The C. I. F. southern section met in conjunction with the State Council in the committee room of the Athletic Club of Los Angeles, Friday, November 25, 1920.

The following members were present:

The "X" League had referred the protest of "Y" High School to the State Council for a decision and the State Council had refused to act for the reason that such protests should be acted upon by the League or Section first and referred to the State Council as a court of final jurisdiction.

It was too late to call a meeting of the League or Southern Section so the schools agreed to allow the members present to settle the matter.

The Protest--"Y" High School protested that "A" of "Z" High School had played Sunday Baseball with a team on which there were two well known "Professional Baseball Players" and that the "hat" was passed during the game. There was no evidence that "A" had received any compensation for his playing.

It was moved, seconded and carried that in as much as no evidence had been submitted that "A" had taken money, thereby becoming a professional, his school should be allowed to continue its schedule with "A" in the "line up".

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

The Council of the Southern Section of the C. I. F. met in called meeting at the Y. M. C. A., December 3, 1920, at 3:30 P. M.

President Oliver called the meeting to order and directed the Secretary to call the roll.

The Secretary stated that the meeting was called because he had received a letter from the Coach of Whittier wanting to know why Whittier was out of the finals.

The President ruled that Whittier could not be considered in the finals for the following reasons:

The Principal had not filed a schedule of games. Whittier had not exchanged eligibility lists with some of the schools which she had played; that she had played ineligible men in some of the games and that she had refused to play Long Beach.

The Secretary then called the council's attention to the fact that Mr. Wise of San Diego had objected to the minutes of November 3, 1920, where the Secretary had stated, "It was agreed that if Long Beach vs Whittier vs San Diego showed a score which differed by 21 or more points, the loser would be out of the semi-finals."

The chair ruled that the minutes were incorrect. That the above motion was made to apply to Whittier. But that in the case of San Diego vs Long Beach, Mr. Wise had objected on the grounds that San Diego had already won her three out of five games, and further that the C. I. F. had taken no action in this matter.

Mr. Moore then stated that there would be no need to enter into the San Diego-Long Beach controversy for Long Beach had decided that L. B. H. S. wished to compete with some Eastern teams in football, that due to the length of the California schedule for State Championship, it was impossible to complete this schedule and play any Eastern team and as the result of these considerations, Long Beach voluntarily forfeited her rights in the semi-finals in football and waived any claims for Southern California or State Championships.

President Oliver stated that this was a very serious matter and asked Mr. Moore if Long Beach had considered what this might mean to the school. Mr. Moore stated that the action had been given due consideration and was final.

It was moved by Mr. Green, seconded by Mr. Fisher that the game played by Long Beach vs Poly be considered cancelled and Polytechnic be requested to go into the semi-finals against San Diego.

Mr. Overton of Venice then came before the Board and asked that the 130 lb. teams finish a schedule for champions, further stating that his team had already won from Fullerton. A representative from John Muir Intermediate asked that his team be placed in the schedule.

The request was granted the secretary voting no.

It was reported by Mr. Green that Santa Monica had been omitted from the Bay schedules for the rest of the year and that the Bay requested that Santa Monica be made a "Free Lance" for the rest of the year. Upon motion, the request was granted.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the "Free Lance" schools shall so arrange their schedules that but one team shall be presented for a place in the semi-finals in baseball and basketball.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the Secretary issue an Annual Pass to each member of the Southern Section to all semi-finals and finals held under our jurisdiction.

It was agreed that the following managers be appointed:

- Basketball--Mr. Downey of Alhambra
- Swimming-----Mr. Wiseman of Venice
- Water Polo--Mr. Squires of Huntington Park
- Track-----Mr. Van Patton of Los Angeles High School
- Baseball----Mr. Blee of Puente

MINUTES of C.I.F.

1920-1921

An informal meeting of the C. I. F. was held at Los Angeles High School at the Poly-San Diego game, the following persons being present: Mr. Oliver, Mr. Hughes, Mr. McIntosh, Mr. Carrigan, Mr. C. B. Moore and Mr. Green. It was agreed that the following letter be sent to Long Beach, that justice might be done to them to the visiting schools and to the C. I. F.

The letter reads as follows:

December 4th, 1920

Mr. David Burcham,
Principal of High School,
Long Beach, Cal.,

Dear Sir:- At an informal meeting of six members of the C. I. F. at the Poly-San Diego Game this afternoon it was agreed that I ought to write to you and inquire if you had sent a statement of the following facts to Everett High School and to Englewood High School?

1. That your school is not State Champion of California.
2. That you are not to play these schools under the auspices of the California Interscholastic Federation.
3. That the C. I. F. will not vouch for the eligibility of

your players.

If you have not already sent these facts, may we not suggest that fair play to all would demand that these facts be sent by your school.

Please let us know your decision in this matter as soon as possible.

The following resolution was passed and referred to the several leagues for action. It was agreed that a copy of the resolution and the vote by schools be sent to Long Beach by the Secretary.

The letter reads as follows:

Dear Sir:

At a meeting of the California Interscholastic Federation, Southern Section, held at the Y. M. C. A. Building, December 7th, the following resolution was carried and referred to the several leagues

for confirmation:

Resolved: That Long Beach, by its refusal to complete the schedule for semi-final and final games, has declared its football season closed so far as the official governing body of interscholastic athletics in Southern California is concerned and has thereby voluntarily withdrawn from the jurisdiction of the C.I.F.

Be it further resolved:--That in order for the school to be readmitted to Southern California High School Athletics, Long Beach High School shall, upon receipt of this resolution, disband its football team for the present season.

MINUTES OF THE C.I.F.
Southern Section
1920- 1921

The Council of the C. I. F. Southern Section met in special meeting December 11, 1920 at 9:30 A. M. in the Y. M. C. A. Building.

The President called the meeting to order and asked the Secretary to call the roll with the following results:

President Oliver stated the history of the case and then called upon Long Beach to state their case.

Principal Burcham, Vice-Principal Moore, and Supt. Stephens then addressed the Council.

The principal contentions were set forth in a letter addressed to the Principals of Southern California.

First: That Long Beach or any other school had a right to withdraw from the schedule.

Second: That the time for action had passed when we allowed her to withdraw on December 3d without a penalty.

Third: That the C. I. F. Rules had been carefully covered to be sure that there was no violation of any accepted rules and regulations and the C. I. F. action was therefore *ex post facto*.

Fourth: Long Beach had not withdrawn from the C. I. F. but had withdrawn from the C. I. F. schedule in order that she might play an independent football schedule with outside teams.

Fifth: Long Beach had not withdrawn from the C. I. F. but had withdrawn from the C. I. F. schedule in order that she might play an independent football schedule with outside teams with players for whom the C. I. F. could not vouch.

Sixth: That when the action of December 7th was received they had already accepted the game with Everett High School so that it was impossible to cancel the game with any degree of justice toward Everett.

Seventh: That Long Beach is a member of the C. I. F. and had lived up to all printed rules of the past.

They therefore thought that the action of the C. I. F. should be reconsidered. (The above wording is the Secretary's from memory and notes)

A very general discussion by members followed. The discussion was open to visitors and the following gentlemen addressed the meeting:

The C. I. F. answers to the contentions of Long Beach were as follows:

First: The right to withdraw from the schedule, carries with it the disbanding of the team for the rest of the season.

Example: If Van Nuys had withdrawn from her league schedule or had she refused to meet San Diego in the semi-finals, she would have disbanded her team at once; while Long Beach withdraws (after due consideration) to play a schedule of her own making under rules of her own making.

Second: The Time of Action

All members of the C. I. F. present stated that they had understood Mr. Moore to say that the action of Long Beach was final and would not be reconsidered.

The C. I. F. paid no more attention to Long Beach but turned to the task of saving our own schedule from disgrace and ruin.

Third: That our action was ex post facto. This is answered by our answer to First: contention: that the long established precedent has been for schools to disband. The action of Long Beach was provided for in the following rule of the State Council passed December 6, 1919.

"It was moved, seconded and carried that no school team which is a member of the California Interscholastic Federation shall play other than practice games with high schools outside of the C.I.F. and in such practice games both teams shall conform to the eligibility rules of the California Interscholastic Federation; and furthermore, that no sectional champion shall play any California High School outside of the C. I. F. In case a school disregards any provision of this rule, the school shall be debarred from participation in that sport in the C. I. F. during the next season."

Mr. Moore replied that he knew of this rule and that the first part did not apply. (He did not state what the first part did mean). He stated that if Long Beach had gone on and played two more games, (San Diego and Santa Monica) She would have come under the second part of this rule.

Note What does this rule of the State C. I. F. mean? Why was it ever passed?

Fourth and Fifth:-The answer to this involves the answer to the question: "Why is the C. I. F."

The C. I. F. IS an association of California High Schools voluntarily banded together in order that when one school meets another, the teams will meet under the same known rules and regulations; in order that there shall be but one schedule of semi-finals and finals for Section or State.

Long Beach withdraws from our sectional semi-finals and finals. She withdraws from the state semi-finals and finals. She is to play her own schedule under rules of her own making. Yet she claims she has not withdrawn from the C. I. F. Question: "What is there of the C. I. F. left? To what part of the C. I. F. is Long Beach loyal?"

Sixth: The matter of justice and honor.

When Long Beach accepted the conditions imposed upon her as a "free lance" and accepted our schedule for semi-finals and played the first round in the semi-finals, the C.I.F. had a first claim on the Honor and Justice of Long Beach.

It was moved by Mr. Moore, State Representative, and seconded by Mr. Milham of the Northern League that we reconsider the resolution of December 7th.

Mr. Green raised the point of order that Mr. Moore must have voted for the resolution in order to reconsider and that Mr. Milham had not been present.

The chair ruled that since Mr. Moore had not voted against the resolution, he must have voted for it.

Mr. C. B. Moore of Central League seconded the motion.

"Resolved:--That the resolution passed December 7th be amended to read as follows: 'That Long Beach play the Everett game and then disband her team for the 1920 football season.'"

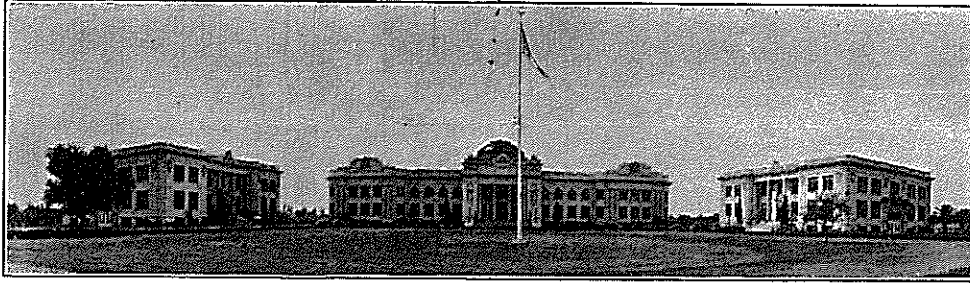

To the Principals
Southern California High Schools.

Your attention is called to the meeting of the Calif. Int. Fed. at the Los Angeles Y.M.C.A. on Sat. Dec. 11, 9:30 A. M. to consider the following resolution passed by the C. I. F. on Tues., Dec. 7 and referred to the schools for confirmation.

Resolved that Long Beach by its refusal to complete the schedule for semi-finals and final games has declared its football season closed, so far as the official governing body of inter-scholastic athletics in So. Calif. is concerned and has thereby voluntarily withdrawn from the jurisdiction of the C. I. F., Sec.

Be it further resolved that in order for the school to be readmitted to S. Calif. H. S. athletics, Long Beach H. S. shall on receipt of this resolution, disband its football team for the present season. Passed by C. I. F. and referred to schools of leagues for confirmation.

Long Beach H. S. earnestly requests your presence at this meeting in order that the situation may be made entirely clear to all the schools of So. Calif.

As to the facts preceding this meeting and the reasons for it being called, the following statements cover the conditions as we see them.

On Wed., Dec. 1, at a regularly called meeting of the C. I. F. the Long Beach representative stated that L. B. H. S. wished to compete with some eastern teams in football, that due to the length of the Calif. schedule for state championship it was impossible to complete this schedule and play any eastern team, and as the result of these considerations, Long Beach voluntarily forfeited her rights in the semi-finals in football and waived any claims for So. Calif. or state championships.

No definite action regarding the attitude of Long Beach H. S. was taken at this meeting, but the following facts led us to believe that the matter was settled and a thing of the past. L. A. Poly was asked by the C. I. F. to accept the position vacated by Long Beach which she did, a 130.5 team football schedule was arranged with Long Beach as one of the teams and last but not least, before our action was submitted to the C. I. F. the rules of the C. I. F. were carefully covered to be sure that there was no violation of any accepted rules and regulations and at the present date we have no knowledge of any rule that has been directly violated, and any action to the contrary taken by the C. I. F. would be ex post facto and should not be applied to Long Beach.

On Monday, Dec. 6, the following communication was received by Long Beach.

1. That your school is not State Champion of California.
2. That you are not to play these schools under the auspices of the C.I.F.
3. That the C.I.F. will not vouch for the eligibility of your players.

If you have not already sent these facts may we not suggest that fair play to all would demand that these facts be sent by your school?

Please let us know your decision in this matter as soon as possible.

Our answer is this:

1. Long Beach has officially announced to the C.I.F. that we make no claims for the state championship, which may be verified by the following resolution passed by the Long Beach board of control and printed in the Los Angeles and Long Beach papers; "In order to carry out this schedule, it was necessary to withdraw from the semi-finals for the championship of the state of California, as a continuance of this schedule would have made it impossible to schedule an eastern game before New Year's and possibly considerably later. It should be made clear that Long Beach in making the decision to withdraw from the California schedule has in no sense withdrawn from the California Interscholastic Federation. This would mean that Long Beach High School was withdrawing from all future competition in all sports with the other California high schools. Such a course is neither necessary nor advisable".

2. Long Beach did not withdraw from the C.I.F. but expected to play these outside teams under the rules and regulations agreeable to both teams.

3. Long Beach has not asked the C.I.F. to vouch for the eligibility of its players, nor has Long Beach given this impression to any outside schools.

Long Beach raises this one question in regard to the Secretary's letter, "Does not this letter clearly imply that Long Beach is still under the jurisdiction of the C.I.F.?"

On Tuesday Dec. 7th, the Long Beach representative attended a meeting called at the Los Angeles Y.M.C.A. and found the council had met with the apparent attention of suspending Long Beach from all interscholastic competition arguing that Long Beach had withdrawn from their jurisdiction and at that time was not a member of the C.I.F. Such action was entirely unexpected by Long Beach and after a lengthy discussion the resolution previously stated was drafted and referred to the individual schools for ratification. The Long Beach representative stated at the meeting that Long Beach had not completed arrangements for any game but on his return to Long Beach he found that Everett H. S. had telegraphed their final acceptance of the Long Beach teams, and had completed arrangements for their trip south, their advance agent had already left, and the team would have to leave Dec. 10 which would be before the meeting of the C.I.F. at which the final decision was to be rendered so that it was impossible to cancel that game with any degree of justice towards Everett.

At the present Long Beach faces this dilemma. The penalty stated in the resolution to be acted upon this Saturday, is for Long Beach to disband its team and play no more games or be suspended from the C.I.F. which would affect all interscholastic sports.

In order that this situation may be thoroughly understood by all the high schools and that there shall be no question as to the facts of the case, we the undersigned earnestly request you to attend the meeting to be held at the Los Angeles Y.M.C.A., 7th. & Hope St, Sat., Dec. 11, 9:30 A.M., at which time a final vote of the So. Calif. schools is to be taken.
