

CROWD CONTROL WORKSHOP HIGHLY SUCCESSFUL

Three words best describe a two-day workshop on Crowd Control for Athletic Contests held in late August at University of Southern California—a fantastic success.

Conducted by CIF, SS, in conjunction with the California Association of Secondary School Administrators, District Councils 18 and 19, the event attracted approximately 325 persons. Participants represented 140 schools, two county offices and the National Football League.

First day's session was highlighted by informative address from Dave Levy, U.S.C. assistant football coach, Frank Bolden, Director, Department of Health, Physical Education, Athletics and Safety, public schools in District of Columbia, Robert Wirth, stadium manager, Parma (Ohio) Public Schools, and deputy district attorney Arnold Guminski.

Martin Ortiz, Director of Mexican American Studies at Whittier College, City of Inglewood administrative assistant Chuck Miller, and Winston Nelson, Pomona Unified School District superintendent, headed panels during the second day's activities.

Development of management papers which will be mailed to all schools was a vital function of those attending the working conference and participants divided into small groups to examine several areas of concern. Topics under discussion were Game Site Systems Program, Community Systems Support Programs, Schools Systems Support Program and Public Media Systems Support Program.

CIF, SS, commissioner J. Kenneth Fagans chaired the Steering and Conference Planning Committee that cultivated the program. He received invaluable assistance from Dr. Richard Perry, associate professor of physical education at U.S.C. who served as Conference Coordinator. Also on the committee were Nelson, Ted Gossard, Principal of Aviation High, Buena Park Principal Dick Spaulding, Miraleste High vice principal Ed Moore, William Barnes, Long Beach

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Football Practice Opening Date Moved Up 1 Week for 1970 Season

All schools are, at the present time, concerned with the current football season.

Your attention is invited, however, to a change in Article XLII, Section 22, of the Blue Book which pertains to the opening day of organized football practice in 1970.

A recent ruling by the CIF, SS, Council has established Monday, Aug. 31, 1970, instead of Sept. 8, as the opening day of organized football practice next year.

The first football game in 1970 may be scheduled on the weekend of

Sept. 18 or 19. This could cause problems if you have a practice football game scheduled with a school from the Los Angeles City or San Diego sections as their seasons will not be advanced.

It is suggested that all athletic directors check their 1970 football schedules to determine whether or not conflicts will exist with other section schools because of Southern Section practice beginning a week earlier than normal.

Remember—this exception is for the 1970 football season only.

Aquatic Poster Contest Opens

Inspired by the overwhelming success of last year's Aquatics Photography competition, CIF, SS, in cooperation with Kalos Kagathos Foundation will conduct its first annual Aquatics Art Poster contest.

Competition is designed to stimulate interest and participation in water polo, and develop art students' interest in aquatic design. It is open to all students at CIF, SS, member-schools where water polo is fielded.

Judging is to be done by the staff of Advertising Designers, Inc., and prizes, provided by Kalos Kagathos, will be awarded.

First 10 finishers are to receive citations of merit, and their works will be published in the CIF, SS, water polo annual report, a professionally edited magazine which is mailed to educators and administrators nationwide. It also serves as the water polo championship program at CIF finals.

Cash prizes go to first through sixth place winners; first warrants \$200, \$100 is given the runner-up, third is worth \$75, and fourth through sixth earns \$25 each. Athletic eligibility or amateur standing is not jeopardized for receiving cash since competition has nothing to do with athletic ability.

The contest is viewed as an outstanding way to help promote aquatic sports in Southern California, and CIF, SS, encourages participation. Rules or answer to questions may be obtained by telephoning the CIF office.

CIF, SOUTHERN SECTION, EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING SEPTEMBER 18, 1969

The September meeting of the CIF, Southern Section, Executive Committee was called to order by Chairman Steve Miletich, at 1:30 p.m. on Thursday, September 18, 1969 at the CIF office.

The following members were in attendance: Chairman Miletich, vice-principal, Beverly Hills High School; Dr. Russ Reynolds, President of S.S. Council, principal, Big Bear High School; Keith Lee, principal, Yucca Valley High School; Msgr. Thomas Kiefer, principal, Bishop Amat High School; Keith Gunn, principal, Victor Valley High School; Claud Hardesty, principal, Santa Barbara High School; Art Hobson, Assistant Superintendent, Whittier Union High School District; Alex Alexander, Assistant Superintendent, Desert Sands Unified District; James Faul, principal, Workman High School; Ferren Christensen, principal, Westminster High School; Commissioner of Athletics, J. Kenneth Fagans and Lou Joseph, Administrative Assistant, CIF office. Dr. Hanford Rants, principal, Gahr High School and chairman of Southeastern area Releaguings Committee was a guest at the meeting.

1. APPROVED MINUTES—It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the Minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of July 10, 1969 as published in the September, 1969, Monthly Bulletin.

2. CALIFORNIA SCHOOL FOR DEAF—It was moved, seconded and carried to allow California School for the Deaf to schedule a basketball game with a related deaf school in Berkeley and Arizona.

3. COMPETITION WITH ARIZONA SCHOOLS—Because of scheduling difficulties and distance involved, it was moved, seconded and carried to allow Eagle Mountain High School to schedule two Arizona schools in basketball for the coming season.

4. DOWNEY HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT—Dr. Arnold Finch, Superintendent, Downey Schools; Mr. Gus Shiney, principal, Warren High School; and Mr. Moe Chavez, newly appointed principal at Downey High School, appeared before the committee to request further consideration of their request for withdrawal from the Coast League. Dr. Hanford Rants, chairman of the Southeastern releaguings area discussed the outcome of his special meeting in May with the principals of the 54 schools in the Southeast

area. Mr. Ferren Christensen related the findings of his special study committee assigned to study the Coast League situation. It was the consensus of opinion that the philosophy and study of the entire releaguings structure should be undertaken with possible action by the 1971-72 school year.

5. NOGALES SANCTIONED GOLF TOURNAMENT—February 12, 1970, Lincoln's Birthday is not a holiday in some districts, Nogales High School Invitational is limited only to schools that are on a holiday schedule, since this event begins before the 3:00 p.m. starting time.

6. SMOG—The CIF office has had a deluge of phone calls and letters regarding the recent APCD Recommendations on School Smog Warning. The CIF office, being appraised of the situation in the middle of August, was not able to call an Executive Committee meeting as most school people were on vacation. The Commissioner in his contacts with the Los Angeles County Superintendent's office and other districts, sent to all Principals and Superintendents in Los Angeles County guidelines to be followed for the present. It is recommended that leagues meet and implement these guidelines for this year. The chairman was instructed to appoint a committee to study the problem and meet with the Medical Association and the APCD to develop recommendations and guidelines for future action by the schools.

7. GIRLS ATHLETIC PROGRAM—The Executive Committee instructed the Commissioner to survey the principals in the Southern Section to find out the sentiment and interest of their school in a Girl's Athletic program. There is an increasing interest and demand being exhibited all over the country for Girl's Athletics. If we are to have a girl's athletic program, the feeling prevailed, it should be under CIF auspices and not a separate organization to handle it. The survey taken by the State CIF a few years ago will be researched and a new instrument will be prepared, so results may be obtained prior to the January, SS, Council meeting.

8. GYMNASTIC CHANGES—Gymnastic recommendations: The sport of gymnastic has not been reviewed for the past 10 to 11 years. A meeting of Gymnastic Coaches was held last

spring at the request of the CIF, SS, to find out how this sport should be updated. In light of the survey results, it was moved, seconded, and carried to recommend to the SS Council the following changes in the Gymnastic By Laws:

1. LONG HORSE—All long horse vaults should have standardized values according to F.I.G. rules. Two different vaults, to be done consecutively, will be required of each competitor.

2. SCORING—Adopt a scoring method whereby the top three scores of competitors from the same school in each event would be totaled and averaged to arrive at their team's score for that event. Five boys from each school could be entered, with the top three scores counting.

3. ROPE CLIMB—The rope climb will be phased out beginning with the 1970-71 season. This year it is left up to the leagues, if they wish to include the rope climb in their dual meet and league championship.

4. Hold a CIF, SS, team championship playoff as well as the individual championship meet.

9. PLAY-OFF COMMITTEE—There has been a number of problems that have arisen regarding the play-offs; placement in various divisions, travel allowance, use of particular type balls, first round scheduling of teams and the like. It was moved, seconded and carried to have the chairman appoint a play-off committee to develop policies to handle problems and procedures of play-offs.

10. NATIONAL FEDERATION CONFERENCE—1970—It was moved, seconded and carried that Mr. Claud Hardesty, Principal, Santa Barbara High School, and Mr. James Faul, Principal, Workman High School, would be representatives of the CIF, Southern Section, and attend the National Federation Conference in June, 1970 to be held at Seattle, Washington.

11. FINAL BUDGET REVIEW—Mr. Keith Lee, treasurer, presented the final budget for the 1969-70 fiscal year. It was moved, seconded and carried to accept his recommendation to adopt the final budget as presented.

12. REPORT ON CIF DOCUMENTARY FILM—Commissioner Ken Fagans reported to the Executive Committee, that the professionally produced film "The CIF, SS," should be finished in three weeks. The 28 minute color film depicts the operation of the CIF and contains action-packed pictures of various playoffs. It will serve as an excellent visual aid in informing communities, parents, and schools as to what the CIF is and why it functions. He suggested that if the film is good, that we should have another print available to handle the anticipated demand to view it.

13. CROWD CONTROL WORKSHOP—The CIF, SS, in conjunction with CASSA groups 18 and 19 sponsored a two day Crowd Control workshop at the University of Southern California, August 26 and 27. Over 150 schools participated with some 325 administrators, athletic directors, and coaches in attendance. It was deemed a tremendous success, as resource people were brought in to share their expertise on this important problem. Mr. Frank Bolden, Public Schools, Washington, D.C. and Mr. Robert Wirth, Stadium Manager at Parma Ohio were very helpful in sharing with us their experiences and how they have handled the problems in their area.

Management Action Papers are being developed and will be sent out to member schools shortly. The papers will contain information, guidelines, and recommendations as to what to do to insure good Crowd Control procedures.

14. FOOTBALL PRACTICE—1970—For the 1970 season only. Since the SS Council has moved the beginning of the football season for 1970 to September 1, it was moved, seconded and carried that August 31 being Monday, schools would be allowed to begin their football practice on August 31 in 1970.

15. AWARD RULE—The CIF State Federation Council has changed its award rule which now makes it legal for sectional championship teams to receive awards up to \$25.00. This will now allow Boster Clubs and other organizations to buy jackets for championship teams. Since the Southern Section is now more restrictive than the state, it will be recommended to the SS Council to raise our award rule to \$25.00 and bring it in line with the recent State change.

16. DEAF STUDENTS—Downey High School District requested a clarification of the eligibility of Deaf students who are required to attend

their school from surrounding districts. The Executive Committee ruled that these students would be eligible to compete for Downey High School in athletics.

17. ELIGIBILITY CASES—It was moved, seconded and carried to waive the residence or scholastic rule to permit the following boys to be eligible to participate in interscholastic athletics effective September 18, 1969:

Beaumont High School, Raymond Hernandez; Covina High School, Dennis Giron; Edison High School, Steve Hunter; Glenn High School, Bill Fletcher; La Puente High School, Foy Eden; Murphy High School, Mark Madding; Norwalk High School, Terry Bryant; Pacific High School, Bob Moore; Pacifica High School, Augie Moore; Rancho Alamitos, Edward Silva; Rosamond High School, Kenneth Keller; Santa Barbara High School, Ed Hernandez; Simi Valley High School, Joe Gonzales; Sonora High School, Mike Briewegar; and Walnut High School, Warren Schlott.

It was moved, seconded and carried to DENY the request to waive either the residence or scholarship rule for the residence or scholastic rule for the following boys: Arcadia High School, Patrick Sullivan; Calexico High School, Robinson Brothers; Edison High School, Gary Root; Riverside High School, John Gilmore; Rolling Hills High School, Chris Boyce; and Santa Barbara High School, Mike Fryer.

It was moved, seconded, and carried to DENY the request to waive the residence rule for varsity competition for: Michael Moger of Pius X High School and Alison Hallstead of Western High School. However, both boys may request a transfer form #99 and be made eligible for class level teams other than varsity.

It was moved, seconded and carried to further investigate the petition of Ventura High School, Dave Hirneise, for eligibility.

There being no further business to come before the committee, the meeting was adjourned at 5:30 p.m.

Currently 441 secondary schools enjoy membership in the Southern Section. Of these 339 are senior high schools located in Southern California which field a full complement of athletic teams.

Associate memberships have been granted to 11 out-of-state high schools in Arizona and Nevada for purposes of scheduling games with border-area California schools.

Ninety-one Southland junior high schools are also associate members with membership in these schools limited to ninth graders, who are subject to all CIF, SS, eligibility rules.

Junior high school participation in interscholastic athletics is rapidly increasing as more and more schools discover the value of competition.

Water Polo Posts to Fagans, Parrish

The success of the Southern California water polo program has been recognized with the appointment of two recognized authorities to the U.S. Olympic Water Polo Games Committee.

They are:
—J. Kenneth Fagans, commissioner of CIF, SS.

—Mason Parrish, efficient and respected polo coach at Buena High in Ventura.

Fagans, who will serve as an administrative representative, and Parrish, spokesman for coaches, are the only committee members associated with high schools.

Fagans has directed section final

competition in water polo for the past several years. The finals annually represent the highest caliber of competition for high school athletes in the nation.

An illustration is that the majority of U.S. Olympic team members from 1948 to 1968 got their start in Southern California high schools. In 1952, the entire team was composed of members of El Segundo High School squads from 1947 to 1952.

The committee is responsible for developing plans for selecting representative teams to participate in both the Pan American and Olympic games. It also raises funds to send teams abroad, and selects coaches and squad managers.

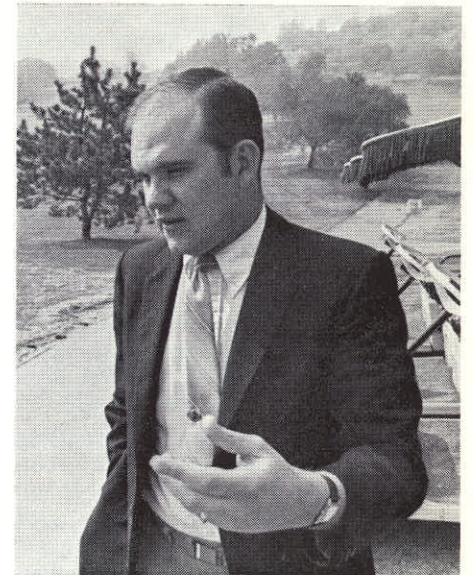

The idea for such a workshop was
 conceived when it was noted confron-
 tations between students, itinerant visi-
 tors and young adults—in and out of
 stadiums across the land—were grow-
 ing with alarming frequency.

It was felt by the CIF, SS, that de-
 velopment of systematic organizational
 plans in crowd control at athletic
 events were necessary if the educa-
 tional values of athletic contests were
 to be truly significant. Strengthening
 human relations between competing
 schools of different ethnic origins was
 also deemed vital.

Football Celebrates Centennial This Year

The entire nation is busy saluting this year as the centennial season of football, and the CIF, SS, is pleased to be a part of the celebration.

It was 100 years ago that Princeton and Rutgers pioneered the sport at Brunswick, N.J., playing the game on successive Saturdays—Nov. 6 and 13. Rutgers won the first, 6 to 4, and Princeton took the second, 8-0. Both duels were contested under soccer rules.

While all high schools are urged to do what they can to support the centennial, the 100th anniversary for prep football is still a few years away.

In 1876, a prep team representing Andover, Mass., clashed with a group from Exeter, N.H., in what is on record as the first high school grid contest in chironical files. The exact schools involved has never been established.

The history of football actually dates back to about the 11th century. Legend has it that August Caesar, first emperor of Rome (63 B.C.-14 A.D.) ruled out the sport for his soldiers.

The reason? He considered the game "too tame" for men of war.

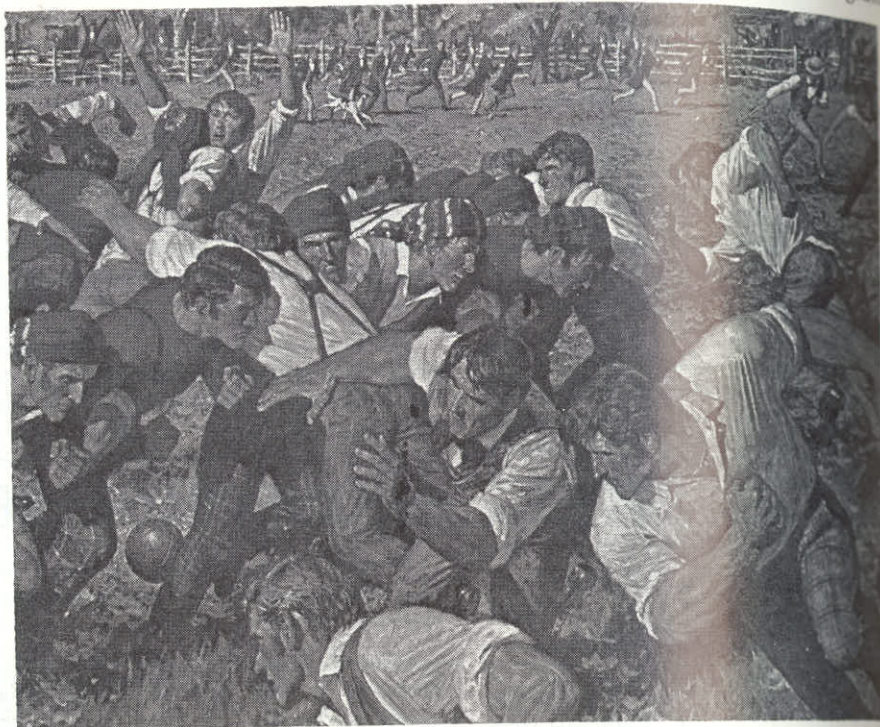
Soccer—the parent game of football, undeniably originated in England about the 11th century. Historians guess the ancient Greeks played the

sport under the name of harpastum.

Football, as such, supposedly originated in Sparta, adopted by the Romans and banned about the dawn of the Christian Era.

Since the Greeks, then the Greeks

and the Romans, indulged in Olympic Games for many centuries, in which they featured the sports known to those times, it is rather strange that football—if it really existed—never found its way to any Olympic program.

3½ MILLION VIEW SS FOOTBALL IN 1968

How popular is prep football as a spectator sport? Would you believe CIF, SS, games attracted 3½ million viewers last year?

That's the figure compiled by J. Kenneth Fagans, Commissioner of the CIF, for the 1968 season, and of the total, 275,189 witnessed playoff contests.

It is urgent that these films be located since similar ones will not be available for distribution prior to Sept. 1970.

A new Wrestling Film on Officiating has been received from the National Federation Film Service Bureau.

This film is excellent for instructional purposes, and coaches are encouraged to show it to their wrestling teams.

In order to schedule this outstanding teaching aid, coaches should contact the CIF office.

Largest crowd at any one game last year was 20,010 at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum, location of the St. Paul-El Rancho 4A championship game that ended in a 20-20 tie.

Top individual attractions were Anaheim, which averaged over 10,000 per game, and Westminster, which averaged better than 8,000.

—C. Merrill Green, retired educator and former coach at South Pasadena High School from 1927 to 1961.

—Bill Seinsoth, 22, CIF, SS, baseball Player of the Year in 1965. Mr. Green passed away July 25. His 1946 basketball team captured the CIF title, and he had been honored by the So. California Basketball Coaches Association for 25 years of meritorious service to the game.

Seinsoth, 1968 College World Series Most Valuable Player while playing for the NCAA champion U.S.C. team, was killed in an automobile accident Sept. 6 near Barstow.

In his senior year at Arcadia High, Seinsoth compiled a 15-1 pitching record, and he batted the Apaches to a 3A crown.
