CIF, SS, COUNCIL APPROVES **RELEAGUING FOR 1968-69**

Two new leagues will be formed and Catholic leagues in the Southland will undergo a face-lifting in September, 1968, following action by the CIF, Southern Section, Council at its meeting September 30.

Following the recommendations of the Releaguing Committee, the CIF, SS, Council approved releaguing schedules which call for a major shakeup in the Southern area of the Southern Section and among private school

Five Whittier schools will band together to form a new league with Montebello and five schools in the Desert-Valley area will join under a new league affiliation beginning in September, 1968. One of the desert schools, Needles, has been a free lance power for several years.

One major change which has Southland football buffs buzzing was the move which sends El Rancho into the talent-laden Moore League in place of Downey, which moves to the Coast

On the private school scene, all four Catholic circuits will undergo major changes in an attempt to relocate schools in closer proximity to one another. Carmel and Sierra will move into the Camino Real League with Crespi, Lasuen, Bishop Montgomery, Murphy, St. Bernard and St.

MINUTES OF CIF, SOUTHERN SECTION, EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING — SEPTEMBER 23, 1967

The September meeting of the CIF, Southern Section, Executive Committee was called to order by Chairman Steve Miletich at 1 p.m. on Saturday, September 23, 1967, at the Southern Section office.

The following members were in attendance: Chairman Miletich, vice principal, Beverly Hills HS; Richard H. Spaulding, principal, Buena Park HS; Claud Hardesty, principal, Santa Barbara HS; Robert D. Ashton, assistant superintendent, Norwalk-La Mirada USD; Rev. Alexander Manville, principal, Bishop Garcia Diego HS; Keith J. Lee, principal, Dominguez HS; Keith Gunn, principal, Victor Valley HS; Clair Franklin, principal, Trona HS; Alex Alexander, principal, Indio HS; James Faul, principal, Workman HS; Arthur Hobson, assistant superintendent, Whittier UH-SD, and Commissioner of Athletics Ken Fagans.

- 1. APPROVE MINUTES It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of June 17, 1967, as published in the September, 1967, Monthly Bulletin.
- 2. APPLICATIONS FOR MEMBERSHIP It was moved, seconded and carried to recommend to the Council that the following schools be admitted to membership in the CIF, SS: Vista del Rio Jr. HS as an Associate Member, as of this date; Royal HS of the Simi District, Miraleste HS of the Palos Verdes District and Faith Baptist HS as regular members, effective September, 1968.
- 3. PLAY-OFF QUALIFICA-TION It was moved, seconded and carried that for Bosco Tech HS to qualify for the 1968 basketball playoffs, Bosco Tech must win eight of the following ten games on its schedule: December 20, Bell-Jeff; December 22, Valley Christian; January 2, Wilson HS; January 12, Ontario Christian; January 13, Boulder City; January 16, St. Bernards; January 23, Bell-Jeff; January 27, Boulder City; February 2, Sonora HS; and February 6, Brethren HS.
- 4. NOMINATING COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION The Nominating Committee recommended that Rev. Thomas Kiefer, principal of Bishop Amat HS, be appointed to fill the Executive Committee post vacated by Arthur H. North. In accordance with Article VII, Section 12, it was moved, seconded and carried to appoint Rev. Kiefer to fill Mr. North's term, which has one year to run.

5. NATIONAL FEDERATION CONVENTION - Since three senior members of the Executive Committee - Art Hobson, Keith Lee and Alex Alexander — are all eligible to attend the 1968 National Federation Convention as the Southern Section's delegates, it was moved, seconded and carried to make an exception for this year only to the policy of sending two delegates and make an attempt to send all three. The convention has been tentatively scheduled for Wisconsin in June, 1968. Expenses for our delegates have been included in the current year's budget.

6. REPORT ON COMPTON-MORNINGSIDE RESOLUTION — Art Hobson presented a summary of recommendations dealing with incidents surrounding the Compton vs. Morningside 1967 play-off basketball game. It was moved, seconded and carried to direct Mr. Hobson to present to the Council for consideration

7. APPROVE FOOTBALL PLAY. OFF AND FINANCIAL REGULA-TIONS - The committee reviewed the football play-off and financial regulations in force during the 1966 playoffs. It was moved, seconded and carried to adopt the same regulations for the 1967 play-offs, except for item 19 pertaining to electronic devices. After some discussion, it was decided that electronic devices (video-tape, instant replay, etc.) would be permitted in connection with play-off games, provided they were not used as coaching aids during the contest but were used as a supplement to regular game films after the conclusion of the game.

8. BOXING RULE CLARIFICA-TION — Two cases involving possible violation of the state boxing rule were presented for clarification. After a thorough review of the circumstances in each case, it was the ruling of the committee that the boys involved were not in violation of the rule.

As a result of these cases and because the Executive Committee expressed grave concern with the confusion surrounding the present rule regulating boxing, Keith Gunn was directed to bring the matter to the attention of the State Federal Council at its next meeting. He was instructed to see if the present rule could be amended to eliminate high school control during the summer vacation period and have it apply only during the school year.

9. UNDUE INFLUENCE CASES

The first case involved Marv Whittaker, a student at Santiago HS, who was influenced to enroll at Garden Grove HS. The matter was handled by the Garden Grove League and after a complete investigation culminating public hearings, the league declared Whittaker ineligible for interscholatic athletics at Garden Grove HS and suspended the coach, Mr. Gerald Cheek, from his coaching activities for one year.

The second case involved a student at Upland HS who was contacted through a personal letter from Mr. Gard, the head football coach at Palm Springs HS, inviting the boy to visit the campus at Palm Springs HS to look over the athletic facilities, discuss the football opportunities at the school in the hope the boy would transfer at the beginning of the current school year. After the boy had visited the Palm Springs campus and visited with the coach, the Upland HS principal reported the matter to the CIF office and registered a formal protest.

An investigation conducted by the Commissioner revealed that the charges were true and that Coach Gardhad violated Article XVII of the Braws, by writing a personal letter to the boy and then entertaining him to the Palm Springs campus.

The committee thoroughly discussed all phases of the case and took no as tion against the boy because he to mained at Upland HS. It was agree however, that a penalty should assessed against the coach or school for the violation of our rule. In effort to resolve the situation without unduly penalizing the innocent me bers of the Palm Springs football team it was moved, seconded and carried inform the principal that if the coad is removed from all coaching response sibility with the varsity football team the matter will be closed. If Mr. Gal. continues his connection with van football in any capacity, the team not be eligible for entrance into 1967 CIF play-offs under any contion. 13. CORONA HS CASE — The case of Mike Griffith, a student at Corona HS who transferred from Mountain Empire HS, was tabled pending further investigation. The Commissioner was instructed to secure additional information and was given authority to rule on the case without referring it back to the committee.

14. GARDEN GROVE CASE — A year ago Jeff and Chris LaBarthe were given approval by the Garden Grove Board of Education to transfer from Bolsa Grande HS to Garden Grove HS because the boys' parents were anticipating a change of address from the Bolsa Grande to the Garden Grove HS attendance area. According to CIF rules, these boys should not have been eligible at Garden Grove HS until the move was consummated. Unfortunateely, the esccrow was not completed on the new home, and to this date the parents have never moved into the Garden Grove HS attendance area. In violation of our rules, these boys were permitted to participate last year in interscholastic athletics.

The situation was thoroughly discussed by the committee and it was felt that the boys should not be penalized at this late date because of an eerror on the part of the school administrators. It was therefore, moved, seconded and carried that these boys be declared immediately eligible for interscholastic athletics but that Garden Grove HS be severly reprimanded for permitting this type of situation to exist.

With a new principal at Garden Grove HS, it was the feeling of the committee that in the future CIF, Southern Section, rules would be strictly adhered to.

It was with Dr. Johnson's help that the CIF, SS, was able to secure the use of Cal-State, Fullerton's spacious, 4,000-seat gymnasium facility for the wrestling finals, which had been previously held at Fullerton Junior College.

The meet will bring together wrestlers from all over the Southland who will qualify for the finals in preliminary meets to be staged at Upland, Arcadia, Mira Costa and Fountain Valley High Schools on February 17, 1968.

Commissioner of Athletics Ken Fagans expressed appreciation to administrators at Cal-State, Fullerton, for inviting the CIF, SS, to use the Titan gym, and praised particularly the efforts of Dr. Johnson in securing the site.

MINUTES OF CIF, SOUTHERN SECTION, COUNCIL MEETING SEPTEMBER 30, 1967

The fall meeting of the CIF, Southern Section, Council was held on Saturday, September 30, 1967, in the cafeteria at El Rancho High School. The meeting was called to order at 9:45 a.m. by Council President Rev. Alexander Manville, principal, Bishop Garcia Diego High School.

Representatives of all but the De Anza and Delphic Leagues were in attendance.

The following guests were also in attendance: William W. Russell, State CIF Commissioner of Athletics; Robert Steuart, State CIF Administrative Assistant: Dr. Joe McLain, superintendent, El Rancho HSD; Ted Gossard, principal, Aviation HS; John Warren, principal, Downey HS; Arden Hirschi, assistant principal, Downey HS: and Dr. Hanford Rants, principal, Warren HS.

1. APPROVE MINUTES — It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the May 6, 1967, Council meeting as published in the June Monthly Bulletin.

It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of June 17, as published in the September Bulletin.

It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of September 23, as read by the Secretary.

2. REPORT ON LEGAL CASES—The Commissioner reported on the Mobley case, which involved a suit of \$1,000,000.00 against the CIF, Southern Section, the Bellflower and Compton School Districts, whereby a boy was injured in a CIF, SS quarter final track meet held at Bellflower High School in May, 1966. Complete information has been furnished our attorney and, as of this date, we are awaiting further word concerning the case.

Because of this suit and others that have been brought against the CIF, Southern Section, in recent years, our attorney has recommended that we add a section to our By-Laws governing protests and appeals. Each Council member was furnished with a copy of 2 proposed addition to our By-Laws, covering the methods of handling protests and appeals from decisions from schools and leagues in connection with our interscholastic athletic program.

An amendment was proposed to change Section 3 of the proposed addition to the By-Laws. This amendment was defeated. It was then moved, seconded and carried to adopt the original amendment as presented, with the Commissioner being authorized to confer with our attorney relative to minor editing changes.

3. APPROVE PLAY-OFF CALEN-

DAR — It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the play-off calendar for the 1968-69 school year as presented. The entire calendar is published on page one of this bulletin.

4. IRVINE LEAGUE PROPOSAL

— The Irvine League requested that
the discus throw be made a regular
part of the CIF, SS, track program
with points to count, since the event
is included in the State CIF track
meet each year. It was moved, seconded, and defeated to add the event
to the CIF, SS program.

5. MEMORIAL DAY PROPOSAL
—Since the State CIF has removed
Memorial Day as a time when athletic practice or interscholastic games
will not be permitted, it was moved that
the CIF, SS, amend Article XXIX,
Section 1, to conform with State CIF
rules and permit practice or athletic
activities on that date. The motion died
for lack of a second.

6. FINANCIAL REPORT — Treasurer Keith Lee presented the financial report for 1966-67 and proposed budget for 1967-68. The statement of income and expenditures for 1966-67 showed a net gain of \$20,906.55, reflected in the football play-off income, where the major share of the gain was attained. Included in the report were a statement of assets, showing total assets of \$102,838.13, and a statement of cash gain over the past 17 years and securities and cash on hand from June, 1946, to the present.

The report indicated that the CIF, SS, financial position was sound. It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the financial report and budget as reported.

7. SAN DIEGO SECTION PRO-POSAL - The Commissioner reported that the San Diego Section had placed on the State CIF agenda an item which would change our present rule governing "the season of a sport." It was pointed out that the Southern Section feels that our present rule is adequate, and if the San Diego Section would like a change in this rule, they should adopt it on a section level rather than force all sections to conform. After some discussion, it was moved, seconded, and carried to instruct the Southern Section representatives on the State Council to vote in opposition to the San Diego proposal.

8. SUMMER ACTIVITIES—Commissioner Fagans reported on summer athletic activities, as they are currently being studied by a State committee. The Commissioner said that nothing of note had been resolved, but asked authority to represent the CIF, SS, on the State Committee.

9. COMPTON - MORNINGSIDE RESOLUTION — Art Hobson prosented a summary and recommendations from the Executive Committee to the Council regarding the Computer ton-Morningside affair.

Mr. Hobson commented that be committee had studied the problem very deeply before drafting the proposed resolution, and that his commettee felt immediate action should be taken in the matter.

It was moved, seconded and carried to adopt the resolution presented by Mr. Hobson concerning the Compton Morningside affair.

10. CERTIFICATION OF COACHES — The Ivy League, in action taken at its last meeting, went expected as opposing the present Starrule which makes it mandatory that a persons connected with the coaching of a high school athletic team be certificated personnel or cadet teacher. The Ivy League learned that many their schools were using non-certificated men, because it was absolutely necessary.

Mr. Balke, the Ivy League representative, then moved and it was seconded that we instruct our State representatives to place this matter on the agenda for the next CIF Federated Concil meeting in the hope that some modification can be made in the presentative. This motion was unanimous carried.

11. RELEAGUING — Steve Metich, Releaguing Committee chairman presented the committee's final recommendations for the leaguing of school for the 1968-69 school year.

MINUTES OF SPECIAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING SEPTEMBER 30, 1967

A special meeting of the CIF, Southern Section, Executive Committee was called to order by Chairman Steve Miletich at 1:15 p.m. on Saturday, September 30, 1967, at the Ramada Inn in Pico Rivera.

All members of the committee were in attendance, along with Jim Wolcott, Director of Public Information; and J. Kenneth Fagans, Commissioner of Athletics.

1. APPROVE MINUTES — It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of September 23. 1967.

2. PIUS HS APPEAL — A letter was read from Rev. James W. Keefe. principal of Pius X HS, in reference to the penalty assessed his school by the Executive Committee last spring because of illegal recruiting activities. At that time, Pius X HS, being adjudged responsible for the illegal activities of its football coach, was penalized to the extent that none of its athletic teams would be permitted to participate in CIF, SS, playoffs during the 1967-68 school year even though they qualified by winning their league. No penalty was assessed against individuals who might qualify for CIF post-season competition.

Since that time, Rev. Keefe pointed out that a strict effort has been made to correct the situation and to remove those persons who were mainly responsible from positions of responsibility in the school. The athletic director and head football coach have been relieved of their positions. The major administrative officers who were at the school at the time of the violation are no longer there. A temporary principal has been replaced by Father Keefe, a man who is thoroughly acquainted with CIF regulations and who believes that they should be enforced according to the spirit, as well as the letter, of the rules.

After a thorough discussion of the situation, it was moved, seconded and unanimously carried that the restrictions placed upon Pius High School's entry into this year's CIF, SS, play-offs

be removed. Pius HS will still, however, be on probation for the balance of the current school year. It was the feeling of the group that the persons responsible had been removed and that there was no reason to penalize the innocent members of the current Pius HS athletic teams.

2. CLASSIFICATION PROBLEM
— Pioneer HS requested a waiver of our classification rule in order to permit Bill Castro, a tenth grade student, to participate this year in Class B football. In 1966 when Bill was classified, he weighed 167 pounds and his total exponents were 87. According to Article XXXIV, Section 6, a boy must advance a total of a minimum of two exponents each year.

In September 1967, Bill was classified and he weighed in at 141 pounds, which gives him an exponent total of 86. Unfortunately, he is ineligible for B competition, because last year he had 87 exponents and he must automatically advance two, which gives him 89 exponents.

Because Bill developed diabetes last January, his physician put his on a diet which brought his weight down to 141 pounds. It was realized by the committee that in exceptional cases this could be done, but if exceptions were made, we would have to permit any boy to sweat down and lose weight in order to make a lower classification. It was therefore moved, seconded and carried to deny a waiver of our classification rule in order to permit Bill Castro to compete in Class B football at Pioneer HS.

3. ELIGIBILITY CASES —

a. Denied a request for a waiver of the previous semester rule in the case of Larry White, a student at North HS in Riverside.

b. Denied a request for a waiver of the residence rule in the case of Kim Ginnever of Simi HS and Mike Griffith of Corona HS.
