I. It was moved by H. J. Moore and seconded by A. B. Forster that the Secretary call the attention of schools entering the semi-finals to pages 10 and 11 of the book of rules.

II. It was moved by G. M. Green and seconded by Homer Martin that H. J. Moore, Football Manager, draw up the schedule for semi-finals and finals.

The San Diego Case-

Statement of facts according to Cleveland:

1. The baseball team of West Technical High School of Cleveland, Ohio played two games of baseball in San Diego, California, July 2d and 4th.

2. Cleveland thought she was playing for the championship of U. S.

3. All arrangements were made by telegram which were signed by Coach Perry and by Manager Kunsel.

4. A certified list of players was handed to Mr. Freeman, Coach of Cleveland team, by Mr. Perry, Coach of the San Diego High School.

5. Expenses were arranged with Coach Perry and expenses guaranteed.

6. Mr. Freeman protested players without results.

-Protest-

The Secretary had made the following protest:-"My attention has been called to the fact that San Diego High School had played Cleveland West Technical High School at San Diego two games of baseball, July 2d and 4th, for the championship of the United States. I theréfor protest because it seems the following rules have been broken: "

1. The rule that one semester does not end until the next begins, gives us jurisdiction over the case.

2. No school under the jurisdiction of the C. I. F. S-S. shall compete with schools outside of the State of California without receiving the consent of the Council.

3. Rule K on page 7

-Results of Investigation Committee-

1. Testimony is very conflicting.

2. Manager Kunsel declares that he made an effort to secure permission from the President of the Council.

3. It was admitted that " Brucker " who was catcher in these games was ineligible according to our rules.

III. It was moved by Homer Martin and seconded by G. M. Green that San Diego High School be suspended from basebal for the coming season.

The motion was declared carried.

IV. It was moved by G. M. Green and seconded by H. J. Moore that the second rule on page 8 be amended by adding the following words: "and the request for such consent shall be made in writing by the Principal of the High School and such consent shall be granted only by a majority vote of the whole Council in meeting assembled". The motion was carried.

V. It was moved, seconded and carried "that a boy entering school as a 9B in February and in regular attendance for 8 consecutive semesters should not be barred from basketball during his 8th semester or from any sport whose season covers parts of two semesters, under the rule limiting a boy to four seasons of a sport.

The above schedules were accepted.

The Chair instructed the Secretary to request all Principals, Vice-Principals and Coaches to read rule K.

-Rulings by Chair-

A. Can a League make a rule contrary to the rules of the California Interscholastic Federation-Southern Section?

No - If the occasion should arise, the request should be made in writing to the Council.

B. Can a League make a rule stronger or more drastic than the G. I. F. rule. Example-May a League change rule K to read, "any school violating this rule shall be suspended". Example-May a League change rule G to read 4 out of 16?

Yes - provided rule is not contrary to the spirit of the rules.

C. Can a school be excused because the rule is omitted on page 9? No - because the rule is stated in full in its proper place on page 6 rule "G".

D. School submitted the following question to the Secretary:- "Boy fails in his work in the spring semester. After ten weeks of attendance from the opening of school this year, and passing in all of his work does he become eligible to play?" Secretary's answer- Boy who is ineligible the first day of a semester is ineligible the whole of that semester." The Chair ruled the Secretary's answer correct.

E. Can schools arrange games and play men who are not eligible provided they have a mutual understanding and agreement to that effect. No- contrary to rule "K".

F. May a graduate from the 8th grade stay out of school one or more years and be eligible when he first enters High School?  
Yes

G. One of our Freshmen students unknowingly professionalized himself by receiving money before entering High School. What action can we take to have him reinstated to amature standing?  
Make application for reinstatement to the Amature Athletic Union of the United States, President, Robert S. Weaver, Los Angeles Athletic Club, Los Angeles, California.

H. X. was compelled to be absent from school during the last year. Is he ineligible? Yes -Rule E and G.

Can the Council declare him eligible if good reasons can be given? No the boy is ineligible for all of this semester.

VI. It was moved, seconded and carried that the Secretary be authorized to purchase a file for letters received and also a suitcase or "Grip" for the carrying of records to and from meetings.

Mr. H. J. Moore was appointed Chairman of committee to interview the A. A. U. and Colleges in the place of Mr. Hughes who resigned.

There being no further business, the Council adjourned.
