## FOOTBALL RULES FOR C. I. F., SOUTHERN SECTION, SCHOOLS FOR 1941

The football rules for 1941 approved by our Council are the Intercollegiate Rules with thirteen modifications. Copies of these modifications printed on gummed paper and suitable for pasting in the Intercollegiate Rule Book are being sent to all schools.

The football coaches of C. I. F., Southern Section, schools approved these changes in most of the thirteen instances by a vote of about twenty to one.

When the Council was informed of the reaction of the Coaches to the proposed modifica-

tions, the changes were officially approved by the Council by a unanimous vote.

Our football rules situation has been in a good deal of a muddle for the past two years. Now that we have a clarification which has nearly unanimous approval of all responsible high school men, we urge all coaches, officials, and Principals to give the new set-up their hearty support. If at the end of the season further modifications seem needed let us make them then.

Anything less than 100% cooperation for the new set-up for the season should be discountenanced by all those in authority.

## EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

The Executive Committee will hold its first meeting of the year on Saturday, October 4 at 9:30 A. M. in the C. I. F. Office unless called by its President at an earlier date. Mr. Kinter Hamilton, Principal of the Harvard School, is President of the Executive Committee for this year.

Business for this first meeting will include: setting of annual dues for this year, eligibility cases, administrative questions submitted by any league or any of our member schools.

The Executive Committee meetings are always open to school men interested in the work of the C. I. F.

The Sixth annual Fall Tennis Tournament will be held by the Montebello High School Saturday, October 18 and October 25. Mr. Lester Gates of Montebello High School will be in charge.

Saturday, November 1, the Ramona High School will inaugurate a crosscountry race for high school boys. An open race for college and club athletes will be held the same day.

The Ramona community celebrates what is known as "Turkey Day" the first Saturday in November. The crosscountry race will be an added feature of this celebration. Last year about 10,000 people came to Ramona to help emphasize their interest in the Thanksgiving bird.

Mr. Charles H. Snell, Vice-Principal of the Ramona High School, will be in charge of the crosscountry races.

On Saturday, December 6, Moorpark High School will stage an invitational cross-country race. Mr. Charles L. Erhard, Director of Physical Education for the Moorpark High School, will handle the details of the event.

Schools are reminded that athletic events they plan to stage that involve schools from more than one league must be approved by the Commissioner of Athletics.

### MONTEREY SUMMER SESSION FOR COACHES

The Commissioner of Athletics spent two days as an observer at the Summer Session for Coaches held at the Monterey High School from August 14 to 22.

It is our considered judgment that any coach who attended the sessions at Monterey and took full advantage of the opportunities offered could not help but be better fitted for the year's work ahead.

Attendance at such a summer session should

be made as convenient and as profitable as possible for all of our coaches.

There are problems that the State Department of Education and the State Council of the C.I.F. should consider, such as finances, credits and records.

### TENNIS COACHES MEETING

A meeting of C. I. F., Southern Section, tennis coaches will be held at Montebello on Saturday, October 18, at 10:00 A. M. This will be the day of the preliminary matches in the Montebello Fall Tournament. Problems and plans for the tennis year will be considered and any necessary recommendations to the Executive Committee or the Council will be prepared.

### KODACHROME FILMS

The C. I. F. Office has a number of 16 millimeter kodachrome films suitable for showing to high school groups. Baseball, boating, skiing, swimming, tennis, track, wrestling, and football are some of the subjects. Two football films showing the marching clubs of the Tucson High School, the Long Beach Poly High School, the Woodrow Wilson High School and the Santa Barbara vs. Whittier game played in the Los Angeles Coliseum on December 14, 1940, have lots of action and fine coloring. Your pupils will enjoy them.

There is no charge for the use of these films. They will be sent to any school upon request. First come, first served.

### C. I. F. ATHLETIC PROTECTION FUND

All requests for information and for supplies for enrolling boys in the C. I. F. Athletic Protection Fund should be addressed to Mr. A. B. Ingham, Pacific Grove High School, Pacific Grove, California. Mr. Ingham is General Manager of the C. I. F. Athletic Protection Fund.

The following statement was received from Mr. Ingham on September 3.

"The coverage that will be offered to the athletes for the school year 1941-1942 will, in most respects, be the same as offered during the past two years. The more serious injuries, such as broken bones and dislocations, will be cared for under Schedules "A" and "B" as was done last year. A new schedule, known as Schedule "C", has been set up for the ensuing year. The purpose of this new schedule is to cover all injuries received which require the attention of a doctor or dentist. The fee to be paid to the doctor will be based upon the Industrial Accident Commission fee schedule, with a maximum of \$100.00 for hospitalization, \$125.00 for medical injuries and \$60.00 for dental injuries. In order to meet this expense, it has been found that it will take



\$5.00 for coverage for the year in all sports, \$4.25 for coverage in football and/or soccer during the season, and \$3.35 for all sports except football and/or soccer.

"The Protection Fund has finished its second year, with a small surplus, and it is anticipated that this small surplus can be maintained, thus assuring the payment of claims. The 2000 claims for the school year 1940-1941 is an indication that this Protection Fund is being of real service to the boys of California."

### THE ANNUAL PACIFIC SOUTHWEST SECTIONAL TENNIS CHAMPIONSHIPS

The Pacific Southwest Sectional Tennis Championships sponsored by the Tennis Patrons Association of Southern California will be held this year from September 12 to 21 inclusive, at the Los Angeles Tennis Club.

An East-West championship modeled after the Wimbledon Tournament will be held on September 13 and 14.

From September 12 to September 19, high school pupils will be admitted for a rate of 25c. This will be a fine opportunity for tennis enthusiasts among our high school pupils to see all the best players from the American Continents in action.

Contributions to the Chinese war relief will be made from the funds derived from the Tournament.

### NEW SET-UP FOR BULL PUPS

The C. I. F. Office received, in July, the following communication from the Pasadena Junior College:

#### STATEMENT REGARDING ATHLETICS

"Beginning with the opening of school in September, 1941, athletics in Pasadena Junior College will be organized for interscholastic competition on an Upper and Lower Division basis. This means that the "Bullpup" team will consist of representatives from the Freshman and Sophomore years exclusively, and that the Varsity team will consist of representatives drawn from the Junior and Senior years exclusively.

For the past several years Pasadena Junior College has experimented with a Frosh-Varsity set-up in its athletic program. Our experience has convinced us that this constitutes an ideal program for any four-year institution, and, in fact, is the regular practice among four-year colleges throughout the country. While this Frosh-Varsity set-up, however, on account of its unifying effect within the college and many other advantages too apparent to require mentioning in this statement, is ideal from the point of view of the internal organization of the college, our experience has shown that it is not feasible as a plan of organization when competing with other insti-

tutions organized on a different basis.

Until such time, therefore, as there are enough four-year junior colleges to constitute a league in which the Frosh-Varsity plan would be carried out among all schools composing such league, the Pasadena Junior College, solely in the interests of promoting harmonious relationships with other institutions, is voluntarily relinquishing the Frosh-Varsity set-up to conform with the Upper Division-Lower Division set-ups prevalent in other institutions.

This means that for high school athletics the Pasadena Junior College is to work on the same basis as Compton, Pomona and Ventura where the 6-4-4 plan of organization is followed in the public schools.

The 11th and 12th grades in Pasadena should be a power in C. I. F. competition. They wish to be known as the "Bull Pups" to distinguish them from the Varsity teams at the Pasadena Junior College which are popularly known as the "Bull Dogs".

### FEDERAL TICKET TAX

A recent conference with Mr. H. G. Barnett, in charge of the ticket tax division of the Internal Revenue Department for Southern California, revealed that there has been no changes from last year in laws relating to taxes on tickets for school activities of any kind.

Tickets which sell for 20c or above are subject to tax unless exemption is applied for on Form 755 and approved by the Revenue Department. Exemption is allowed if all the money realized is used for educational purposes.

A new revenue bill now before Congress provides for a tax on all tickets of ten cents and above and does away with exemptions.

Principals should note carefully the provisions of this revenue bill when it is finally enacted into law.

The C. I. F. Office will endeavor to keep schools fully informed on this important matter.

Medical Attendance: If an injury does not come under the above Schedule of Benefits but requires treatment by a legally qualified physician or surgeon, not including treatment on the field at the time of play or practice, an allowance of \$2.00 for the first treatment and \$1.00 for each subsequent treatment will be made. The maximum benefit for this type of injury will be \$12.00 with the maximum for infection \$6.00.
