COAST LEAGUE DISBANDED, IS AFFECTED IN ANNUAL REALIGNMENT

Major changes in the Southeast area, moderate ones in the South Bay, and minor switches in the citrus belt and desert areas will result among CIF, Southern Section, leagues for the 1972-73 school year as a result of the annual relegating process, completed recently by the Council.

The long-standing Coast League was disbanded, and a new league, yet to be named, was formed. Realignment of 17 Catholic schools in three parochial leagues will be found on page 5.

The new league will be made up of the seven schools in the Whittier Union High School District—California, La Serna, Monte Vista, Pioneer, Santa Fe, Sierra and Whittier—plus Dominguez High of Compton. Four teams come from the Whitmont League and two each from the Coast and San Gabriel Valley.

Three other Coast League teams, Downey, Warren and Lynwood, and La Mirada from the Suburban League join the SGVL, making it an eight-team circuit for 1972-73. The Whitmont also jumps to an eight-team loop, with the addition of Arroyo, Keppel, Monrovia and San Gabriel from the Pacific League, and new schools Mountain View (El Monte) and Schurr (Montebello) gaining league affiliation.

The other Coast League team, Montebello, joins El Rancho (from

FALL PLAYOFF LINEUP

Football—AAA, AAA and AA playoffs open Nov. 26 and continue on Dec. 3, 10 and 17. AAAA championship game will be played Dec. 17 at Los Angeles Coliseum. A and Small Schools division playoffs are Nov. 26, Dec. 3, 10. Six-man playoffs are Nov. 19, 26, Dec. 3.

Cross Country—CIF prelims for league team winners in four divisions and qualifying individuals will be held Nov. 27 at the two-mile Cal State Long Beach course. Finals are scheduled for the same course Dec. 4.

Water Polo—The newly enlarged 32-team playoffs will begin Nov. 24 and continue on the 30th. Dec. 3 quarterfinals will be played at Millikan and Lakewood High Schools and the semifinals Dec. 7 and championship Dec. 10 will be at the Belmont Plaza Olympic Pool, Long Beach.

TRAVEL RESTRICTIONS EASED BY STATE

A new event in the state track meet, a state-level wrestling championship and eased restrictions on distances athletic teams may travel, were three of the key items coming out of the most recent meeting of the CIF State Federated Council, held in Monterey.

The triple jump (or hop, step, jump) will be added to the state track meet for 1973 (which the Sac-Joaquin Section will host) as a scoring event. Several sections already have this event, and Southern Section invitationals have used it in the past on a limited basis. The SS will now have to decide on what system SS athletes will qualify for the state meet in the event—whether it will be included in the championship meet, or if there will be a special qualifying session, such as now takes place for the discus.

The discus is a state meet scoring event, but not a regular event in the Southern Section.

The state CIF will stage a California high school championship wrestling tournament in the 1973 season. Details and format are to be decided by a committee consisting of section secretaries.

The state level rule on travel has been liberalized, and the Southern Section is now in a position to decide whether or not it will retain its more restrictive regulation, or align with the state ruling.

The new travel rule says:

1) Schools may travel to any part of the state of California to take part in a dual or triangular contest without section or state sanction (previously the limit was a distance of 300 miles). Intersectional Invitationals (more than three schools) would need sanctions.

2) Interstate travel up to 500 miles

is allowable with the approval of the section and the state (this does not apply to SS associate members in Nevada and Arizona, which may meet SS schools without state sanction).

3) Interstate travel for distances over 500 miles is allowable provided approval is obtained from local board, league, section, state and the National Federation. However a school may apply for sanction for such a contest only once every five years. Two or more different teams (sports) could make the same trip (i.e. football and cross country; basketball and wrestling; baseball and tennis, etc.)

In other action:

—The San Diego Section received approval to experiment with aluminum baseball bats for the 1971 season. Rising costs of wooden bats was among the considerations in approval of this request.

—The "classification rule" was clarified to the point that when schools using the exponent system of classification from different sections play each other, eligibility will be determined by the state exponent list, rather than either individual section's list.

—The experiment allowing swimmers to compete in two outside meets other than the AAU championships will be continued for another year. The Southern Section is taking part in this state experimental rule.

—The subject of proposed changes and additions to the "all-star" rule was referred to the sections.

—The status of boxing and its effect on CIF eligibility was reviewed in light of a program being conducted in Northern California by law enforcement agencies.

MINUTES OF MEETING OF CIF, SS, EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE
October 16, 1971

The October meeting of the CIF, Southern Section, Executive Committee was called to order by Chairman Steve Miletich at 2:00 p.m. on Saturday, October 16, 1971, at the CIF, SS, Office.

The following members were in attendance: Chairman Miletich, Vice-Principal, Beverly Hills High School; Rev. Lawrence Dunphy, President of the Southern Section Council, Principal, St. Bernard High School; Keith Lee, Treasurer of the Southern Section Council, Principal, Yucca Valley High School; Alex Alexander, Principal, Desert Sands High School; Tony Balsamo, Principal, Apple Valley High School; Ferren Christensen, Principal, Westminster High School; Richard Cordano, Principal, Arcadia High School; James Faul, Principal, Workman High School; Msgr. Thomas Kiefer, Principal, St. Genevieve High School; Rev. Alexander Manville, Principal, Bishop Diego High School; J. Kenneth Fagans, Commissioner of Athletics, Thomas Morgan, Administrative Assistant, and Mike Peck, Director of Public Information, CIF, Southern Section Office.

1. APPROVAL OF MINUTES. It was moved, seconded, and passed to approve the minutes of the special meeting of the Executive Committee of September 25, 1971, as published in the October Monthly Bulletin.

2. APPLICATIONS FOR MEMBERSHIP.

a. It was moved, seconded, and passed to approve the application for regular membership in the CIF, Southern Section, for Huntington Valley Christian High School of Fountain Valley, effective immediately.

b. It was moved, seconded, and passed to approve the application for regular membership for the new Don Lugo High School of Chino, effective beginning with the 1972-73 school year.

3. ELIGIBILITY CASES.

a. After careful consideration of each case, it was moved, seconded, and passed to waive the Transfer or Previous Semester Rule to permit the following students to be immediately eligible to participate in interscholastic athletics: Michael Schaub, Quartz Hill High School; Tim Marozick, Anaheim High School (Gymnastics only); Randy Bowdin, Anaheim High School (Gymnastics only); Michael Schultz, Savanna High School (Water polo and Swimming only); William Bird, Savanna

High School (Water polo and Swimming only); Richard Leedom, Estancia High School; David Gibney, Servite High School (Water polo only); James Struck, Rio Hondo Prep School; David Lee Brown, San Geronio High School; George Gray, El Segundo High School (Water polo and swimming only).

b. It was moved, seconded, and passed to DENY the requests to waive the Transfer Rule for the following students: Tarrekegne Mehari, Agoura High School; Scott Livingston, Canyon High School; Richard Concepcion, Rosemead High School.

c. Dr. Kuschell and a representative of Notre Dame High School (Riverside) appeared before the Executive Committee regarding the eligibility of Dr. Kuschell's son, John, at Notre Dame. John had attended Notre Dame as a freshman during the 1969-70 school year, then transferred to Riverside Poly in 1970-71 for his sophomore year. During this past summer his parents changed their legal residence from Riverside to Crestline (Rim of the World High School public school attendance area), and at the beginning of the current 1971-72 school year, John chose to enroll again at Notre Dame in Riverside.

The Arrowhead League had requested an interpretation from the CIF, SS, Office as to the eligibility status of John Kuschell at Notre Dame. In the absence of Commissioner Fagans, an original ruling was made declaring him eligible based on the information that Notre Dame would be the closest possible parochial school which John could attend from his new residence in Crestline. However, subsequent investigation by the Commissioner revealed that Aquinas High School in San Bernardino is geographically located between Crestline and Riverside. Therefore, in accordance with CIF, SS, transfer regulations and procedures, John would have the following choices of schools available to him if he desired to be eligible for interscholastic athletics after his family's change of residence: 1) He could remain at Riverside Poly High School; or 2) He could choose between the public high school in the new attendance area, Rim of the World, or the closest parochial school, Aquinas. However, it was ruled that he would not be considered to be eligible at Notre Dame.

Dr. Kuschell appealed this interpretation of the transfer rule, and informed the committee of reasons why he felt that the rule should be waived in order to permit his son to be eligible at Notre Dame.

After considerable discussion and a review of correspondence regarding the matter, it was moved, seconded, and unanimously passed to reaffirm that a proper ruling had been made in this case and that John Kuschell would be ineligible at Notre Dame for a period of one year from the date of his enrollment there.

It was called to the attention of all concerned that a CIF, SS, Form 99 may be processed and, with the approval of the principal of Riverside Poly High School, John could be permitted to play on teams other than at the varsity level at Notre Dame during the present school year.

4. INTERNATIONAL FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM. Information was presented to the Executive Committee regarding the organization and operation of the International Fellowship foreign exchange student program in the Southern California area. It had been requested that these students be considered to receive "automatic" residence eligibility when they enroll at CIF, SS, schools, the same privilege offered to foreign exchange students who are sponsored by the American Field Service and "Youth For Understanding" programs. The members of the committee were familiar with this established program, and it was moved, seconded, and passed to amend paragraph 1(C) of Article XI (Residence Eligibility) of the Blue Book to include International Fellowship foreign exchange students as among those boys granted residence eligibility when entering any CIF, SS, high school.

5. COURTESY CARDS FOR ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENTS. The Commissioner, in response to several recent requests, asked for an interpretation from the Executive Committee concerning the issuance of annual passes, or "courtesy cards," to assistant or associate superintendents. The committee discussed the matter at length and ruled that, in accordance with Article XXIX (Annual Passes) of the CIF, SS, By-Laws, "courtesy cards" could not be authorized for assistant superintendents, associate superintendents, or coaches at member schools. It was emphasized that the policy adopted by the Council at its meeting of May 1, 1971, severely restricted the issuance of "courtesy

cards" in an attempt to control the widespread problems which have resulted in the past from the indiscriminate use of these passes.

6. STARTING DATE FOR CROSS COUNTRY SEASON. Riverside Poly High School requested that the Executive Committee consider the possibility of delaying the start of the cross country season until either October 1 or 15 because of high levels of smog concentration which traditionally occur during September and early October. The committee discussed this matter, but felt that the advantages of delaying the start of the season would not be conclusive since potential cross country team members would probably still run and practice during the first few weeks of the school semester the same as they are doing now during the summer months in preparation for the season. The committee was also of the opinion that it would be difficult to set back the start of the cross country season and not take similar action for football and water polo, since the basic problems are the same in all of these sports. Riverside Poly was informed that this matter could be brought to the attention of the CIF, SS, Council in January through the Citrus Belt League representative if it was still felt at that time that a change should be considered.

7. MEMBERSHIP IN ORANGE LEAGUE FOR DANA HILLS HIGH SCHOOL. The Commissioner informed the Executive Committee that a request had been received from the new Dana Hills High School, scheduled to open in September, 1972, to be placed in the Orange League beginning with the 1972-73 school year. This request arrived too late to be brought to the attention of the Releaguings Committee or to the Council before its meeting of September 25, 1971, when the final releaguings proposals for

1972-73 were approved, and therefore was being presented to the committee for consideration. Since the Orange League is scheduled to be a seven-team league for 1972-73, and thus the addition of one more school would not create an imbalance or adversely affect league schedules, it was moved, seconded, and passed to recommend the addition of Dana Hills High School to the Orange League beginning next year, subject to the approval and acceptance of the member schools of the Orange League.

8. DISSEMINATION OF CIF INFORMATION TO LEAGUES. Concern was expressed by the Executive Committee members over the apparent lack of effective dissemination of CIF, SS, information to the member schools of all leagues, and discussion was held regarding methods by which to attempt to improve this situation. The committee felt that too many times matters were tabled at Council meetings because representatives were not prepared to vote, and that all schools were not being made aware in advance of proposals for important policy changes. The Commissioner was directed to research some of the procedures now being used by established leagues in the CIF, SS, which may be of benefit for the organization of other leagues, and to report back to the committee at its next meeting so that this information can be prepared for recommendation and distribution to all leagues in the near future.

9. PEP BANDS AT BASKETBALL GAMES. The Commissioner asked the Executive Committee to review, in response to recent inquiries, the regulation which restricts a pep band to 12 members at CIF, SS, basketball playoff games. The committee felt that because of space and acoustical problems inherent to these games the number of members in a pep band would have to continue to be limited, and moved, seconded, and passed to reaffirm the present restriction of 12 members based on the fact that this is an adequate number to provide the musical instrumentation required.

10. BY-LAW CHANGE, DEACTIVATION OF MEMBER SCHOOL. Because of the fact that several private member schools of the CIF, SS, have ceased operations due to a lack of funds during recent years, the Executive Committee was advised that permanent procedures should be established to govern these types of situations and to provide for the orderly transition and eligibility of students in new schools in which they enroll in order to complete their education. The committee agreed that affected students are

entitled to further interscholastic athletic participation without loss of eligibility when they are forced under such circumstances to move to a new school. In accordance with this principle, it was moved, seconded, and passed to recommend to the Council that the following by-law be added to the CIF, SS, Blue Book to govern the deactivation of a member school:

1) Boys who enroll in a public high school in the attendance area in which their parents or legal guardian reside will be immediately eligible for interscholastic athletics at that school.

2) Boys who wish to transfer to another private school will be granted eligibility if:

- it is the nearest private school mileage-wise;
- it is the nearest private school of the same type as the one they were attending;
- because of extenuating circumstances the Executive Committee approves their eligibility.

The names of all boys with further high school eligibility should be listed alphabetically according to their grade in school, along with the address of the boy's parents and the name of the school he plans to attend the following semester. This information should then be sent to the CIF, SS, Office at the earliest possible moment. The information will be verified and principals will be advised as to the athletic eligibility of boys planning on enrolling in their school.

11. FOOTBALL PLAYOFF REGULATIONS.

a. **Tie Games**—The Commissioner asked the Executive Committee to discuss the value of the California Tie-Breaker System which has been in effect recently during the CIF, SS, football playoffs. The committee reviewed the advantages and disadvantages of this system, and concluded that the tie-breaker should continue to be used during all games in the playoffs. The additional cost of duplicate awards in cases where there are ties and the tremendous crowd interest and appeal generated by the tie-breaker playoff, as evidenced at last year's "AAAA" championship game, were cited as the main reasons for this decision.

b. **Police and Game Management Expenses**—It was reported to the committee that many member schools have expressed concern with regard to the large amounts of expenditures for police protection and administra-

tive personnel to staff certain CIF, SS, playoff games. While the committee indicated that the discussion was in no way meant to imply that these games should not be properly policed or staffed, it was nevertheless pointed out that different areas were confronted with different problems concerning the required numbers for and costs of these types of services. However, the committee was also of the opinion that it is not fair to ask the visiting school and the CIF, SS, to share in this excessive expense when the game might be staged in another area at a more reasonable cost. Following discussion, the Commissioner was directed to prepare recommendations for procedures and possible limitations for game management expenses for playoff games for consideration at the next meeting of the Executive Committee.

12. SELECTION OF COUNCIL PRESIDENT.

The Executive Committee discussed at length some of the problems inherent in the present system of selecting the President of the CIF, SS, Council as provided for in Section 2 of Article V (Officers) of the Constitution; this procedure states that the Council presidency will rotate annually in alphabetical order among the member leagues. The committee emphasized that this position was considered to be one of the most important of the CIF, SS, and because of the complexities of the office, concluded that it would be to the benefit of the organization to always have a person experienced in CIF matters as the president in order to provide essential leadership, both throughout the year and at the regular meetings of the Council. This is the system that is currently utilized on a very successful basis by the State CIF Federated Council. Following further discussion, it was moved, seconded, and passed to authorize the Commissioner to prepare recommendations for an amendment to the CIF, SS, Constitution which would provide for the election of the Council President and Vice-President. This proposal would be returned to the Executive Committee for approval at its next meeting, and recommended to the Council at the scheduled meeting of January 29, 1972, in order to become effective for the 1972-73 school year.

There being no further business to come before the committee, the meeting was adjourned at 5:30 p.m.

NEW COURSE OFFERED AT CARPINTERIA HIGH

An innovative pilot course, Aspects of Interscholastic Sports, special phases of an athlete's life, is being offered this semester at Carpinteria High School under the direction of Jim Perino, vice-principal and athletic director.

The class, Perino explained, meets one hour a week for one unit of credit and includes members of all interscholastic teams at Carpinteria as well as girls in the interscholastic and GAA programs. It brings before the students varied programs which explain aspects of the overall interscholastic program.

Perino has asked Carpinteria coaches to share rotating responsibility for a program, and has also been in contact with community leaders and those involved in athletics. Tom Morgan, CIF, SS administrative assistant, presented the first such program, in September, explaining the function of the CIF, Southern Section, with the aid of the film "The CIF Story," which is available through the Southern Section film library.

Perino expects to cover such topics as insurance, training, officiating, equipment, nutrition, etc. during the course, and also hopes to have several "name" sporting figures visit the campus.

Among the aims of the program are to provide opportunity for and promote the desire of athletes and coaches to become involved in a practical and theoretical group instruction, and in the total school and community program, areas Perino feels are often overlooked in any one interscholastic sports program.

LEAGUES SWITCH CAGE DIVISIONS

With the onset of basketball season, a reminder has been issued regarding two differences from the listing last year of playoff divisions for the current season.

The Crestview and Ocean Leagues originally slated for AAAA play, are now in AAA. The Whitmont and Sky Leagues have moved from AAA into the AAAA.

The Whitmont-Ocean change has since been published in the Press and Record Book (inside back cover). The Sky-Crestview change should be entered.

NEW GYM TEAM

Fountain Valley High School in Orange County will field a gymnastics team for the first time this season. Athletic Director Ken Dudderidge says the Baron gymnastics must fill all dates. Those interested should call Dudderidge at (714) 962-3301.

Moore League) in moving to the Pacific League. The PL drops to six teams with the exit of four schools to the Whitmont.

The new Cerritos High takes La Mirada's place in the Suburban League.

Five coastal area leagues get one change apiece. Jordan returns to the Moore League from the Bay; West (from Ocean) replaces Jordan in the Bay; Palos Verdes (from Sky) replaces West in the Ocean; Miraleste (from Pioneer) replaces Palos Verdes in the Sky; and St. Bernard (from Camino Real) replaces Miraleste in the Pioneer.

Damien moves out of the Del Rey into the San Antonio replacing Bonita. Bonita and San Dimas (from Arrowhead) join the Hacienda making it an eight-team league for next school year. The Arrowhead League also loses La Sierra to the San Andreas, bringing its membership to six.

San Andreas becomes an eight-teamer with the addition of La Sierra and Palm Springs from the Desert Valleys, making the DVL a six-team loop.

The De Anza League increases to eight schools as Twentynine Palms and Yucca Valley switch over from the Chaparral League, dropping the latter loop to five schools. The Pinon League adds new school Los Pinos (Elsinore), giving it seven teams.

The plan the council accepted was formed from final recommendations of the CIF, SS, relegating committee, chaired this year by Dr. Ken Bullock of San Marino HS.

ADDED SANCTIONED EVENTS LISTED

The following is a list of sanctioned events (tournaments) which did not appear on the CIF, SS published list issued at the beginning of the year. Schools planning events are reminded that SS sanctioned event forms must be submitted three months prior to the event. It is suggested that forms be submitted before the end of the previous school year in order that the events may all be published for the September-issued list.

BASEBALL
