' A.D. representative, reviewed with the Committee concerns relative to the number of contests in both boys' and girls' volleyball and the length of time to complete varsity and junior varsity round robin matches in badminton.

5. SUPERINTENDENTS' UPDATE: Dr. Maury Ross reported on the recent successful spring regional ACSC Conference; concerns relative to regional and state basketball championships; and the continued need for communication between school boards, superintendents and the CIF.

6. TREASURER'S UPDATE: Mr. Jim Faul updated the Committee on the 1982-83 working budget which is to be voted on at the May Council meeting.

7. STATE REPORT: (A) Mr. Byrnes, state commissioner, reviewed with the Committee concerns relative to wrestling weight reduction programs which may be hazardous to the health or cause serious injury. Additionally, Commissioner Byrnes reported on the Air Cal Scholarship Program, cable television, the success of the television coverage of the State Basketball Championships from Oakland, and a brief overview of work being done by various state committees.

(B) **COMMITTEE REPORTS:** (1) **SECTION RELATIONS** — Dr. Packer reported on the recent meeting of the Committee which reviewed various proposals for restructuring the geographical makeup of the state organization and the new recommendation for same.

(2) **WAYS AND MEANS:** Mr. Bruce Keuning reviewed the proposed State CIF budget, to be voted on at the State Federated Council Meeting on April 30/May 1, 1982.

8. LEE VINING HIGH SCHOOL TRANSFER REQUEST: It was moved, seconded and passed to support a move to the Nevada State Association by Lee Vining High School, with the followup by the State CIF Commissioner to the Executive Director of the Nevada State Association.

9. SAN DIEGO UPDATE/IMPERIAL VALLEY SCHOOLS REQUEST: Mr. Blinn Tenney reviewed with the Committee a concern of the schools in the Imperial Valley, currently members of the San Diego Section, desiring to participate with Southern Section schools in the sports of basketball and volleyball. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to direct Mr. Tenney to respond to the Imperial Valley schools and direct them to contact their Section Commissioner with regard to the issue.

10. NEW MEMBERSHIP: It was moved, seconded and passed to approve membership for Calvary Baptist (La Verne), Coast Christian (Newport Beach), and Baptist Christian (Norwalk) effective the 1982-83 school year.

11. CERRITOS HIGH SCHOOL VIOLATION: Dean Crowley, administrative assistant, reviewed with the Committee a violation of the basketball rules and regulations wherein a faculty/student basketball game was conducted outside the season of sport. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed that Cerritos High School be permitted to schedule only 19 contests for all levels of its boys' basketball program during the 1982-83 season of sport.

12. FINANCIAL CHAIN LETTER: Commissioner Plutko reviewed with the Committee and cautioned member schools to be

aware of fund raising chain letters that are being circulated throughout the State and the Southern Section.

13. SANTA PAULA HIGH SCHOOL BASEBALL REQUEST: The Executive Committee reviewed an appeal from Santa Paula High School regarding the cancellation of a baseball contest between Santa Paula Union High School and Thousand Oaks High School. Following discussion, the Executive Committee ruled that the contract in question was not valid due to the fact that the principals of both schools involved had not signed the contract. It was a further recommendation of the Committee that both schools work together in an effort to try to reschedule the contest at a later date.

14. ROLLING HILLS HIGH SCHOOL COACHING RESPONSE: Dr. Packer reviewed with the Committee correspondence from Rolling Hills High School relative to the soccer coach pulling his team from the field prior to the end of the contest. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to accept the recommendation of the CIF-SS Office that is that the action of the Principal that the coach be disassociated from coaching the soccer team during the 1982-83 season up until such time as the fourth regularly scheduled contest is completed. Additionally the Committee commended the Principal for his action taken in this matter.

15. ALTA LOMA HIGH SCHOOL COACHING RESPONSE: Dr. Packer reviewed with the Committee correspondence from Alta Loma High School relative to the basketball coach pulling his team from the court prior to the end of the contest.

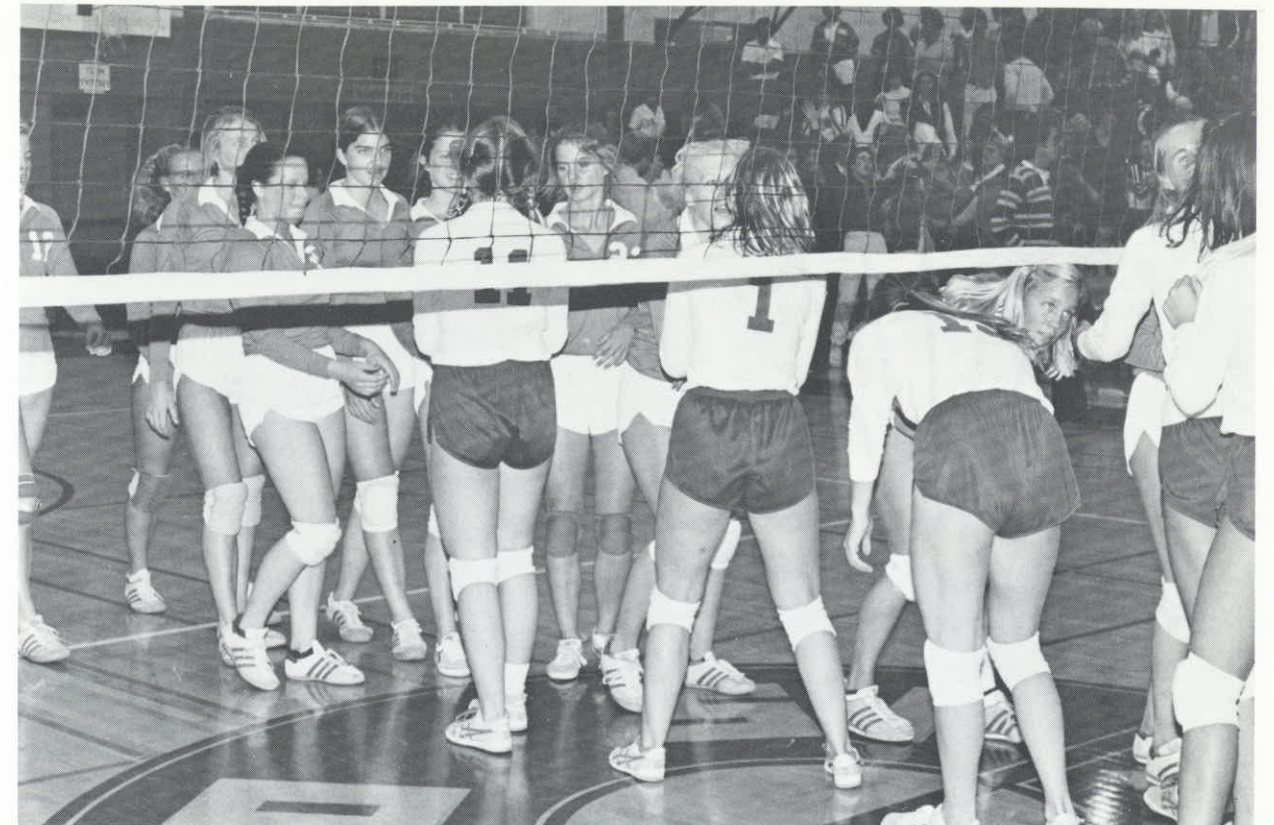
Following discussion, the Committee directed Dr. Packer and Commissioner Plutko to meet with representatives at Alta Loma High School of added concerns and report back to the Executive Committee.

16. PREP LEAGUE REQUEST: Commissioner Plutko presented a request from Chadwick High School to drop from the Prep League and join the Pioneer League for boys' basketball only. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to deny the request and instruct Chadwick to follow the normal guidelines for relegating.

17. ALL CIF SELECTION PROCESS: Mr. Crowley reviewed with the Committee concerns relative to the All-CIF selection process. In addition, the Committee was presented with a position statement prepared by the Athletic Administrators Advisory Committee. Following discussion, a committee composed of Barbara Wilson, Moe Chavez, Bruce Keuning and Pat Mauch and Commissioner Plutko was appointed to review the current problem and develop a recommendation for the Southern Section Executive Committee.

22. BLUE BOOK COMMITTEE - BASEBALL/SOFTBALL PRACTICE RULE: It was moved, seconded and passed to recommend to the Council that the sections in the Blue Book dealing with practice with an outside team in the sports of baseball and softball be deleted and brought in line with other sports, effective with the 1982-83 school year.

23. STUDENT PRESALE: Commissioner Plutko reviewed with the Committee a proposal relative to the sale of student pre-sale tickets in the sports of football and basketball. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to refer the proposal to the Council at their initial meeting of the school year on September 23, 1982.

24. CALENDAR: The Calendar for the 1982-83 school year was approved as submitted.
