### CIF-SS ATHLETES COLLECT 34 OLYMPIC MEDALS

The CIF Southern Section was well represented at the recent XXIVth Olympiad in Seoul, South Korea, as former -and even a pair of current- student-athletes representing member schools collected 34 medals. In all, 73 athletes and three coaches hailing from CIF-SS schools made the trip to Seoul.

At the head of the CIF-SS list was 17-year-old Placentia El Dorado senior lanet Evans, who won the hearts of the nation by swimming for three gold medals. Evans won the 400-meter freestyle in a worldrecord time of 4:03.85, the 400meter individual medley in 4:37.86 and the 800-meter freestyle in 8:10.20. As a junior just last spring, she set two national high school records and swam a leg on El Dorado's championship medley relay team at the CIF-SS finals in Long Beach. The other current high school student to compete in Seoul was Mission Viejo's Rafal Szukala, a member of the Polish

DRUG ABUSE PREVENTION

The more we read in our local newspapers about drug abuse, ranging from Olympic to professional to collegiate athletic programs, it has been asked, "What direction should the CIF Southern Section take with regard to antidrug education, enforcement and non-participation?"

It can be accurately stated, we have several schools and districts in the Southern Section that are participating in voluntary drug testing programs at this time. The leader in this entire program is Edison High School, where the former football coach, Bill Workman, current athletic director Lyman Clower and team physician Dr. Bob Belanger, have provided the pioneering steps to make it a reality.

A unique element of the Edison program developed when the organizers contacted the A.C.L.U. and discussed the direction to take in order to avoid future legal problems. It is noted and Edison High School is commended for having initiated the program several years ago, continuing to voluntarily test athletes without the infringement of the rights of privacy.

The recent Olympics have emphasized the embarrassment and hardship caused by steroid abuse. Unfortunately, professional football has not taken a firm position with regard to drug abuse. In my opinion, it is an embarrassing arrangement when professional athletes use drugs, are suspended for thirty days and return with no further penalty.

If a major problem does indeed exist in our member schools, how will the CIF Southern Section react?

### CIF-SS EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MINUTES

August 20, 1988

The August meeting of the CIF Southern Section Executive Committee was called to order by Chairman Bruce Keuning at 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, August 20, 1988 in San Luis Obispo. All members were present.

1. MINUTES - It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the minutes of the CIF-SS Executive Committee meeting of June 16, 1988.

2. PRESIDENT'S UPDATE - President Bruce Keuning introduced new Executive Committee member Kenn Gunn, Principal of Walnut High School; Tom Triggs, Principal of La Habra High School; and Frank Cano, Principal of Alhambra High School. Mr. Keuning provided an overview of the meeting format and welcomed the entire Executive Committee to the first meeting of the 1988-89 school year, stressing the importance of their role in the area of decision-making as Executive Committee members. Additionally, Mr. Keuning reviewed concerns with regard to litigation, the role and function of the Administrative Committee, corporate support, and a letter sent to private schools relative to Title V responsibilities and the certification of coaches.

It was also announced that Gary Smidderks, Principal of L.A. Baptist High School, will serve as the State Federated Council Representative of the private school sector.

President Keuning announced with regret, the resignation of Fr. Charles Motsko, who has served the Southern Section as the Private Area #1 Representative to the Executive Committee. Replacing Fr. Motsko will be Sr. Marion Kikukawa, Principal of St. Anthony High School.

3. COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE
Commissioner Stan Thomas welcomed the entire executive Committee to their first meeting of the new school year. He reviewed with the Committee the area of corporate support; officials, at both the State and Southern Section level; and litigation. Additionally, he updated the Committee on the July meeting with representatives of Reebok and the State CIF and reviewed plans that are now under way to develop a five-year master plan for the CIF Southern Section.

4. BOYS' A.D. UPDATE - Mr. Mike Moropoulos, Boys' A.D. Representative, reviewed with the Committee the National Federation TARGET Program and the new video available for school use in the area of drug prevention and education. Additionally, he stressed the importance of school recognition of coaches for outstanding service. A model program has been conducted by Athletic Director Don McIntyre of Cabrillo High School.

5. GIRLS' A.D. UPDATE - Sheri Ross, Girls' A.D. Representative, reported on the process of incorporation now being undertaken by the State and Orange County A.D. Association, Additionally, it was announced that the State A.D. Conference, set for April of 1989, will be held in Palm Springs.

6. SUPERINTENDENTS' UPDATE Cynthia Grennan, Superintendents' Representative, announced that the Temporary Coach Regulations are now in the hands of the Administrative Law offices of the State Department of Education, and the regulation should be available to school districts within 60-90 days. It should be

#### SUPERVISION OF ATHLETES

The Southern Section Office has experienced a problem that has perpetuated itself over the past few years as it pertains to proper supervision and entry of individual student-athletes in the post-season playoffs.

Please note this situation relates only to the individual sports (i.e. Cross Country, Individual Tennis, Track and Field, Wrestling, Swimming, etc.) and the official recognition and registration of entrants at playoff sites.

State and Southern Section Rule 307 states: "No CIF team (i.e. individual) shall participate in interscholastic or approved competition with any other team unless the CIF team is under supervision as required by the California Administrative Code Title V of CIF By-Law No. 506 (b)."

Schools representing the same district may send one credentialed or certified supervisor for three or four students. These individuals have been recognized and are to continue to be recognized for registration and participation purposes.

The concern is for those students who are not accompanied by a faculty representative and report to the playoff site by themselves with a parent.

This rule was reviewed with both the State CIF Office and the Southern Section Executive Committee at its meeting of Oct. 28, 1982. At that time, it was reaffirmed that the interpretation stand as above and that any student reporting for competition who is not under the direct supervision in accordance with State and Southern Section Rule 307 is to be DENIED entry for

As pointed out by the Southern Section and State CIF attorney, there are also inherent liability problems when an individual competes in violation of this rule.

In view of this, it becomes essential that we fully understand and support the body that governs and directs our professional lives. That body is not simply the "CIF", nor is it "They" or "Those Guys". It is the CIF-SS COUNCIL, consisting of representatives from each of the 64 member leagues.

Following are some suggestions that should help to make the

1988-89 school year one of greater understanding and enhancement for each of us, our coaching staffs and the student-athletes for whom we serve:

- Every AD should attend at least one council meeting each year. if you have not done so, talk it over with your principal. There is no better way. Four are conducted each year and they are listed on page 21 of your Blue Book.

- If your principal has never attended a Council meeting, make sure he or she plans to visit one in the near future.

- Ensure that your board members and superintendent understand the function of the CIF-

## CIF-SS COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES September 22, 1988

The September meeting of the CIF-SS Council was called to order by President Bruce Keuning at 9:30 a.m. at the Sequoia Athletic Club in Buena Park. All leagues were present with the exception of the Liberty, Los Padres, Victory and Junior High

1. APPROVAL OF MINUTES - It was moved seconded and passed to approve the minutes of the CIF-SS Council meeting May 5, 1988 as published in the September issue of the CIF-SS BULLETIN; and minutes of the CIF-SS Executive Committee meeting of August 20, 1988 as mailed to the Council. 2. PRESIDENT'S UPDATE - President Bruce Keuning introduced new Executive committee member Sister Marian Kikukawa, Principal of St. Anthony High School, who was appointed, for the 1988-89 school year, to fill the vacant position of Fr. Charles of Motsko. Mr. Keuning reviewed the purpose and role of Council Representatives in representing their respective leagues and stressed their responsibility to stimulate communication at all levels. Additionally, he updated the Council relative to the releaguing of Miraleste High School and concerns with reference to litigation

3. COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE -Commissioner Stan Thomas provided an overview and update of the new principals and athletic directors' orientation program; superintendent/board member Symposium; officals assignment program; the National Federation Hall of Fame program and its relationship to the Southern Section and State CIF; the impact of year-round school; the importance of eligibility checks by school administrators; and the direction the Southern Section and State CIF are taking with reference to summertime rules and

4. NATIONAL FEDERATION UPDATE -Mr. Mike Moropoulos reported on the National Federation summer meetings held in Kansas City, Missouri as it related to various trends and athletic administration concerns throughout the United States.

5. TREASURER'S UPDATE - Dr. Gary Smidderks reviewed the recently completed auditor's report and the findings which reflected excellent check and balance system within the CIF-SS bookkepping procedures.

6. GEOGRAPHICAL RELEAGUING UPDATE - Dean Crowley, Associate Commissioner, updated the Council with regard to meetings held with reference to the disbanding of the current San Garbriel Valley Releaguing area and attaching the 21 schools to other existing releaguing areas.

7. BASEBALL RULES UPDATE - Administrator Bill Clark reviewed with the Council the new rules adopted by the National Federation Rules Committee for the upcoming 1988-89 season. It should be noted that the Baseball Rules Committee reinstated the use of metal cleats for use during the 1989 season

8. ANTI-DRUG POSTERS - President-elect Tom Jacobson, reviewed with the Council posters featuring anti-drug message that are expressly designed for the high schools of California. Each school will receive these posters that are sponsored and made available by the State CIF in conjunction with its major corporate sponsor, Reebok.

9. TITLE V - Dr. Robert Packer reviewed with the Council the newly adopted Title V regulations dealing with the certification of coaches that are to be implemented during the 1988-89 school year. It should be noted that superintendents must certify to the Board of Education that all temporary coaches on their district lists have complied with Title V mandates. Information with reference to the new Title V regulations will be forwarded from the State Department of Education within the next few weeks to all school districts.

10. SCHOOL PROPERTIES - Dr. Robert Packer updated the Council on progress being made by representatives of the State Federated Council with reference to contract negotiations with School Properties. It should be noted that School Properties, Inc. purports a licensing concept that allows for a company to have the right to license CIF State logo to outside corporations in the primary areas of sports apparel, specialty items and package goods.

11. BASEBALL, BASKETBALL, SOCCER INCIDENTS - Dean Crowley, Associate Commissioner, reviewed with the Council concerns relative to the excessive number of incidents in the sports of baseball,

basketball and soccer that occurred during this past season. As part of the report, comprehensive crowd control guide was passed to each representative of the Council for use as a discussion item at a future league meeting. The CIF-SS Office will distribute a copy of the Crowd Control Guide to the principal of each member school for their information and/ or use.

12. FIVE-MAN FOOTBALL CREW PROPOSAL - Bill Brown, a member of the CIF-SS Football Coaches Advisory Committee, presented a proposal that beginning with the 1989 football season, five officials be assigned to all varsity contests, with the exception of 8-man football. This is a non-action item and will be voted upon at the January, 1989 Southern Section Council meeting

13. FOOTBALL GAME EXPENSE REPORT Executive Committee member Gary Smidderks reviewed background information compiled by a three-person committee of the Executive Committee that reviewed concerns and recommendations with reference to football playoff expenses. It was the feeling of the Committee that every effort be made to monitor costs so that all schools see COUNCIL MINUTES page 11

noted that schools and districts at this time should be getting started with CPR training and the coaching certification process. Additionally, Ms. Grennan reviewed the importance of the "Say No To Drugs" Program, which will be held during the month of October

7. TREASURER'S REPORT - Garv Smidderks, Treasurer, reviewed with the Committee the auditor's report, which is currently a preliminary report only. As the findings have not been submitted in final written form, it appears that the books are in order and the accountant, Shirley Frazier, has been conducting business in an exemplary fashion.

8. NATIONAL FEDERATION MEETING UPDATE - Mike Moropoulos reported on the National Federation summer meetings held in Kansas City, Mo. It should be noted that Scott Cathcart, Southern Section Director of Media and Public Relations, has been appointed to serve a term on the National Federation Records Committee, and Bill Boswell, Director of Athletics, Huntington Beach USD, will serve as chairman of the National Federation's 1990 Annual Conference of High School Directors f Athletics, to be held at the Anaheim Marriott in December of 1990.

9. STATE REPORT - Dr. Robert Packer reviewed with the Committee the School Properties contract negotiations and expressed, on behalf of the Southern Section State Representatives, appreciation for the time and effort put forth in this area by the State CIF Office.

10. LEGAL UPDATE - Attorney Andy Patterson updated the Committee on current areas of litigation, legal issues in the area of releaguing, and the initial draft on the rule revisions of the State CIF

Constitution, which are being reviewed by the Section Commissioners.

11. HALL OF FAME COMMITTEE - Bruce Kitchen updated the Committee with reference to the involvement of California in the National Federation Hall of Fame

12. MUIR HIGH SCHOOL UPDATE President Bruce Keuning reviewed with the Committee concerns dealing with the excessive number of violations of Blue Book regulations, specifically in football, basketball, track and baseball, by John Muir High School. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to request the administrative staff representatives to appear before the Executive Committee for a hearing to review violations during the 1987-88 school year. The hearing will be held before the full Executive Committee at its regularly scheduled meeting on October 18, 1988.

13. MIRALESTE HIGH SCHOOL - Tom Jacobson and Stan Thomas reviewed the recent court decision which overruled the school board's decision to close Miraleste High School, beginning with the 1988-89 school year. Now that Miraleste High School will remain open, CIF Southern Section representatives met with district and high school administrative personnel to discuss scheduling and leaguing for Miraleste High School for the upcoming school year.

14. GEOGRAPHICAL RELEAGUING Dean Crowley, Associate Commissioner, updated the Committee with reference to the disbanding of the current San Gabriel Releaguing area and attaching the 21 schools to other existing releaguing areas.

# NATIONAL PREP SPORTS PARTICIPATION FIGURES CONTINUE TO RISE

athletics increased for the fourth consecutive year in 1987-88 as more than 5.2 million boys and girls were involved in interscholastic sports.

Figures obtained from the 50 state association offices and the District of Columbia and compiled by the National Federation of State High School Associations show that 5,275,461 boys and girls were involved in high school athletics last year, an increase of 75,023 from 1986-87.

Boys participation increased 61,695 and girls participation was up 13,328. Overall boys participation was 3,425,777, the highest total since the 3,503,124 mark in 1980-81. Total girls participation was 1,849,684, the best mark since 1,853,789 in 1980-

The overall increase of 75,023 is the largest single-year rise in 10 years. Participation in high school athletic programs hit an all-time high of 6,450,482 in 1977-78 and then began a general decline until the reversal four years ago. Figures have remained slightly above the five-million mark since 1980.

Among boys sports, football is still the most popular activity in terms of participants with slightly less than one million boys involved. After football at 949,279, basketball remains No. 2 with 524,606 participants, followed by outdoor track and field at 431,009.

The order of the rest of the top 10 remains unchanged from a year ago. Following outdoor track are baseball (407,630), wrestling (246,771), soccer (208,935), cross country (157,306), tennis (136,083), golf (124,486) and swimming (94,199).

Participation in all of the top 10 boys sports increased with the exceptions of outdoor track and wrestling. Football registered the largest numerical gain with an additional 18,103 participants, although the biggest percentage gains were in swimming (9.3 percent) and golf (8.7 percent)

Boys basketball remained No. 1 in popularity among schools, with 16,769 high schools offering the

Participation in high school sport. The remainder of the top 10, which is unchanged in order from last year, is outdoor track and field (14,246), football (14,068), baseball (13,589), cross country (9,823), golf (9,360), tennis (8,844), wrestling (8,358), soccer (6,159) and swimming (3,919).

> Soccer continued its recent growth with an additional 179 high schools sponsoring the sport, the largest increase among top 10 sports.

Basketball once again is the most popular sport for girls, both in terms of participants and schools offering the sport. With 392,047 participants, basketball continued its lead over outdoor track and field (326,694). Other top 10 sports in terms of participants are volleyball (292,883), fast-pitch softball (208,344), tennis (126,586), cross country (104,975), soccer (103,173), swimming (83,964), field hockey (47,701) and slow-pitch softball

Volleyball (10,770) and soccer (10,139) gained the most participants in 1987-88. Other top 10 sports that experienced increases in participants are tennis (5,246), cross country (5,951) and slowpitch softball (1,053).

In terms of number of schools, basketball (16,196) retained its lead over outdoor track and field (13,804), followed by volleyball (11.834), cross country (8,747), tennis (8,426), fast-pitch softball (8,314), swimming (3,897), golf (3,719), soccer (3,697) and indoor track (1,165).

Soccer also experienced the largest gain in school sponsorship among girls sports with an additional 275 schools. Other sports which increased sponsorship over last year were volleyball, fast-pitch softball, golf and swimming.

Recently, I attended a luncheon with Orange County athletic personnel hosted by Sheriff/ Coroner Brad Gates. Sheriff Gates has a personal and major commitment to eradicating drug abuse in Orange County. He has assigned four people in the Orange County Sheriffs Department to work on this project. More importantly, Gates is spearheading the program personally and will be featured at future CIF Southern Section meetings.

In my last 10 years as an educational and athletic administrator, the Orange County Sheriffs program is the most comprehensive I have seen. I am certain that Sheriff Gates would be happy to share with any school in the Southern Section, data relevant to his program.

The method by which rules and regulations are brought to the Southern Section for consideration is through the CIF-SS Council. Is there a league in the Section that would propose, at a future Council meeting, a direction and/or position to consider in order to combat drug abuse in our high school athletic program?

This is not to imply all athletic programs are subject to abuse. It is intended to raise the awareness level of high school administrators and coaches, so that we can begin thinking about prevention, education and avoidance in order to promote a healthy lifestyle for high school student-athletes, free

Additionally, it should be noted that Reebok International, a State CIF corporate sponsor, is entering into a program featuring posters for all high schools of prominent sports persons and entertainers with the theme to stay in school and avoid drug abuse. As Sheriff Gates points out, "drug abuse is life abuse".

The Executive Committee of the CIF Southern Section and the CIF-SS Office strongly supports programs directed with the intent to eradicate drugs and keep high school athletics free of any and all abusive substances. I welcome your comments and would entertain, from any league, a position for the Southern Section to assume with regard to this concern.

Former All-CIF star Karch Kiraly of Santa Barbara captained the U.S. men's volleyball team to a secondconsecutive gold medal, with assistance from seven teammates that attended CIF-SS member schools. The championship team included Bob Ctvrtlik of Long Beach Wilson, Scott Fortune of Luguna Beach, Robert Partie of Goleta Dos Pueblos, Jon Root of Los Angeles Loyola, Eric Sato of Santa Monica, Troy Tanner of Hacienda Heights Los Altos and Steve Timmons of Newport

Another former CIF-SS competitor to bring home a gold medal was sprinter Alice Brown of Pasadena John Muir, as a member of the U.S. women's 400-meter relay team. In demonstration sports, Brent Barberie of Cerritos Gahr and Robin Ventura of Santa Maria Righetti played on the United States' gold-medal winning baseball team, while Jimmy Kim of Cerritos captured a gold medal in the heavyweight division of the men's Takewondo competition.

Former CIF-SS athletes to win silver medals included West Covina Edgewood's Mike Powell in the men's long jump, and Deanean Howard-Hill of San Bernardino San Gorgonio as a member of the U.S. women's 1600-meter relay team. Candace Cable-Brooks of Edgewood won a silver medal in the 800meter wheelchair demonstration.

Under the direction of Newport Harbor Coach Bill Barnett, the U.S. water polo team captured a secondstraight silver medal and included no fewer than 10 former CIF-SS players: James Bergeson of Newport Harbor, Greg Boyer of Manhattan Beach Aviation, Jeff Campbell of Irvine University, Jody Campbell of Long Beach Wilson; Peter Campbell of University, Mike Evans of Ontario Chaffey, Doug Kimbell of Villa Park, Alan Mouchawar of Long Beach Poly, Kevin Robertson of Newport Harbor and team-captain Terry Schroeder of Santa Barbara San Marcos.



# SIMI VALLEY-ROYAL VOLUNTARY DRUG TESTING PROGRAM MERITS NATIONAL RECOGNITION

CIF Southern Section member schools Simi Valley and Royal were honored for their innovative and progressive approach to dealing with the problem of drug abuse by high school students, being listed among five programs nationally recognized in the Final Report of the 1988 White House Conference for a Drug Free America.

As members of the Simi Valley Unified High School District, the two schools have established a voluntary and random urinalysis program for drug-testing. The program joined the National Basketball Association, the Women's Sport Foundation, the United States Olympic Committee and the National Collegiate Athletic Association in the published report as examples of the many programs being conducted by concerned and dedicated Americans to reduce illicit drug use in our nation.

The Simi Valley plan is unique in that: it has strong school board and district office support; each athlete (from all boys and girls teams) are offered an initial free test and then put into a lottery for weekly testing; it provides a district drug coordinator (Dr. Gene Hatton) who is paid a stipend similar to that of a coach; it presents a mandatory educational program for both the students and their parents; it has expanded to include the school activities program as well as athletic teams; and encompasses over 90 percent of all studentathletes at the two schools.

Initiated by Athletic Directors Terry Dobbins of Simi Valley (who has since moved to Royal) and Glenn Lipman of Royal (now at Channel Islands of Oxnard), the testing began in 1986. Another principal to the program is Dr. David Lewis, who heads up the clinical and counseling aspects from Adventist Hospital in Van Nuys. Dr. Lewis' previous experience in the field includes major involvement in the National Basketball Association's anti-drug efforts, as an administrative assistant to Commissioner David

The Simi Valley-Royal program received initial assistance from a model at Edison High School of Huntington Beach, but has been tailored to meet the specific needs of its schools and community. Edison initiated drug-testing for student-athletes in 1984 and put it into practice in the fall of 1985, after a long, arduous year of working to convince school administrators and district officials of the feasability and merits of such an undertaking.

A major portion of the efforts by proponents at Edison were to prevent potential legal problems and litigation. Dr. Bob Belanger went as far as to take the plan to the American Civil Liberties Union to request its opinion before the program went into practice. Clearly, Edison was a national forerunner in the area of random drug testing for high school student-athletes.

"We based our program on the Edison model," Dobbins pointed out. "Were it not for their efforts, our program would probably have taken at least another year to get off the ground."

And thanks to the involvement

of Adventist Hospital, Simi Valley and Royal provided nearly 1,100 tests to students at no charge during the 1987-88 school year. Of all those tests, only one came back positive.

"That shows the tremendous effort put forth by our students and the overall effectiveness of the program," added Dobbins. "The real key is the mandatory educational meeting that involves the students and their parents at the beginning of each season of sport. The random urine tests act simply as a reminder to provide the student with a reason to say 'no' to peers who might encourage drug experimentation and usage."

Commissioner of Athletics Stan Thomas echoed the sentiments of the proponents of drug testing at Simi Valley, Royal, Edison and the many other CIF-SS member schools that have installed tough and compassionate programs.

"Drug abuse has no place in athletics at any level," said Thomas, see DRUG TESTING page 10

16. BASKETBALL RULE 10-5 - Associate Commissioner Dean Crowley updated the Committee on a recommendation from the Section Commissioners to the State Federated Council that it approve the coaching box for basketball for the 1988-89 season at the Council's October 21 meeting. It should be noted that failing approval of the coaching box, it is further recommended that all Sections would then continue with the "seat belt" rule.

# FIVE-MAN OFFICIATING CREWS URGED FOR '89 GRID SEASON

Commissioner of Athletics Stan Thomas, along with the Football Coaches Advisory Board and local units of the Southern California Football Officials Association endorse a proposal to the CIF-SS Council that would provide five officials for all varsity football games in the 1989 season, with the exception of eight-man contests.

Presently, five-man crews are already being used by an estimated 65 percent of member schools fielding eleven-man teams. Further, the CIF Southern Section has required five-man crews for all playoff contests since 1986.

"From a consistency point of view and for the simple concept of better officiating, we are of the opinion that adopting the five-man crew proposal would be advantageous to our member schools," says Bill Clark, CIF-SS Administrator in charge of both football and officiating.

The official to be added is designated as the "back judge" and his basic position is in the center of the defensive backfield, 15-17 yards from the line of scrimmage. A key element in adding the back judge is that it provides vastly improved coverage for the goal line and end line.

The primary responsibility of the back judge on running plays is to observe play directly in front of and adjacent to the point of attack. In particular, he watches for illegal "crack-back" blocks and clipping from the wide receivers. These notorious fouls often cause the most serious injuries in the game. Due to the fact flank officials have a primary responsibility to follow the ball and mark progress, coaches have routinely complained these blocks have gone undetected and unpenalized.

With respect to the passing game, the back judge maintains his position in the center of the field and retreats towards the defender's goal line, keeping all receivers in full view beneath him. With pass interference being the most disputed and critical call in the game, the perspective of a deep official from the center of the field

is advantageous. The view of the back judge on passes is often superior to that of the flank official, who starts each play on the line of scrimmage and must trail the play along the sideline. As the passing game has improved and grown in popularity on the high school level, it has also become more sophisticated. With the refined skills of modern passers and receivers, the additional coverage provided by a back judge is certainly justified.

In the kicking game, the coverage provided by existing four-man crews is barely sufficient for administration of the game, much less provide consistent, safe coverage of the entire field. The addition of the back judge enables all officials to cover their assigned areas more deliberately and concentrate on their various assignments. The back judge is particularly helpful in covering the on-sides kick. These plays require exact execution by the kicking team, often at a critical stage of the game.

Perhaps most importantly, is what the back judge means to overall game control. On all plays (Runs, passes and kicks) that go into the sidelines and team area, the back judge follows the players to escort them back onto the playing field. The visibility of the back judge often eliminates needless pushing and verbal confrontations between opposing players as each play ends. Such a presence will often head off problems before they occur. By communicating with players, substitutes and coaches, the officials can direct opponents to their proper positions and help all parties avoid embarrassing incidents we have seen in the past.

Finally, in the area of liability, an 'additional official will demonstrate a primary concern for safety and control in a court of law and to the public at-large. To add a fifth official for varsity football games would cost schools approximately \$200 per year (based on five home games). From a liability standpoint it is certainly justified.

# ST. ANTHONY'S SR. KIKUKAWA NAMED TO EXEC. COMMITTEE

Sister Marion F. Kikukawa, O.S.F., Principal of Saint Anthony High School of Long Beach, has been named as the newest member of the CIF Southern Section Executive Committee, effective with the beginning of the 1988-89 school year.

Kikukawa replaces former Servite High School Principal Fr. Charles Motsko, as the Private Area No. 1 representative.

Now in her fourth year at St. Anthony, Kikukawa has an extensive background in education and administration. SS and the Council, even to the extent of attending a meeting.

- Inform your athletes and their parents of the structure of the organization. This can be done through newsletters, boosters and PTA groups. Informed parents are much more likely to be supportive parents.

- Meet with local sportswriters and invite them to attend a meeting with you.

Other items of particular interest to athletic directors this year include. . .

WALK-ON COACHES. While private schools are not legally bound by the provisions of Title V as they pertain to "temporary coaches," they have been encouraged by Council President Bruce Keuning, Valley Christian, to utilize the guidelines in the hiring and assigning of coaches at their respective schools. It would be advisable for those of you in the private schools to discuss this with your principal.

LAWSUITS. As most of us are aware, lawsuits are becoming a major problem for both the CIF-SS and our member schools. All of us could contribute to the alleviation of these problems by ensuring that our principals, superintendents, board members, and the CIF-SS office are kept informed of any potential problems that might arise within the scope or our responsibilities. We must remember that a lawsuit brought against the CIF-SS is a lawsuit against us! CHEERLEADING. While very few of us are

charged with the responsibility of Cheerleading, the following information might be of great interest to you or any other person who does have that assignment. The NATIONAL FEDERATION has produced a set of safety guidelines pertaining to that activity. While they are only recommended guidelines, it would appear that school personnel should seriously consider their implementation as policy. A word to the wise: Such a recommendation may not be well-received by your Cheerleader supervisor. Interested

"and we (the section membership as represented by the Executive Committee and administrative staff) intend to maintain a hard line against it whenever and wherever possible. I believe testing is the strongest form of deterrant and offer strong endorsement and support to those schools that have displayed leadership in this area."

"Our philosophy is that athletics and related school activities are a solution for teen-agers. What better arena than that of physical activity, coaching and health guidance is there for educating against and monitoring the dangers of drug abuse."

HONOR YOUR COACHES. If any of you are interested in a program that is designed to honor members of your own coaching staff, you should contact Don McIntyre, AD at Cabrillo High School in Lompoc. Don has successfully conducted such a program and has met with great success. Contact him directly if you are interested.

INCIDENTS. The school year 1987-88 witnessed a significant increase in the number of serious incidents in the sports of Baseball, Softball, Soccer, and Basketball. The degree of seriousness is such that the circumstances are now under study and recommendations will soon be forthcoming. There are some very undesirable, and hopefully unnecessary, sanctions being considered in committee. The purpose in mentioning the issue at this time is that we still have time to meet with our coaches and convince all concerned that we can reverse the trend through action within our own ranks and without the necessity of extreme sanctions.


OFFICIATING. In years past, it was a fact that the vast majority of officials, perhaps as many as ninety percent, were educators. Today, that statistic is almost reversed. As a result we are witnessing a growing trend toward unionization and militancy, demonstrated by recent fee increases and threatened boycotts. While the level of competence and conscientiousness remains relatively - but arguably - acceptable, there is cause for concern. All of us must assume a greater share of the responsibility for officiating and make a concerted effort to recruit young officials from the ranks of our teachers and our former athletes. One productive effort has been to encourage each head coach to recruit at least one new official each year. An increased number of teachers and former athletes in the officiating ranks could serve our interests

BASKETBALL COACHING BOX. Following much effort and communication, the State of California has been granted permission to modify the 10-5 rule to allow coaches to stand within a prescribed area immediately in front of the bench for the purpose of COACHING only. That area will be designated by floor lines (details pending). Let's convince our Basketball coaches to make it work and keep rule 10-5 in the box where it belongs!

REPRESENTATION. Just a reminder that all Southern Section ADs are fully represented on the EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE and are vigorously involved in every decision made by that group. There are two voting representatives, one each for Boys and Girls athletics. We encourage your participation and input and ask that you call either Shari Ross of El Toro High School or Mike Moropoulos at Santa Barbara High School. Your comments, opinions, and advice are not only welcome, but needed.

BASELINE LEAGUE PLAYOFF TRAVEL PROPOSAL -Father Patrick Travers, principal of Damien High School, representing the Baseline League, presented a proposal that during playoff competition in girls' volleyball and boys and girls basketball, beginning with the 1989-90 school year, where playoff competition involves schools 100 miles or more apart, the event be played at a site representing half way between the participating schools. This is a non-action item and will be voted upon at the January meeting of the CIF-SS

15. EMPIRE LEAGUE GOLF PROPOSAL - Dr. Barry Escoe, principal of Katella High School, representing the Empire League, presented a proposal that each team entry in golf post an average best-nine-hole score of 230 or lower for any eight matches to be considered for team regional competition, as long as they finish in the top three of their respective league. This is a non-profit item and will be voted upon at the January meeting of the CIF-SS Council.

16. BAY LEAGUE SOCCER PROPSAL - Roger Bryant reviewed a proposal on behalf of the Bay League relative to tie-breaking procedures for use in CIF-SS Soccer playoff contests leading up to the championship game. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the proposal.

#### 17. STATÉ FEDERATED COUNCIL ACTION ITEMS -

(A) CROSS COUNTRY AWARDS - Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to direct the Southern Section delegates to the State Federated Council to support a proposal by the Central Coast Section to increase the team awards from 2 to 3 in all divisions of the CIF/Reebok Cross Country Championships.

(B) TRAVEL REIMBURSEMENT FOR STATE BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to send the Southern Section delegates to the State Federated Council uninstructed with reference to a recommendation from the State CIF Executive Committee to reduce the ground transportation travel allowance for teams involved in the State Basketball Championship play.

(C) BASKETBALL RULE 10-5 EXPERIMENTATION - Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to direct the CIF Southern Section delegates to the State Federated Council to support a recommendation to allow for the experimentation with basketball rule 10-5, allowing coaches to stand within a six foot area during basketball games for the sole purpose of coaching players.

There being no further business to come before the Council, the meeting adjourned at 12:05 p.m.

#### OFFICIALS SHOULD INCLUDE SCHOOLS RECRUITMENT OF

An issue that has always been a major priority for the member schools of the California Interscholastic Federation, Southern Section is the recruitment of officials in all sports. The CIF-SS Office would like to take this opportunity to encourage personnel at its member schools to assume an active role in this endeavor.

"Schools have as much of an obligation to recruit new officials as do the associations or the officials themselves," notes Bill Clark, CIF-SS Administrator in charge of officiating. "There is a critical need for the coaches and athletic directors of our member schools to recognize potential officiating aptitude and encourage involvement. A key source of new officials are recent high school graduates who participated in sports and would like to maintain ties to athletics."

The current fees paid to CIF-SS Officials range from \$27 to \$68 per event, depending on the sport and level of competition. However, the rewards of officiating are not only financial, they can be fullfilling to sports-minded people from all

walks of life. Potential officials must meet just two criteria in order to qualify: they must be 18 years of age and out of high school.

Sports administered by the CIF Southern Section requiring officials (by season) are: Fall- football, girls volleyball, and water polo; Winter - basketball, wrestling, soccer and field hockey; Spring - baseball, softball, track & field, boys' volleyball, swimming and diving and gymnastics.

"Our schools must recognize the importance of new official recruiting," says Clark. "If each of our member schools could bring in one or two new officials per year, it would make a tremendous impact. Without officials, our programs can not survive -its as simple as that. We have also found out -through a national study- that in states where the schools have become involved in recruitment. fewer problems have arised in the area of officiating.
