COOPERATIVE EFFORT PLANNED

The CIF-Southern Section announces a new three-year program with the National Athletic Health Institute, one which will be the foremost of its kind in the area of sports injury prevention throughout the United States. The Institute will be providing educational materials on the care and prevention of athletic injuries for all sports in each CIF-SS Sports Preview. The NAHI also plans to work closely with the CIF-SS to conduct regional sports medicine seminars. Topics, such as emergency care of fractures, lacerations, head and neck injuries, heat exhaustion, sprains, strains, taping, nutrition and drugs, will be covered.

"One of the most important aspects in the prevention of sports injuries is education of the individuals who are taking part in and supervising the activity" says Dr. Robert K. Kerlan (Co-Founder of NAHI along with Dr. Frank W. Jobe).

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SUPERINTENDENT-SCHOOL BOARD SYMPOSIUM

In pursuit of our communication's goal, the CIF-Southern Section is hosting a Superintendent-School Board Symposium at Industry Hills Convention Center, Tuesday, October 13, 1981. The symposium is especially designed to re-orient school board members and district superintendents to the California Interscholastic Federation, Southern Section, and to the school achievement, sportsmanship and wholesome entertainment high school athletics offer to young people.

Master of Ceremonies for this event will be Dr. Maury Ross, Superintendent, Tustin Unified School District, and keynoting the symposium will be attorney Richard Ball.

Mr. Ball is a trial lawyer from Phoenix, Arizona. Throughout his career he has concentrated heavily on the handling of personal injury litigation, primarily for the defense. During the past five years, he has developed extensive experience in cases involving athletic injuries.

Mr. Ball served as a member of the trial team in the landmark Riddell Corporation case. Mr. Ball voices a concern that despite improvements in the quality of equipment, coaching and rules, the number of suits being filed is on the increase.

Workshop sessions and a panel discussion also highlight this event which concludes with a luncheon at the Industry Hills Convention Center site.

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MINUTES OF THE CIF-SOUTHERN SECTION EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING OF JUNE 20, 1981

The meeting of the California Interscholastic Federation, Southern Section Executive Committee was called to order by Chairman Dr. Hanford Rants at 9 a.m. at the Riviera Hotel in Palm Springs. All members were present including guests Mr. Thomas E. Byrnes and Mr. Ken Fagans.

1. COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE: Mr. Ray Plutko thanked the members of the Committee and his staff for a successful year, also indicating a possible TV package for the Football Championships of the Southern Section for the fall of 1981.

2. BOYS' ATHLETIC DIRECTOR UPDATE: Mr. Clyde Francisco, Boys' Athletic Director Representative, commented on the successful playoff season, indicating the positive experience gained by both staff and students. Also stated, were concerns of future financing for athletics, as well as the question of participation fees.

3. GIRLS' ATHLETIC DIRECTOR UPDATE: Mrs. Barbara Wilson, Girls' Athletic Director Representative, reported the efforts of several women, in particular Ms. Jan McCreery, Crescenta Valley HS, in gathering support for Senate Bill 19 from women currently active in athletics in the Southern Section.

4. SUPERINTENDENT'S UPDATE: Dr. Maury Ross, Superintendent's Representative, reported on the need for continued CSBA involvement with the CIF

Southern Section and residential eligibility problems currently being encountered by school districts. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to ask the CIF Southern Section Eligibility Committee to address the question of residence eligibility at its next meeting.

5. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL:

(a) **Section Relations Committee:** Dr. Robert Packer updated the Committee on the work of the Section Relations Committee, giving a historical perspective on how the State CIF came to be structured into ten CIF sections. Dr. Packer also reported that the proposed Orange County Section failed to receive a majority vote of its schools to proceed with a plan for a possible CIF Orange County Section.

(b) **State Rule 214:** Dr. Hanford Rants explained new CIF Rule 214 and indicated 214 would replace Form 99. Following discussion it was moved, seconded and passed to utilize the Southern Section's standard appeals procedure for State Rule 214.

(c) **CIF Protection Fund Proposal:** Mr. Tony Balsamo reviewed action by the State Federated Council to accept the offer of Great Republic Life Insurance with regard to the CIF Protection Fund. In addition, Mr. Balsamo indicated the State CIF will relocate its offices in the Southern California area within the next six months.

CIF PROTECTION FUND SOLD

The CIF Administrative Committee concluded an agreement with Great Republic Life Insurance Company on August 7, 1981. Terms of the agreement include the lease and sale of the California Interscholastic Federation Protection Fund building in Santa Barbara, purchase of the California Interscholastic Federation Protection Fund physical assets, assumption of the California Interscholastic Federation 1981-82 student accident coverages, and an administrative agreement to pay claims incurred under previous school year California Interscholastic Federation Protection Fund coverages.

Recently this condition has changed and the California Interscholastic Federation believes it has accomplished its task, and can best serve high school athletics by focusing on other areas of need.

The California Interscholastic Federation will remain a contributing factor to the benefit of California students by serving in an advisory capacity to Great Republic Life Insurance Company. The California Interscholastic Federation will endorse student insurance programs offered by Great Republic Life Insurance which will provide for the insurance needs of students and athletes.

DAVIS MOVES TO STATE CIF POSITION

Margaret Davis, who became the first full-time woman administrator with the Southern Section Office seven years back, has duplicated that effort at yet another level of the California Interscholastic Federation.

Davis has accepted a similar position in the State CIF Office and assumed her new duties earlier this month — the initial woman to hold such a position at the State level.

The native of San Diego and graduate of Rosary High School and San Diego State University, was largely responsible for the organizational phase of girls' interscholastic athletics within the CIF-SS during its formative years and served under three different commissioners.

"Margaret's professional growth in this instance is the Southern Section's loss," said Commissioner Ray Plutko.

"She's a unique and talented individual in her profession and a positive influence on what many of us consider to be the other half of education. Fortunately, Margaret will be in a position to continue her skills with the CIF throughout the State. Thus, in one respect, it's only a partial loss."

Davis has also been instrumental in her work with Senate Bill 19 and was selected to serve on the National Federation Field Hockey Rules Committee. Her experience with the Southern Section has ranged from various boys' and girls' sport responsibilities, sanctioned events, public relations and publicity, publications including the Blue Book, Directory, CIF-SS "Bulletin", Sport and Playoff Calendar to eligibility.

Prior to her position with the Southern Section, Davis was a highly successful basketball coach and athletic director at Poway High School in the San Diego Section.

NATIONAL CONFERENCE FOR ATHLETIC DIRECTORS SET FOR LAS VEGAS

More than 1,600 athletic administrators, spouses and exhibitors are expected to converge on Las Vegas, Nevada, on December 6-9, 1981, when the National Federation hosts its Twelfth Annual National Conference of High School Directors of Athletics at Caesars Palace.

The Conference has also been designated as the site for the Annual Meeting of the National Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association.

This year's Conference program features some truly outstanding speakers at four general sessions, three seminars and three Conference meal functions. Conference attendees will have their choice of 16 different topics offered during workshop sessions, including Assistance for the New Athletic Director, Booster Clubs, Coaching Requirements, Personnel Action Procedures, Computer Update, Crowd Management, Declining Enrollments, Facility Care and Maintenance, Program Promotion, and Staff Organization and Communications. There also will be the popular round table discussion groups and workshops for special interest groups such as private schools, junior high schools, large city districts and female administrators.

The Keynote Address at the Opening General Session, "Appointment With Success," will be given by Bjorn Secher of Fort Lauderdale, Florida, a nationally known authority on personal development and self-discovery. Mr. Secher will also make a presentation at the Second General Session on Monday morning on "The responsibilities of a Leader."

"More Than Winning" is the title of the Luncheon Address by Glen Tuckett, Director of Athletics at Brigham Young University.

"You Better Believe It" is the title of the Banquet Address by Dr. Thomas Tutko, the nationally known sports psychologist from San Jose, California.

(d) O.C.R./Women's Academy Compliances: Mrs. Barbara Wilson presented the State CIF recommendation for final compliance with the OCR Report of October 10, 1979. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to ask the CIF Southern Section Blue Book Committee to review same with a report back to the Executive Committee.

(e) San Diego/L.A. City Section's Sanction: Mr. Ray Plutko, commissioner, reviewed the action of the State CIF Federated Council regarding intersectional competition with San Diego and Los Angeles in specified sports, effective the 1981-82 school year.

6. LEGAL UPDATE: Mr. Andrew Patterson, CIF-SS attorney, reviewed the question of handicapped eligibility as well as several pending court cases in other states, the outcome of which may have implications for high school athletics.

7. STATE COMMISSIONER'S REPORT: Mr. Tom Byrnes, State CIF Commissioner, outlined action to date by the State CIF Office including liability coverage for all CIF Sections, the stipulation with the Women's Coaches Academy, the new "committee system" at State meetings and congratulated the Southern Section for its outstanding performance in conducting the State Track Meet.

8. SENATE BILL 19 UPDATE: Mrs. Barbara Wilson, chairwoman of the State CIF Legislative Committee, reviewed the current status of SB 19, as well as reviewed the amendments offered by the Assembly Sub-Committee.

9. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE VACANCIES: Dr. Hanford Rants and Mr. Ray Plutko, speaking for the Administrative Committee, reviewed vacancies on the Executive Committee and forwarded the following recommendations for consideration to the Executive Committee:

It was moved, seconded and passed to deny the request of Whitney School.

11. YESHIVA HS REQUEST: It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the request of Yeshiva HS to compete against St. Anthony's Seminary in basketball for the 1981-82 season.

12. SANCTION EVENT STARTING TIME: Ms. Margaret Davis, administrative assistant, outlined present and past practices with regard to the 3 p.m. starting time for CIF Southern Section sanctioned events. The Executive Committee indicated its approval of current office procedures regarding this regulation.

13. RIVERSIDE POLY HS UPDATE: Mr. Ray Plutko reviewed the status of the Mike Churchill case, which a petition for writ of mandate was denied by the Superior Court.

14. DIRECTOR'S LIABILITY RENEWAL: Mr. Tony Balsamo apprised the Executive Committee of our renewed liability policy.

15. LEGISLATION UPDATE: Mr. Ray Plutko, commissioner, updated the Committee regarding current California legislation as outlined from Mr. John Klumb's office.

There being no further business to come before the Committee, the meeting adjourned at 2:30 p.m.

OFFICIALS AND COACHES ORGANIZATIONS ESTABLISHED



The National Federation Council acted January 6 in New Orleans to establish national professional organizations for high school coaches and officials. Separate organizations for coaches and officials will be operative beginning with the 1981-82 school year and be named the National Federation Interscholastic Coaches Association (NFICA) and National Federation Interscholastic Officials Association (NFIOA).

An ad hoc committee was appointed by the National Federation's Executive Committee to prepare recommendations for the initial organization of these two associations. The ad hoc committee submitted several recommendations which have subsequently been refined and approved for immediate implementation by the Executive Committee.

STATE ASSOCIATIONS INVOLVEMENT SIGNIFICANT

A fundamental principle underlying the establishment and continuity of the NFICA and the NFIOA is the direct administrative and cooperative involvement of state associations. Such participation by state associations should be a basic benefit to the high school coaching and officiating professions which cannot be realized by membership in any other professional organization. Although membership in each association

will be on an individual basis, it will permit an individual to be part of a national organization which is an integral part of, rather than extraneous to, the national and state bodies actually having the responsibility and authority for the promulgation of playing rules and the administration of high school sports in the United States. The unmatched advantage accruing to individual coaches and officials because of this integral relationship will be the opportunity for professional growth while being represented through their own national professional organizations in providing meaningful input in a variety of ways to programs affecting them and administered by high school organizational sports authorities.

PURPOSES AND OBJECTIVES OUTLINED

The NFICA and NFIOA will share common purposes and objectives in that basically the organizations will provide for professional growth of the individuals in their respective professions; provide services and enhance the image of interscholastic coaches and officials; provide for cooperation and development of prestige of their respective professions through the efforts and coordination of state high school associations; provide an effective system of communications in each state between individual sports officials and

coaches, local and regional associations, state organizations and the National Federation; and advance and preserve the educational nature of interscholastic athletics for boys and girls in the curricula of schools.

ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE

Both the NFICA and NFIOA will be governed by their own separate board of directors made up of eight individuals, one from each of the eight geographical sections of the United States corresponding to the eight National Federation sections. Initially, the boards of directors will be nominated by state associations in those eight sections and selected by the National Federation Executive Committee.

SPORTSLINE AVAILABLE NATIONWIDE

The Women's Sports Foundation's toll-free SPORTSLINE, formerly provided to callers in California, became available nationwide on May 1, 1981, it was announced by Foundation president and NBC sportscaster Donna de Varona.

The SPORTSLINE, funded in part by the runners on the 1981 Bonne Bell Race Circuit, provides all interested individuals, researchers, editors, media representatives, athletes, coaches and journalists resource information, contacts and referrals on all areas of women's sports. The SPORTSLINE will not, however, act as a hotline for results of games, matches, tournaments, meets or other women's sports events.

The toll-free number for California callers is 800-652-1455. The national number is 800-227-3988. The national number became operative May 1, 1981; it does not service Alaska and Hawaii.

The Women's Sports Foundation, established in 1974, works to promote women and girls' involvement in sports and to provide greater opportunity for women at every level of sport.

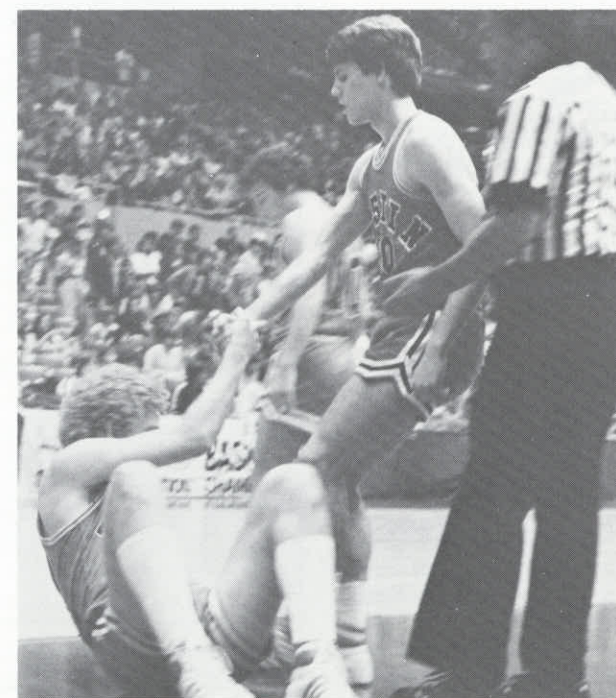

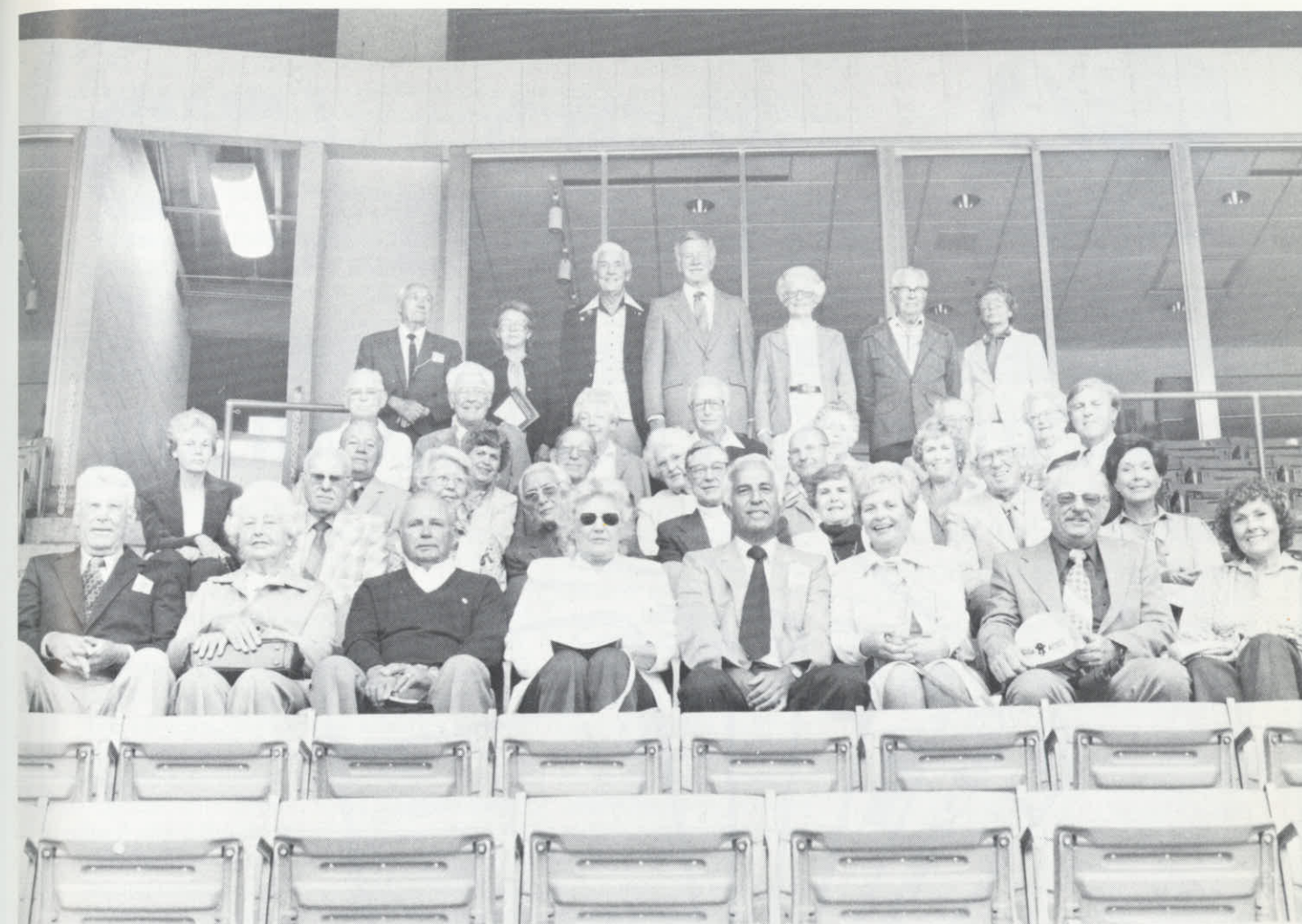

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In discussing the project, Ray Plutko, Commissioner of the Southern Section, states, "I am simply elated in developing the working relationship with the National Athletic Health Institute.

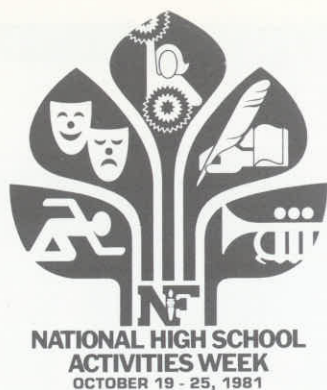
