## Releaguing For 73-74 Affects Southbay Private Schools

Very few changes, except in the South Bay area and among private and parochial schools, were evident in the 1973-74 league alignment approved recently by the CIF, SS, Council.

Hart (Newhall) and Canyon (Saugus) move from the Marmonte League to the Foothill League, reestablishing the latter as an eight-team league and

relegating the Marmonte to a six-team loop.

A new school, Inland Christian (San Bernardino), will be added to the Pinon League, and Palm Springs and Norte Vista will switch places, with PS going to the Ivy and NV going to the San Andreas.

In the Bay area, the Sky League ends a 10-year existence. Aviation, Beverly Hills, Morningside and Redondo move to the Ocean League and Leuzinger and Miraleste move to the Pioneer. To make room for the Sky Leaguers, the Ocean loses Palos Verdes and Rolling Hills to the Bay League, making that loop an eight-teamer once again. Three new Orange County schools, Esperanza (Placentia), Canyon (Orange) and Cypress will free lance next year.

Losing St. Monica and Murphy to the new Catholic alignments, the Pioneer gains long-time Olympic League team Harvard.

A new Parochial League will be created, made up of eight teams from four different leagues. All other private and parochial leagues are in for changes, except the Angelus.

A new school, American Christian of Pomona has applied for Academy League membership.

## CENTINELA VALLEY INDOOR MEET SLATED FOR JAN. 20

For the second year, Hawthorne High School and the Centinela Valley District is sponsoring an indoor track meet for Southland preps. The Centinela Valley Invitational is part of the Sunkist meet and will be held Jan. 20 at the Los Angeles Sports Arena.

Bill Gill, track coach at Hawthorne High and coordinator of the meet says well over 100 athletes will appear in the high school events, interspersed with world class open and college events starting at 5:45 p.m.

Most of the Section's top performers have been invited and coaches are reminded that they may work with individuals who are entered in this meet from Jan. 2 through the meet. Only an athlete entered may work out under his high school coach, who may also coach his athletes at the meet.

The meet does not count as one of the allowable outdoor season meets, school uniforms may be used, and boys may compete using their schools' names.

## TEMPLE CITY ROLLS TO NEW WIN STREAK RECORD

At this printing, Temple City High School has captured 38 straight varsity football games over the past four seasons. There are many who feel the Rams, virtual owners of the AA division in 1970, 71 and this season, can go on to capture a third straight title.

If they do, they'll also break the known California state record for win streaks. Willow Glen of San Jose is the holder of the current reported state record of 42 straight wins.

This streak was run up from 1958 through 1963. Coach was Bob Berry, Sr. and his son Bob, Jr. was the quarterback. Young Berry went on to Oregon, and now is the quarterback for the Atlanta Falcons of the NFL.

If Temple City were to capture the AA title for 1972, without losing along the way, it would be the 43rd in a row for the Rams.

Coach Bob Hitchcock in his 13th year as headman at TC credits community support and a "professional" coaching staff for the school's football success.

"Here in Temple City, the people are strivers," Hitch says.

This year's team is small by comparison with other Ram squads, and is mostly oriented to a ground attack. Hitchcock, who coached the South Shrine team to a smashing victory over the North last summer, feels platooning is important too. "We've played a lot of games in which we've been a lot fresher in the fourth quarter than the other guys."

TC broke Loyola's old Southern Section record in its second league game. Observers point to Loyola's mark and note that it was made against major division schools. Temple City schedules AAAA and AAA schools in pre-season and beats them. The last loss was 10-6 to South Pasadena in 1969, the year the Tigers won the CIF

## MINUTES OF MEETING OF THE CIF, SS, EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE October 28, 1972

The October meeting of the CIF, Southern Section, Executive Committee was called to order by Chairman Steve Miletich at 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, October 28, 1972, at Ben Brown's Motor Hotel in South Laguna Beach, California.

The following members were in attendance: Chairman Miletich, Vice Principal, Beverly Hills High School; Alex Alexander, Principal, Desert Sands High School; Tony Balsamo, Principal, Apple Valley High School; Ferren Christensen, Principal, Westminster High School; Richard Cordano, Principal, Arcadia High School; James Faul, Principal, Workman High School; Ted Gossard, Principal, Aviation High School; Lowell Jackson, Superintendent, Centinela Valley High School District; Keith Lee, Principal, Yucca Valley High School; Rev. Alexander Manville, Principal, Bishop Diego High School; Hanford Rants, Principal, Gahr High School; J. Kenneth Fagans, Commissioner of Athletics, and Thomas Morgan, Administrative Assistant, CIF, Southern Section, Office.

1. **APPROVAL OF MINUTES.** It was moved, seconded, and passed to approve the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of September 23, 1972, as published in the October, 1972, Monthly Bulletin, with the following correction: Item 4 (Eligibility Committee Report)—The name of Robert Wilson of Workman High School was erroneously listed with those requests which were recommended for denial by the Eligibility Committee, and should have properly been listed as one of the requests in which the committee recommended waiver of the Transfer Rule in order to permit the boy to be immediately eligible to participate in interscholastic athletics.

### 2. APPLICATIONS FOR MEMBERSHIP.

a) It was moved, seconded, and passed to approve the applications for Regular membership in the CIF, SS, for the following schools, effective immediately:

b) It was moved, seconded, and passed to approve the applications for Associate membership in the CIF, SS, for the following two Clark County District high schools in Las Vegas, Nevada, effective immediately:

### 3. EVALUATION OF SCHEDULES FOR CIF, SS, PLAYOFFS.

The following schedules were evaluated by the Executive Committee for consideration for free lance entry into CIF, SS, post-season championship playoff competition in each respective sport:

a) Rambam Torah Institute, 1972-73 basketball schedule—It was moved, seconded, and passed that the basketball team must win at least 10 of 14 designated games in order to qualify for entry into the "A" playoffs.

b) Los Angeles Baptist High School, 1973 baseball schedule—It was moved, seconded, and passed that the baseball team must win at least eight of 12 designated games in order to qualify for entry into the "A" playoffs.

4. **EARLY FOOTBALL PRACTICE, HI-LO LEAGUE.** The Commissioner presented a request from the Hi-Lo League for permission to begin football practice for the 1973 season one week earlier than the normal starting date for Southern Section schools. It was explained that this request was being made once again because of the fact that the league schools play eight-man football, and must coordinate their schedules with schools from neighboring Nevada leagues for non-league games due to the lack of available opponents in their geographical area. In addition, weather becomes a factor for these schools if their football schedules must extend into the snow season. The Executive Committee moved, seconded, and passed to grant permission for the Hi-Lo League to begin its pre-practice conditioning program on Monday, August 20, 1973, and official organized football practice on Monday, August 27, 1973.

5. **STARTING TIMES, SANCTIONED GOLF TOURNAMENTS.** Special permission was requested from the Executive Committee to begin the following CIF, SS, sanctioned golf tournaments at earlier than the required 3:00 p.m. starting time for events scheduled on school days:

a) Huntington Beach Union High School District Junior Varsity Golf Tournament (sponsored by Edison High School), May 7 and 14, 1973, starting time: 1:00 p.m.

b) Huntington Beach Union High School District Varsity Golf Tournament (sponsored by Edison High School), May 15-18, 1973, starting time: 1:00 p.m.

In accordance with established policy for such sanctioned golf activities, it was moved, seconded, and passed to approve these requests in order to

allow conformance with schedules prescribed by the host golf courses and play prior to darkness each day.

6. **HAWAII SWIMMING AND WATER POLO FORUM.** Permission was requested from the Executive Committee for selected swimming and water polo participants from CIF, SS, member schools to attend a clinic and forum sponsored by the Kalos Kagathos Foundation and the United States Navy to be held at Barber's Point in Honolulu, Hawaii, from December 18-31, 1972. In accordance with established policy governing instructional programs such as this, it was moved, seconded, and passed to approve participation by student-athletes from the CIF, SS, in activities under the jurisdiction of the clinic without jeopardizing their remaining eligibility for interscholastic athletics. The Commissioner indicated that sanction would also be requested from the National Federation for this year's clinic in order to be able to include interested high school representatives from other areas of the nation.

### 7. ELIGIBILITY CASES.

a) After careful consideration of each request, it was moved, seconded, and passed to waive the Residence Rule in order to permit the following students to be immediately eligible to participate in interscholastic athletics:

b) It was moved, seconded, and passed to DENY requests to waive the Residence Rule for the following students:

(Santa Maria High School was reminded that in the case of Larry Debro a CIF, SS, Form 99 may be processed in order to allow him to

be eligible to participate in interscholastic athletics at other than the varsity level.)

8. **FOOTBALL PLAYOFF REGULATIONS.** As the result of action directed by the Executive Committee at its meeting of September 23, 1972, the Commissioner presented the following recommendations for CIF, SS, football playoff regulations, to become effective for the upcoming 1972 playoffs:

a) **Officials' Fees**—In accordance with proposals recently submitted to the Council for general increases in officials' fees in CIF, SS, dual and triangular competition and all tournaments and sanctioned events, it was recommended that a corresponding adjustment should be made in the fees to be paid to football officials assigned to work playoff games. The committee then moved, seconded, and passed to approve a revised officials' fee schedule, as listed below, for CIF, SS, football playoffs:

#### AAAA and AAA Divisions

Championship game—Each member of crew: \$40.00;  
All other games—Referee: \$30.00; Other members of crew: \$28.00.

#### AA and A Divisions

Championship game—Each member of crew: \$30.00;  
All other games—Referee: \$25.00; Other members of crew: \$23.00.

b) **Supervisory Faculty Personnel**—The committee reviewed the recently-established policy which prohibits all persons other than those holding complimentary tickets, CIF, SS, Courtesy Cards, or CIF, SS, press credentials from being admitted free of charge to any football playoff game. It was determined, however, that each participating school would be expected to assign a certain number of supervisory faculty or administrative personnel for crowd control and other related responsibilities who should also be admitted free of charge, and discussion was held concerning the most appropriate methods by which to implement this plan. It was then moved, seconded, and passed to stipulate that the home school submit the total number of its assigned working faculty personnel (to be admitted free of charge) as part of the Game Management Report which is required by the CIF, SS, Office in advance of each scheduled playoff game. This total number requested would then be approved by the Commissioner in accordance with the procedures established for approval of allowable game expenses. The

visiting school would submit its list of working faculty members directly to the home school, with a copy to the CIF, SS, Office for attachment to the appropriate Game Management Report.

c) **Limitation of Squad Members**—The committee continued its discussion of the feasibility of establishing a limitation on the number of players who may be listed on the official team roster of a school and suited up for a football playoff game. Following through consideration of the matter, it was felt that the reported problems were not serious enough to justify an attempt to provide a solution, and that there would therefore be no recommendation made regarding a limitation of players because of the great disparity in squad size between schools and the difficulty in establishing maximum figures which could be applied equally to all schools without restricting opportunities for student-athletes to become involved in CIF, SS, playoff competition.

### 9. NEW FORMAT FOR CIF, SS, COUNCIL MEETINGS.

The Commissioner discussed with the Executive Committee suggestions for a new format for the conduct of CIF, SS, Council meetings in order to allow for these meetings to be scheduled at a location where a catered luncheon could be included as part of the program. Because of the increase in the number of agenda items and the added length of time required for transacting necessary business, recent Council meetings have not adjourned until as late as 1:30 or 2:00 p.m.—without a break for lunch. This has caused Council members who have scheduled other commitments, under the impression that the meetings would end at an earlier hour, to have to leave prior to the conclusion of all business, and has generally created an atmosphere which is not conducive to thorough consideration of agenda items near the close of the meetings. It was felt that, because of the importance of Council matters, an attempt should be made to plan in advance for the meetings to continue until at least early afternoon. With this point in mind, and following a review of available locations, the Commissioner was directed to schedule the next meeting of the Council on Saturday, January 20, 1973, at the Rodger Young Auditorium in Los Angeles. It was determined that this would be a convenient location with easy freeway access on a Saturday, free parking would be available, and the meeting could be scheduled in a private room where a catered lunch would be served to the Council members. In addition to this proposed

new meeting format, the Executive Committee further suggested that the Council agenda be arranged in such a manner that very important items would be placed first if at all possible according to the meeting procedures and, as a matter to be discussed as a possibility for future years, that consideration be given to scheduling the Council meetings on school days rather than Saturdays in order to incorporate the attendance and participation of CIF, SS, league representatives as part of approved business during regular school time.

**10. GIRLS' ATHLETICS.** Alex Alexander, Chairman, Girls' Interscholastic Athletics Advisory Board, presented a progress report to the Executive Committee concerning the formation of the Girls' Interscholastic Division of the CIF, SS. He indicated that, in accordance with the recommendations contained in his previous report of September 23, 1972, all superintendents and principals will be contacted in the near future to determine whether or not they would continue to endorse a CIF, SS-sponsored girls' interscholastic program. Mr. Alexander also advised the committee that additional study of this matter had produced questions relating to the administration and financing of a girls' program under the present organization of the CIF, SS, Office. It is planned that these particular questions will be referred to the Administrative Committee for further consideration and any appropriate recommendations for the development of the administrative and financial support necessary for girls' athletics.

**11. CROWD CONTROL ORIENTATION FOR COACHES.** In accordance with the recent endorsement received from the Council for continuance of the crowd control orientation program for all CIF, SS, coaches involved in spectator sports, the Commissioner presented information concerning the proposed dates and locations of the meetings which have been scheduled for basketball coaches. The main purpose of the meetings will be, as previously done in the sports of football and water polo, to make the coaches aware of the increasing concern over crowd control problems at athletic events and to inform them of their responsibilities with respect to conduct and sportsmanship. By action of the Council, attendance at one of these meetings will be mandatory for all basketball coaches at all levels (i.e., varsity, JV, frosh-soph, etc.) at each member school. The basketball meetings have been scheduled at eight locations on five different dates. For the

sports of soccer and wrestling, where the experience of crowd control problems has not been as severe as in basketball, it was recommended that this orientation be accomplished by preparing a bulletin for distribution by mail to the affected coaches, rather than to schedule meetings. The bulletins would contain guidelines, procedures, and other explanatory crowd control items which would be applicable to each particular sport. Following discussion, the Executive Committee commended the program as a positive means of preventing crowd control problems, and moved, seconded, and passed to approve the proposed plans for basketball, soccer, and wrestling. The Commissioner emphasized that this program would also include contact with the various officials' associations for the purpose of making these organizations aware of the recommended procedures and standards of conduct expected of both coaches and officials.

**12. WATER POLO VIOLATION.** The Commissioner brought to the attention of the Executive Committee a violation of CIF, SS, water polo regulations which had occurred recently at a member school. He reported that the principal had initiated independent action to investigate the matter and to properly discipline those persons who were found to be in violation of the rules, then had notified the CIF, SS, Office of all necessary information and proceedings. In this particular case, the alleged violation involved illegal water polo practices at the close of the swimming season, and the principal's investigation had substantiated the charge. The following disciplinary action was taken by the principal: 1) An official letter of reprimand was sent to the coach, with a copy placed in his personnel file; 2) Notification was made to the league that all league games involving affected players and/or coaches would be forfeited during the current water polo season; and 3) Rules regulating the use of the pool facilities had been written so that boys would not have the use of those facilities at the conclusion of swimming season this year. Although this report was intended as an informational agenda item for the Executive Committee, appreciation was expressed by the committee for the excellent and efficient manner in which the principal had investigated the violation and taken appropriate disciplinary measures. It was moved, seconded, and passed to commend this cooperation and responsible action in enforcing the rules of the CIF, SS, and to have this case become a matter of record in order to be able to make all principals

aware of the proper manner in which such violations should be handled.

**13. APPEAL, AGGELER HIGH SCHOOL.** Mr. Robert Shiner, Principal, Aggeler High School, appeared before the Executive Committee to appeal the recent decision of the committee which had denied his school membership in the CIF, SS. The decision had been based on the fact that since Aggeler High School was under the jurisdiction of the Los Angeles Unified School District, the school should rightfully apply to the Los Angeles City CIF Section for competition opportunities because membership in this section is limited exclusively to schools from within that district. The committee reviewed with Mr. Shiner details pertaining to the organization and operation of his school and its relationship with Rancho San Antonio, an affiliated residence center for boys which prior to the 1972-73 school year held regular membership in the CIF, SS, and the Delphic League. Following discussion the committee expressed appreciation to Mr. Shiner for his appearance and the information he presented, and adjourned to executive session. It was concluded that, in addition to the basic fact that Aggeler High School was part of the Los Angeles District, it would not be possible for the school to adhere to CIF, SS, eligibility regulations for interscholastic athletics because of its status as an "opportunity school" and the general transient state of the members of the student body. The Executive Committee then moved, seconded, and passed to deny the appeal for membership, and to suggest that Aggeler High School contact the Los Angeles City CIF Section to request basketball and baseball competition in one of its established leagues at the junior varsity or sophomore level. The committee added that it would be pleased to reconsider this membership application at any such future date when full assurance could be given that Aggeler High School would be able to comply with all CIF, SS, eligibility regulations.

**14. LEGALITY OF CIF, SS, CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS.** In view of the recent legal involvements of the CIF, SS, and challenges by member schools and other organizations against the Constitution, by-laws, and established administrative procedures, Chairman Miletich suggested to the Executive Committee that consideration be given to the appointment of a special committee to review the legality of these items. It would be proposed that this committee, in consultation with legal advisors, would prepare recommendations for changes, additions, or deletions in the Constitution

and by-laws in order to attempt to make them legally sound prior to their publication again for the 1973-74 school year. Members of the Executive Committee and the CIF, SS, office staff were requested to offer their recommendations and/or comments for revisions, and it was concluded that the matter should remain an open agenda item at the present time to assure the most thorough and effective results possible.

### 15. REQUEST FOR REINSTATEMENT OF AMATEUR STANDING, PACIFICA HIGH SCHOOL.

A written request was directed to the Executive Committee by Mr. Al Buenafe, Principal, Pacifica High School, appealing for reinstatement of the amateur standing of Jim Hammond, currently a senior student at Pacifica. This boy had participated in an adult industrial bowling league where money prizes were awarded, thus violating Article XVII (Amateur Rule), Section 1(G) of the CIF, SS, Blue Book. The penalty for such participation in athletic competition where cash prizes or gift certificates are awarded to members of any team is the loss of all future eligibility for interscholastic athletics. The appeal for reinstatement was based on the fact that the bowling establishment at which this particular league was conducted was not in compliance with the regulations of the Bowling Proprietors' Association, and thus the boy was an inadvertent victim of this oversight. The Proprietors' Association requires that bowling alleys conspicuously post bulletins explaining the amateur rules, and further stipulates that a release form signed by the parents must be completed before a high school athlete can be allowed to compete in an adult bowling league where cash prizes are involved. Information presented in this case substantiated the claim that the bowling establishment did not fulfill any of the above responsibilities, and because of these extenuating circumstances, the committee moved, seconded, and passed to declare that the amateur standing of Jim Hammond be restored effective as of December 1, 1972. This would mean that after the prescribed date he would be permitted to again participate on any athletic team at Pacifica High School, provided he was eligible under all other rules of the CIF, SS.

**16. APPEAL, LA PUENTE HIGH SCHOOL.** Representatives of La Puente High School appeared before the Executive Committee for the purpose of appealing the recent decision by the committee and the subsequent affirmation by the Council of penal-

ties imposed for violations of CIF, SS, regulations governing football activities (Reference: Item 13, Executive Committee minutes of September 23, 1972; Item 14(a), Council minutes of September 30, 1972). Those persons present for the appeal included Mr. Ted Hornstra, principal, Mr. Michael Quinn, head football coach and athletic director, and Mr. Stan Sanders, an attorney representing the school. Also in attendance to submit information concerning this matter were Mr. William Dunn, former basketball coach and presently a physical education instructor at La Puente High School, and Mr. Jacobson, an attorney representing Mr. Dunn. The chairman reviewed each of the charges involved in the case and offered all parties an opportunity to respond; following the presentations, the committee members spent considerable time asking questions and discussing the charges and applicable facts and information with the respondents. The committee then expressed appreciation to all persons present for their attendance and complete cooperation, and adjourned to executive session. After additional deliberation, and a review of the information which had been previously introduced at the Executive Committee meeting of September 23 and the Council meeting of September 30, it was moved, seconded, and passed to direct the Commissioner to inform La Puente High School that the committee had heard the appeal but found insufficient reason to recommend that this matter be referred back to the Council for any further consideration. The original penalties imposed would therefore remain in effect. The above vote was unanimous with the exception of Mr. James Faul, who abstained from voting on this issue.

There being no further business to come before the committee, the meeting was adjourned at 4:45 p.m.

Presently, Hitchcock's "family" seems to consist of the community of Temple City, many of whom can't remember what it is like to lose.
