

MINUTES OF 1924-25 ANNUAL MEETING FIRST MEETING OCTOBER 4, 1924

The Council of the California Inter-Scholastic Federation Southern Section, met in Annual Meeting at the Y. M. C. A., in Los Angeles, at 9 A. M., October 4, 1924.

President Westcott in the chair, called the meeting to order and asked for a roll call.

Minutes of Annual Meeting of May 17, 1924, were approved.

A Protest from Anaheim Union High School against the action of League in reference to the decision of the League Baseball Championship.

1 It was moved by Oliver and seconded by Smith that the protest of Anaheim be not sustained; that the check of Ten Dollars be returned; that the action of the Orange League did not contravene any law or regulation of the C. I. F. S. S., so therefore the League action should stand. Carried.

2 It was moved by Smith and seconded by Berlin that we recommend to the Leagues that each adopt the following rules for determining championships:

- a On percentage of games won
- b Tie games to count 1-2 game game won and 1-2 game lost
- c If a and b result in a tie then one of these schools has defeated the other in the duel meet, that school shall be declared champion.
- d If the above rules do not determine a champion the schools shall remain a tie.

B Last February a boy transferred to us and brought with him an incomplete grade in Science. During the Semester he made up his note book and in June returned to his former teacher and took an examination and received a passing grade. May this grade be considered as one of three necessary to make him eligible to play here this Semester?

RULING—If the boy passed in but two other studies in the second school between February and June, then the boy is ineligible.

C Request came from the Tri-County League that if a town or District has but one Junior High School, the 9th grade boys be allowed to play on the teams of the Senior High School.

ANSWER—It was moved by Smith and seconded by Malcom that the present ruling of the C. I. F. S. S. regarding the playing of boys in Junior High School or Senior High School stand. Carried.

D Capt. Thomas A. Davis of the Army and Navy Academy, San Diego, requested that boys boarding in his school be allowed to play on his teams the first Semester. It being understood that his team would not play League games or enter Semi-finals.

It was moved by Blee and seconded by Collins that the Army and Navy Academy be permitted to play members of the C. I. F. S. S. in all sports, using pupils who are bonafide members of the school. These games are not to count toward a championship in any way. Men competing in track for S. C. must meet all of the regular eligibility requirements. Carried.

E It was stated that the Baseball Manager could not make his report because of the delay of San Diego and it was further stated that San Diego had not paid National City for her part of the gate.

It was moved by Oliver and seconded by Collins that San Diego be suspended until it complies with the requirements of the Baseball Manager for last Semester and until the moneys due Sweetwater Union are paid and that San Diego is not to be admitted to the Football schedule of the Coast League until Mr. Moore receives word that her Baseball obligations have been met. Carried.

F It was moved by Collins and seconded by Oliver that for Classification purposes Basketball shall be considered a First Semester sport.

G Permission was given the schools of Imperial League to play Mesa, Arizona, provided lists are filed with the Secretary of C. I. F. S. S.

H It was moved by Smith and seconded by Malcom that we rescind the action of a former meeting in regard to filing the exponents with League Secretary and require filing any time prior to first League game. Carried.

I It was moved, seconded and carried that the Southern Section inform the State Council that we will not play more than one game per week in the Semi-finals of Football.

J It was moved by Oliver and seconded by Moore that the chair appoint a committee to confer with the Track Manager to get a rating for schools en masse in Track Athletics. Carried
Committee—Seth Van Patten, Thomas Davis, Kinder Hamilton, G. Walter Monroe and R. D. Wadsworth.

K The Council Member of each League must inform the Manager at least one week before the close of the League's schedule and that the League intends to enter the Semi-finals.

L The Chair ruled that the Council Members could not be Athletic Coaches unless they were also Principal or Vice-Principal of the school.

M The attention of school is called to the ruling that the SEASON of a sport starts with the first League scheduled game and ends with the last scheduled game of the League, except for schools in Semi-finals and that for such schools the season did not end until school was eliminated.
