**JOSEPH RINDONE, CHULA VISTA
PRINCIPAL, NEW COUNCIL PRESIDENT**

Joseph Rindone, Jr., capable and popular Principal at Chula Vista High School, in Chula Vista, is the new President of the C.I.F. Southern Section Council for the 1953-54 school year. Although Rindone was born in Independence, Kansas, his family moved westward so that he received most of his education in Los Angeles. Rindone was graduated from the Los Angeles Polytechnic High School in 1928, and from the University of Southern California in 1932.

Joe's first teaching assignment was at the Southwest Junior High School in 1933, where he was appointed Principal in 1935. He later became Principal of the Chula Vista Junior High School where he served from 1942 to 1947. When it was decided to establish a senior high school in Chula Vista in 1947, Mr. Rindone was chosen to organize and activate the school. It opened in temporary quarters with some 600 students. This past Spring the Chula Vista High School has completed its modern educational plant on thirty acres of ground, with a current enrollment of approximately 1000 students. An enthusiastic believer in the value of interscholastic athletics, Mr. Rindone saw to it that the plans for the high school included a fine gymnasium and athletic field.

Mr. Rindone has been active in his civic affairs and has served as President of the Chula Vista Rotary Club. Mr. and Mrs. Rindone have three sons, Howard 14, John 12, and Jerry 7.

The C.I.F. Southern Section Council will be fortunate to have an enthusiastic and efficient leader as our new President, Joseph Rindone, Jr.

MINUTES OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING JUNE 22

The regular June meeting of the C.I.F., Southern Section Executive Committee was called to order by President B. L. Bergstrom at Santa Barbara High School on Monday, June 22, 1953, at 1:45 P.M. Those present were Messrs. Oliver Corbin of Covina HS, Bruce Lawson of Keppel HS, Harvey J. Holt of Santa Barbara HS, S. Chester McIntosh of Puente HS, Winston Nelson of Pomona HS, and William W. Russell, Commissioner of Athletics.

Mr. Corbin and Mr. Lawson were introduced as new members of the Executive Committee for the 1953-54 school year.

1. It was moved, seconded, and carried unanimously that Mr. S. Chester McIntosh be presented with the C.I.F., Southern Section "Certificate of Appreciation" in token thank you on behalf of all the C.I.F. schools for his many many years of unselfish service to the boys and girls of this area. Mr. McIntosh retires from Puente HS as of June 30, 1953. Mr. Bergstrom presented the certificate, suitably framed.

2. It was moved, seconded, and carried to cast a unanimous ballot for B. L. Bergstrom as President of the Executive Committee for the 1953-54 school year.

3. Mr. Russell presented a summary financial report of the C.I.F., Southern Section incomes and expenditures for the 1952-53 year, based on actual incomes and expenses from July 1, 1952 to June 19, 1953; and based on estimated figures from June 20 to 30, 1953. Along with the financial report, was a proposed budget which had been reviewed by Mr. McIntosh and Mr. Nelson, retiring and incoming Treasurers respectively. It was moved, seconded and carried to accept the financial report.

4. Mr. Russell excused himself from the meeting while the committee considered salary for the Commissioner for the coming school year. It was moved, seconded, and carried to set the salary at \$7,500. It was then moved, seconded, and carried to insert the salary figures into the appropriate lines on the proposed budget, and to adopt the proposed budget for the 1953-54 school year. The budget is based on dues to the C.I.F., Southern Section of 4c per ADA, with a minimum fee of \$10.00 per school, the same as the two previous years.

5. It was moved, seconded, and carried to send Mr. Russell as the C.I.F., Southern Section representative to the National Federation Annual

In addition, Free Lance schools may be placed in any of the Groupings, subject to standards set by Executive Committee.

7. It was moved, seconded, and carried that Pa-

cific HS of San Bernardino be considered as a free lance school of the Southern Group of Leagues; and that Muir HS, Pasadena HS, and Santa Barbara HS be considered as free lance schools of the Central Group of Leagues.

8. The Executive Committee reviewed the football schedules of the four free lance schools which had submitted schedules, Pacific HS, Muir HS, Pasadena HS, and Santa Barbara HS. It was moved, seconded and carried that Pasadena, Muir, and Santa Barbara may not lose more than one game of the last six games on their schedule in order to qualify for football playoffs 1953; a tie game will count as one half game lost.

MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF SWIMMING AND WATER POLO COACHES

The usual annual meeting of swimming and water polo coaches was held June 17, 1953, at the C.I.F. Office, Helms Athletic Foundation Building, at 3:00 P.M. The purpose of the meeting is to formulate plans for both the water polo and swimming activities sponsored by the C.I.F. Office for the coming school year.

Swimming Schedule

CHAMPIONSHIP MEET

Prelims May 7, 1954, 7:00 P.M. at one Long Beach high school and at another pool yet to be selected. The six fastest boys by time from each prelim meet will qualify for the semi-finals.

Free-Lance qualifying meet will be held April 30, 1954, at site yet to be determined, for schools whose league does not have a league swimming meet. Each league may enter six boys in the prelims at the Championship meet.

Semi-finals, swimming only, May 11, 1954, 3:30 P.M., Beverly Hills HS. Six fastest boys by times qualify for the finals.

Semi-finals, diving, May 12, 1954, 3:00 P.M., Beverly Hills HS. Qualify six boys in each class for finals. (First competition for divers will be May 12.)

Finals, swimming and diving, May 14, 1954, 7:30 P.M., Beverly Hills HS.

INVITATIONAL MEET

Prelims March 19, 1954, 7:00 P.M. at Jordan HS and another pool yet to be selected. Six fastest boys by time from the combined two prelim meets, will qualify for the finals.

Prelims, diving only, March 24, 1954, 3:00

P.M., at pool to be selected. Qualify six divers in each class for the finals.

Finals, swimming and diving, March 26, 7:30 P.M., at site yet to be selected. Diving prelims and all finals must be held at same pool.

WHITTIER RELAYS

Prelims on February 23, 1954, at 2:30 P.M., at Whittier HS. Six fastest competitors by time, will qualify for the finals.

Finals, February 26, 1954, 3:15 P.M., at Whittier HS.

The group recommended that a Class B 75 yd. Individual Medley event be added to the list of events. The B Individual Medley would immediately precede the Class A Individual Medley in the order of events. It was recommended that both a starter and a referee (two men) be hired at each event in order to properly conduct the meets. The referee will be responsible to check turns, kick, and touching on each race, and to secure proper assistants at the meet to see that this is accomplished. It was strongly recommended that each school in the metropolitan area must furnish one competent official to the host school manager at each meet, in order to secure competent timers and judges. This latter provision would be included on the entry blanks sent out to all schools.

A Games Committee for the 1953-54 school year was appointed, to consist of Mr. Pete Archer of Wilson HS; Mr. Pat Dowd of Black Foxe; the host school meet manager; and William Russell.

Water Polo

There will be a water polo officials and coaches clinic at Whittier HS from 7:30 to 9:00 P.M. each night on September 21, 28, and October 5. The clinic will be conducted by Mr. Heber Holloway, Mr. Jimmy Smith, and Mr. Pete Archer. All water polo officials must attend these meetings if they are to officiate CIF water polo games.

The Coast League will conduct their own water polo league as in 1952. Other schools which wish to enter the CIF sponsored Free Lance Water Polo League may do so. Plans were tentatively drawn for a six-team league, with a double round of competition, 5 games at home, 5 games away, on Wednesdays, Sept. 30, October 7, 14, 21, 28, November 4, 11, and 18; and Fridays November 13, and 20. Class C games will start at 3:00 P.M. with B and A games to follow.

A playoff between the champion in each class of the Free Lance League and Coast League may be held December 2 at 3:30.

The Commissioner of Athletics will draw the schedule for the Free Lance League after determination of entries has been made.

1953 TRACK FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS PROVIDE OUTSTANDING COMPETITION

Three new C.I.F., Southern Section track and field records were written into the books during the 1953 preliminary, semi-final, and final meets held May 16, 19, and 23 in competition that was marked by unusually strong competition in several events.

Claude Ford of the new Baldwin Park HS set a new Class C 180 yard dash mark by running

the distance in 18.2 seconds at the Chaffey HS semi-final meet, May 19, to erase the record held by Don Heldoorn of Perris HS since 1950. Tod Thompson of Glendale HS put the Class B shot 57' 10" to eclipse the 54' 1 7/8" put made by Melvin Lewis of Santa Monica HS in 1947. And big Don Vick of Chaffey HS set a new Class A shot put record with a toss of 61' 2 7/8" to better the 1946 mark of John Helwig of Mt. Carmel HS.

Two boys set new national individual marks, Vick in the shot put with a 62' 5 1/4" mark made in his Citrus Belt League meet; and Ronnie Morris, the finest high school pole vaulter yet to appear in this nation, cleared 13' 11 1/8" in the Foothill League meet. In addition, Bellflower HS set a new mark in the four-man two mile relay event, when they outran Compton HS and Downey HS teams finishing second and third respectively in a fine field of eight entrants, by finishing the distance in 7 min., 56.0 seconds. This time was 9 1/2 seconds faster than the old record set in 1938 by Roosevelt HS of Des Moines, Iowa. All three national record applications were forwarded by the C.I.F., Southern Section Office to the National Federation where they have been officially accepted as national marks.

Santa Ana HS won the Class A title, edging out Compton 15 1/3 to 15. Riverside Polytechnic finished third with 13, and Monrovia and Burbank tied at fourth with 11 points. The City of Glendale retained the Class B championship won last year by Hoover of Glendale and this year by Glendale HS which nosed out Wilson of Long Beach 13 to 11. Pomona HS walked off with the Class C plaque piling up 21 1/2 points to second place El Monte's 14.

A revised plan for the eliminations somewhat answered the need for stiffer competition in the preliminaries, but more need's to be done in this direction. This year some of the leagues which had not been entering as many boys as permitted previously, were allowed only one or two entries

where they formerly were permitted three. Competition in the semi-final meets this year was keen, with an abundance of brilliant half milers. In the two heats of the 880 at the Oxnard HS semi-final meet, six boys ran in times of 1:59 or better, yet only the first two of each heat could qualify for the championship meet. Contestants in the track events placed themselves in the various heats and lanes by their performances in the previous week's meets; field events competitors placed themselves in order of competition by their previous week's marks.

Wind marred the championship meet held on Oxnard High School's well groomed field. In the semi-final meet at Oxnard on Tuesday afternoon, May 19, there was no wind and competitive conditions were ideal; but on Saturday, May 23, the wind blew the sprinters down the track so that the 100 yard dash times in Classes A, B, and C were better than accepted records. Of course, these times are not accepted CIF marks because of the excessive wind condition.

Four preliminary meets were held Saturday, May 16, at San Diego State College, Riverside HS, Compton HS, and Carpinteria HS. The San Diego and Riverside meets were brought together in semi-final competition at Chaffey HS, while Oxnard HS was the semi-final site for the qualifiers from Compton and Carpinteria. Semi-finals were held Tuesday afternoon, May 19. The Championship Meet was held at Oxnard, Saturday, May 23.

The administration and staff of each of the schools which held a C.I.F., Southern Section meet this year is to be commended for making it possible for almost 2000 entrants to take part in our track and field program which is regarded by other states as one of the best in the nation. Mr. Darryl Smith and Mr. William Bailey of the San Diego City Schools Physical Education office managed the San Diego preliminary meet.
