Financial Report

The financial statement printed below was presented by Mr. Van Patten. Moved by Mr. Hayhurst, seconded by Mr. Fischer that the report be approved. Carried.

Collection of Annual Dues

Mr. Van Patten reported that the annual dues for the year were coming in rather slowly. He suggested that each League Representative be notified which schools in his league have paid dues for the year and also remind each League Representative of Rule XXVI, Page 39 of our Constitution. There being no objection, the President so ruled.

Eligibility Cases

A number of eligibility cases were considered. One case had to do with a boy who was not in school last year. The others were all cases of boys who had changed schools without their parents having changed residence. In all cases the boys were ruled not eligible for competition this term.

Football Schedules Extended

Due to war conditions the football schedules in the Metropolitan League, the Orange League, and the Sunset League cannot be finished until December 4. Moved by Mr. Hayhurst, seconded by Mr. Thompson that the three leagues in question be allowed to extend their football schedules to December 4. Carried.

Victory Pentathlon

The VICTORY PENTATHLON proposed by Mr. Landreth of the State Office of Education was discussed at length. It was moved by Mr. Fischer, and seconded by Mr. Bergstrom that the Executive Committee go on record as endorsing the purpose and content of the program offered and that Mr. Hamilton, Mr. Hayhurst, and Mr. Van Patten be made a committee to prepare plans to be offered to C.I.F., Southern Section, schools to put the proposed activities into operation. Carried.

Swimming Program

The recommendations of the swimming coaches printed below were considered at length. It was moved by Mr. Bergstrom, seconded by Mr. Fischer that the recommendations be approved. Carried.

Sunday Games

St. Anthony's High School requested that it be allowed to play a game of football with Cathedral High School on Sunday, November 8. Moved by Mr. Hayhurst, seconded by Mr. Bergstrom that the request be denied as Sunday games are forbidden by Rule VIII, Page 24. Carried.

Tennis Activities

The question of whether tennis tournaments and tennis matches ought to be attempted in view of the rubber shortage was discussed. It was moved by Mr. Thompson, seconded by Mr. Burnight that it is the sense of the Executive Committee that our usual tennis program be carried out as fully as possible so long as Federal regulations regarding the use of rubber are not violated. Carried.

Crosscountry Championships

Mr. Van Patten reported that it seemed likely that not more than four or five schools would enter teams in a crosscountry championship. It was moved by Mr. Hayhurst, seconded by Mr. Burnight that ribbons, or medals if available, be given to the five first boys to finish in a single race and that if there were four or more schools competing that two plaques be given. Carried.

Residence Established

When a boy's parents change residence for the purpose of making the boy eligible for athletics, when have they established residence in the meaning of the C.I.F. rule?

This question was discussed quite fully by the Executive Committee.

Mr. Van Patten suggested that registration for voters offers definite proof of residence as a person must take oath as to his residence when he registers.

There being no objection, the Chairman so ruled.

The meeting adjourned at 5:00 P. M.

SANCTIONED EVENTS

We have been notified by the Ramona High School that it will not attempt to stage its annual Cross Country near the end of November. The Ramona High School authorities believe that the transportation difficulties make this move advisable.

The Bonita High School, for the same reasons as given above, has decided to discontinue its annual Basketball Tournament during the period of the War.

The Santa Monica High School has not as yet decided whether or not to stage the Dudley Cup Tournament in 1943.

SWIMMING COACHES MEET

Swimming coaches were called together at the Compton Jr. College on Wednesday, October 14, 1942. Those present were: El Holston, Compton; William V. McAlister, Fullerton; Leonard Lyndon, Flintridge; Evertt Braun, Inglewood; Mel Caines, Pasadena Jr. College; H. G. Alldis, Whittier; and Seth F. Van Patten, C.I.F. Office. The swimming situation was discussed as a whole at considerable length. Transportation difficulties being as they are, it seemed that the program would have to be very much curtailed. Only two schools, Inglewood and Whittier, are to play any water polo this season.

Mr. Lyndon stated that Flintridge School for Boys would like to stage the Southern California Swimming Championships this year at the Occidental College Plunge, if it is possible to hold them.

It was agreed that the swimming relays and the Southern California Invitational Swimming Meet should both be held if it is possible. The coaches recommended that the relays be held in a 75 foot pool. Beverly Hills plunge was designated as the choice of the coaches. Mr. Van Patten was asked to contact Beverly Hills in regard to the swimming relays and, also, to contact Mr. Douglas of Whittier regarding the Invitational Swimming Meet.

In case transportation difficulties should make it impossible to hold dual meets and the various other swimming activities, it was recommended that a plan be worked out whereby two or more schools could compete in the same events on the same day but swim in their own home pools and exchange results by telephone or otherwise.

It was brought out that medals will not be available this year due to metal priorities. It was recommended that ribbons be given in place of medals, if it was necessary.

Following the meeting, Mr. Brown of Beverly Hills expressed a willingness to help stage the relays in the Beverly Hills pool. Mr. Douglas of Whittier is willing to help stage the Invitational Swimming Meet, if one is held.

Thank you for the opportunity of sending some information to you for your bulletin.

Last year on November 1st, we had 14,208 boys covered. Our books today show that we have 12,415 boys covered. The enclosed sheets give you the figures of this year and last year to November 1st.

When you consider the fact that many of the schools have opened later this year, we believe that the showing already made for the year is quite favorable.

The schools appreciate the fact that boys are being covered for the intramural program and many of the schools are taking out coverage on this basis.

Many of the schools are coming to appreciate the advantages that are given under Schedule "C." To date, we have over twice as many boys covered under Schedule "C" as we had for all of last year.
