C—HIGH SCHOOL FRATERNITIES

2. It was moved by Oliver and seconded by Barnes that the State Law relating to Fraternities be added to the eligibility rules debaring from athletic competition all boys who may be, are, or have been, members of High School Fraternities.

3. It was moved by Ely, seconded by Hayden that the above motion be amended to read "all boys who are members of High School Fraternities after October 2, 1926."

4. **SUBSTITUTE MOTION**—It was moved by Westcott, seconded by Fisher and LOST, that any boy who is a member of a High School Fraternity after January 1, 1927, shall be ineligible for any further competition in C. I. F., S. S., and this rule shall be referred to the Leagues for action and a written report of action be sent to Secretary Green before January 1, 1927. LOST.

5. **SECOND SUBSTITUTE MOTION**—It was moved by Green, seconded by Ely and CARRIED that any boy who is a member of a High School Fraternity on or after January 1, 1927, shall be ineligible for any further competition in the California Interscholastic Federation, Southern Section. CARRIED.

D—INDIAN BOYS AT COVINA

Mr. Millken asked for the floor and stated that there were two boys at Covina High School who attended Sherman Institute last semester.

First—**BILL ARENAS**—has spent one year in Sherman Institute and is under 21 years, passing in 3 subjects last semester. Wallace Newman has applied for guardianship.—Case set for October 13th.

CHAIR RULED—Boy eligible just as soon as Newman was appointed guardian. See minutes of October 3, 1925, Part 15A.

It was moved by Moore, seconded by Malcom, and carried, that Rule 15, Part A, of October 3, 1925, be interpreted to mean that Guardian means Legal Guardian appointed by the Court.

Second—**JERRY COLE** graduated from Sherman Institute in June (tenth grade). Spent summer with his folks at Klamath Falls, Oregon, and this fall returned to California to finish his High School, and entered Covina High School.

7. It was moved by Malcom and seconded by Barnes and LOST that Jerry Cole be declared eligible. LOST.

R—MR. MILLIKEN ASKED THE QUESTION

Where are the graduates of Sherman Institute eligible? Sherman Institute graduates at end of 10th grade.

8. It was moved by Collins, seconded by Westcott, that pupils transferring from any State or Federal School to a high school are on the same basis as in cases of transfer from one High School to another. Carried. (See Page 10, Rule 26.)

9. It was moved by Barnes, seconded by Green, that all graduates of Sherman Institute be declared to be eligible at Riverside High School the Semester following graduation. Lost.

P—THOMAS DAVIS, PRESIDENT OF THE FOOTBALL OFFICIALS' ASSOCIATION REQUESTS:

That the membership card of that organization admit members not working a game, to any league game.

10. It was moved by Moore, seconded by Fisher, that Official Membership Card of Football Officials' Association admit to all football games in Southern California. CARRIED.

G—HOLTVILLE VS. ESCONDIDO—

Statement of Fact—Holtville boy moved to Escondido with family and two other Holtville boys went with family also. The three boys worked all summer on Escondido High School building. Boys entered Escondido High School. New Coach thought they lived in Escondido and played them in practice game. When true facts became known they were not allowed to play further. When Holtville High School opened, the three boys re-entered that school.

11. Moved by Hayden, seconded by Barnes, that the boys who played in first practice game at Escondido, owing to ex-

tenuating circumstances be now declared eligible at Holtville. Roll Call was demanded.

Result—Imperial and Southern League did not vote.

YES—One—Tri-County.

NO—All Others—15 votes.

12. It was moved by Collins, seconded by Barnes, and LOST, that Escondido High School, be debarred from participating in football during the season of 1927 for playing ineligible men in a practice game with Brea on September 11, 1926. LOST.

H—TIE GAMES—

That in final and semi-finals the method of playing off ties must be used and we recommend use to the leagues. Moved by Moor, seconded by Fisher. CARRIED.

I—BLYTHE AND RIVERSIDE LEAGUE—

It was moved that if Blythe be not scheduled to play three or more games in any sport by Riverside League, that Blythe be allowed to challenge the winner of the league for the right to represent the league in the semi-final in the sport although they have not been allowed to compete for the League Championship. Moved by Collins, seconded by Barnes. CARRIED.

J—CASES OF ELIGIBILITY—

1. Case of George Stepp of San Fernando. Referred to Committee consisting of Moore, Badenoch, and Squires.

2. Case of Arthur Johnson, of Pasadena. Put over until Pasadena answers.

3. Case of Hervey Pember of Anaheim. Must produce birth certificate.

4. Harold Key of Montebello—Ineligible. Change of school without change of residence.

K—MR. FISHER REQUESTS:

That E No. 9 be reconsidered because the Sherman Institute boys had played for Riverside High School for many years.

13. **CHAIR RULED**—That since the Sherman Institute was within the limits of Riverside School District that boys from Sherman were eligible to represent Riverside High School.

14. It was moved by Moore and seconded by Oliver, that the Chair be sustained. CARRIED.
