No school to enter more than two men in any event unless more than that number have won places in the League Meet.

2. Heats in all races where heats are necessary be run on Wednesday preceding the Meet.

5. Moved, seconded and carried that Baseball report be accepted and filed.

Secretary then reported that he wished to submit Dr. Stolz plan for weight teams.

6. It was moved, seconded and carried that the matter of weight teams be laid over to our next meeting and H. J. Moore and G. M. Green be appointed a committee to determine proper and workable exponents.

7. It was agreed that this matter of weight teams have no effect on the football teams for this year.

8. It was agreed that the following letter be printed in the minutes in full.

C O P Y

My attention has been called to the fact that the baseball game with Cleveland Tech is being advertised as a High School game.

Permit me to advise that the High School is not playing Cleveland Tech; that we are in no way connected with this game and that no student enrolled as such in the High School will, with permission of the High School, take part in this game.

Mr. Barry then reported that the Bay League recommended that a "Letter" man, moving from one school to another, be not allowed to play on the new school team unless he has resided in that School district at least one year except when his parents move with him.

9. It was moved that this question be referred to the several Leagues.

10. It was moved, seconded, and carried that the expense for telegrams \$20.60 in connection with the Franklyn-Hanford Baseball game be paid.

A. Boy played on another team other than his school team and was debarred for rest of season. What is his status this semester? Eligible.

B. Secretary had ruled that where a boy has attended one school and a Board of Supervisors annexes his district to a second High School, the boy may stay in the first school but if he moves to the second school, he is eligible at once in the second school.

11. Moved, seconded, and carried that the Secretary's ruling is correct.

12. It was moved, seconded, and carried that the Secretary call attention of all schools to the importance of the eligibility rules. Read pages 6, 7, 8, and 9.

C. Boy is admitted to High School by Principal and County Superintendent who has not graduated from Grammar School. Boy is eligible.

D. Boy is attending "A" School; moves to "B" School. Parents live in neither town but are moving from place to place with headquarters at "C". Is boy eligible? Must be in school one semester.

E. Boy moves from New York to Southern California but parents do not change residence, only here for winter. Boy meets all other requirements. Boy may play.

13. It was moved, seconded, and carried that we invite Coach Pipal of Occidental to attend our next meeting.

14. Moved, seconded, and carried that we adjourn.

C. I. F. RULINGS FROM THE MINUTES

March 16, 1921

Man not allowed on two weight teams in same week.

An institutional team (college or prep combined) may play out of league season.

May 21, 1921

President authorized to appoint a representative at any time to attend any game or meet, and to report conduct of any individual or team at the expense of C. I. F.-S. S.

June 13, 1921

Hereafter five places in S. C. track meet.

October 15, 1921

In order to be re-instated a suspended school must abide by the rules of the C. I. F.-S. C. during suspension.

Schools playing games with schools outside of the C. I. F. must file eligibility list with the Secretary.

October 29, 1921

Pupils in Grammar Schools annexed by supervisors to High School "A" who were attending High School "B" may stay in "B" and be eligible but would also be eligible if they entered "A".

If pupil is marked "4" by teacher, the teacher must make it clear that the grade was "passing" but withheld for change to higher rating.

November 12, 1921

One semester does not end until the next semester begins.

Request to play with schools outside of California must be made in writing by the Principal of a school and consent granted only by a majority vote of the whole Council in meeting assembled.

Sports conducted so that part of schedule is in each semester shall count as one season of that sport.

League cannot make rule contrary to rules of the C. I. F. but may make rule more drastic.

Boy ineligible first day of semester is ineligible whole semester. Some Principals, coaches and pupils seem to think that ten weeks attendance removes ineligibility.

December 10, 1921

Man may play on unlimited and 130 lb. teams in semi-finals provided he is not played on both teams the same week.

Referee is acting within his rights when he reverses his decision regarding an explicit rule of the game and if the score is affected the score may be declared changed.

League must inform Manager that the league intends to enter the semi-finals before the schedule is drawn up. No school will be allowed to enter after the schedule starts.

January 21, 1922

Basketball game must run full time, unless shortened by mutual agreement before game starts, to be called a game.

If the two teams cannot agree basketball manager shall have semi-finals and finals played on a court about 35'x 70' with clear space of three feet and overhead clearance of at least 20'.

If one school demands two officials in semi-finals or final games, two must be supplied.

In S. C. Track one boy to enter only three events and relay.

Free-lance schools must win all games in approved schedule of five games in order to enter semi-finals.

No school may charge traveling expenses in excess of the railroad or stage fare except by mutual consent of the two schools.

March 11, 1922

Imperial Valley League granted permission to play Yuma if she lives up to C. I. F. rules.

April 22, 1922

If school coach, coaches from first or third base box, the game is forfeited.

No team shall be allowed in semi-finals or finals weight contests unless it has won approved or league schedule of at least three games.

First round of baseball semi-finals fourth Saturday in May.

One boy be allowed to enter but two of these three events $\frac{1}{4}$, $\frac{1}{2}$ and mile races in one track meet.

Pupils in separate Junior High Schools cannot represent Senior High Schools.

All boys to be weighed in during the first two weeks of school of each semester.

May 5, 1922

State Council

Each section limited to four men in each event in State Track Meet.

There will be no State Championship in Baseball hereafter.

Order of Events in Swimming

50 yard, 220 yard, 100 yard breast fancy diving, 100 yard free, 50 yard back, 440 yard free, plunge, relay.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR CLASSIFICATION OF HIGH SCHOOL BOYS

ACCORDING TO THE "FOUR POINT" RATING TABLE.

1. The weight to be taken without clothing.
2. The height to be taken without shoes.
3. The age to be recorded in years and months.
4. The grade to be recorded as 9, 10, 11, and 12.
5. For the weight, height, age and grade as determined above, find from the table the proper exponents.
6. Add the exponents. (See example immediately below table).
7. When the sum of the exponents is 64 or over, the boy is rated as "Class A" and may not compete on a "Class B", "Class C", or "Class D" team. When the sum of the exponents is 57, 58, 59, 60, 61, 62, or 63, the boy is rated as "Class B" and may not compete on a "Class C" or a "Class D" team. When the sum of the exponents is 50, 51, 52, 53, 54, 55, or 56, the boy is rated as "Class C" and may not compete on a "Class D" team. When the sum of the exponents is less than 50, the boy is rated as "Class D".



Chicago University High School Contest

Rules of Eligibility for Participation

No student is eligible unless he has been in unlapsd attendance at his school from the eleventh school day of this semester.

No student, unless entering a secondary school for the first time, is eligible unless he has credit on the school records for twelve regular periods of work per week, for the past and present semesters or quarters.

No student is eligible (1) who has ever used or is using his knowledge or skill in athletics for gain or (2) who has ever played under an assumed name.

No student is eligible who is twenty-one years of age.

No student is eligible who has previously played on any High School team or already has competed in Interscholastic Meets for four years.

No student is (1) who has graduated from a High School or Academy previous to April 1, of the present year or (2) has been in attendance more than eight semesters.

No student is eligible who has played on a normal school, junior college, college, or university team.

No student who has changed school systems, unless upon change of residence of parents or guardians, shall be eligible until one year has elapsed.

No student is eligible who does not present a certificate of his eligibility from the principal or superintendent of his school.

Whenever a competitor enters from a school of a state where there is a state high-school association, except the high schools of Cook County, Illinois, the competitor must be certified upon the official blank of the state association and be eligible under the rules of this association.

The Director reserves the right to reject the entry of any student or group of students whom he considers ineligible under the spirit of the above rules.

Gentlemen:

In submitting the report of the Annual Southern California Interscholastic Tennis Tournament, your manager wishes first to express his thanks to Mr. Frank Bryant, and other members of the Los Angeles Tennis Club; to Mr. R. E. Munsey of Hollywood High School, and to Mr. W. A. Hall of Chaffey Union High School; these being the men responsible for the success of the tournament.

ENTRANTS. 54 boys and 32 girls entered the singles and 58 boys and 38 girls entered the doubles, making a total entry list of 182. This is, I believe, the largest tournament that Southern California has ever seen. The competition was of high grade.

GIRLS' SINGLES. The girls' matches were held at Chaffey Union High School, under direction of W. A. Hall. 28 matches were played in singles the tournament day, and the final match was played the Wednesday following on the same courts. Miss E. Bielefeldt of Fullerton was the winner, and has been awarded the schedule suitably engraved.

GIRLS' DOUBLES. 18 matches of play decided the girls' doubles, which were finished on the tournament day at Chaffey. Miss Gardner and Finley of Riverside High School for Girls were the winners, and their medals have been sent. 19 teams were entered in Girls' Doubles.

BOYS' SINGLES. The 54 entrants settled the championship in favor of Conrad Bryant of Hollywood, in 53 matches. The last few of these matches were played on the Saturday following the tournament date. Seven courts of the Los Angeles Tennis Club were used, and three courts of the Hollywood Y. M. C. A. The Boys' matches were under the auspices of Hollywood High School, Mr. R. E. Munsey, manager, and the officials were from the Los Angeles Tennis Club, Mr. Frank Bryant in charge.

BOYS' DOUBLES. 28 matches in Boys' Doubles brought the championship to Wachter and Ordway of Los Angeles High School, out of a field of 29 teams. The final matches were played the Saturday following the tournament.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT. The attached financial statement shows a total expense bill of \$122.24 and receipts of \$70.80, the deficit being \$51.44.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR CLASSIFICATION OF HIGH SCHOOL BOYS

ACCORDING TO THE "FOUR POINT" RATING TABLE.

1. The weight to be taken without clothing.
2. The height to be taken without shoes.
3. The age to be recorded in years and months.
4. The grade to be recorded as 9, 10, 11, and 12.
5. For the weight, height, age and grade as determined above, find from the table the proper exponents.
6. Add the exponents. (See example immediately below table).
7. When the sum of the exponents is 64 or over, the boy is rated as "Class A" and may not compete on a "Class B", "Class C", or "Class D" team. When the sum of the exponents is 57, 58, 59, 60, 61, 62, or 63, the boy is rated as "Class B" and may not compete on a "Class C" or a "Class D" team. When the sum of the exponents is 50, 51, 52, 53, 54, 55, or 56, the boy is rated as "Class C" and may not compete on a "Class D" team. When the sum of the exponents is less than 50, the boy is rated as "Class D".

No team shall be allowed in semi-finals or finals weight contests unless it has won approved or league schedule of at least three games.

First round of baseball semi-finals fourth Saturday in May.

One boy be allowed to enter but two of these three events $\frac{1}{4}$, $\frac{1}{2}$ and mile races in one track meet.

Pupils in separate Junior High Schools cannot represent Senior High Schools.

All boys to be weighed in during the first two weeks of school of each semester.

May 5, 1922

State Council

Each section limited to four men in each event in State Track Meet.

There will be no State Championship in Baseball hereafter.

Order of Events in Swimming

50 yard, 220 yard, 100 yard breast fancy diving, 100 yard free, 50 yard back, 440 yard free, plunge, relay.

C. I. F. RULINGS FROM THE MINUTES

March 16, 1921

Man not allowed on two weight teams in same week.

An institutional team (college or prep combined) may play out of league season.

May 21, 1921

Managers paid as follows:

Football	100	and expenses
Baseball	50	" "
Basketball	50	" "
Track	50	" "
Swimming & Polo	50	" "
Tennis	25	" "

President authorized to appoint a representative at any time to attend any game or meet, and to report conduct of any individual or team at the expense of C. I. F.-S. S.

June 13, 1921

Hereafter five places in S. C. track meet.

October 15, 1921

In order to be re-instated a suspended school must abide by the rules of the C. I. F.-S. C. during suspension.

Schools playing games with schools outside of the C. I. F. must file eligibility list with the Secretary.

October 29, 1921

Pupils in Grammar Schools annexed by supervisors to High School "A" who were attending High School "B" may stay in "B" and be eligible but would also be eligible if they entered "A".

If pupil is marked "4" by teacher, the teacher must make it clear that the grade was "passing" but withheld for change to higher rating.

November 12, 1921

One semester does not end until the next semester begins.

Request to play with schools outside of California must be made in writing by the Principal of a school and consent granted only by a majority vote of the whole Council in meeting assembled.

Sports conducted so that part of schedule is in each semester shall count as one season of that sport.

League cannot make rule contrary to rules of the C. I. F. but may make rule more drastic.

Boy ineligible first day of semester is ineligible whole semester. Some Principals, coaches and pupils seem to think that ten weeks attendance removes ineligibility.

December 10, 1921

Man may play on unlimited and 130 lb. teams in semi-finals provided he is not played on both teams the same week.

Referee is acting within his rights when he reverses his decision regarding an explicit rule of the game and if the score is affected the score may be declared changed.

League must inform Manager that the league intends to enter the semi-finals before the schedule is drawn up. No school will be allowed to enter after the schedule starts.

January 21, 1922

Basketball game must run full time, unless shortened by mutual agreement before game starts, to be called a game.

If the two teams cannot agree basketball manager shall have semi-finals and finals played on a court about 35'x 70' with clear space of three feet and overhead clearance of at least 20'.

If one school demands two officials in semi-finals or final games, two must be supplied.

In S. C. Track one boy to enter only three events and relay.

Free-lance schools must win all games in approved schedule of five games in order to enter semi-finals.

No school may charge traveling expenses in excess of the railroad or stage fare except by mutual consent of the two schools.

March 11, 1922

Imperial Valley League granted permission to play Yuma if she lives up to C. I. F. rules.

April 22, 1922

If school coach, coaches from first or third base box, the game is forfeited.
