MEDIA COVERAGE IMPORTANT

The growth of the girls' sports program has been phenomenal. We are now entering the third formal year of playoff competition under CIF-SS regulations. We have added many programs to assist this growth, including officials assignment services, playoff divisions, working coaches committees and extended communications services.

In spite of all our added sophistication, girls' sports still lack a vital ingredient—PRESS COVERAGE. Girls, coaches, interested parents and friends are unable to pick up a newspaper and read the results of recent girls' contests. This situation will not resolve itself.

As a beginning, your Southern Section Office has committed administrative and secretarial time for the purpose of updating the press on your league standings. Press Releases will be sent to over 170 newspapers reporting up-to-date league and season standings for each major girls' sports season.

How does the Southern Section Office acquire the necessary information to update the media? We ask each league's Girls' Coordinator to be responsible for phoning league and season standings to our office. Each Coordinator is held accountable to our office for this task. Coaches can help by being as efficient as possible in responding to the requests of your Girls' League Coordinator or person designated by your league as a central recording secretary for league and season standings. By reporting your school's standings to the proper person, you can only help yourselves, your athletes and your program.

MINUTES OF THE CIF-SS COUNCIL MEETING SEPTEMBER 30, 1976

The September Council meeting of the Southern Section of the California Interscholastic Federation was called to order by Chairman Lou Joseph at 9 a.m., Thursday, September 30, 1976 at the Saddleback Inn, Norwalk. All leagues were represented, with the exception of the De Anza and Delphic.

- 1. APPROVAL OF MINUTES: It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the minutes of the Council meeting of May 6, 1976 as published in the June-July issue of the "Monthly Bulletin;" the Executive Committee meeting of June 21, 1976 as published in the June-July issue of the "Monthly Bulletin:" the Executive Committee tee meeting of September 18, 1976 as submitted to the Council.
- 2. **COMBINED SEASONS COM- MITTEE:** Mr. Steve Miletich, chairman of the Combined Seasons Committee, apprised the Council of the background information and correspondence received on the proposal to combine the seasons of sports for Boys and Girls, scheduled to come before the Council for a vote at the January 20, 1977 meeting.
- 3. ATHLETIC INJURIES COM-MITTEE: Mr. Ferren Christensen, chairman of the Athletic Injuries Committee, apprised the Council of the upcoming Athletic Injuries Symposium on October 14, 1976 at U.S.C. and the recommended need for a Safety Review and Awareness Committee on the campus of each member school.
- 4. SOUTH COAST LEAGUE PRO-POSALS: Mr. Bob Packer, representative for the South Coast League reviewed three volleyball proposals to be submitted for a vote at the January 20, 1977 meeting of the Council recommending the number of allowable contests in Girls' volleyball be increased from 18 to 22; recommending the matches be the best 3-out-of-5 for Girls' competition; and recommending the Boys' playoff division be increased from 16 to 32 teams. Following discussion, it was noted the initial two proposals would call for a vote at the January 20, 1977 Council meeting and that the latter proposal increasing the Boys' playoff division would be referred to the Playoff Grouping Committee for further input.
- 5. TREASURER'S REPORT: Dr. Hanford Rants, treasurer, reviewed with the Council the proposal calling for an assessed fee per individual sport as the means of implementing the adopted 1976-77 budget for the CIF-SS. Following discussion, it was moved,

seconded and passed to adopt the plan as submitted.

- 6. FROSH-SOPH SWIMMING: It was moved, seconded and passed to adopt the proposal for frosh-soph swimming distances, that by league approval, the 100-yard breaststroke, backstroke, butterfly and the 200-yard individual medley distances could be modified to a distance of 50 yards for the first three events and 100 yards for the individual medley in league competition only.
- 7. **OFFICIALS' FEES:** Mr. Ted Gossard, chairman of the Officials' Fees Committee, presented a proposal on behalf of the Los Angeles City Section, seeking an increase of \$2 in Girls' basketball and a \$2 increase in Boys' volleyball. Following discussion, a motion to approve the proposal was defeated.
- 8. FOOTBALL PROPOSAL: Mr. Dick Salter, representative of the Southern California Football Coaches Association, presented a proposal on behalf of the Pacific League which set the starting and ending dates in football. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and amended to accept the plan on a two year trial basis (1977 and 1978 seasons) as submitted.
- 9. **YEAR-ROUND SCHOOL:** It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the year-round school program of Rim of the World High School as submitted.
- 10. WRESTLING PROPOSAL: Mr. Blinn Tenney, representative of the Desert-Valleys League, presented a proposal to increase the number of wrestling matches from 16 to 18, effective the 1976-77 season. Following discussion, the motion to approve the proposal was defeated.

SUCCESSFUL ORGANIZATION AND IMPLEMENTATION OF A SAFETY REVIEW COMMITTEE

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is a guest editorial as written by Jim O'Hara, Athletic Director of Westminster High School.)

After reading the Athletic Injury Committee Progress Report from the January 15, 1976 Southern Section Council Meeting, we at Westminster High School decided to follow the recommendations contained therein and organize a Safety Review Committee. The committee is comprised of one Assistant Principal, the Boys' and Girls' Athletic Directors, the Boys' and Girls' Physical Education Chairpersons, the school nurse, the Athletic Trainers and four coaches.

We established sub-committees to research and make recommendations in the following areas: a) Evaluation and critique of athletic facilities; b) Equipment evaluation; c) Evaluation of coaching practices; d) Evaluation of athletic codes; e) Evaluation of officiating and supervision; f) Evaluation of home-school communications; and g) Consideration of implementation of: 1) comprehensive physical examinations; 2) a co-educational training room; 3) revision of emergency procedures: 4) Student trainer programs; 5) pre-testing of athletes by a qualified athletic trainer; and 6) in-service courses in care and prevention.

The athletic facility group, along with our Media Advisor, made a tour of the athletic facilities and took some fifty snapshots of safety hazards which were then super-imposed on paper with written detailed information on the hazards as well as the suggested remedial recommendations. Work orders were then submitted to our plant foreman. A complete equipment inventory was done and faulty equipment was subsequently repaired or discarded.

Total staff meetings were held to discuss improvement in the area of coaching practices and the coaches' legal and moral responsibilities to their athletes. A copy of the Huntington Beach Union High School District booklet which was distributed by Dr. Jay Settle, Deputy District Superintendent, entitled Playing Rules and Safety in Interscholastic Sports was distributed and discussed. The booklet has a sport by sport delineation of the CIF and district regulations and policies relative to safe practices in athletics and the use of proper protective equipment.

The Athletic Code from the Boys' and Girls' Athletic Departments were up-dated and combined so that we now have a single Athletic Code for the two departments.

Officiating techniques were discussed and recommendations are being made to those bodies currently responsible for the supervision and assignment of officials. We now have an Assistant Principal or an Athletic Director, and an Athletic Trainer present at our home athletic contests.

Our home-school communications system was revamped and our school nurse made up several form letters relative to athletic injuries, physical examinations, insurance, etc.


The areas of comprehensive physical examinations, co-educational training room, and pre-testing of all athletes are still in the planning stages.

We have implemented in varying degrees a student trainer program, a revised emergency procedure, and the scheduling of mandated in-service mini-courses in the first aid, athletic injuries and taping, and cardio-pulmonary resuscitation.

FEMININE NATIONAL FEDERATION RULES

RULE MODIFICATIONS FOR GIRLS' BASKETBALL



For several years, the girls in California have been using the "30-second clock" rather than the back court rule to discourage "freezing" tactics during which there is little or no attempt to

score. The girls basketball coaches feel that the "30-second clock" offers a superior game to one in which the back court rule is used.

This modification does not require extra equipment. The "30-second clock" does not have to be visible, even though this would be ideal. The only equipment needed is a stopwatch at the timer's table. Coaches are asked to properly instruct their timers who are in charge of the "30-second clock" so that the rule is properly enforced.

A detailed list of rule additions and deletions has been sent to the girls basketball coaches. Please review these in order to be totally familiar with the changes.

PUBLICITY IMPORTANT IN PROMOTING PROGRAM

Recently, all volleyball coaches were sent information on how to work with the Media during the season to obtain expanded coverage of girls' prep sports. For many coaches, this is a whole new facet of theirs as head coach. Each coach has to become her own public relations specialist.

FOCUS

This is also true within the school itself. Be sure to make the girls' program well-known within your own

coaching staff and school administration. An easy way to do this is to send out schedules to administration and all school staff members. Likewise, have schedules mailed to the parents. Maybe a few more loyal fans will show up to support your teams.

Follow this up by posting or announcing the results of every game. Keep up-to-date statistics in order to spotlight the outstanding players.

ARE ALL YOUR ATHLETES ELIGIBLE?

Nothing is more important in the interscholastic athletic program than the assurance that all competitors are eligible under the rules of the CIF. Principals, coaches and athletic directors should become familiar with the eligibility provisions in the Blue Book. If there is any question about an athlete's eligibility, it should be checked with the CIF-SS Office at once. School officials are urged to review Eligibility Rules under Section VII of the CIF Southern Section Blue Book. All CIF-SS eligibility rules apply in all games including practice, interscholastic, scrimmage, league, tournament and playoff games.

BADMINTON SURVEY RESULTS


At the close of last year's badminton season, the members of the Orange League prompted the CIF-SS to find out if the more expensive feathered shuttlecocks were still preferred by the competing schools and if indeed they were difficult to purchase due to an apparent shortage.

The coaches responded that they preferred the feathered shuttlecock over a high quality plastic shuttlecock

by a margin of 58 to 28. Likewise, it was found that the schools did not have difficulty in purchasing the feathered shuttlecock as was thought to be the case.

The Girls' Badminton Committee followed up with another survey to find out the coaches' opinions on the three singles — two doubles format for CIF-SS team competition. Of the 36 schools which responded, 28 were in favor of the existing format.

EQUIPMENT AND FACILITY CHANGES NOTED

Following are recent changes in playing rules that affect facilities and/or equipment. School administrators and athletic directors are urged to take note of all recent changes.

BASEBALL:

- 1. The pitcher is prohibited from wearing any item on hands, arms or wrists which may be distracting. (Rule
- 2. Coaches, players and bench personnel are prohibited from using amplifiers or blow horns on the bench or the field during the game. (1-1-5)
- 3. The handle end of the bat must have a knob. It is recommended that aluminum and magnesium bats have a handle and knob securely fastened to the bat; and beginning in 1978, it will be mandatory for all metal bats to have a securely fastened handle knob. (1-3-5)

GIRLS GYMNASTICS:

- 1. Following each set of specifications for equipment, in the rule book, there is a note cautioning schools against purchasing equipment which does not meet specifications. A deduction of 0.5 points shall be made for use of unauthorized equipment.
- 2. The uneven parallel bars shall be constructed of multi-laminated, unvarnished wood or other material which received the approval of the Girls Gymnastics Rules Committee. (3-1-1)
- 3. Mats placed under the vaulting board shall not exceed two inches in thickness. (3-1-4)
- 4. The balance beam shall be constructed of solid or laminated wood

METRIC DISTANCES ON THE HORIZON

TRACK & FIELD CHANGES FOR 76-77

It looks as if metric distances will be with us sooner than we expected. Beginning with the 1980 season, National Federation rules will shift to the metric system. Administrators involved in developing new facilities, or refurbishing present track facilities, are encouraged to make accommodations for metric races.

To more efficiently conduct a meet, the new rules suggest schools add a Finish Line Recorder to the list of meet officials.

There will be ten rule changes noted with the highlights as follows:

- 1. Specifies that the race course for distances run around a curve on a 400 metre track shall be measured 30 cm outward from the inner edge of the track (in lane one) when a raised curb or any lane line is used. (1-2-1 and is used and 20 cm when a painted line
- 2. Clarifies each lane shall be marked so that the left hand boundary line is outside the runners lane, and the right hand boundary line is within the lane.
- 3. Authorizes a finish tape of soft breakable material not wider than 2 inches. (2-2-2 and 7-2-7)
- 4. Removes "throwing the baton" from an individual unsportsmanlike act to a team disqualification penalty. (2-3-8 and 9-3-9)
- 5. If the course is round or oval, wind velocity is not considered when the distance of the event involves one or more complete laps (circuits) or if around one curve, equal portions of the race are run on both straightaways (as in the 330 yard intermediate hurdles). (3-3-5)
- 6. A "Finish Line Recorder" has been added to the suggested list of meet officials. (4-1-1)
- 7. Referee will note and call aloud, for the benefit of each runner, the laps remaining in individual races or relay lengths of three laps or more. (4-2-3)

SWIMMING MODIFICATION

By league adoption frosh-soph swimming distances may be modified for league competition as follows: The frosh-soph 100 yard breaststroke, backstroke, butterfly and the 200 yard Individual Medley distances could be modified to a distance of 50 yards for the first three events and 100 yards for the Individual Medley.

8. Measurements in the field events shall be to the nearest lesser 1/4 inch of centimeter, except in the case of the discus, javelin or hammer throws, distances shall be recorded to the nearest lesser inch or even centimeter. (4-8-5)

- 9. A competitor who competes with an illegal uniform shall be disqualified from that event. (5-3-2)
- 10. Authorizes the clerk, with the approval of the referee, to reduce the number of heats if the number of contestants to appear is not more than the number of available lanes. (9-2-2)

FALL PRACTICE: Organized football practice, which includes all equipment, may begin Tuesday, August 30. NO practice or instructions of any type may be conducted on a Sunday. Practice IS permissible on Labor Day,

SCRIMMAGE DATE: The first allowable date for an interscholastic scrimmage is Saturday, September 10. Note, a PLAYER must complete 10 DAYS of practice (not including the conditioning period) before taking part in an interscholastic scrimmage or contest. Thus, a team would have to practice on Labor Day in order to schedule a scrimmage on Saturday, September

FIRST GAME: The initial date on which a school may schedule an interscholastic contest is Friday, September 16. Note: **TEAMS** must have 14 days of practice (not including the conditioning period) before scheduling an interscholastic contest. Thus, a game would NOT be permissible on Thursday, September 15.

LAST CONTEST: The last allowable date for an interscholastic contest, league or non-league, is Saturday,

WHAT'S HAPPENIN' IN THE OTHER 49 STATES

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is another in a series of monthly articles covering items of interest from throughout California and other State Associations in their administration of high school athletics.)

ITEM: Principals express concerns . . .

COMMENT: The Massachusetts Secondary School Principals Association is **opposing** several bills before the Massachusetts State Legislature, including a bill that would provide that no student could be prohibited from school athletics because of non-school competition; a bill to require football coaches to be certified; another bill requiring all football helmets to have a NOCSAE stamp of approval. Among the legislation being **favored** by the MSSPA is a bill to prohibit girls participation on the same team with boys in contact sports and a bill requiring ice hockey players to wear protective helmets.

ITEM: Legal ruling in Illinois . . .

COMMENT: Teachers can be assigned non-teaching duties, according to an Illinois court. In DISTRICT 300 EDUCATION ASSOCIATION VS BOARD OF EDUCATION, the court said, "such duties were proper adjunct to classroom instruction and were not demeaning or unnecessarily burdensome" and ordered the teachers to perform them. Teachers in the district were being assigned crowd control at public events and to activity advisorships, some requiring work on Saturdays and all of it at a pay scale substantially lower than the regular rate of pay for teaching duties.

ITEM: Eligibility rules differ from state to state . .

COMMENT: There is some justifiable criticism of the differences between high school association eligibility rules in various states. This is caused, of course, by the fact that the schools of one state determine one set of eligibility rules are necessary while the schools of another state determine that another set of eligibility rules are necessary to administer their program. Some of the differences are justified because of regionalized problems. Others may not be justified and thus bring criticism. However, it is interesting to note that while all state departments of education require a minimum number of credits for graduation, the number varies from 160 to 230. Some states mandate up to 13 specific courses for a high school diploma, while others require none. In other words, state departments of education have established graduation requirements which are at least as variable as the eligibility requirements of state high school associations. Each, however, reflects what the schools themselves feel is necessary.

ITEM: Separate programs in Colorado . . .

COMMENT: The Colorado High School Activities Association Board of Control went on record supporting seperate programs for the sexes. The Board of Control adopted a resolution, submitted by the CHSAA Executive Committee and presented by Jefferson County representative Alice Barron, which reflected dissatisfaction with certain sections of the Colorado Equal Rights Amendments as it pertains to interscholastic athletics. The resolution reaffirmed the Board's belief in seperate programs for boys and girls in contact sports and where comparable programs exist.

ITEM: Interpretation meetings required in Indiana . . .

COMMENT: The Indiana High School Athletic Association will conduct 121 rule interpretation meetings during the 1976-77 school year. The Association will sponsor 24 clinics for boys and girls basketball, 24 for football, 23 for baseball, 14 for wrestling, 11 for boys and girls track and field, 10 for volleyball and 6 each for girls gymnastics and boys and girls swimming and diving. Head coaches of these sports are required to attend one rule interpretation meeting for the appropriate sport. If there is no representative from a school, the principal of that school will be notified of the fact by the Association. If the school is not represented at a second meeting, the principal will be requested to appear before the IHAA Commissioner. In the event of a third absence, the principal will be required to appear before the Executive Committee, which may issue a warning, probation or suspension of the membership of the school involved.

- 5. Padded balance beams which otherwise meet specifications are legal.
- 6. The height of the horse shall be 47½ inches or 120 centimeters. (5-1-1)
- 7. A running strip for vaulting is required. It shall be no more than one inch thick and a minimum of 60 feet long with a smooth, non-slip surface. (5-1-6)

TRACK & FIELD:

- 1. Beginning in 1978, the stopboard for the pole vault shall be placed at 105 degree angle from the base. (1-7-3)
- 2. The circumference of the relay baton shall be a minimum of 4 inches and a maximum of 5 inches. (1-10-5)
