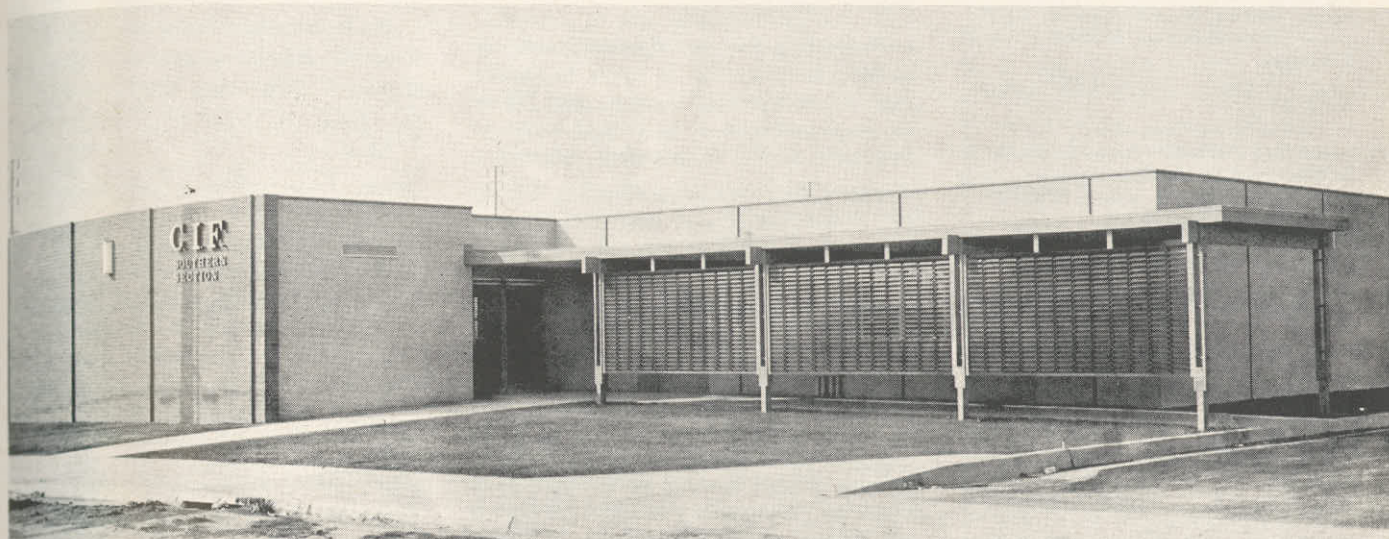

Devereux School Resigns From CIF, SS

Devereux School of Goleta has informed the CIF, SS, that it is resigning its membership in the organization effective immediately.

In a communication from Thomas K. Dawson, director of athletics, it was revealed that students who might be eligible to compete in interscholastic athletics had dwindled to twenty. "We believe that an intramural program would better meet the needs of these students," said Dawson.

Devereux had been a member of the Condor League along with other small private schools in Ventura and Santa Barbara counties.

Play-Off Committee Named

A three-man committee, charged with the duties of filling open spots in the football play-offs with second place teams if such vacancies arise and determining which leagues are to receive two entries if there are more champions than vacancies in the bracket, has been appointed by the Executive Committee.

The committee will be comprised of Commissioner of Athletics Ken Fagans, Council President Roger C. Weeks, and a representative to be announced by the Southern California Interscholastic Football Coaches Assn.

Swim Officials to Be Certified At Beverly Hills on December 11

The only opportunity for swim officials to become certified for assignments for the 1966 swim season will come on December 11, when the Southern California Swim Coaches and Officials Assn. holds its annual certification meeting.

The session, which will include discussion of rule interpretations as well as the certification exam, will be held at Beverly Hills High School beginning at 9 a.m.

COMMISSIONER'S CORNER

UNDUE INFLUENCE INTERPRETED

As a result of the St. John Bosco case of last summer an official interpretation was approved by the CIF, SS, Executive Committee regarding the question "What is undue influence?"

The undue influence rule of which we speak is listed in Article X, Section 8 of the By-Laws of the CIF, SS, and reads as follows:

"The use of undue influence by any person or persons to secure or retain a boy or to secure or retain one or both parents or guardians of a boy as residents will cause the boy to be ineligible for high school athletics for a period of one year and shall jeopardize the standing of the high school in the CIF, Southern Section."

This rule has been a part of our By-Laws for many years and has been interpreted to mean "that no representative (official or unofficial) of a member school shall exert any influence to secure a potential athlete for a particular school. This includes telephone calls, home visitations or personal contact with either the boy or any member of his family."

In future cases, violation of any phases of the interpretation will be considered a violation of the undue influence rule and will be dealt with accordingly.

ASSOCIATE MEMBERSHIP IN CIF, SS

There are two kinds of membership in the CIF, SS,—regular and associate membership—and often people ask us the difference between the two. Basically, people wonder, what is associate membership?

According to our Constitution, associate membership is open to junior high schools and to Arizona and Nevada high schools that desire competition with CIF, SS, member schools.

The only difference between associate membership and regular membership is that the associate member schools do not have league representatives with voting privileges on the CIF, SS, Council.

The out-of-state high schools join primarily for purposes of being able to schedule California schools near the Arizona and Nevada borders without having to get special permission each time an inter-state athletic event is scheduled.

In our more than 70 junior high schools which have associate membership, only the ninth grade competition falls under the jurisdiction of the CIF, SS. Eighth and ninth graders may not compete on the same teams when they are in competition with other associate member schools.

We are asked, quite often, what eligibility rules affect the associate member schools, particularly the junior highs. Can their boys play little league baseball or on outside youth football teams?

The answer is simple. All members of the CIF, SS,—regular and associate—are subject to the rules set forth in the Blue Book. All standards must be met.

Administrators of junior high schools are urged to read the Blue Book and become particularly familiar with the rules concerning eligibility.

Home Field No Advantage

In contradiction to the popular notion of the "home field" advantage, the National Football League reports that last season NFL home teams won less than half of their contests. Of the 98 games played, 48 were won by the home club, 44 by the visitors and six ended in ties.

MINUTES OF CIF, SS, EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING—OCTOBER 18, 1965

The second meeting of the CIF, SS, Executive Committee for the 1965-66 school year was called to order by Chairman Robert D. Ashton at 1:30 p.m. at the new CIF Office in Artesia.

The following members were in attendance: Chairman Ashton, administrator, secondary personnel, Norwalk-La Mirada School District; Arthur H. North, assistant superintendent, Azusa USD; Keith Gunn, principal, Victor Valley HS; Winston Nelson, superintendent, Pomona USD; Richard Spaulding, principal, Buena Park HS; Charles Ronin, vice principal, Redlands HS; Harry L. Bigger, principal, Fillmore HS; Claud Hardesty, principal, Santa Barbara HS; Marion Hays, vice principal, Harvard School; Clair Franklin, principal, Trona HS; Steve Miletich, vice principal, Beverly Hills HS; Roger C. Weeks, principal, Sierra HS; and Kenneth Fagans, Commissioner of Athletics.

1. APPROVED MINUTES—It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the September 18, 1965, Executive Committee meeting as published in the October Monthly Bulletin.

2. APPLICATIONS FOR MEMBERSHIP—It was moved, seconded and carried to recommend to the Council that the following schools be admitted to regular membership in the CIF, SS.

- a. Glenn A. Wilson HS of La Puente
- b. Workman HS of La Puente
- c. High School #7 in the Fullerton District
- d. Pinecrest School of Woodland Hills

It was moved, seconded and carried to recommend to the Council that Curtis Junior High of San Bernardino be admitted to associate membership in the CIF, SS.

3. ST. JOHN BOSCO REQUEST—A request was received from St. John Bosco High School to waive the 40 mile travel limit which is one of the stipulations under that school's terms of probation so that St. John Bosco might travel to San Luis Obispo for a football game on October 22. It was moved by Mr. Hays, seconded and carried to deny the request.

4. MISSION CENTRAL FOOTBALL REQUEST—Mission Central Catholic High School of San Luis Obispo submitted a letter seeking permission to enter the 1965 football

play-offs on a free lance basis. Free lance football schedules must be submitted for evaluation prior to the May Council Meeting the preceding school year. The Committee questioned the tardiness of the Mission request inasmuch as three games had already been played.

The committee was informed that Mission had had a change in athletic directors during the summer months and it was due to the confusion of the change that the schedule was not submitted for evaluation.

It was moved, seconded and carried to permit San Luis Mission Central to enter the 1965 football play-offs provided that its record merits such entrance. The schedule and game results will be evaluated just prior to play-off time.

5. REPORT ON WATER POLO VIOLATION—It was called to the attention of the Executive Committee that Estancia High and Costa Mesa High had violated a water polo regulation by participating in a scrimmage-type activity after both teams had already begun their regular season.

Because the individual school administrations had taken appropriate disciplinary action the Executive Committee was of the opinion that no further action was necessary. Principals of the two schools were commended for their handling of the incident.

6. MEETING WITH CITRUS BELT AREA REPRESENTATIVES REGARDING OFFICIATING ASSIGNMENTS—Charles Ronin reported that a meeting had been held with league, school and officials association representatives in the Citrus Belt area to discuss the assignment of game officials in that area. In his progress report, Mr. Ronin said that three proposals were being discussed: a) that the assignment secretary or commissioner of officials in that area be appointed and paid by the CIF, SS, b) that the person appointed assign for varsity events only with local area associations handling JV, B and C, etc.; and c) that a larger portion of gate receipts from final and semi-final games in all CIF football play-offs go to the CIF, SS, office to be used for assisting outlying schools in employing a person to assign game officials. Mr. Ronin said that another meeting would be held before any final action was taken.

7. FOOTBALL PLAY-OFF COMMITTEE—In line with the previous-

ly approved plan of appointing a committee to decide which leagues would be permitted second place entries in the play-offs (if there were open spots in the brackets) and which leagues would be permitted more than one entry (if more than four leagues finished with co-champions) in the 3-A and 4-A football play-offs, the following action was taken.

It was moved by Mr. Franklin, seconded and carried that a three-man committee be appointed and that it consist of Commissioner Fagans, Roger Weeks, (President of the CIF Council) and a representative to be selected by the Southern California Interscholastic Football Coaches Assn.

8. WRESTLING PROGRAM FOR 1965-66 SEASON—a) It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the Hawthorne High Christmas Take-Down Tournament provided that all schools in the CIF, SS, were given the opportunity to participate if they so desired and that the tournament not count as one of the permitted interscholastic matches. b) It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the new weight-plan as recommended by the wrestling coaches and presented to the Executive Committee. c) It was moved, seconded and carried to adopt the new CIF wrestling tournament format as recommended by the commissioner after meeting with the coaches.

Further information on items B and C is being sent to all schools which list wrestling coaches in the CIF Directory of Member Schools.

9. ELIGIBILITY CASES—a. Alhambra High—A request to reverse a previous decision by the Committee in which it had voted against waiving the eight-semester rule in the case of John Stockman was denied.

b. Mira Costa—It was moved, seconded and carried to waive the transfer rule in the case of Edward Hazell to make him eligible beginning with the second semester provided he is eligible in all other respects.

c. Upland—A request was heard from Upland seeking waiver of the academic rule to permit William Gates and Larry Freeman to be eligible even though they had not passed in four subjects of new work last semester. The Executive Committee denied the request.

d. Foothill—It was moved, seconded and carried to waive the previous semester rule in the case of Stan Kenyon to make him immediately eligible at Foothill HS.

e. Montclair—It was moved, seconded and carried to waive the residence

rule in the case of James McLaughlin to make him eligible at Montclair High.

f. Notre Dame—Mr. and Mrs. Robert Magnante appeared before the committee seeking a waiver of the eight semester rule in the case of their son, Robert, a student at Notre Dame High in Sherman Oaks. The request was denied.

g. Hueneme—The Commissioner reported that he had ruled Tommy Sanchez eligible at Hueneme High inasmuch as his parents were legally separated and he had chosen to live with his mother who moved from El Centro to Hueneme. The Executive Committee reviewed the case and upheld the Commissioner's ruling.

h. Edgewood — Principal Roscoe Vaniman and Athletic Director James Arwood appeared before the committee to appeal a previous decision to deny a request for a waiver of the residence rule in the case of James Johnson. After rehearing the case it was moved, seconded and carried to deny the request for waiver of the residence rule.

i. Central—Walter Brennan appeared to ask the committee to reconsider an earlier ruling which had declared his nephew, Mike Donahue, ineligible at Central High in El Centro. After rehearing the case it was moved, seconded and carried that the request for waiver of the transfer rule be denied.

j. Valencia—It was moved, seconded and carried to waive the residence rule in the case of Bruce Joseph to make him eligible at Valencia High.

k. Monte Vista—It was moved, seconded and carried to permit Monte Vista High School to accept the athletic classification of two students who were weighed in late due to a conflict with another school activity.

l. Heritage HS—It was moved, seconded and carried to waive the residence rule in the case of Phil Hammond, Terry Mott, Ron Ness, Rick Kuehn and Steve Johnson at Heritage HS, to make them eligible immediately for interscholastic athletics.

10. FOOTBALL PLAY-OFF RADIO POLICY—It was moved by Art North, seconded and carried to accept the recommendation of the Director of Public Information, to establish the following broadcast fees for the 1965 football play-offs: For 3-A and 4-A games—\$50.00 per game, payable to the home school for inclusion in the game receipts. For 2-A, 1-A and Small School contests — \$25.00 per game, payable to the home school for inclusion in the game receipts.

11. RELEAGUING COMMITTEE APPOINTMENTS — Council President Roger Weeks announced that invitations would be extended to current members of the Releaguings Committee to serve on the new committee which will shortly begin work on leaguings schools for the 1967-68 school year.

12. ARROWHEAD LEAGUE INSURANCE REQUEST—Some of the members of the Arrowhead League, particularly those schools supported by county and local governments, seek assistance regarding the new mandatory insurance law passed by the State legislature. The item was referred to our state representatives for study by the State Federated Council.

13. PALO VERDE HIGH REPORTS NON ENFORCEMENT OF TRANSFER RULE—The administration of Palo Verde High in Blythe reported to the committee that it was aware of violations of non enforcement of the transfer rule by schools in the Northern Section. Southern Section representatives on the State Federated Council were asked to bring this matter to the attention of the state body in December.

14. ELIGIBILITY RULES COMMITTEE — Council President Roger Weeks appointed the following committee to begin a comprehensive study of CIF, SS, eligibility and transfer rule and to make a progress report at the next Council meeting. The committee: Leon Meeks, principal, Corona del Mar; Walter Newland, principal, Long Beach Poly; Ed Ellis, director of athletics, Chadwick School; Art Hobson, principal, California High; and Rev. John Hughes, president of the Catholic Athletic Assn. Weeks and Commissioner Fagans will serve as ex-officio members of the committee.

15. CONSIDER CHARGE OF UN-DUE INFLUENCE BY CLAREMONT COACH — The Executive Committee heard a protest from Jesse Cone, head football coach at Ganesha High School in Pomona, who charged that Leonard Cohn, head football coach at Claremont High School, had used undue influence to encourage outstanding football players to attend his school.

The specific charge centered around the fact that Leonard Cohn had twice visited the home of the John Shaw family in the spring of 1965 while the Shaw boys were still enrolled in Pomona Catholic High School.

Mr. Cone of Ganesha further charged that Leonard Cohn had at-

tempted to influence Mike Raether, a former student at Ganesha High School, to transfer to Claremont High.

Leonard Cohn then responded to the charges and answered all questions asked by members of the Executive Committee concerning the matter.

The committee also heard statements from the superintendent and principal of the Claremont USD, an official representative of the San Antonio League and other concerned persons.

After hearing all of the testimony, the Executive Committee went into an executive session for the purpose of discussing the case.

After thorough discussion of the entire matter, it was moved, seconded and carried that Claremont High football Coach Leonard Cohn be severely censured and placed on probation for a period of two years, inasmuch as he had visited the Shaw family home and had used extremely poor judgment in his relations with athletes of neighboring high schools.

It was the opinion of the Executive Committee that such action, regardless of its motivation, creates suspicions among other schools, causes people to question a coach's intentions, jeopardizes the status of coaches in general and reflects unfavorably upon the total interscholastic athletic program.

The Committee directed that copies of the letter of censure be sent to the Claremont District Superintendent, Board of Education and principals of schools in the San Antonio League and that the league review annually during the period of probation the actions of Coach Cohn as they relate to the spirit and letter of CIF regulations and report its finding to the Executive Committee.

16. NEW BUILDING REPORT—Commissioner Fagans reported that the CIF, SS, staff moved into the new building on Monday, October 4, and that aside from the usual minor additions and changes necessary, all was in good order. He thanked the Executive Committee, the Desert League and Valley Christian High School for their thoughtfulness in sending bouquets of flowers welcoming the staff to its new headquarters.

There being no further business to come before the committee the meeting was adjourned at 9:45 p.m.

Cross Country Championship Set for Dec. 2 at Long Beach

Three preliminary cross country meets have been scheduled for Tuesday, November 23, from which teams and individuals will qualify for the CIF, SS, championship finals at California State College—Long Beach on Thursday, December 2.

The 1965 meet will be conducted in four divisions, based on enrollment in the upper three grades. After the deadline for entries has passed, the Commissioner will place the largest one-fourth of the schools in the "AAA" division, the next largest one-fourth in the "AA" and so on until "A" and "Small Schools" divisions have been filled.

Prelims will be held at 3:00 p.m. on Nov. 23 at Sunny Hills HS, Centinela Park in Inglewood, and at Mt. San Antonio College. The prelims will be managed by Bill Lingenfelder of Sunny Hills, Hank Ketels of Aviation and Don Ruh of Mt. SAC.

From each preliminary meet the three fastest teams in each division and the two fastest boys on non-winning team (provided they finish among the first five in their division) will qualify for the finals.

The championship meet will again be held at Long Beach under the direction of Dr. Jack Rose, cross country coach at Cal State.

All races in CIF championship competition will be run on a course measuring exactly two miles.

No awards will be given for the preliminary meets, but in the Championship meet first and second place teams in each division will be awarded trophies. Individual medals will be presented to the boys on the winning and runner-up teams and the five fastest individual performers in each race will receive pen sets.

Burbank High is the defending "AAA" team champion, Colton the defending "AA" titleholder, Aviation the "A" champion and Glenn will be back to defend their "Small Schools" title.

Five Southern Section Boys Now "World Champs" With Dodgers

Three youthful major leaguers who attended CIF, Southern Section high schools, were among the eight regular starters for the world champion Los Angeles Dodgers and five CIFers were on the Dodgers' roster at the conclusion of the 1965 campaign.

The five boys who reflected credit upon the baseball program conducted by high schools in Southern California were Ron Fairly (Jordan, Long Beach), Jim Lefevbre (Morningside), Wes Parker (Harvard), Mike Kekich (Lynwood) and Bill Singer (Pomona).

Fairly played his high school ball at Long Beach Jordan and made ALL-CIF honors in both 1955 and 1956 as an outfielder. He hit .506 on '56 when he was named Co-Player of the year along with another major leaguer,

Mike McCormick.

Fairly led the Dodgers with 70 RBI during the 1965 season and hit .379 with six RBI and two homers in the winning world series with Minnesota.

Wes Parker, All Olympic League choice for three straight years (1956 - 57 - 58) while at Harvard School, hit .556 in his senior year. He first base, outfield and pitched.

Parker, regular Dodger first baseman during the season, hit .304 in the series.

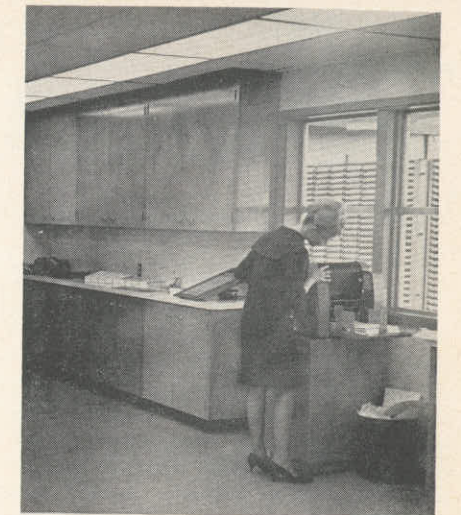

Lefevbre drove in 69 runs (second to Fairly) during the regular season and hit .400 in his three world series

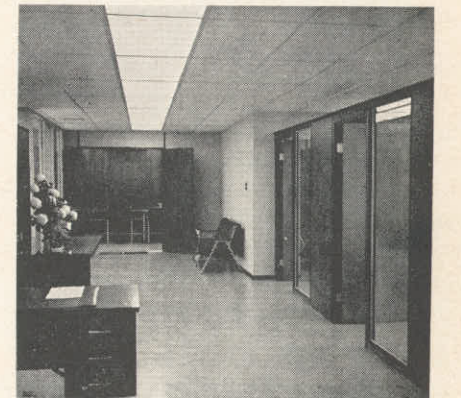
