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MINUTES OF 1927-1928 CALIFORNIA INTERSCHOLASTIC FEDERATION Southern Section

SECOND MEETING

OCTOBER 29, 1927

1. The Council of the California Interscholastic Federation, Southern Section, met in the Y. M. C. A., Los Angeles, at 9:30 A. M., October 29, 1927, in adjourned meeting.

2. President Ely called the meeting to order and requested Mr. Green to act as Secretary.

4. Minutes of First Meeting were approved and reports which were omitted were ordered printed with the minutes of the Second Meeting.

5. Report of Committee to Interview Mr. Green—

Mr. Hayden and Mr. Moore reported that they had requested Mr. Green to come to the meeting and that the Committee had agreed that the work of the Secretary and the Managers had grown to such an extent that it was not right to expect these men to put in the time that was necessary. The average Principal did not realize how the work had grown.

It was the recommendation of the Committee that the time had come when a paid Secretary or Manager should be employed to take over the work of the Secretary and all the Managers. For this to be done ways and means would have to be found to finance the undertaking.

One suggestion was that each of the Los Angeles City schools pay dues.

Another suggestion was that each school in Southern California pay dues according to enrollment.

Another suggestion was that we ask for 30% of all semi-final and final games.

6. Committee to Study Problem and Report—

It was moved by Hayden and seconded by Oliver and carried, that the chair appoint a committee of three, or five, as he deems best, one to come from the City schools, one to represent outside of city leagues, to consider the entire problem of C. I. F.: first, the problem of full time Secretary; second, budget to finance same; and third, any other reorganization which would seem to them expedient. Said committee to report back at the end of the Football season.

8. No "C" or "D" Playoff—

It was moved by Hayden and seconded by Woodruff that the C. I. F., Southern Section, eliminate all playoff games for "C" and "D" sports except Track. Carried.

9. Letter to State Director of Physical Education—

It was moved by Oliver and seconded by Collins that the President write a letter to the State Director of Physical Edu-

cation explaining attitude of the Southern Section of C. I. F., in reference to supervision.

10. State Contests Referred to Leagues—

It was moved by Collins and seconded by Moore that the question of doing away with all State Championships after this year, except Track, be referred to the various Leagues competing in the Semi-finals. Carried.

11. The Secretary, Mr. Green, agreed to act as Secretary until the committee reported.

12. Secretary's Letter of Resignation—

Dear Friends:

I am herewith handing you my resignation as secretary to your honorable body after seven years of service. I wish to commend you for your devotion and loyalty to the youth of our fair southland. I wish to thank you for the cooperation and kind consideration given me at all times.

Inasmuch as this is to be my swan song, may I express to you some thoughts that have been in my mind for some time?

I wish to commend your attitude that our problem is educational. We have no interest in winning teams. Our one concern is the development of character and health. A winning team is an accident, a concatenation of circumstances which may happen once in ten years and is nothing for the Chamber of Commerce, the student body, the principal or the coach to get excited about. Yet they like to "kid" themselves into believing that they deserve credit for this phenomenon. They get excited and desire all rules to be broken or new ones to be made, so that their glory shall not fade. If one team wins year after year, one of two things is true; either the other teams of the league are hopelessly outclassed or else the team is crooked. Stand your ground and do not be stampeded. Look after the physical wellbeing and character of our boys. Any coach who tampers with the character of boys is on dangerous grounds.

Do not fall into the pit of log rolling. You are more than a group of league representatives. You are the council of the southern section of the C. I. F. Therefore take your work seriously, and attend to the business of the council. At times in the past very important business has been taken up near the end of meetings when scant quorums were present.

There are several questions which ought to be discussed frankly:

1. Why should the City League have two representatives?
2. Should the high schools of Los Angeles City pay annual dues to the C. I. F., S. S.?
3. Can we not persuade the athletic clubs to help us in protecting high school boys from exploitation?
4. Is there no way to protect our pupils while yet in high school from college scouts?
