

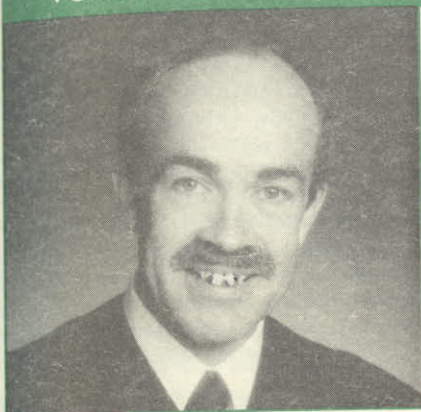

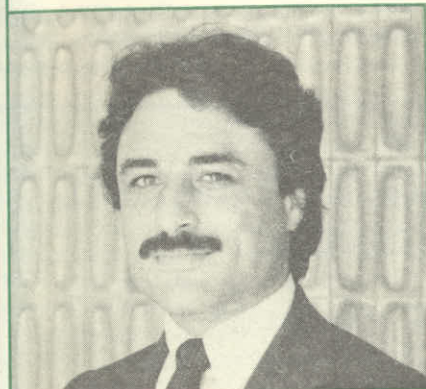

ATHLETICS TODAY

The CIF Southern Section proudly announces the Seventh Annual Symposium for our Athletic Administrators. Don't miss this year's program, scheduled for the Anaheim Convention Center on October 14, 1985. In light of today's trends and issues affecting athletics, we believe the program will be very informative and quite pertinent to the issues we'll be dealing with this upcoming year.

Focus of the 1985-86 Symposium will be on liability and managing risk. The opening session will be a simulation of "Adversary Positions" featuring the honorable Edward J. MINUTES OF THE CIF-SS EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING August 24, 1985

The August meeting of the Executive Committee of the California Interscholastic Federation, Southern Section, was called to order by Chairman Moe Chavez at 8:56 a.m. in Solvang. All members were present.

1. **MINUTES** - It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the minutes of the CIF-SS Executive Committee meeting of June 22, 1985 as mailed.

2. **PRESIDENT'S UPDATE** - Mr. Moe Chavez welcomed the entire Executive Committee to the first meeting of the new year, stressing the importance of their role as Executive Committee members. Mr. Chavez introduced new Executive Committee members Jim Carmichael, principal at Palmdale High School, who was appointed to replace the retiring Blinn Tenney; and Doug Rozelle, principal at Paramount High School, elected as the Southeast Area Representative. Mr. Chavez also introduced Cynthia Grennan, Superintendent, Anaheim Union School District, and Pat Mauch, principal of Los Altos High School, who will be the new representatives to the State Federated Council.

3. **COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE** - Mr. Ray Plutko, Commissioner, reviewed with the Committee the ongoing services of the Southern Section to member schools, duties and responsibilities assigned to individual staff members and updated the Com-

mittee on specific goals and programs for the upcoming year.

4. **BOYS' ATHLETIC DIRECTORS REPRESENTATIVE** - Mr. Mike Moropoulos, Boys' Athletic Directors Representative, discussed the continuing goal of improving communication between athletic directors at the school site and continuous support from the Tri-County Athletic Directors' Association in developing additional A.D. associations in other areas.

5. **GIRLS' ATHLETIC DIRECTORS REPRESENTATIVE** - Sheila Burrud, Girls' Athletic Directors Representative, reviewed the status and direction of state playoffs and the notation there should be no addition of other sports at this time.

6. **SUPERINTENDENTS UPDATE** - Ms. Cynthia Grennan reviewed with the Committee the recently completed Anaheim Union School District Walk-on Coaches Manual, possible legislation carried regarding the "C" average, and the sunseting of S.B. 19.

7. **TREASURER'S UPDATE** - Mr. Bruce Keuning, Treasurer, reviewed the recently completed auditor's report and reported to the Committee that the findings were excellent along with a noted surplus from the 1984-85 physical budget.

SHAKE HANDS FOR SPORTSMANSHIP PROGRAM ENTERS FOURTH YEAR

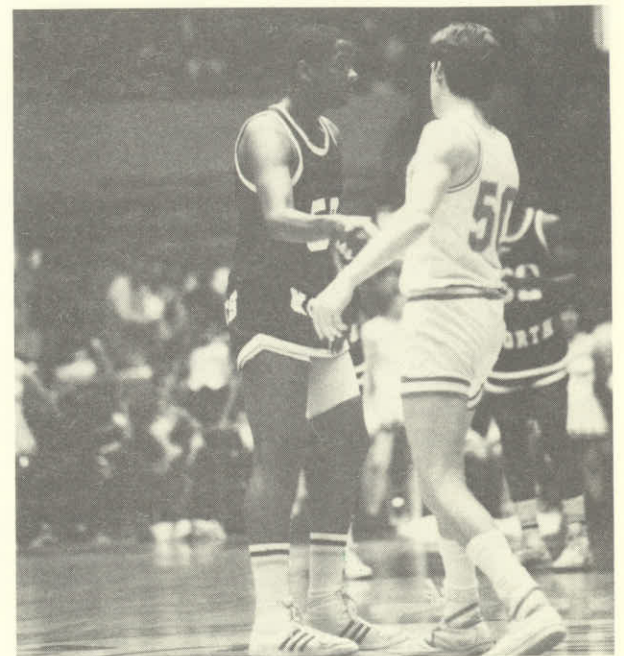
The highly successful "Shake Hands For Sportsmanship" program, sponsored jointly by the Los Angeles Dodgers and Adohr Farms Dairies, will kick off October 21-26 with "Support High School Activities Week."

The week will start out Monday, October 21 with Band & Pep Units Day, Tuesday, October 22 will feature Scholar-Athlete Day, Wednesday, October 23 promotes Community Involvement Day, Thursday, October 24 highlights Coaches-Media Day and Friday, October 25 is set as Officials Day. The week concludes with each local high school's football game.

"Character in high school students isn't just built on the fields and courts of competition," said Bill Shumard, Director of Community Services & Special Events-Los Angeles Dodgers.

CIF-SS ANNOUNCES ACADEMIC AWARDS PROGRAM

Over the course of the past few years, a great deal of attention has surfaced at the community level with regard to academic achievement in the area of interscholastic athletics. For years, the various administrative organizations have been aware of the outstanding accomplishments of these student-athletes involved, but acting independently, have been unable to achieve the desired level of promotion with these accomplishments from a public relations standpoint.

With this in mind, the CIF Southern Section has earmarked an Academic Awards Program for those involved in interscholastic athletics effective with the 1985-86 school term.

To this end, the CIF-SS Office has finalized a corporate sponsorship agreement with the Ford Motor Company to cover all costs of the program. Additionally, the California Angels will serve in a secondary role by way of providing the setting for a major awards presentation. The Academic Awards Program will consist of three phases.

PHASE I

Recognize the outstanding academic achievement on a cumulative team basis at the varsity level for all Boys and Girls sports offered. This would entail 21 team awards over the course of the school year. The winner would be determined in each Boys' and Girls' sport category on the basis of the highest cumulative grade point average of that specific team.

Guidelines were established in conjunction with the CIF-SS Office and representatives from the Ford Motor Company with an appropriate official entry blank providing the

NATIONAL ATHLETIC DIRECTORS CONFERENCE SET FOR ANAHEIM, CALIFORNIA

The National Federation's Sixteenth Annual Conference of High School Directors of Athletics will be held December 15-18, 1985, in Anaheim, California. The National Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association will hold its ninth annual meeting in conjunction with the conference at the Marriott Hotel.

These annual conferences enjoy a well-earned reputation for outstanding programs featuring a good mix of nationally known speakers and authoritative athletic administrators willing to share their ideas on timely topics of great interest to their peers.

ELIGIBILITY STANDARDS TO UNDERGO COMPLETE REVIEW

As evidenced at the most recent National Federation meeting and in research conducted by the CIF-SS Office, the areas of eligibility requires an on-going and effective evaluative process. By this means, the organization not only keeps pace the trends, but assumes the leadership role in setting the appropriate standards for its members.

With respect to current trends, an increase in single parent families, dual custody, influx of foreign exchange students and involvement of coaches with youth and summer programs more than provide the incentives for a review of existing rules.

In accomplishing this review, three avenues of input will be utilized:

1. Initial notification to all principals in October, providing background information, timetable and format to be utilized. Further, it is recommended that principals contact their respective superintendents for any recommendations at their specific level which may be incorporated in the review data.

On approximately October 15, the questionnaire forms will be forwarded to representatives of each league with directions that the review be initiated at this level. The league would be the most appropriate sector in that any subsequent proposals would again require input from the respective league principals and the CIF-SS Council.

The questionnaire will ask league representatives to identify problem areas, provide recommended changes and where appropriate, supplement with support rationale.

2. Additional recommendations will be developed upon independent research by the CIF-SS Office.
3. Also, a review and compilation of salient points from other state associations and National Federation files will be conducted.

Following the collection of data from the three areas, the Commissioner will convene a meeting of the CIF-SS Blue Book Committee which will review all materials and develop possible proposals for consideration by the CIF-SS Council.

It would be anticipated the proposals would appear on the January agenda of the CIF-SS Council, voting to take place in March and implementation of any passage to be in place by July 1, 1986.

CHEMICAL AND DRUG ABUSE SUPPORT PROGRAM

Alcohol, drugs and youth . . . it's a concern we all share. Many people have been reluctant to accept the fact that student chemical use is as widespread as a number of sources suggest. The concept that the student-athlete is not involved or immune to these problems must be re-examined. Educating ourselves and sharing that knowledge is one preventive means we can all take.

With this in mind, the CIF-SS Office has begun the task of developing/exploring this much needed base of information to assist school administrators and coaches in planning and implementing chemical awareness activities that meet the needs of their respective schools and communities.

The first step took the form of a major presentation of the 1984 CIF-SS Athletic Administrators Symposium. Other organizations are beginning to take such steps. The NCAA has created a full time department and the National Federation of State High School Associations has hired a full time staff member in an effort to combat the problem and further educate their respective constituencies. The apparent need and searching for a leadership position is further evidenced by the number of calls the CIF-SS Office received following its symposium presentation last year.

Future plans of the CIF Southern Section for developing the awareness base will be to develop a supplemental service which will take the form of:

1. Additional presentations at the 1985 CIF-SS Athletic Administrators Symposium with follow-up survey of member schools of current or planned programs.
2. Survey and gathering of the information from other athletic associations on current chemical awareness activities with information obtained to be made available to member schools.
3. Development of CIF-SS film or video library of up-to-date information from which to draw.
4. Further workshops as pertinent information becomes available.
5. Dissemination of information to member schools as it becomes available, in particular, by way of the National Federation.
6. Up-to-date information on current programs of member schools to be updated yearly.

It is the belief of the CIF Southern Section that these initial steps would be augmented with current and timely information and be the platform for the development and implementation of comprehensive and realistic programs of response, prevention and health promotion for that very valuable commodity, the student-athlete.

NATIONAL FEDERATION RULES CHANGES

BASKETBALL

As a result of action taken by the National Federation Basketball Rules Committee, two major changes in the high school game were made, effective with the 1985-86 season.

The first involves only the girls game and dictates that the smaller ball — one inch smaller in diameter and two ounces lighter — may be used in all high school games.

The other major change involves the jump ball. A jump ball will be held to start the first period and any overtime period. In all other cases, the ball will be awarded out of bounds on jump ball situations on an alternating basis, the same as has been done in the NCAA men's game.

If states so wish, they may utilize a three-point field goal which would be scored from beyond a 19-foot circle.

Other changes are:

5-2-1: Delete the prohibition on successive timeouts by the same team.

10-3-6: Allows any player fouled to grasp the basket to prevent injury.

10-4-1g: Squad members must remain seated on the bench while the clock is running, except to spontaneously react to an outstanding play or to report to the scorer's table.

10-5: Coaches must remain seated on their benches at all times, except for limited specific situations.

WRESTLING

There will be several major rule changes this year and one of which will not affect California schools.

4-4-2 allows for a 275 lb. maximum weight class which the State has yet to adopt, so we will still be using our same weights as listed in the Blue Book.

4-5-3 cuts the weigh-in time for tournament competition from 2½ hours to 1 hour. This will help alleviate lengthy delays for weigh-ins.

5-1-5 provides for an optional starting position for the offensive wrestler.

5-2 now allows for a technical fall and the stopping of the match when a wrestler has earned a 15 point advantage.

6-2-3 gives the wrestler who has the choice of position to select either up, down, or neutral at the start of the second and third period.

Other changes are:

4-2-1: Allows wrestlers to wear a neatly trimmed mustache.

4-4-6: Added rubber, vinyl and plastic-type suits to the list of devices used for weight reduction purposes.

5-1-4: The defensive starting position must allow the offensive wrestler to start from either side.

6-6: New article to follow 6-6-4 which relates to clerical errors in match score.

6-6-5: When a coach questions the misapplication of a rule, the penalty will be assessed against the head coach.

7-4-4: Any action commencing after the end of the third period prior to the end-of-match procedure shall be considered unsportsmanlike or flagrant misconduct.

10-2-1: The article stating that physicians will examine all contestants has been deleted.

10-3: This section will be moved to comments on the rules.

RECORD COMPARISON

BALDWIN PARK HAS HIGHEST GRID WINNING PERCENTAGE OF '80s

Which CIF Southern Section schools have had the best football fortunes in the 1980s? With the opening of the 1985 season marking the midpoint of the decade, the time has come to take a look at what has transpired on CIF-SS gridirons in the past five years.

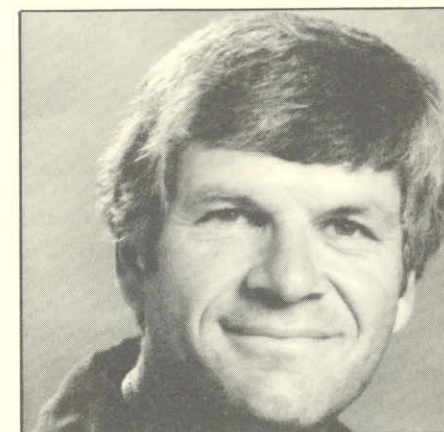
With a sparkling record of 54-6 (.900) between 1980-84, Baldwin Park High School ranks No. 1 overall. In addition to four of five Montview League Championships during the period, Coach Ty Pagone's Braves have appeared in two CIF-SS conference finals, winning the Desert-Mountain crown in 1980 and finishing as the runner-up in the Southeastern Conference a year ago. During the five-year span, Baldwin Park High School has produced such notable players as Ram wide-receiver Ron Brown and 1984 Div. III Player of the Year Michael Johnson, now attending Arizona State.

Atascadero ranks a close second, with a five-year record of 61-7 for an .897 winning percentage. Coach Larry Welsh's Greyhounds are the only CIF-SS team with over 60 wins in the decade and have appeared in three CIF-SS title games during the period, winning Desert-Mountain Conference championships in 1982 and 1983.

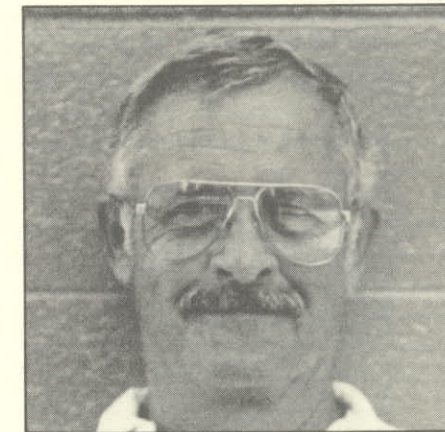
Third on the list is Lynwood, with a five-year record of 51-8-1, a winning percentage of .858. Although Lynwood has fared well in regular season play, its playoff fortunes have not quite measured up, with just one championship-game appearance. In 1980, Coach S.K. Johnson's squad captured the Southern Conference crown with a 14-13 win over El Modena. Under the direction of fourth-year Head Coach Larry Anderson, Lynwood has an outstanding 30-4-1 mark.

No other CIF-SS school comes close to the playoff accomplishments of fourth-ranked El Modena (56-12-1, .819), as the Vanguardians have posted a 16-3 playoff record under Head Coach Bob Lester in the past five seasons. Elmo has won two straight CIF-SS Southern Conference titles, while appearing in four of the past five championship games. The only year in which Lester's crew missed the final round was in 1982, when it was upended 13-10 by eventual-champ Los Altos in the semis.

Yet another Southern Conference school completes the top five, as Foothill High of Santa Ana checks in with a five-year mark of 52-11-2 (.815). Coach Ted Mullen's Knights

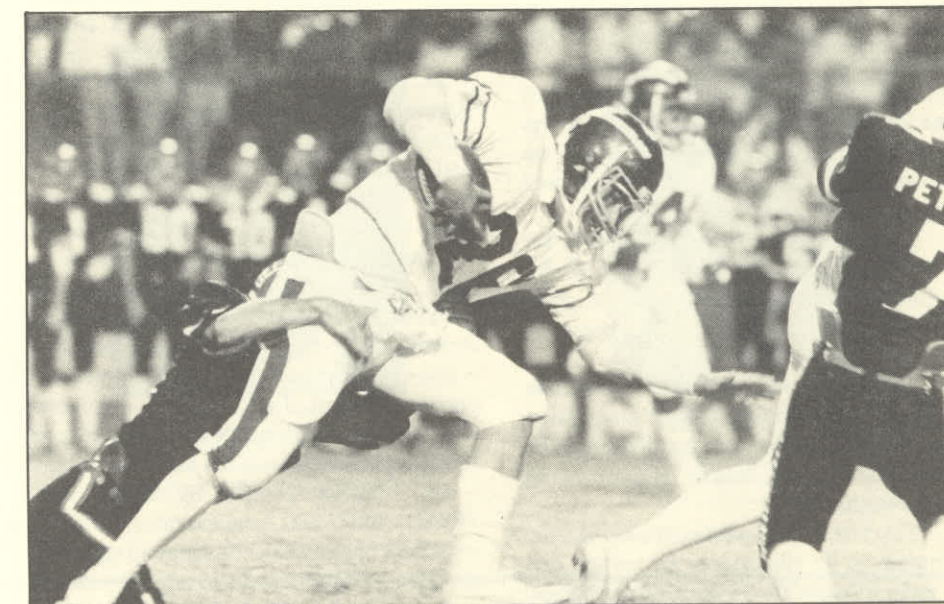

have appeared in two CIF-SS championship games during the period, beating El Modena 21-14 for the conference crown in 1981 and dropping a 10-7 decision to the same foe in the 1983 title match.

By conference, the top tanking teams

include Long Beach Poly (Big-Five), Sunny Hills (Central), Muir (Coastal), Miraleste (Desert-Mountain), Bell Gardens (Eastern), Whittier Christian (Inland), Atascadero (Northwestern), Baldwin Park (Southeastern) and Lynwood (Southern).

8. **NATIONAL FEDERATION UPDATE** – Mr. Hardgrave reported on the National Federation summer meetings held in Lexington.

9. **STATE REPORT – (A) LIABILITY INSURANCE UPDATE:** Mr. Tony Balsamo reported that the State Office is looking for a carrier. He also indicated that the State Office has recently hired a lobbyist to assist in apprising new bills affecting the CIF. In addition, Mr. Balsamo has been designated the Representative of Section 7 to the National Federation Executive Committee.

(B) **STATE GOALS AND OBJECTIVES:** Dr. Bob Packer reviewed with the Committee the proposed state goals and objectives. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to direct the CIF-SS delegates to the State Federated Council to support adoption.

(C) **HEALTH AND SAFETY BY-LAW:** Ms. Burrud reviewed proposed by-law additions. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to support adoption of the by-law.

10. **LEGAL UPDATE** – Attorney Andy Patterson reviewed with the Committee the new CIF-SS Athletic Administration and Sport Preview which provides an excellent resource for school personnel. Mr. Patterson also discussed the 1985-86 Athletic Administrators Symposium and the emphasis on the major concern of legal liability as it affects athletics.

11. **OCEAN VIEW HIGH SCHOOL UPDATE** – Commissioner Plutko reviewed with the Committee the response of the Huntington Beach Union High School District following the administrative review of Ocean View's Boys' Basketball program on June 28, 1985. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to impose the following sanctions on the Boys' Basketball program for the 1985-86 school year:

(a) The CIF-SS runner-up trophy for 1984-85 be returned to the CIF-SS Office due to the forfeitures in post-season play and that the runner-up position be declared vacant.

(b) The Boys' Varsity Basketball team is not eligible for post-season competition in 1985-86, should it so qualify and/or be selected by the league as one of its representatives.

(c) The school administration is censured on its procedures for review and application of CIF-SS rules and regulations. Further, that appropriate changes be made where necessary, to provide the proper orientation and protocol for all staff members in the implementation of the organization's Constitution and By-Laws.

(d) The Boys' Varsity Basketball coach is censured on his review and application

of CIF-SS rules and regulations.

(e) The school administration provide the CIF-SS Executive Committee by way of written documentation, the corrective administrative action taken with regard to procedures in orientation of staff members within the basketball program following the 1985-86 basketball season and no later than the scheduled meeting of April 17, 1986.

Additionally, the CIF-SS Executive Committee moved, seconded and passed that a review be conducted to determine the eligibility status of students Ricky Butler and Desi Hazely for the 1985-86 season as a result of undue influence in accordance with State and Southern Section Rule 510.

Further, it was moved, seconded and passed that an Ad-Hoc Committee be formed from the CIF-SS Executive Committee to review the current and past administrative practices and procedures in place at the Huntington Beach Union High School District for the implementation and administration of the CIF-SS Constitution and By-Laws as they apply to students with remaining eligibility.

12. **NEW SCHOOL MEMBERSHIP** – It was moved, seconded and passed to approve membership of Camp Kilpatrick and Coutin School, effective with the 1985-86 school term.

13. **OFFICIALS UPDATE** – Bill Clark, Administrator, reviewed with the Committee the minutes of the CIF-SS Executive Committee Officials' Committee and the special press release regarding the need for officials and the positive response received. Mr. Clark also indicated additional meetings have been planned in regard to officials and will report back to the Committee at their completion.

14. **PUBLIC NOTICE DECISIONS** – Commissioner Plutko reviewed with the Committee a procedure for providing public notice accountability to its membership in terms of rule and regulation enforcement. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to implement the procedures.

15. **CHEMICAL AND ALCOHOL POSITION STATEMENT** – Karen Hellyer, Administrator, reviewed with the Committee a proposed chemical and drug abuse resource support program. Following discussion, the Committee authorized the CIF-SS Office to begin implementation of the support program.

16. **TRONA HIGH SCHOOL UPDATE** – Bill Clark, Administrator, reviewed with the Committee the background regarding the Trona High School appeal as it pertains to the non-traditional playing surface and the testing of a new salt-water grass for football at Trona High School. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to extend the waiver for one year.

17. **REVIEW AND UPDATE OF ELIGIBILITY STANDARDS** – Commis-

specific instrument to be used in communication with the member schools.

The team award will be an appropriate banner signifying the achievement and designed to be hung in the winning schools gymnasiums for public view and incentive. Plans call for the major awards presentation to be made in order to maximize the promotion of the program at an Angel game just prior to the conclusion of the school year.

The CIF Southern Section Office would enhance the publicity by way of its Media Department and mailings to 200 members of the newspaper, radio and television industries.

PHASE II

An individual certificate will be awarded to all members of the winning scholastic team in order that each individual has a record of recognition for his/her accomplishments.

PHASE III

This would include an extension of the Academic Awards Program down to the individual level, with a Boy and Girl student-athlete being selected from EACH of the CIF Southern Section 500 member schools. The winners, again, are based upon criteria established by the CIF-SS Office and Ford Motor Company with the major emphasis being a minimum grade point average and participation in a minimum of three categories of extra-curricular activity.

Awards presented will be different from those given to the team members under Phase II.

Look for the Official Nomination Forms arriving at your school later on this year.
