and Mr. Van Patten took notes on the business conducted.

Schedule

The six high schools represented at the meeting together with Anaheim and Fullerton, it was agreed, would enter teams in the water polo schedule to be prepared.

Starting Date

Thursday, October 23 was agreed upon as the starting date of a double round schedule. All games are to be played on Thursday unless changed by agreement of the two coaches concerned.

The games are to start at 2:30 P. M.

Officials

It was agreed to have two officials for each game. The fee is to be \$10.00. The C. I. F. Office is to assign the officials.

Rules

N. C. A. A. Rules are to be followed except as noted below:

(1) Class C games which are to be played first will be two five-minute halves. Class B and Class A games are to be seven-minute halves.

(2) Whenever the ball goes through the uprights forming the front of the goal it is a goal no matter who puts it through.

Attention is called to the fact that the ball may not be taken under water except when the player in possession is being tackled.

The schedule of games is to be prepared by Mr. Van Patten.

C.I.F., SOUTHERN SECTION NOTABLES PROMOTED

Mr. Harry J. Moore of Long Beach and Mr. Normal C. Hayhurst of Glendale who have both been long with the C.I.F., Southern Section were signally honored by their school systems during the past vacation.

Mr. Moore has been made Director of High Schools for the City of Long Beach. He has five high schools and eight junior high schools under his supervision. His long experience as Principal of Woodrow Wilson High School should fit him well for his new duties.

Mr. Moore has been long identified with the C.I.F., Southern Section. He has served on the State Council since 1914. He has served as its President since 1920.

Mr. Normal C. Hayhurst was elected Superintendent of Schools for the City of Glendale on September 17. He succeeds Mr. Willard S. Ford who resigned for reasons of health.

Mr. Hayhurst has been with the Glendale schools for 30 years on October 1, 1947. He was first a coach. He served eight years as Vice-Principal of Herbert Hoover High School, eight years as Principal and has been Assistant Superintendent for two years.

He has served for years on the Council and the Executive Committee of the C.I.F., Southern Section.

As track coach of the Glendale High School he helped develop Frank Wykoff into a world famous sprinter.

Mr. Hayhurst is at present one of the five members of the Executive Committee of the C.I.F., Southern Section. He is also a member of the C.I.F. Track Committee.

We are proud to have these two school administrators associated with the C.I.F., Southern Section.

SOUTHERN LEAGUE

The Southern League staged a family picnic and a business meeting in Live Oak Park, Fallbrook on Sunday, September 14 at 1:00 P. M. The picnic was a huge success. Good food, fellowship, and good league relationship were much in evidence. Football occupied most of the time of the business meeting.

Mr. O. Kenneth Williamson who has been Director of Athletics at Vista High School for ten years has deserted the ranks and become a sports goods dealer. He was present at the meeting and offered to weigh and measure all the boys in the league and even furnish the scales for weighing. His offer was unanimously accepted. This incident indicates a good fraternal spirit in league affairs.

THE TRI-COUNTY LEAGUE

On September 17 the Tri-County League met at Citrus High School at 3:30 P. M. The questions of game schedules for the year took most of the time of the meeting. A football carnival for October 10 was arranged. They voted to pay Class A football officials \$12.00 per game. Cake and coffee were served.

SUNSET LEAGUE AND ORANGE LEAGUE

The Sunset League had a meeting at 9:00 P. M. at Swansons Cafe in Santa Ana. The League meeting was preceded by a dinner meeting of the Orange County High School Principals.

The Commissioner of Athletics answered a number of questions on eligibility and then moved over to the Orange League which was meeting in an adjoining room.

At the Orange League meeting most of the

time was spent discussing schedules and C.I.F. rules.

The Orange League voted to ask our Executive Committee to arrange a play-off among the four following small schools leagues: Desert-Inyo, Orange, Preparatory, and Tri-County.

MOUNT BALDY LEAGUE

On Wednesday, September 24 we visited the California Junior Republic at Chino where the Mount Baldy League was holding its first meeting of the school year 1947-1948.

Mr. Joe Bonnett, the new Principal at California Junior Republic has been for years at Pomona High School and Junior College. Joe should be an expert with boys.

The Mount Baldy League is made up to a large extent of junior high schools. Their problems are similar to those of senior high schools. Eligibility rules and finances took up much of the time of the meeting.

They voted to ask the C.I.F. Office to assign officials for all of their games in all team game sports.

The eighteen league representatives had a fine dinner before the meeting started.

CITRUS BELT LEAGUE

The Citrus Belt League met at 6:00 P. M. on Tuesday, September 23 at the Redlands High School. After a fine steak dinner the members of the league were too contented to oppose anything very vigorously. President Winston Nelson, Principal at Pomona, found it hard to get a good lively discussion started. The meeting ended at 8:30 P. M.

Schedules for the year were approved. The fee for all Class A football games was set at \$12.00 per game. The fee for Sophomore games will be \$7.50. The Principals all indicated that they would all give as much encouragement as possible to the Inland Officials' Association.

LAW ENFORCEMENT

We attended a league meeting recently and the question of a special dispensation for a boy to make him eligible was being discussed. A Principal in the group remarked, "That C.I.F. Southern Section Executive Committee never makes exceptions to the letter of the law. They insist on the rule being enforced as long as it is in the book."

We think it is quite noteworthy that we have a pliment to the rulings of our Executive Committee.

Our Constitution and Rules are the result of more than thirty years of trial and error. Most

of what we have learned in those thirty years has come about through the errors we have made. When we make a mistake we admit the error and try to correct it.

We think it is quite noteworthy that we have a set of regulations which we apply to 166 schools of all sizes and descriptions and yet have the member schools fairly contented and loyal.

PUENTE VIEWS FUTURE

Mr. S. Chester McIntosh, Principal of the Puente High School, has consulted the economic experts and has come up with a very rosy picture of his school three to five years from now. Business and industry in the valley near Puente is all in a flourishing condition. Expansion is very evident. The Puente High School is growing rapidly and the optimists look for the school enrollment to more than double in the next three or four years. The A.D.A. for last year (1946-1947) was just under 300.

To care for the expected increase in the enrollment in the High School, acreage adjoining the present school sight has been purchased. They now have forty-three acres all in one block.

A group of citizen boosters for the community recently presented Puente City with twenty acres of land for a public park. This park sight adjoins the high school grounds and will make a splendid community center.

If and when the expected increase in school enrollment arrives, Puente will be ready for it.

Puente may soon step out of the position of smallest school in the Tri-County League. Better and stronger athletic teams will follow any growth in the school and the community.

COOPERATION ESSENTIAL

Last year, with the approval of our Executive Committee, we started sending out a weekly news release to each of our 165 member schools and 180 newspapers of Southern California. The reception given to this new effort in the line of service was such as to justify its continuance.

This weekly news release to be what it ought to be can only be put out if all of our 165 member schools cooperate in an effort to make it 100% efficient.

We need weekly game reports. We need letters and information in regard to athletic developments. We need and will welcome constructive criticism.

We have sent to each school in the C.I.F. Southern Section a quantity of game report cards. We urge every Principal to put these cards in the hands of some reliable sports enthusiast with definite instructions to mail the Post Card report

to the C.I.F. Office as soon as the game is finished. Only the home school need make such report.

In the C.I.F. Office we are minded to give our very best effort to the Weekly News Release. If the member schools cooperate to the best of their ability, we can have a service much improved over that of last year.

NEW HIGH SCHOOLS

Since the beginning of the present school year on July 1, 1947 three high schools have been added to the C.I.F., Southern Section.

The Torrance High School voted last Spring to separate from the Los Angeles City set up and has become a part of the Redondo Union High School District. It is now associated with the C.I.F., Southern Section in the control of its athletics.

Montebello has built a new high school at Bell Gardens which is applying for admission to the C.I.F., Southern Section. The Bell Gardens High School will have no football schedule this year, but expects to enter teams in basketball, baseball and track.

Sweetwater High School District has been divided and a new high school has been set up at Chula Vista. The new high school has been made a part of the Metropolitan League and will enter teams in all sports.

We welcome these new schools to the C. I. F., Southern Section. Unless they show signs of too much athletic power, we hope the schools with whom they compete will not be too rough with them.

At Bell Gardens, Parke Oliver as Principal and Emory Doner as Director of Athletics are old hands at handling athletic problems.

Arthur M. Main, Vice-Principal at Torrance was formerly on the C.I.F., Southern Section Council from the Southern League. He is very familiar with the C.I.F. athletic picture in Southern California.
