EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

The Executive Committee held the first meeting of the year in the C. I. F. Office Friday, September 30, at 3:00 P. M. Present at the meeting were:

1. The Executive Committee organized for the year by electing Mr. Hayhurst Chairman.

2. Mr. Alman, Treasurer of the C. I. F., Southern Section, presented the financial report printed in another column.

Moved by Mr. McIntosh, seconded by Mr. Moore that the report be accepted and filed. Carried.

3. Moved by Mr. Moore, seconded by Mr. McIntosh that the annual dues for year 1938-1939 be three cents per pupil based on the A.-D.A. for 1937-1938. Carried.

4. Mr. Cline, Vice-Principal of San Bernardino High School, presented verbal charges that the Elsinore Naval and Military school, boys and football coach, had been trying to proselyte a number of the San Bernardino football team, and that the school authorities were reported to be cooperating to the extent of offering free tuition to prospective athletes.

Major Conklin and Capt. Davis denied all charges.

Mr. Alman pointed out that under present C. I. F. rules the Executive Committee had no authority in the case except in passing on the question of eligibility for competition.

Moved by Mr. Moore, seconded by Mr. Alman to call attention of all Preparatory Schools to our Residence Requirements as they appear in Article VIII, page 16 of our Constitution and Rulings, and to the fact that these rules apply to both day and boarding pupils in Preparatory Schools.

Moved by Mr. Alman, seconded by Mr. McIntosh that we ask Mr. Hornaday, of the Riverside County League, to investigate the whole situation and report to the Council any pertinent facts. Carried.

5. Mr. Van Patten reported that he had had requests for sanctions for Practice games of football between high school teams and junior college reserves (Spartans, Goofs, etc.)

Moved by Mr. McIntosh, seconded by Mr. Hamilton, that we continue the policy of no sanctions for games with any Junior College first team and that Mr. Van Patten use his own judgment so far as games with Reserves are concerned. Carried.

6. Moved by Mr. Moore, seconded by Mr. Alman that the Commissioner of Athletics prepare a report on swimming records for approval and publication and that he ask the cooperation of Mr. Jimmy Smith of Fullerton and Mr. Pete Archer of Woodrow Wilson in doing the work. Carried.

7. Mr. Van Patten called attention to the rule in the football code in regard to wearing a headgear.

Moved by Mr. Moore, seconded by Mr. McIntosh that the Commissioner of Athletics direct all officials working C. I. F., Southern Section games to enforce this rule rigidly even for the kicker in try for point after touchdown. Carried.

8. Bakersfield High School had asked to be included in the water polo league now operating in Los Angeles and Orange Counties. The C. I. F. Representatives of the Central Section of the C. I. F. had approved. The coaches of the schools playing water polo in our league had approved admitting Bakersfield for a year's trial providing Bakersfield came down for all games.

Moved by Mr. Moore, seconded by Mr. McIntosh that Bakersfield be admitted to our Water Polo League for one year on the conditions named above. Carried.

9. Moved by Mr. Moore, seconded by Mr. Alman that the attention of Principals and Physical Education Directors be called to paragraphs (7) and (8), Article XII on the subject of Classification, and that paragraph (8) be quoted in these minutes. It was pointed out that this latter paragraph seems to be misunderstood or is being overlooked. Motion carried.

10. Anaheim High School has been granted a sanction to hold a badminton tournament and asked that for this year the winner be declared the Southern California Badminton Champion.

Moved by Mr. Moore, seconded by Mr. Hamilton that the Anaheim Badminton Tournament winner be declared the Southern California Champion for this year provided the tournament is open to all C. I. F., Southern Section members on equal terms. Carried.

11. Santa Barbara High School applied for consideration as a contender for football play-off privileges and submitted a schedule of games for approval of the Executive Committee.

Moved by Mr. McIntosh, seconded by Mr. Alman, that the schedule printed below be declared Santa Barbara's qualifying schedule and that winning five of the six games listed be necessary for Santa Barbara to qualify for the play-off. Carried.

12. A request from the Pomona Valley League to be allowed to use 7th and 8th grade boys within the League only, in competition with upper grade boys was considered.

Moved by Mr. Moore, seconded by Mr. Hamilton, that the rules of the C. I. F. are for control of competition among boys of the four grades, 9th to 12th only, and therefore 7th and 8th grade boys are ineligible for competition under our set-up. Carried unanimously.

13. Numerous inquiries had come to the C. I. F. Office relative to the regulation passed by the State Council at its May meeting forbidding boys under fifteen playing varsity football. Mr. Van Patten asked for a clarification of the term varsity printed in italics in the last State Council Minutes.

Moved by Mr. Moore, seconded by Mr. McIntosh that the term varsity was meant to apply to Class A first team only.

Carried unanimously.

(Added interpretation) Boys who have not become fifteen by September 1 of any school year may play football with the Class A second team, the Junior Varsity, the "scrubs", the "yannigans" and "what have you".

14. Mr. Van Patten called attention to the fact that the nine boys listed below had set new rack and field records in the Southern California Meet in May, 1938, and presented a design of a gold shoe to be presented to these boys as provided in our rules.

Moved by Mr. McIntosh, seconded by Mr. Hamilton, that the design be approved and that the shoes be ordered and sent to the schools for presentation to the boys concerned. Moved further that if a boy establishes two new records in any one season, (see Browning of El Monte), that only one shoe be awarded but that the engraving show both records. Carried.

15. A new High School was opened at Palm Springs this year. The new school applied to be admitted to the C. I. F., Southern Section, and for membership in the Riverside County League.

Moved by Mr. Moore, seconded by Mr. McIntosh that the new school be admitted to membership as requested. Carried.

The Principal of Palm Springs High School is Mr. Morris F. Richardson.

16. Eligibility Cases

A number of cases of eligibility, all having to do with boys coming in by transfer whose parents or guardian had not changed residence, were considered. All were ruled ineligible except two.

A boy who had been in the Reform School at Preston last year had carried more than three units of work and had been allowed to return to his home and to his former high school was ruled eligible for competition.

Boys living in a camp for Court wards when sent to a neighboring high school by Court orders were ruled eligible for competition.

Two boys having taken part in boxing bouts not under control of their schools were ruled ineligible for competition for a period of one year following their last bout in non-school controlled boxing.

Three cases were considered of boys who have changed schools and whose parents expect to move into the new high school district within a short time. **Ruling**—Boys will be eligible if and when parents actually take up residence in the new high school district.

The Committee adjourned at 5:30 P. M. The next regular meeting is scheduled for the first Saturday in December.

**FOOTBALL SCHEDULES PUBLISHED
BY HELMS FOUNDATION**

Mr. Wm. R. Schoeder, Managing Director of Helm's Athletic Foundation, has put out a small folder containing the football schedules of all the Southern California high schools. On the side of the folder opposite the schedules is printed a map of Southern California with the location of all of the 170 schools in the L. A. City Section and the Southern Section of the C. I. F. clearly shown. The League to which each school belongs is also indicated. Mr. Schroeder has done a fine piece of work. The folder will be very convenient to Principals, Coaches and football officials, for reference.

AN OMISSION

Mr. H. A. Berlin of Oxnard calls attention to the fact that the change in our rules requiring a boy to be in attendance at least 50% of the elapsed time of any term in order to be eligible to compete does not appear in the September, 1938, issue of our Constitution and Rulings. This ruling was approved by the Council at its April meeting and appears in the April Bulletin. It is in effect and must be observed.

A NEW HIGH SCHOOL

Alhambra is just starting its new high school which will be ready for use by September, 1939. The school is located in the southeast part of Alhambra near Valley Boulevard and Garfield Avenue. It will be known as the Mark Kepple High School. It is being named in honor of Mr. Kepple, a former County Superintendent of Los Angeles County.

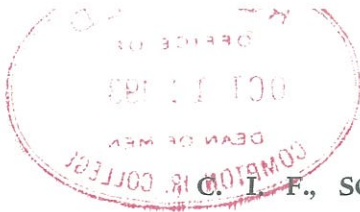
