# MINUTES OF THE CIF SOUTHERN SECTION EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING August 28, 1982

The August meeting of the Executive Committee of the California Interscholastic Federation was called to order by Chairman Dr. Robert Packer at 9:30 a.m. on Saturday, August 28, 1982 at the Coto de Caza Conference Center in Orange County. All members were present.

1. APPROVAL OF MINUTES: It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the minutes of the June 19, 1982 meeting of the CIF Southern Section Executive Committee as mailed.

2. PRESIDENT'S UPDATE: Dr. Robert Packer introduced new Executive Committee members Mr. Gerald Harer, principal, Pacific Christian HS; Fr. Charles Hill, principal, Pius X HS; H. L. Looney, principal, Troy HS; and Lon Hardgrave, assistant principal, La Sierra HS.

Dr. Packer reviewed the purpose and role of Executive Committee members in representing constituants in their respective areas and stressed the responsibility to stimulate communication at all levels of the CIF Southern Section.

3. COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE: Mr. Ray Plutko apprised the Committee of the Southern Section Office summer activities and upcoming plans. The Commissioner outlined details of the recently conducted National Athletic Health Institute (NAHI) Football coaches' and team doctors' workshop and updated the Committee on the spring regional workshops that will be conducted by NAHI.

The Commissioner reviewed with the Committee plans for the upcoming Athletic Administrators' Symposium; continued efforts in the area of communication with the schools via the monthly Principals' and Athletic Directors' Newsletters; work in the area of corporate sponsorship for CIF-SS activities; the CIF-SS Story brochure to be released in October; staff in-service and the "Know Your Blue Book Day" regional workshops which will be conducted during the 1983-84 school year. Also highlighted were the new eligibility posters, the new Blue Book format and the "Focus on High School Activities Week", which will be a major project of the Office during the period of October 18-30, 1982.

4. BOYS' A.D. UPDATE: Mr. Clyde Francisco reported on the start of fall activities and the very positive reaction to the new Blue Book.

5. GIRLS' A.D. UPDATE: Mrs. Sheila Burrud reported on the upcoming Girls' fall sport season, and the new materials supplied by the CIF-SS Office.

6. SUPERINTENDENTS' UPDATE: Dr. Maury Ross stressed with the Committee the importance of communication with superintendents and board members.

7. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL: (a) STATE REPRESENTATION — Mr. Tony Balsamo reviewed with the Committee representation and voting structure on the State Federated Council.

(b) STATE ELIGIBILITY STANDARDS — Mrs. Barbara Wilson reviewed with the Committee the eligibility discussion points as submitted by the State Eligibility Committee. These points will be reviewed by the State Federated Council at its upcoming October meeting.

(c) CONTINUATION SCHOOL — Mr. Moe Chavez reviewed with the Committee a request to the State Federated Council on self-referred students to be eligible for athletics. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to maintain the earlier position of non-support as originally processed.

(d) SECTION RELATIONS — Dr. Packer reviewed the concepts of alignment and current correspondence to principals and superintendents throughout the State regarding Section realignment.

(e) MEDIA PROMOTION — Mr. Tony Balsamo reported on the five-year television contract signed for State Basketball Championship activities, which will be hosted this school year by the Southern Section at the Los Angeles Sports Arena on March 19, 1983.

8. TREASURER'S REPORT: Mr. Bruce Keuning reviewed the recently completed auditor's review, with a final written version to be ready for the CIF-SS Council.

#### PLAYOFF PAIRING FORMAT

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is the first in a series of feature articles by Commissioner Ray Plutko, dealing with administrative procedures and areas of eligibility by the CIF Southern Section Office. This month's feature centers on the playoff pairings.

"How in the world did I ever draw them for the opening round of the playoffs?"

With that introduction, let's take an in-depth look at the protocol utilized by the CIF Southern Section Office in the development of post-season playoff pairings.

Despite some thoughts to the contrary, there is a procedure to this madness. However, it is necessary to grasp an understanding of the task and the conditions in which it takes place.

Initially, administrators and coaches should be aware there are three peak periods in which pairings are formulated — November, February and May — with the CIF-SS Office handling no less than five different sports at any one time and as high as nine at one juncture.

However, the overall task becomes even more complicated when developing pairings for a sport which fields both Boys' and Girls' teams at the same time, i.e., basketball, soccer, baseball/softball.

Possibly, the following summary statement places the task in perspective

. . . this fall there will be 512 openinground playoff pairings required, all to be formulated in the span of two 24-hour periods!

## How then, does the CIF-SS Office meet this challenge?

SEEDS — The initial step is to designate four teams (maximum) as seeds, with No. 1 and 4 placed in the top bracket and No. 2 and 3 in the bottom bracket (see Diagram 1). An exception to this procedure would be if seeds in the same half of the bracket are from the same league. If this occurs, and using the example of the top half of the bracket, No. 4 would then become the No. 3 seed and No. 3 would fill the No. 4 position to separate the league representation.

## Is it possible to designate more than four seeds?

The task would be virtually impossible on two counts. Attempting to delineate which team is the No. 7 seed, as opposed to No. 8 or No. 12 rather than No. 13 would result in 25 different answers by 25 different people. Additionally, an attempt at a "true seed" would be in opposition to the CIF-SS Constitution and By-Laws, which spe-




cify a league's designated No. 1 entry shall meet a No. 3 entry and a No. 2 shall meet another No. 2 where the draw provides for same in the opening round.

FILLING THE DRAW — The next step is to fill the bracket draw and a simple guideline provides the ground-rules for same. Assuming for the moment the top four seeds are all No. 1 teams, the procedure calls for the No. 2 teams from each of these leagues to be

placed in the opposite half of the bracket (see Diagram 2).

Consider there are five leagues assigned to this particular bracket, it now becomes necessary to place the only league not represented thus far, League D. The No. 1 designee is placed in either half of the bracket, with League D #2 in the opposite half (see Diagram 3).

The final step is to place the No. 3 teams from each of the respective leagues in the open slots, attempting to



place each in one of the remaining "quarters" of the bracket where the league is not represented. This process eliminates the aspect of schools from the same league meeting in the second round of competition.

An exception to this procedure occurs where geography does not permit wide placement. The Office then follows the directive of the CIF Southern Section Council from its meeting of March 13, 1980, which directs schools be placed in the same half and if necessary, quarter of the bracket to curtail excessive travel.

Another factor utilized by the Office when formulating initial pairings is to review the playoff bracket for the previous years in an effort not to match identical teams which may have been paired the previous year or two years back. This would not preclude two leagues being matched in consecutive years, but with two different representative schools.


#### Is it true they use a two-headed coin?

No two-headed coins nor wooden nickels are part of the playoff procedures. In fact, notice is given in all playoff bulletins that coin flips, where necessary, are conducted in public by the Commissioner or his designated administrator in the CIF-SS Lobby at 8 a.m. the morning following the contest. It should be noted all necessary coin flips are conducted, even though one or both teams involved are not present due to travel distance, etc. in order that they might be verified by other administrators and/or coaches present.

With respect to the opening round, coin flips, where necessary, are conducted in the CIF-SS Office by a principal from a member school who is not involved in the playoffs. This is necessary in that the draw must be typed with the appropriate information, duplicated and processed for telephone calls which follow a few hours later.

One major accomplishment of the Southern Section office over the last four years has been the adoption of the "wild card contest" to remove all subjectivity by way of a Selection Committee. This is accomplished in all sports with the exception of football. Wild card contests are not feasible in football in that it would create two games in a one week span and three within an eight-day period.

For all sports other than football, the wild card game matches third place designees of leagues geographically, which are then placed into a hat for a blind draw. The reasoning behind the



geographical match is to prevent undue travel as a blind draw could result in Santa Maria playing Riverside on Wednesday evening and the winner having to return two days later with another possible lengthy road contest.

Once the matchups are placed in the hat for the blind draw, a principal from a member school conducts the draw and verifies same by signing the back of each entry card for a permanent record.

It should also be noted CIF-SS Rule 2916 specifies wild card teams and free lance teams competing in the playoffs receive a third team designation for purposes of determining home and away status.

#### Is there an alternative?

The CIF Southern Section Office has communicated with other State Associations as to their method of determining playoff pairings and these have been reviewed with the Executive Committee. However, the Committee believes the present procedure is not only the most sound, but one which attempts to match schools in an effort to have the top two seeds meet in the championship contest.

But, it would be remiss not to mention alternatives:

(1) Complete Blind Draw — This would be one objective alternative, but the results could be disastrous. Such a procedure could result in two first place teams meeting in the opening round; third place finishers meeting in the opening round; the No. 1 and 2 seeds meeting in the opening round; and/or extreme travel resulting by way of a

blind draw pairing which would be perpetuated in each ensuing round.

(2) Pre-Determined Bracket Sheet — This alternative is utilized by some states whereby a rotation system is developed and the bracket is published September 1st of each year. It specifies that the No. 1 entry from League A will play the No. 3 entry from League C, etc. This method, although objective in nature, could result in the top seeds meeting in the second round or for that matter, the top four seeds being placed in the same quarter of the bracket.

(3) Combination — A third alternative might involve a combination of the two above, whereby the seeds are determined and a blind draw is conducted to complete the bracket. This could result in teams from the same league meeting in the opening round and/or being placed in the same quarter of the bracket.

However, it should also be pointed out that once the opening round is conducted, there are few who can predict the exploits of youngsters in the 15-18 age bracket and just two or three "upsets" can result in a completely different playoff picture.

Needless to say, the perfect solution would be welcomed by all. But if one objectively studies the present system being utilized and as reviewed with the CIF-SS Executive Committee, there is little doubt the procedure is one which is defined to reflect the most accurate bracket possible, while at the same time, protecting member schools in terms of financial burden.

#### INDIANAPOLIS TO HOST NATIONAL ATHLETIC DIRECTORS CONFERENCE

More than 1,800 athletic administrators, spouses and exhibitors are expected to converge on Indianapolis, Indiana, on December 12-15, 1982, when the National Federation hosts its Thirteenth Annual National Conference of High School Directors of Athletics at the Indiana Convention Center.

The conference has also been designated as the site for the Annual Meeting of the National Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association.

This year's conference features some truly outstanding speakers at five general sessions, four seminars and three conference meal functions. In addition to the general sessions and seminars, conference attendees will have their choice of 14 different topics offered during workshops sessions on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. Included will be workshops on Assistance for the New Athletic Director, The Use of Computers, Cable TV, Office Management, Coach-Athletic Director Relationships, Participation Fees, Public and News Media Relations, Staff Evaluation Techniques, Confronting Cutbacks in Staff and Programs, and Coping With Administrative Stress. There will also be the popular round table discussion groups and workshops for special interest groups such as private schools, junior high schools and large city district administrators.

The keynote address at the opening session, "Why Are We Here?" will be given by Gerry Faust, football coach at the University of Notre Dame.

Ty Boyd of Charlotte, North Carolina, nationally known speaker on motivation and seminar leader on Interpersonal Effectiveness, will deliver a general session presentation on "How To Survive in a Competitive World," as well as serve as master of ceremonies at the conference banquet.

Robert Kanaby, Executive Director of the New Jersey State Interscholastic Association, is sure to challenge meeting attendees with a sterling address on "Now That We're Here — What Do We Do?"

Other general session speakers include Dr. Herb True, noted psychologist and humorist, whose closing general session presentation, "Take Charge of Yourself," will include a powerful message about the qualities of a successful leader.

Registration forms and hotel room reservation cards will be sent to all NIAAA members, as well as athletic administrators who attended one or more of the National Conferences during the past five years. In addition, approximately 16,000 conference fliers and advance registration forms are being distributed by state high school associations and/or state athletic director associations. - 9. NATIONAL FEDERATION REPORT: Mrs. Barbara Wilson reported on the National Federation summer meetings held at Innisbrook in Tampa, Florida, and the positive reaction to presentations by CIF personnel, including Commissioner Ray Plutko.
- 10. LEGAL UPDATE: Andy Patterson, CIF-SS Attorney, reviewed recent appeal cases from other states in the area of interscholastic athletics.
- 11. WALK-ON COACH UPDATE: Mr. Pat Mauch reviewed with the Committee the July 7, 1982 bulletin from the State Board of Education, amending the State regulations governing who may coach California high school athletic teams, and the specific procedures for same.
- 12. NEW MEMBERSHIP: It was moved, seconded and passed to accept Irvine Coast Christian High School (Costa Mesa) and St. Margaret's High School (San Juan Capistrano) to full regular membership effective this date.

- 13. LIVE TELEVISION BROADCAST: Mr. Tony Balsamo updated the Committee relative to live and delayed telecasts of interscholastic activities and a report to be filed by the State CIF Office.
- 14. FOREIGN EXCHANGE PROGRAMS: Mr. Blinn Tenney provided an indepth review of the foreign exchange programs currently being offered in member high schools and the potential for recruitment of athletes, with a final review of each program to be completed by the close of the current school term.
- 15. FOCUS ON HIGH SCHOOL ACTIVITIES: Commissioner Plutko highlighted the corporate sponsorship package (Los Angeles Dodgers and Adohr Farms) and work being done by the Office to promote the special Focus on High School Activities set for October 18-29, 1982.



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



16. SOCCER PLAYOFF PROPOSAL: Mr. Dean Crowley, administrator, reviewed with the Committee a proposal to provide relief on the number of excessive overtime games during the playoffs which cause difficulties for schools in terms of travel and possible injury to participants. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to place the proposal before the Council at its September meeting.

17. STUDENT/COACH ASSOCIATION PRO-POSAL: Mr. Robert Paisola reviewed with the Committee the report of the State CIF Sections on the student/coach association and the status that movement is away from summer restrictive guidelines during the summer vacation period.

18. SPORT SANCTION FOR POST-SEASON PLAYOFFS: Commissioner Plutko reviewed the Office research on sanctioned sports for playoff purposes as it pertains to the number of participating schools. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to place the proposal before the Council at its September meeting.

There being no further business to come before the Executive Committee, the meeting was adjourned at 2:30 p.m.


