OCTOBER 1934 BULLETIN

The first meeting of the year for the Council was held in Room 418, Student's Union Building at the University of Southern California on Saturday, October 6, 1934.

The meeting was called to order by President Blee of Bishop at 9:30 a.m. A roll called showed the Leagues represented as follows:

1. Moved by Mr. Fischer, seconded by Mr. Monroe that the minutes of the May meeting be approved as printed. Carried.

2. Moved by Mr. Veenker, seconded by Mr. Alman that the N. C. A. A. Track Rules be substituted for the A. A. U. Track Rules in our High School meets. Carried

3. A committee appointed by the President to consider the question of a basketball tournament for this year recommended that we return to the method of play-off among the leagues that we have used in former years. Moved by Mr. Means, seconded by Mr. Berlin that the Committee's recommendation be adopted. Carried.

4. A committee appointed to study and report on the subject of allowing ninth semester boys to play basketball in the second semester if the basketball schedule continued into the second semester gave its report. Moved by Mr. Means, seconded by Mr. Moore that the report be laid on the table. Carried.

5. The question of reorganizing the C. I. F., Southern Section and creating four or more sub-sections was introduced by the Committee that had considered the subject of allowing nine semester boys to play basketball in the second semester.

Moved by Mr. Berlin, seconded by Mr. Alman that a Committee to study the subject of reorganization be appointed. The Committee to consist of Mr. Wolfe, Mr. Moore, Mr. McIntosh and two additional members from each of four sections. The sections being—Los Angeles City, the Counties

to the north, the Counties to the south and Los Angeles County outside of the city and the section to the east. This Committee to make a preliminary report, not later than December 1st. Carried.

6. The Executive Committee recommended—"that tickets to all play-off games be provided and checked by the C. I. F., Southern Section Office. That complimentary tickets be handled by the Office and be issued only to news papers, radio stations, and school officials and limited."

Moved by Mr. Veenker, seconded by Mr. Coverdale that the Commissioner of Athletics assume complete control, financially and otherwise of all C. I. F., Southern Section play-off games. Carried.

7. Moved by Mr. Berlin, seconded by Mr. Wolfe that item 13 of the Minutes of the May Meeting be laid on the table. Carried.

8. The Bay League recommended that the discus throw replace the football throw in track. Moved by Mr. McIntosh, seconded by Mr. Berlin that the question be referred to the League for report at the December Meeting. Carried.

9. Moved by Mr. Thompson, seconded by Mr. Wolfe that Article VIII of the Constitution be interpreted on the old unit basis, that is, three of the sixteen subject units of credit, exclusive of physical education be required for participation in athletics. Carried.

10. Moved by Mr. Means, seconded by Mr. Alman that we ask Assistant State Superintendent Walter Hapner to establish the old 16 unit requirement for graduation, so that we may be able to properly certify to the scholastic standing of athletes. Carried.

11. The question of a boy that last semester carried one solid in his home school and two solids in the Polytechnic Evening High School had been referred to the Executive Committee relative to competition this semester. The members of the Executive Committee had given a personal opinion to the effect that they believed the boy to be eligible under a new ruling made by the Council in 1931. Moved by Mr. Berlin, seconded by Mr. Poliski that the personal opinion of the Executive Committee members be approved by the Council. Carried.

12. Mr. Van Patten read a report by the Treasurer. (See copy at the end of these Minutes.) Moved by Mr. Monroe, seconded by Mr. Moore that the report be accepted and published. Carried.

13. The financial status of the C. I. F., Southern Section was discussed at considerable length. The question of establishing regular annual dues was discussed pro and con. It was informally agreed if it were possible to get through the year without asking dues from the schools that this should be done. Mr. Van Patten informed the Council that under existing conditions he would wait for salary payment until revenue from football is received.

Moved by Mr. Oliver, seconded by Mr. Thompson that we refer to the leagues for a vote prior to November 10 the question of having the C. I. F. take 50% of the net receipts from all play-off games and divide the remaining 50% between the competing schools. It being understood that this would help to lessen any annual dues which may be found necessary later. It was further moved that it be the responsibility of each League Representative to get the vote of the schools in his league and transmit such vote to the C. I. F. Office by November 10 or before. Carried.

14. Mr. R. E. Squire presented a new type of hurdle to the Council for consideration. Mr. Squire expressed the belief that the hurdle he has developed meets all the technical requirements prescribed in regard to hurdles and that it also has very decided safety features. Moved by Mr. Thompson, seconded by Mr. Alman that Mr. Squire's hurdles be recommended on an experimental basis. It was moved further that Mr. Squire be asked to take his hurdle before the local A.A.U. Track and Field Committee for examination and consideration. Carried.

15. The following recommendations were made by the Executive Committee:

That Free-Lance schools wishing to enter the play-off in football must finish their regular schedule by Saturday, November 17, and be ready for the first play-off game by November 24.

That a form of report be prepared for the use of schools of the several leagues and that each league representative be asked to give a summary of all reports on each activity to the C. I. F. Office for the purpose of an annual report.

That the request of the Long Beach Polytechnic High School that it be awarded the Swimming Championship for 1934 though a final swimming meet was not held be not recommended.

Moved by Mr. Johnson, seconded by Mr. Berlin that the recommendations be approved. Carried.

16. Mr. Hamilton reported on the A. A. U. activities for the year. He reported a successful year for the organization and urged all schools of the C. I. F., Southern Section to lend their aid and support to all of the activities of the A.A.U.

17. Mr. B. L. Halferty of the General Medical Corporation of California appeared before the Council and explained a plan that his organization is offering to schools in the way of medical aid to students injured while in attendance at school. There being no motion relative to Mr. Halferty's plan the President directed that the matter be left to the Executive Committee for review and recommendation at the next meeting.

18. Mr. Hearst Ross reported on the progress made in the plan that has been endorsed by the C. I. F. for insurance for injured athletes. Because of legal requirements affecting Principals, in the future all of such insurance will have to be handled as a student body activity.

19. Mr. Walter Shanks of Interscholastic Sports informed the Council that it would be necessary for his organization to change the nature of the publication that they are proposing to put out. His organization intends to publish a weekly paper to be distributed to the schools without cost. It is planned to take care of the expense of publication from advertising patronage. The President directed that any question of circulation, approval or censorship be referred to the Executive Committee.

20. Mr. Adam Leonard representing the Alumni Association of the University of Southern California appeared before the Council and presented to each member of the Council, not already supplied, complimentary tickets to the U. S. C.-Washington State game at the Coliseum on the afternoon of October 6.

Moved by Mr. Oliver, seconded by the whole group that we extend to U. S. C. and its Alumni Association our sincere thanks and appreciation for the tickets and for the privilege of meeting at U. S. C. so convenient to the game. Carried with applause.

21. Executive Committee—Mr. Alman, Mr. Moore, and Mr. Oliver were reelected members of the Executive Committee for this school year.

22. The question of the time and the place of the next meeting of the Council was brought up for discussion. The President ruled that this be left to be arranged by the Executive Committee in consultation with Mr. F. L. Thurston of

the California Teacher's Association, Southern Section.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned at 12:45 p.m.

A pair of field glasses were left in room 418 Student's Union, U. S. C. by someone who attended the C. I. F. Meeting on October 6. The glasses are now in the C. I. F. Office awaiting a claimant.
